## Carter optimistic on hostage release

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States sent Iran the draft of a possible agreement to end the hostage crisis Friday night, and the White House said the 52 American captives could be released before President Carter leaves office if Iran promptly accepts.

Bargaining furiously to gain the hostages' freedom before Carter turns the government over to Ronald Reagan next Tuesday, the administration also announced the start of preparations for transferring frozen Iranian assets to the Tehran government in the event of a settlement.

"You would be correct in interpreting the fact we have taken these steps today as a sign we have some optimism about it," White House press secretary Jody Powell told reporters.

But at the State Department, Treasury Secretary G. William Miller and representatives of 12 major banks were unable after a seven-hour meeting to reconcile differences between the United States and Iran over the total of Iran's frozen assets.

Iran claims about \$14 billion in assets were blocked by Carter, while the United States puts the total at about \$9.5 billion. Miller reported "good progress" in talks with the bankers but said, "We are still at a point where we do not have an agreement." Consultations will continue, Miller said.

Miller and White House counsel Lloyd Cutler then went to work drafting a U.S. response to Iranian financial demands.

"The reason we are trying to be so precise is that no one wants to make an agreement in which there is so much vagueness that there could later be an abortion of an agreement because of the misperceptions of the amounts," Miller said.

The draft was sent Friday night to Deputy Secretary of State Warren M. Christopher in Algiers, to be relayed

by Algerian intermediaries to Tehran.

"The real next step," said Miller, "is to see, if through Mr. Christopher, there can be communication (with Iran), a verification of figures and to see if the other elements of a settlement can be accomplished."

Powell said the U.S. terms for a final agreement should reach Tehran on Saturday. If Iran accepts the American draft on that day, he said, the hostages could be released by Inauguration Day next Tuesday. The hostages spent their 40th day in captivity Friday.

Powell said about \$2.2 billion in gold and cash or "cash equivalents" is being placed in position for delivery to an escrow account that could be

turned over to Iran "if and when the hostages are released."

In addition to the gold, worth about \$1 billion, Powell said about \$1.2 billion worth of U.S. Treasury securities owned by Iran but held by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York are being sold to turn them into cash or cash equivalents for prompt transfer to an escrow account.

Powell said that if Iran accepts the agreement proposal, most of it written by U.S. negotiators in Algiers working with Algerian intermediaries, there probably would be no need for further U.S. messages.

Powell said he did not know whether Carter would greet the hostages upon their release.

### Iran Demands At-A-Glance

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here, at a glance, is the status of the four demands set Nov. 2 by the Iranian Parliament for release of the American hostages.

**Non interference**  
Iran demanded a pledge of non interference in its internal affairs. The United States agreed.

**Frozen Assets**  
Iran demanded release of assets frozen in the U.S. after the hostages were seized. Iran estimates they total \$14 billion, the U.S. says they total about \$9.5 billion. The U.S. says about \$2.2 billion is located in the Federal Reserve System and can be released immediately when the hostages are freed. However, billions more are being kept by U.S. banks and are subject to legal claims that might block their return to Iran.

**American Claims**  
The Parliament demanded cancellation of all American claims against Iran. The U.S. said the president had no authority by law to do that, but proposed binding arbitration by an international claims commission and the Parliament accepted that this week.

**Shah's Wealth**  
Iran demanded confiscation and return of all property the late Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi and his relatives brought to the U.S., and demanded that \$10 billion be deposited in the Central Bank of Algeria as a guarantee. The U.S. said the president had no such authority by law but promised to freeze any U.S. assets of the shah's estate and assist Iran in recovering them. Secretary of State Edmund S. Muskie said Thursday he believes Iran no longer plans to press this demand but added the U.S. has not been told that explicitly.

## Shaking Shasta's citizens cynical

MOUNT SHASTA, Calif. (AP) — Mount Shasta has shaken and quivered with more than a 100 small earthquakes this year, but some worried residents of this snow-paused forest town take a fatalistic view of the possibility the volcano will blow up.

Observers from the U.S. Geological Survey are on hand to study the earthquakes, which have been centered along a fault running through Tennant, a logging town of 100 persons about 16 miles northeast of the mountain.

A similar watch in Washington last spring culminated in the awesome, deadly eruption May 18 of Mount St. Helens, 100 miles to the north in the same Cascade mountain range.

"If it happens, it happens," said Frank Melis, the fire chief of Mount Shasta. "That's what makes people old. They worry about it."

Although scientists haven't linked the earthquakes to any volcanic activity in the bowels of Mount Shasta, at least a few townfolk — Tony Franklin included — are cynically hoping to capitalize on the alarm.

"I'm going to haul all the old tires I can find and set them on fire on top of

the mountain. Then when everyone comes, I'm going to buy up all the property," Franklin jokingly told fellow drinkers at the local Boom bar.

About 1,000 people in the area regard the mountain as a "dormant" Mount Shasta. Wood and Melis said would have to be evacuated if a volcanic eruption occurred.

## One suspect released in Atlanta

ATLANTA (AP) — A man arrested Friday with a badge and a bunch of lollipops was freed as a suspect in the deaths and disappearances of 10 black children, but a newspaper said another man was being questioned in the case.

A 16-year-old man, charged with the attempted kidnapping of a 3-year-old black girl and simple battery, was being asked if he knew anything about the 10 victims, the Atlanta Constitution reported. The newspaper said he was arrested Thursday after the incident involving the 3-year-old girl. Authorities were not available for comment.

The most recent record of suspect activity on Mount Shasta was in the 1900s, when seismans off the California coast sighted a cloud above the 14,142-foot peak. But scientists can't confirm that the vapors were volcanic. The last definite eruption of the mountain has been traced back more than 10,000 years ago.

The child screamed when a man was carrying her in his arms, said Willie Clayton, a witness.

The girl saw me and panicked, Clayton said. "He put the little girl down and took off." The suspect was arrested after Clayton pointed him out to police.

The man, with the lollipops and badge, "is not a suspect in the missing and murdered children cases," said police spokeswoman Beverly Harvord.

## Iran raid survivor would try rescue mission again

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — Joseph J. Beyers III, a U.S. serviceman severely burned in the aborted attempt to rescue the American hostages in Iran, says he would try the mission again if given the chance.

