## One Of Area's Best Wheat Harvests Over

One of the best wheat crops ever harvested in this area is over and wheat farmers are beginning to put up their land, or were until the rain Monday of this week.

Both elevators, Farmers Grain and Knox City Grain, reported receiving approximately 425,000 bushels of 1979 wheat as compared to 45,000 last year. They also reported their good luck in obtaining box cars to ship out the wheat, due to the fact that other areas were receiving rain, making more combines and box cars available for Knox City.

Farmers reported various yields of from 25 to 50 bushels per acre. Price was also above last year's ranging

from \$3.36 to \$4.30. Elevators reported receiving numerous small loads but the first full loads were brought in on May 29 at Farmers Grain and June 6 at Knox City Grain.

## June Rains Are A Welcome Sight

## Would You Believe!

(Editor's Note: The following editorial appeared in a recent issue of the Beaumont (Texas) Enterprise-Journal concerning the exporting of diesel fuel. It reads as follows:

"We're surprised the nationwide trucker's strike didn't originate in Texas along the Texas-Mexico border.

"There's plenty of gasoline in Mexico these days, and they don't mind sharing it with United States motorists who come to Mexico. According to a report in the El Paso Times, motorists can buy unlimited 92 octane unleaded gasoline for 67.9 cents a gallon and regular gas for 47.9 cents a gallon in Juarez - but no extra cans or drums,

through much of the Big Country dumping large amounts of rain and causing isolated flash flooding. Stamford reported 2.02 inches on Monday and 2.7 inches of rain fell in Haskell in about an hour. Haskell residents reported flooding in low-lying areas, but no damage.

Rochester reported an even 2.00 inches with Monday's gauging a total of 1.24 inches. Other area towns reporting rain were Weinert with a 2.50 reading and Rule, which received the smallest area amount, with .8 inch.

please. "But diesel fuel in Juarez is selling for 16 cents a gallon. There isn't enough to go around, however, so truckers can only buy 100 liters at a time, and they will not sell diesel fuel to foreigners.

"Why? Because Pemex, the Mexican national oil company, imports its diesel fuel from the United States oil companies and cannot get enough for unlimited sales at border stations.

"Obviously, the Mexicans are getting diesel fuel a lot cheaper than United States citizens are getting it.

"We think the truckers - and the rest of us - deserve to know why diesel fuel is being exported to Mexico and why they can afford to sell it at 16 cents a gallon."

## Meinzer Is Photo Winner

### Summer Sport Camps

## UIL Officials Discuss Situation

AUSTIN - To camp. Or not to camp.

This question, involving the University Interscholastic League's sanction on specialized summer football, basketball, and volleyball camps, is suddenly a hot item of discussion among high school athletic officials and enthusiasts.

The rule states that students attending specialized camps will lose one year's eligibility in the sport or sports in which he or she attended the camp. Despite a setback in court last August and Legislative attempts to circumvent the rule - not to mention probability of further litigation - Texas school administrators voted 670-259 last April to retain the ban on camps.

"The basic question is this: Does the member school have a vested interest in the activities of students during summer months?" said Bill Farney, UIL athletic director. "The answer is yes."

"The UIL is one of the few remaining amateur organizations in the nation," Farney said. "In order to retain this amateur status, some rules must be enforced throughout the year. For example, the League has restrictions on gaining college instruction in all activities: music, literary and academic, as well as athletic.

"There are varying degrees of restriction from event to event, and these degrees of restrictions arise from the pressure on students inflicted by members of the community, coaches and other peer groups."

This explains in part why camp participation is allowed in tennis and golf, band and one-act play, but not football or basketball. Community pressure has not come to the point where golfers and thespians are pressured to attend summer camps. In basketball and football, this is not the case. Prior to the rule, students were "indirectly coerced" to attend camps, whether they wished to or not.

League officials contend that already, junior high students (who are not bound by camp prohibitions) are pressured into camps against their will, being told by coaches and others, "You cannot play on the high school team unless you attend a camp this summer."

Farney said, "It is the feeling of the school people that there are a lot more who would be forced into going to camps than there are those who want to go but cannot. In other states, we find this happening."

In addition, sports such as golf and tennis are individual sports, considered lifetime avocations. Football, basketball, and volleyball are team oriented sports and, except for a small fraction, most do not participate regularly past the high school level.