Beyers, an Air Force staff sergeant, was discharged from the service with 100 percent disability benefits because of his injuries.

"There are plenty of people in this world who would do it," the 38-year-old Beyers told The Augusta Herald in an interview Thursday. "There are millions of Americans who would volunteer because we care."

Eight U.S. servicemen were killed and several were injured last April when a C-130 Air Force transport was hit by a helicopter and burst into flames as the crew tried to take off from an Iranian desert after the rescue mission was called off. The mission was aborted because helicopters broke down.

Beyers, a radioman on the transport, was flown to Germany and then to Texas with other injured servicemen. His hands are covered with red scar tissue and his fingers are twisted from burns.

He and his six children now live at Eglin Air Force Base in Florida, where he has physical therapy every day. He visited his parents' home in North Augusta, S.C. this week. North

Augusta is just across the Savannah River from this Georgia community.

Beyers said he might have escaped injury had he not been standing behind the pilot at the time of the crash. His normal position was in the middle of the airplane, but that area was full of cargo for the rescue mission, he said.

"He said he was approached for the volunteer mission after another serviceman dropped out because his mother was sick."

"After that, there was no way they could get me out of it. It was what I had been trained to do, and it was what the American people were paying me to do," said Beyers.

"There was no doubt in my military mind but what the mission would work. There was 100 percent morale. Probably the highest I had ever seen," he said.

"Everything was pre-positioned. It was just a matter of going in and moving them out," Beyers said.

"Those things that went wrong were minor things that probably could not happen again in 100 years. There was a dusty storm, and those equipment failures. You probably could fly those helicopters in 100 sorties and it would never happen again. I just don't know what happened," he said.

## Families keeping fingers crossed

Probably with more hope than ever before, the families of the American hostages in Iran crossed their fingers, said their prayers and awaited word on Friday that their loved ones may soon be freed.

"My fingers are braided to the elbows," said Louisa Kennedy, wife of hostage Moorehead Kennedy, and spokeswoman for an organization that has been the hostage family liaison with the State Department through 40 days of torment.

"I feel like we've been on a cruise ship that is just coming into port," she said. "But this cruise has been a nightmare."

Across the United States — in towns like Oak Creek, Wis.; Jesup, Iowa, and Stone Mountain, Ga., and in cities like Washington, New York and San Diego — it was a nerve-wrenching vigil.

"This is the longest week I've ever

lived through," said Carol Ellledge of Kennewick, Wash., sister of captive Joe Hall, 31, of Bend, Ore. "I wake up with the news and go to bed with the news."

"We're just sorta sitting back on the sidelines and watching what's happening and just waiting and praying that something comes of it," said Ernest Cook, of Memphis, father of hostage Donald Cooke, 25.

Everybody's walking around with their fingers crossed — the feeling is very hopeful," said Dorothea Morefield of San Diego, wife of the Embassy's consul general Richard Morefield.

The family's mood is one of high tension with lots of joy in the air," said Dan Morefield, the couple's 21-year-old son.

"I'm just hoping. It sounds promising," said Arvid Laingen of Odin, Minn., brother of Bruce Laingen, the U.S. charges d'affaires in Tehran,

who spent most of his captivity at the Iranian Foreign Ministry.

But like many of the hostage family members willing to comment Friday, as negotiators appeared near a settlement, Laingen tempered his hope with the knowledge that there have been many disappointments before.

"I hope it's not just another peak in the rollercoaster ride," said the freed mill operator, who last heard from his brother in December, when the diplomat expressed optimism about his release.

That was the same concern in the home of Vivien Homeyer of Jesup, Iowa, sister of hostage Kathryn Koob, 13.

"We're watching the news real close, but we're trying not to get our hopes up too high for fear we'll be disappointed as we have been so often in the past," she said.

"We've been there often enough now that we're not going to be climb-

ing any mountain peaks until we know that all 52 of the hostages are out of Iran."

Betty Scott, wife of hostage Col. Charles Scott, 48, of Stone Mountain, Ga., also reigned in any excitement. "I'll believe it when I see him," she said.

And Deborah Plotkin of Sherman Oaks, Calif., said she planned to spend the day by her telephone. "If they are released, then I will have something to say," said the wife of Jerry Plotkin, 46, who was in Tehran on business at the time of the Nov. 4, 1979, takeover.

The families have been subjected to intense media interest during the ordeal, with reporters and photographers parked at their doorsteps or calling every time the crisis took a new twist.

Some have welcomed reporters into their homes, while others took steps to avoid the pressure.

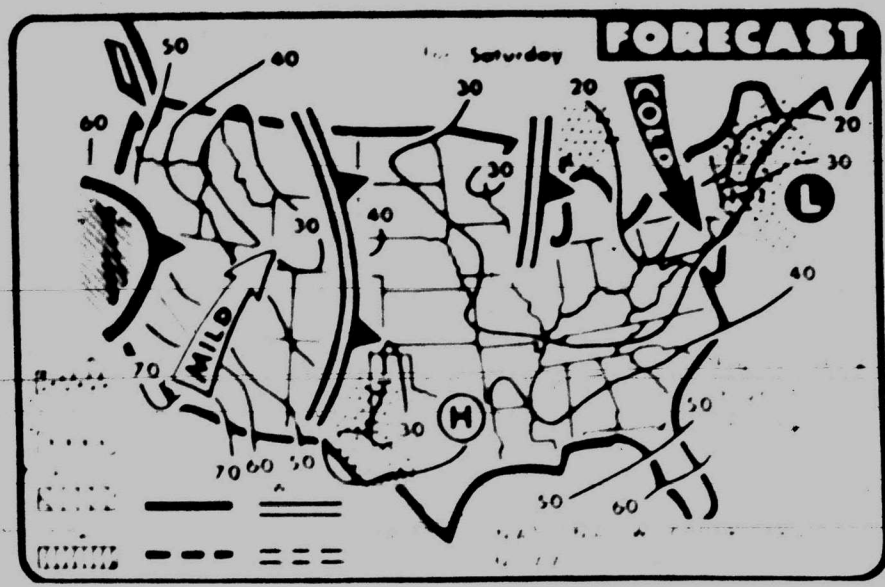

AT&T, Justice reach settlement agreement

WASHINGTON (AP) — The American Telephone & Telegraph Co. and the Justice Department have reached agreement on a concrete, detailed proposal for settlement of the government's massive antitrust suit aimed at breaking up the world's largest company.