The rules do not prohibit students from attending these camps but state that a student who attended a specialized camp cannot represent the school on the varsity squad. He may play for the junior varsity. The rules do not prohibit summer workouts. An athlete may practice the entire summer, as long as the practices are not organized. Most high schools open gymnasiums in order to allow students workout time of their own.

Rules governing out-of-season participation are not unique to the UIL. The NCAA and other sports organizations, including the professionals, have rules governing organized practices outside the regular season.

"These rules are not adopted by irascible school administrators for no good reason," Farney said. "These people are not given to capricious or arbitrary behavior and the actions they take are given grave consideration. One thing to keep

in mind is that every rule in the League Constitution was placed there in order to relieve some abuse of educational competition.

"The League program is structured so that each program is in coordination and perspective with the others," he said. "While some states may allow some activities Texas does not, we here allow quite a bit they may not."

For example, Minnesota allows its schools to play only 19 basketball games per year, in contrast to Texas schools, which can play as many as 35 to 40.

"We allow more games than most states," Farney said. "We allow schools to conduct a year-long off-season program whereas many states do not have the one-hour practice period during the school day."

"This is a master plan by the school people to keep our program educational by not allowing one program to infringe upon another school program, and not allowing any of these programs to infringe upon the educational process," Farney said.

Farney said contentions that the camp ban has hurt

basketball in Texas are absurd.

"In the first place, just because other states have camps does not mean they don't have problems with them," he said. "We attend national meetings and one of the major concerns is summer camps."

"As for the idea that no camps has hurt Texas, consider that there are no football camps, and football in Texas doesn't seem to be suffering. In addition to that, we have the same rule for girls and the overwhelming majority of girls playing for Texas colleges last year was from Texas, playing the five player game despite the fact they've played the six-player game up to this year. And three Texas collegiate teams were ranked in the top ten nationally."

The question is one of interest. Better athletes in Texas traditionally went the football route, not only in high school but in college. Today, more interest is building in basketball and the sport is stronger today than ever and will continue to grow.

Consider the adverse effects of camps: minority students or those from poorer school

districts are at a disadvantage because they cannot afford the high costs of camps, outstanding players from poor districts could face disqualification in violation of amateur rules if it is found he allowed a coach or other person to pay his way to a camp.

The camps, more often than not, are showcases for college recruiters. The basic activities are fundamentals and playing time. In some cases, the players are taught different fundamentals than the high school coach would teach and problems can arise when the coach attempts to correct or change what the player was taught.

The exceptional athlete will win the college scholarship. The rules affect not only the outstanding few but also the 96-97 percent who will never participate in college football, basketball or volleyball.

These rules are necessary in order to protect that 97 percent, to make certain they can go out on their own during the summer months rather than being pressured by coaches and other parties. ## Farabee Blasts DOE Policy

AUSTIN - State Senator Ray Farabee blasted Washington for its lack of any National Energy Program saying, "State government does not set energy policy, but somehow the Department of Energy (DOE) expects state and local governments to enforce their piecemeal plans."

"Until we have a coherent National Energy Plan, we will be living from one crisis to the next. It is unfair to expect state or local governments to carry out something which the Federal government can neither explain, understand nor administer," Farabee stated to the Lions Club in Wichita Falls this week.

Although there are no simple answers to the energy problem according to Farabee, he outlined four points which he stated we must address: 1) a clear-cut National Energy Policy; 2) greater individual conservation; 3) development of energy alternatives such as gasohol, solar energy, coal and lignite power; and 4) priorities for agricultural production, emergency health care and commercial transportation.

Farabee filed a protest with DOE in Washington last week opposing their latest so-called "conservation plan" because the proposed regulations reflect ignorance of the problems in the 30th Senatorial District.

Farabee stated his office has received a number of requests for assistance in connection with energy needs related to the wheat harvest, disaster needs and health care. "We have received excellent cooperation from the Governor's Office of Energy Resources, and I am pleased that although they are limited in their authority, they have been able to provide assistance in most instances."

## Special Treatment, Purchases

# Gasoline Dealers Are Being Warned

DALLAS - Retail gasoline dealers offering special treatment to preferred customers or requiring the purchase of a product or service in order to buy gasoline may be violating federal pricing regulations, it was announced today by G. Dan Rambo, Dallas, regional representative for the U.S. Department of Energy.

DoE regulations prohibit changes in business practices which give special treatment to preferred classes of customers, such as credit card holders, cash-paying motorists, or regular customers.

Also prohibited are tie-in

sales that require a motorist to purchase products or services such as a car wash, food, or auto accessories and repairs as a condition to buy gasoline. Rambo pointed out that these practices occur more frequently during times of gasoline supply shortages and long service station lines. "Any new tie-in sale, business practice or credit arrangement may be a violation of the regulations," Rambo said.

penalty is up to \$10,000 per day for each violation.

Motorists who have complaints about discriminatory or tie-in sales should call DoE's toll-free hotline at 1-800-424-9246.

Dealers who have questions about the regulations should contact the DoE Enforcement Office at P.O. Box 35228, Dallas, Texas 75235.

Rambo emphasized the DoE Office of Enforcement currently is investigating service stations which are reported to be using these sales practices. "We want dealers and motorists to be aware that these practices, as well as requirements for appointments, purchase of membership cards, reservation fees, and advance payments for gasoline or services, all may be violations of the regulations," he said.

Failure to comply with the regulations can result in civil penalties of up to \$2,500 per violation for each day the violation occurs. In the case of willful violations, the

# New General Manager For Six Flags Is Quanah Native

ARLINGTON - In 1961, 18-year-old Errol McKoy left Tulsa, Oklahoma, to become a host on one of the dozen or so rides at the spanking new Six Flags Over Texas theme park in Arlington.

This month he is back, and he is now the general manager of the entertainment center which boasts more than 100 rides, shows and attractions and draws more than two million visitors a year.

McKoy's wife, Sandy, was a perky, teenage hostess on the park's Riverboat ride when they first met. They

were married in June, 1969, less than a month before he was named general manager of the second park in the Six Flags chain, Six Flags Over Georgia near Atlanta. He was 26 at the time.

At the Arlington park McKoy replaces Dan Howells who has been named general manager of the sixth theme park in the growing organization, Six Flags Magic Mountain in Valencia, California.

McKoy commented, "When you've spent your adult life with Six Flags, it's a real thrill to come back to the spot

where it all started. It's a particularly important step for me since I was lucky enough to be a part of the team of kids that worked here when the gates opened in '61.

"I suppose I feel an extra responsibility to Six Flags Over Texas because I was here in the days when everybody was dreaming about what the park could be. Now I'm in a position to share in the decisions which will make Six Flags more fun than ever, and that's exciting."

McKoy noted that Six Flags Over Texas employed about 400 seasonal hosts and hostesses at the time that he was working as a ride operator on the Astrolift. There are some 2,500 youngsters on the 1979 host and hostess team.

"Working with these youngsters is half the enjoyment of being at Six Flags," he said. McKoy met the hosts and hostesses during his first week on his new job by helping serve juice and doughnuts to the morning shift as they reported to work. The impromptu "continental breakfast" was a McKoy idea. "It seemed like a neat way to get to meet a lot of people in a hurry," he explained.

The new park executive was born in Quanah, Texas. He attended public schools in Tulsa, and holds a degree in Economics from Northeastern State University.

# DPS To Be On Full Alert

The Texas Department of Public Safety will be on full alert with all uniform services on roads and highways in the state of Texas to control traffic during the Fourth of July Operation Motorcade in 1979. This alert period will begin at 6:00 p.m. July 3, and continue through midnight July 4. During this time, highway activities are expected to increase. With this anticipation, the Department of Public Safety has estimated that 13 persons will lose their lives in traffic accidents. Operation Motorcade will last 30 hours, and each motorist will be responsible for himself and all others on the Texas highways. This is a great responsibility placed on the individual driver at this time of highly congestive traffic.

The condition of the driver is the main source of maladjustment for most accidents in both rural and city driving. It is estimated that at least 50 percent of all fatal accidents involve a drinking driver. Those persons who operate motor vehicles for long periods of time without a rest period develop "Highway Hypnosis". This condition is caused by fatigue and monotonous driving, allowing the mind to wander, and in turn reduces alertness and reflexes.

The Fourth of July will produce many extra vehicles on the highways. From these added motorists come traffic snarls, and with traffic snarls come nervous tension and impatience. The best way to make a trip is to plan the trip well in advance. Always understand two things; if you leave late, plan on arriving later, and remember that the most dangerous mile you drive is the next mile ahead. These two maxims really mean you can't make up time lost on the road by speeding, and only the defensive driver

will survive in today's modern mode of transportation.