The biggest remaining question according to attorneys for the two sides is whether the incoming Reagan administration will accept the settlement terms.

Top officials of both AT&T and the Justice Department refused to discuss details of the proposed settlement, but informed sources indicated AT&T was offering to voluntarily sell at least one of its local operating companies and divest certain equipment manufacturing functions.

The existence of an agreement was revealed Friday by U.S. District Judge Harold H. Greene immediately after the completion of opening arguments. The judge started courtroom observers by announcing he was granting a request by both sides to delay the taking of testimony until at least Feb. 2.

The judge later issued a written order, disclosing that he had met with attorneys for both sides in his chambers Wednesday and Thursday and was now convinced they had negotiated a tangible settlement agreement.

Greene had refused just last week to delay the start of trial in the 6-year-old case, despite claims by AT&T and the Justice Department that they had reached a framework or concept for a settlement.

Both sides have estimated the trial could take more than two years if there is no settlement.

Court officials later released a transcript of Wednesday's closed-door meeting of the judge, AT&T general counsel Howard J. Trienens and prosecutor Gerald A. Connell. The judge sealed the record of Thursday's meeting, however, presumably because it contains details of the proposed settlement.

During Wednesday's meeting, Trienens informed the judge a "tangible concrete agreement" had been reached.

"We have no complex or controversial features remaining to be resolved in substance but we do have last minute technical drafting problems," Trienens said.

Nation has 'problem'; Carter

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Jimmy Carter said the defense establishment will require some sacrifice if the nation is to meet its obligations to the world.

He said that nothing in the United States' strategic doctrine contains anything that nuclear warfare could be a deliberate instrument for achieving our own goals of peace and freedom.

He said the ability of the nation to withstand a series of economic shocks unprecedented in peacetime — mainly because of the increase in imported oil — was impaired because of a decrease in the growth of productivity and the persistence of underlying inflationary forces built up over the past 15 years.

Nevertheless, the economy has proved to be remarkably resilient, he said, citing a 10 percent growth in employment and an average 1 percent growth in real output.

He said inflation requires that government restrain spending but high inflation cannot be attributed solely to government spending.

He said he declined to recommend a tax cut to stimulate the economy, because the persistent inflationary pressures that beset our economy require a restrained fiscal policy.

Marcos ends martial law

MANILA (AP) — President Ferdinand Marcos said Friday that martial law would be lifted throughout the Philippines.

He said if the Philippines are to begin to be democratic processes it was necessary to develop a strong opposition. It is now time that we begin to debate, Marcos added.

Nonetheless, Marcos said, he would rather debate than fighting in the streets.

The 67-year-old Marcos, who came to power in 1966, imposed martial law in September 1972, saying his aim was to reform Philippine society and to save the republic from what he then called communist and rightist leftist subversive power.

Marcos said Friday that although his proclamation will lift martial law throughout the country, one important right — the writ of habeas corpus — will remain totally suspended in part of the southern island of Mindanao.

Mindanao is the scene of a long-running rebellion by Muslim guerrillas seeking independence from the predominantly Roman Catholic Philippines.

Suspension of habeas corpus writ means the government can arrest anyone without formal charges of court warrants on suspicion that he has committed or is likely to commit any kind of crime.

That will remain true in such other provinces as may be recommended by the National Security Council, Marcos said. And the writ would be suspended in the rest of the country only in connection with crimes against national security and public order, he said.

# Inspectors checking thermostats

BOSTON (AP) — Inspectors looking for thermostats set above 55 degrees on hundreds of stores and factories Friday, as state officials stepped up efforts to force conservation of a dangerously low natural gas supply in eastern Massachusetts.

Massachusetts Energy Secretary Joseph S. Fitzpatrick said the latest conservation efforts by customers of Boston Gas Co. had reduced demand by only 2 1/2 percent. He said a savings of at least 10 percent was needed to halt the continuing erosion of reserves.

About 70 polite but firm inspectors from the utility fanned out across the Boston area, checking to see whether large commercial and industrial gas users were heeding the 55 mandatory thermostat ceiling imposed Thursday by Gov. Edward J. King. Fitzpatrick said initial reports showed only about one-third of the firms complying with the order.

Doris Pote, chairman of the state Department of Public Utilities, said violations were especially high among smaller firms and those in wealthier areas.

One variety store had its thermostat set on 80, Fitzpatrick said. More than 100 gas-heated schools were shut down across the state as another conservation measure.

King and Fitzpatrick said they would not know until Sunday whether it would be necessary to keep schools closed or take any other mandatory steps, such as closing industries.

Boston Gas still was sending out more gas than it was receiving from

pipelines and various auxiliary supplies, Fitzpatrick said, adding that the utility could face a dangerously low liquefied natural gas supply by Tuesday if the present trend continued.

Utility spokesman John D'Addico said consumption for the 124-hour period ending at 8 a.m. was 408 million cubic feet of gas, compared with 435 million for the previous 24 hours. He said a two-degree rise in outdoor temperatures accounted for most of the decrease, however.

An Associated Press reporter who accompanied one inspector to South Boston found five thermostats at 55 or lower, and four above.

Some plant managers insisted they were obeying the rules, but their thermostats told a different story.

Gar Ferguson, part-owner of the Stanley W. Ferguson coffee firm, led inspectors to a dusty boiler room to prove his temperature controls were on the mark. However, when he opened his thermostat box, the pointer was set at 58. He quickly rolled it down to 50.

At Crown Services, a Boston linen supply firm, a company official who unlocked his covered thermostat and found a 62 reading muttered: "Well, it was low before. I don't know who put it up there."

At some locations, inspectors found thermostats that could be turned down only to about 59. Some companies claimed there was no thermostat or that they didn't know where it was located.