Major C.W. Bell, regional commander of the DPS's 60 counties said, "Defensive driving is driving to prevent accidents in spite of the incorrect actions of others and adverse conditions." He cautioned the Texas motorist to wear seat belts at all times. The National Safety Council has statistics showing that a person has a five to one chance of surviving if he remains in the auto during violent crashes. These are much better odds than being thrown from the vehicle just before it rolls over the person involved. The human body does not fare too well when that

much weight (3000 pounds) is forced upon it in these rollover accidents. Remember, when a person is thrown from a rollover crash, such as can occur at almost any speed, that person will usually be thrown in the path of the vehicle.

Despite the fact that 13 persons are predicted to die in traffic accidents this Fourth of July on this state's highways, the Texas Department of Public Safety will do everything reasonable to help Texas motorists prevent an accident. If drivers are in need of directions, or have engine trouble, they should call upon the trooper on the road to give them assistance. That black and white patrol

car can mean the difference between a safe, secure trip and a great physical loss in many cases. The Department has a motto of "Courtesy, Service, and Protection."

Major Bell summed up the situation by saying, "We in this region hope to have the safest Fourth of July on record this year. The American public are the people this celebration is for, and what better way to celebrate than by keeping alive."

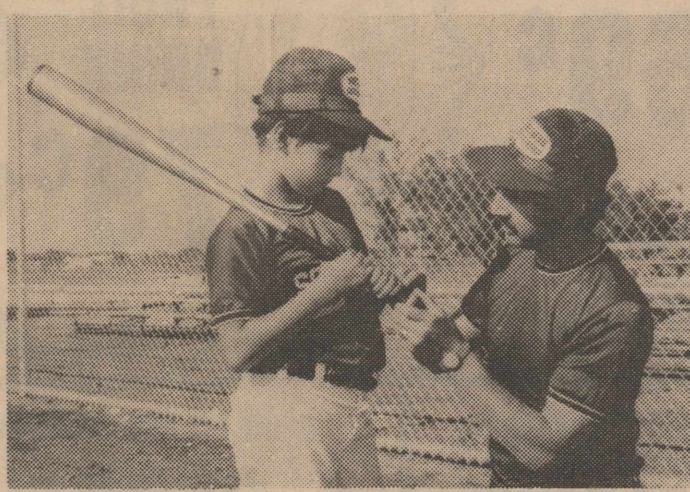

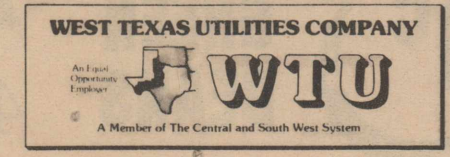

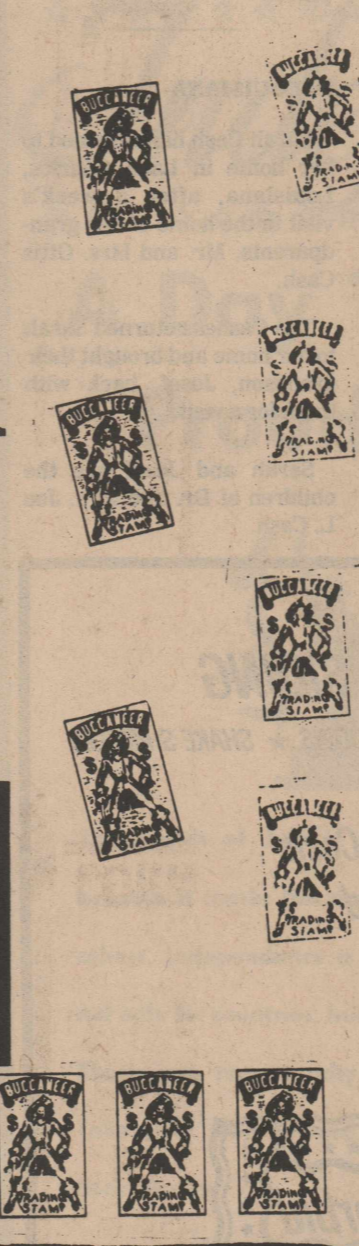