At the Boston Tennis Club, players quickly jumped into exercise suits and turtle-necks and warmed up with coffee after taking showers in 60-degree air. But no one seemed to mind. "I keep it this cold at my own home anyway," explained Nancy Altman of Marblehead. "It's been cold for so long this winter I'm used to it."

Inspectors had to rely on diplomacy alone as they made their rounds. Officials said nothing in current state laws permitted sanctions.

Boston Gas was counting on a shipment of LNG from Georgia to ease its crunch. Officials said a vessel sent to Savannah to pick up the fuel was expected back in Boston by Friday.

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## AT&T wants authority to distribute TV programs

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a move to enter the commercial satellite business, the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. asked federal authorities Friday to authorize a three-year trial during which it would distribute television programming.

AT&T disclosed in a filing with the Federal Communications Commission that NBC has already asked to experiment with using AT&T's satellites to distribute programming to stations in Chicago, Houston and Los Angeles.

If federal approval is received AT&T added the satellite service for NBC would begin May 18.

"NBC came to us and requested that we consider this trial," said AT&T spokesman Wayne Dubois. The trial period is designed to evaluate the potential demand for this type of service.

AT&T along with the General Telephone & Electronics Corp., currently leases and controls the entire capacity of three domestic satellites owned by the Communications Satellite Corp. (COMSAT).

When the FCC authorized AT&T to add satellite connections to its interstate network in 1976, however, it prohibited the giant telephone firm from using them to provide any type of commercial private service, including television programming, for three years.

As a result, customers must now go to either the Western Union Telegraph Co., which has three satellites in orbit, or RCA American Communications Inc., which has two satellites.

RCA American Communications, which like NBC is a subsidiary of the

RCA Corp., has focused most its attention on serving cable TV programmers and thus it is Western Union's satellites which are now used most frequently by broadcasters.

The competitive situation in the satellite field will soon change, however, since the FCC last month approved the launches of 20 new communication satellites, including two that would be owned directly by AT&T.

FCC sources suggested Friday that AT&T had decided to explore the television distribution business as a new market in which it might establish itself before additional competitors launch their satellites.

As a secondary reason for this request, we do feel that satellite technology is adaptable to broadcast needs and we are interested in gaining our own experience in this type of service," Dubois acknowledged.

Efforts to reach NBC officials late Friday to discuss why they approached AT&T for satellite service were unsuccessful.

Dubois said he could not speak for NBC on whether the proposed satellite transmissions to the three TV stations would involve the regular network schedule or some type of specialized programming.

All three major TV networks rely on microwave radio systems to distribute their regular programming simultaneously to affiliates throughout the country.

If NBC is moving actively toward the use of satellites, it would require a huge capital investment to replace an operating microwave system that allows the network to reach most of the homes in the country.

## Police told 'shoot to kill'

NEW YORK (AP) — The head of a police union has directed all city policemen to "shoot first and shoot to kill" if they believe their lives are in danger but Police Commissioner Robert McGuire said Friday such an order has been in effect in the department since 1972.

Philip Caruso, the head of the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association, had the directive posted in all 73 police precincts following Monday's execution-style slaying of a police officer.

McGuire said the department's firearms regulations state that no warning shot is required when an officer orders a suspect to halt.

The department has officers have been shot and 21 killed.

"If mad-dog killers ways-instructed officers to shoot to kill if they feel their lives are in danger, he said.

"This is not a John Wayne movie. You don't shoot some guy's (gun) arm off," he said.

Caruso issued his directive hours after attending a funeral for the slain officer, Robert Waish, who was killed during the attempted robbery of a Queens, N.Y., bar. Four young men have been arrested in that case.

Three other officers have been wounded here since the first of the year.

McGuire noted that since he took office three years ago 86 police officers can declare an open season on police officers and do so with impunity, then I certainly feel free to likewise declare an open season on violent criminals," Caruso said.

In a similar incident, Police Chief Gerald L. Loudermilk of Terre Haute, Ind., announced last week that he had revised department policy to give policemen broader use of guns. Loudermilk said his so-called "shoot-to-kill" policy resulted from frustration over rising crime rates and restraints on police in dealing with criminals.

"If it boils down that it's us against them, I want it to be us," said the chief, whose announcement prompted a steady stream of calls and letters supporting the change.

## Nancy proposes contest

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nancy Reagan invited America's school children on Friday to enter an essay and poster contest about her husband's inauguration.

The best student artists and writers from each state will be invited to the White House — at their own expense — for special citations later this year.

The future first lady announced the contest at a news conference attended by 90 children from schools in the District of Columbia and its Maryland and Virginia suburbs.

Many of the children got autographs and all got a surprise bonus of two tickets to Tuesday's inaugural parade.

The Presidential Inaugural Committee said it was mailing out official posters and discussion kits on President-elect Ronald Reagan's inauguration to 25,000 high schools.

The essay contest is limited to high school students, and the poster contest to elementary school students.

The essays are to be written on the theme, "Inauguration—An American Beginning." They must be typewritten, double-spaced, and no more than 500 words long. High schools are to send their three best essays to the local superintendent's office, and the local school board is to choose the best essay in the district and send it to the state superintendent by Feb. 27.

State school chiefs are asked to choose the four best essays and send them by March 27 to the National School Boards

Association here. The association will pick two winners per state.

The same procedure will hold for elementary schools in the poster contest.

Hugh O'Brian, the Wyatt Farp of television

fame and vice chairman of the Inaugural Civic Participation Committee, told youngsters at the news conference.

"This is a first. There are an awful lot of firsts in this inaugural... It really truly is an American beginning."

# Weapons seized, exiles jailed

MIAMI (AP) — Six members of a militant Cuban exile group were arrested Friday after federal officials boarded their boat in the Florida Keys and confiscated 24 explosive devices and three semi-automatic rifles, the FBI said. An official of the Miami-based exile group, Alpha 66, said the men were planning a raid on Cuba. "They were on their way to one of the bases from where we start our anti-Castro activities," said Andres Nazario Sargen, secretary general of Alpha 66, which claims to have plans for disruptions and infiltrations in Cuba.

"You'll have to arrive at your own conclusions," Nettles said. But he did say that the arrests were made "as part of a continuing investigation of violations of the Neutrality Act." ## Hernandez seeking freedom in court

Margarito "Stucho" Hernandez, whose effort to get out of prison via the habeas corpus route in state court was thwarted in 1979, is making another effort via federal court in Midland.

Hernandez, who in 1974 was convicted in Midland's 142nd State District Court of delivery of heroin to an undercover agent, is alleging that he is being unjustly held due to alleged "ineffective assistance of counsel."

The former Midland man was sentenced to 30 years in prison and is living in the Texas Department of Corrections' Eastham Unit in Lovelady.

Hernandez is claiming that his defense rested upon alibi and that his defense attorneys, Richard B. Saxe and Richard T. McMillan, failed to subpoena "three essential and material witnesses" in his second trial in December 1974.

Hernandez maintained that he was in Florida picking oranges on Feb. 19, 1974, when he is alleged to have sold two "shot papers" of heroin to Texas Department of Public Safety undercover agent Gerald Howard at 803 N. Baird St. in Midland.

The first trial, in October 1974, ended in a mistrial after then District Attorney Jim Mashburn brought out in cross examination that Joe Garcia Jr., the defendant's principal witness, was under indictment for possession of heroin. Garcia was later convicted of the heroin charge and was sentenced to 10 years in prison.

In a 1979 habeas corpus hearing before 142nd State District Judge Perry D. Pickett, the judge ruled that the defense attorneys were not in error in not calling Garcia, his sister Teresa Garcia and their mother, Lorraine Garcia, to testify as alibi witnesses.

Pickett ruled that Garcia "made a poor and ineffective appearance" in the first trial "and that the defense counsel had interviewed about six jurors who indicated that Garcia's testimony was weak and not worthy of belief."

Jurors in the second trial recommended a 30-year sentence for Hernandez, who had been convicted in Odessa for possession of marijuana in 1970. Hernandez was prosecuted by Mashburn and by Rusty Wall, then assistant district attorney.

Case file records indicate that Hernandez was offered 20 years and then 16 years "to do" in prison in a plea bargaining agreement, but the defendant refused to plea guilty.

"He (Saxe) asked me to take 20 (years) because they were going to find me guilty anyway... and I didn't want no 20," Hernandez had said. "So, then, he brought it down to 16, and I still didn't want no 16."

"So, he said, 'Well, it's up to you, you know.' And I said, 'Well, OK, you know, but I said I wanted my witnesses there.'"

Following his conviction, Hernandez appealed the verdict through his court-appointed appeals attorney, Vern Martin, who in 1977 succeeded Mashburn as district attorney. Martin, in an August 1975 letter to Hernandez wrote "in my opinion, you have no grounds for a new trial from this (court) record."

The state appellate court opined that Hernandez' appeal was "frivolous and without merit."

The case in federal court is to be heard by U.S. District Judge Lucius D. Bunton in the Midland-Odessa Division of the federal court system.

Hernandez is claiming the U.S. Constitution's Sixth Amendment guarantees a defendant the right of "effective assistance of counsel."

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# McCall quits at Baylor

WACO, Texas (AP) — Abner McCall, for 20 years Baylor University's iron-willed leader known for his hard-line stance in confrontations with students, resigned Friday as president of the school.

McCall said he had been considering the move for some time, citing his age as the major factor.

The resignation, effective May 31, was accepted at the regular bimonthly meeting of the board of trustees. The board named Herbert H. Reynolds, executive vice president and chief operating officer of the university since 1978, to succeed him.

McCall officially will step up to the new position of chancellor at the Southern Baptist school June 1.

McCall's last major battle came last year, when he threatened with expulsion any Baylor coed who posed for Playboy magazine's pictorial essay on "Girls of the Southwest Conference."

Three student editors of the Baylor Lariat were dismissed after newspaper editorials urged freedom of choice in the matter. At one point McCall described the Playboy controversy as a "wart on my toe."

In the early 1970s, the Lariat was transformed from a student-run newspaper into a lab publication after editors clashed with McCall.

The university came under fire from pro-inerrancy Baptists last summer, when several instructors were accused of teaching that parts of the Bible were not literally true. An investigation found no wrong doing, however.

McCall's decision to resign was not prompted by such controversies, Baylor officials said.

"Several years ago, Judge McCall informed the full board of his desire to be relieved of chief executive officer responsibilities after his 65th birthday, and that he planned to resign from the office of president as of May 31, 1981," said W. Dewey Presley, chairman of the board of trustees.

In 1978, a special ad hoc committee of trustees was appointed to study "present and future responsibilities" of both McCall and Reynolds, Presley added.

"The committee was particularly concerned about the matter of presidential succession and the need for an adequate period of observation of a potential successor to Dr. McCall and for the individual to gain needed experience and knowledge of the complex academic, financial, denominational, administrative and public affairs elements of the position to assure an orderly and efficient transition."

The ad hoc committee unanimously approved the long-range plan announced Friday, Presley said.

"This realignment of responsibilities will assure the continuity of leadership by the strong executive team of Judge McCall and Dr. Reynolds," he said.

McCall's duty as chancellor, which at his request will carry no substantial administrative responsibilities, "shall be provided in the bylaws of the university and as may be assigned to him from time to time by the trustees or any committee of the board, or delegated to him by the president," the trustees' resolution stated.

When McCall was named president in 1961, Baylor consisted of 50 acres and 25 buildings with capital assets of \$36 million, the resolution said. Now, the campus includes more than 40 buildings on 300 acres and has \$180 million in capital assets.

Born in Perrin, Texas, McCall was reared in Fort Worth's Masonic Home and various orphanages after his father's death in 1918.

He earned a bachelor of arts and law degree from Baylor, as well as a masters degree in law from the University of Michigan, and joined Baylor as instructor and assistant law professor in 1938.

In 1943, he joined the FBI as a special agent, but returned to Baylor in 1946. He was dean of the Baylor School of Law from 1948 to 1959, and in 1956 was named associate justice of the Texas Supreme Court.

McCall was named Baylor's executive vice president in 1959, and in 1961 was inaugurated as the university's 10th president.

He holds several honorary doctorate degrees, and serves in many organizations and boards, including the Texas Judicial Council, the Texas War on Drugs Committee and the Education Commission of the States.

He has been president of Independent Colleges and Universities of Texas Inc. and of the Association of Texas Colleges and Universities, and is a trustee of the Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

In 1979-80, McCall served as first vice president of the Southern Baptist Convention. He also is a past president of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

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# Tarnower struggle possible

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y. (AP) — Scarsdale Diet doctor Herman Tarnower was probably shot during a struggle with Jean Harris, but it's almost as likely that there was no struggle, a medical expert testified for the defense Friday.

"The question of struggle versus no struggle is a very close call," Dr. Henry Ryan said. "I would favor the probability of a struggle."

Ryan, the chief medical examiner for the state of Maine, was called to comment on testimony from Deputy Westchester County Medical Examiner Dr. Louis Roh.

Roh testified he found tissue from Tarnower's hand in the millionaire doctor's chest wound, strongly supporting the prosecution's theory that Tarnower was shot as he held up his hand in front of his chest in a defense gesture.

Mrs. Harris' defense at her murder trial is that she intended her own death last March 10 and not that of her lover of 14 years.

Defense lawyer Joel Aurnou contends Tar-

nower was shot as he was trying to grab the gun away from her as she was about to take her own life.

Ryan testified that he found the tissue to which Roh referred but could not identify it.

The hand wound, Ryan said, "could be a defensive wound, on the other hand, the evidence is not strong."

Earlier Friday, Westchester County Judge Russell R. Leggett ruled that Mrs. Harris' will, which was shown to the jury but kept from the press and the public by the defense, must be disclosed.

The reading of the will, which apparently does not mention Tarnower, was scheduled for Monday.

A passage from the will read aloud by Aurnou said: "I wish my body to be immediately cremated and scattered where it is convenient. This should be done as cheaply as possible."

Asked later if the will mentions Tarnower, Mrs. Harris' lover of 14 years, Aurnou snapped, "If it did, wouldn't you have heard about it?"

Mrs. Harris, 37, former headmistress of the Madeira School for Girls in McLean, Va., is charged with shooting the 69-year-old Tarnower at his Purchase estate last March 10 in what the prosecution says was a jealous rage over his af-

fair with another woman.

Aurnou seeks to show that Mrs. Harris was despondent over her job at Madeira and drove to Tarnower's home to "say goodbye to the human being who meant the most to her." Tarnower was shot repeatedly as he attempted to stop her suicide, the defense maintains.

Carol Potts, Mrs. Harris' secretary at Madeira, testified that on the morning of March 10, Mrs. Harris explained what to do in case of her death.

"She said she'd been meaning to tell me for some time what to do if her plane went down," Mrs. Potts said. Mrs. Harris had just returned from a 10-day tour of six cities to raise money for the school.

Mrs. Potts said Mrs. Harris also told her the location of her good jewelry and said her sister should divide Mrs. Harris's possessions among relatives.

Her voice breaking, the witness said Mrs. Harris told her the instructions would be in her will but "nobody would read it anyway."

"I said to her, 'You've got one foot on the grave and one on a banana peel,'" Mrs. Potts said, tears streaming down her face.

Other witnesses have said Mrs. Harris came to them that morning and asked them to witness her will.

On cross-examination by George Bolen, the assistant district attorney, Mrs. Potts said she last saw Mrs. Harris on March 10 at about 3:45 p.m. when the headmistress left the office for the day.

"What did she say to you?" Bolen asked.

"She said either good night or goodbye and 'I'll see you in the morning,'" Mrs. Potts replied.

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# Bernadette's condition 'critical'

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — Bernadette Devlin McAliskey, Ulster firebrand for Roman Catholic rights, was fighting for her life in an intensive care ward Friday after she and her husband were gunned down by masked terrorists.

Three gunmen burst into the McAliskey home just after breakfast and opened fire in front of the couple's three young children.

Three suspects, identified by police sources as Protestant extremists, were captured by British troops on patrol near the rural cottage at Derry, 40 miles west of Belfast in this British province.

Mrs. McAliskey, 33, was hit seven times in the chest, hip and leg, police said. Her husband, Michael, a former school teacher who works as a greyhound dog trainer, was hit by three bullets in the abdomen and arm.

One of the McAliskays was in the kitchen at the time and one in a bedroom — blood was found in both rooms, police said.

They were taken by army helicopter to Belfast's Musgrave Park Hospital where they were in intensive care, under police guard. Mrs. McAliskey was reported in "critical" condition.

Their children, aged 9, 5 and 2, were not injured. The suspected terrorists were captured without a fight after they discarded their weapons, police said.

Three guns and a getaway car were recovered and the suspects were taken to Armagh for questioning. Unconfirmed reports said Mrs. McAliskey had received threats on her life because of her strong stand on behalf of Irish Republican Army guerrillas demanding political status in Ulster's jails.

The outlawed IRA is fighting to force the British out of Northern Ireland and unite the province with the largely Catholic Irish Republic. Sectarian violence in the province has taken at least 2,072 lives in the past 11 1/2 years.

In Dublin, the Irish Republic's Prime Minister Charles Haughey was reported shocked by the news. He was quoted as saying, "will it ever stop?" In an official statement, his government deplored the "barbaric attack" as yet more evidence of the violent divisions among the Irish.

In London, Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher heard of the attack as she was meeting at 10 Downing St. with a Northern Ireland political group.

Before her marriage in 1973, Bernadette Devlin, the 5-foot scourge of British politicians, became the youngest woman ever elected to the British Parliament, winning the Mid-Ulster seat in 1969 at the age of 21.

She served five years in the House of Commons where she once punched Home Secretary Reginald Maudling in the nose in an argument over Northern Ireland.

She was jailed for four months in 1970 for inciting unrest in Northern Ireland.

Bernadette Devlin came to prominence in the Catholic civil rights demonstrations of the late 1960s

and embarked on speaking tours in the United States to drum up support. A political leftist, she sought an end to British rule in Ulster and the creation of a socialist, united Ireland.

A founder member of the non-violent Irish Republican Socialist Party, she once said of the militant "Provisional" wing of the outlawed IRP: "You have got to understand that you don't force people into a republic simply with the bomb and the bullet."

The assassination attempt follows the killing of four other Roman Catholic campaigners on behalf of convicted IRA guerrillas in the H-block complex at the Maze prison outside Belfast or at Armagh women's prison. John Turnly, Miriam Daly, Noel Lyttle and Ronnie Bunting all have been slain in the past year.

The murder bid also recalled the 1976 slaying of Maire Drumm, vice president of the Provisional Sinn Fein political faction. She was shot by gunmen who walked into Belfast's Mater Hospital where she was undergoing treatment.

Police said the McAliskays would be well guarded.

A spokesman for the H-Blocks Committee, of which Bernadette is a leading member, said: "Those who carried out the attack should be in no doubt that we are committed to the defense of prisoners in the Maze and will not be deterred by this attack."

Meanwhile, a part-time member of the Ulster Defense Regiment, a mostly Protestant military auxiliary, was slain Friday.

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## Migration talks continue

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and Cuba concluded on Friday their second round of talks on migration problems with no report of progress.

A brief State Department statement said the five days of talks "continued in a useful manner exploratory discussions" initiated last month in New York.

U.S. officials said no plans were made for another meeting in order to allow the incoming administration to make its own decisions on future policy on migration issues.

Published reports earlier this week had said the United States offered Cuba a program providing for the orderly transfer of Cubans wishing to migrate to this country.

The report said Cuba, in turn, was asked to take back some of the

# Fire destroys country club

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Firefighters stood guard Friday over the smoldering ruins of the River Crest Country Club, destroyed by the second blaze to hit the building this week. The fire, which went to four alarms after it was reported at 1:30 a.m., was out of control when firefighters arrived and they were forced to pull back as the building collapsed. "There's nothing left but the walls," said Fort Worth Fire Capt. W.E. Dunkin. "Everything else has fallen in."

two-alarm fire that caused \$150,000 in damages Wednesday. That blaze was attributed to paper backing on insulation in a recessed lighting fixture, Dunkin said, adding the second fire was not caused by "anything left smoldering" from Wednesday's fire. "We do have an idea of the area it started in," he added. In addition to the 40,000-square-foot clubhouse, the club's valuable collection of antiques, art works and trophies was destroyed. The club's records and a computer had been moved to a nearby building earlier in the day. Club president Eric Hyden vowed to rebuild the club, which boasts an exclusive membership that includes Amon Carter Jr., Fort Worth Star-Telegram publisher; Eddie Chiles, oilman and owner of the Texas Rangers; members of the oil-rich Moncrief family, and developer Sid Bass.

# PUC unable to stop Bell experiment

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Public Utility Commission cannot stop Southwestern Bell from testing a computerized home information system, PUC's general counsel argued Friday. General Counsel Allen King agreed with Bell that as long as the Austin experiment is free the phone company can pursue it without PUC approval. "The commission does not have jurisdiction over experiments," King said. Hearing Examiner Phil Ricketts said he would rule early next week on Bell's motion to throw out a complaint filed by the Texas Daily Newspaper Association. TDNA claims the test would give Bell a "stranglehold" in the blossoming home information business. The newspaper publishers want a PUC hearing on the matter. TDNA lawyer Ernest Casstevens said Friday the "electronic information service" test, set for June, would give Bell "a leap forward" over possible competitors in the burgeoning field. It would keep potential competitors out of the market, he argued. Bell plans to place computer terminals in 680 Austin homes and 60 businesses. The televisionlike screens would be equipped to display phone listings and advertising. A PUC examiner routinely

approved the test when proposed in 1979. No hearing was held. "I don't think the commission can reach a decision without knowing what the facts are," Casstevens said at the pre-hearing. Bell lawyer Jon Dee Lawrence said the test is a "management decision" not subject to PUC approval. The tariff granted by the commission, and now challenged by TDNA, gives Bell potential protection against anti-trust suits, King said. Casstevens branded the test "anti-competitive." Lawrence questioned the newspaper publishers' concept of competition. "Their idea of the way to protect competition is to eliminate the competitor before the competitor decides whether to get into it or not," Lawrence argued. He offered this analogy: If Bell decided to buy Cadillacs for all its service personnel, PUC could not interfere. However, the commission could keep the cost of the cars from being passed on to customers. King said Bell has agreed to keep specific lists of the cost of the test in order to keep them from being passed to customers.

# Banker's wife abducted

POINT, Texas (AP) — FBI agents and local authorities were searching Friday for a masked man who kidnapped a bank president's wife, found locked in the trunk of her car after her husband paid an undisclosed ransom. Authorities said two men may have been involved in the abduction. Charlie Johnson, 59, was whisked away about 7:30 p.m. Thursday by an armed man who surprised her and her husband, Clifton, as they returned to their home in this small East-Texas town near Lake Tawakoni. The gunman told Johnson, president of the

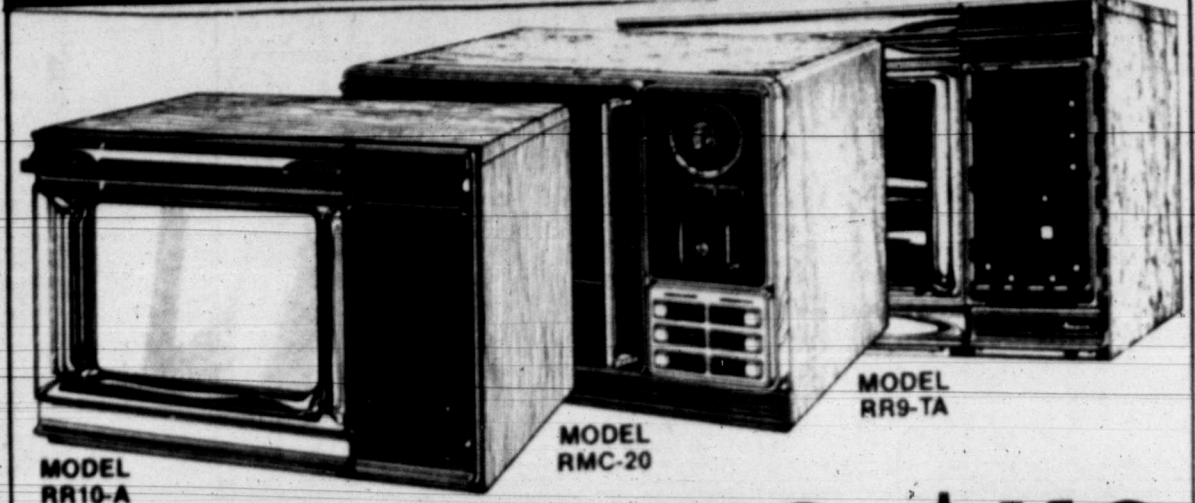
First State Bank of Point, to take a "substantial amount of money" from the bank and leave it at a spot three miles from the couple's home, officers said. He then forced Mrs. Johnson to drive him away in her car. Johnson said he went

to the bank, "scooped up a bunch of money," and made the drop before calling authorities. About 8:25 p.m., Rains County Sheriff Mike Carter and Deputy Jim Roberts located the woman's car on FM 47 about about 2 miles south of town and heard her calling out for help.

# Girls get death threat

ALEXANDRIA, La. (AP) — A state judge said Friday that three white girls have been threatened with death if they follow the wishes of a federal judge and attend an integrated school. A fire, meanwhile, caused minor damage to the all-white school the girls want to attend.

The minor fire at a workshop behind Buckeye High School will be investigated for arson by the state marshal, officials said. But they said the saw no connection between the blaze — which did less than \$1,000 damage — and the controversy over where the girls would go to school.

State Judge Richard Lee, who took custody of the girls and personally escorted them to Buckeye High in defiance of a federal judge's order, said he received three anonymous telephone calls Thursday night.

He said he was told that if the girls attend Jones Junior High in Alexandria — the school where they were assigned under U.S. District Judge Nauman Scott's desegregation order — they would not live through the first day. Lee said he was making a report to the FBI.

On Thursday, Scott dropped contempt charges against all concerned after Lee agreed to stop personally enforcing his order that Buckeye High enroll the girls.

Lee took the girls and their parents to Scott's court on Friday. They expected to confer with Scott but left after a waiting an hour.

J. Minos Simon, an attorney for the parents, said Scott would not see them. A spokesman for the judge

said no one asked to see him. No explanation was immediately available.

Simon was there to tell Scott he would not accept the compromise reached Thursday, when Simon was not present, that took the heat out of the power struggle between Lee and Scott.

Scott's ruling Thursday gave Michelle Laborde, 13, Lynda McNeal, 13, and Ramona Carbo, 12, two choices:

—They could attend Buckeye until this semester ends Jan. 23. Then, to receive public school credits for studies thus far this year, they would have to shift to Jones Junior High, riding the school bus 15 miles to Alexandria.

—Or they could enroll at a private school.

As he left the federal offices, Simon told reporters, "I asked the clerk to tell the judge that if he wanted an expression of opposition I would state it to him. I don't want to intrude any further so we are leaving."

Chris Roy, a lawyer for Lee, said he told Scott in court Thursday that Simon would be on hand Friday at 9 a.m. Roy said he, Lee, the parents, the girls, two Justice Department lawyers, and two lawyers for black plaintiffs in the desegregation case were in Scott's office waiting room on schedule.

"I didn't go knock on the door to say, 'I'm here,' but I have to believe somebody told him we were here," said Roy.

# Scattered fighting in El Salvador

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — Scattered fighting was reported around the countryside Friday, but Salvadoran government sources said a leftist offensive had "concluded" and guerrilla activity was reduced to harassment.

But other sources, who asked not to be identified, said that in the provinces of San Vicente, Chalatenango and Morazan, all areas bordering Honduras, the guerrillas were still very active. And the sources said the guerrillas were apparently trying to destroy communications between principal cities.

Government sources admitted communications were out to many cities, but added "this is the result of desperation on the part of the terror-

ists, who believe they have lost."

Reported casualties from the seven days of fighting topped 700 Friday, most of them guerrillas. At least 50 government troops also were reported killed in the fierce battles that began last Saturday and did not taper off until Thursday.

In the past year, some 9,000 persons have been reported killed in political violence involving

left- and right-wing squads, troop, peasants and now centered on land reform and attempts by the guerrillas to install a Marxist government.

The government said that an invading force of 100 men that landed Tuesday on a beach on the Gulf of Fonseca was apparently Salvadorans who had trained in Nicaragua. In a communique, the government said 67 of the invaders were

killed in battles with government troops, but there was no evidence they were Nicaraguans or Cubans.

"We don't deny the possibility that there were foreign mercenaries in the group," said the government communique.

There were several reports of violence here late Thursday and early Friday including a leftist attack on a military hospital in the northeast zone of the city. Witnesses said two policemen were killed in the 20-minute firefight.

# Gilley denies suit for publicity

HOUSTON (AP) — Country-western singer Mickey Gilley dismissed the notion Friday that he went to court to rekindle a nationwide fad over the mechanical bull.

Gilley, who owns and operates the Pasadena, Texas, nightclub billed as the world's largest honky tonk, testified his only motive was to guard the patent rights to his bucking marvel.

Gilley's Enterprises Inc. and Joe D. Turner — a New Mexico inventor who designed the mechanical bull used in the movie "Urban Cowboy" — want federal court jurors to stop three Houston companies from cutting into their profits on the nightclub rodeo circuit.

But Buck N Broncos Inc., Southwest Rodeo Enterprises Inc., and Texas Rodeo Bulls Inc. have challenged the validity of the patent issued to Turner almost six years ago.

The defendants, who admit they "copied" the Gilley's model, contend the mechanical bull existed before Turner patented his creation.

Gilley admitted the suit has spawned "some con-

troversy... and a lot of publicity" about his nightclub and the lifeless demon. But, he argued, the suit was necessary to protect his business interests.

"We have the sole patent rights to the mechanical bull. We bought the patent legally and in good faith. And now that we've got the thing started, everybody wants in," the entertainer said.

Gilley purchased the patent rights to the "El Toro" model in 1979 after Turner became ill and was advised by doctors to give up his lucrative business.

"We installed a bull at the club and it caught on like wildfire. It cause so much fanfare about Texas living and the Houston night life," Gilley said.

The hoopla over the headless, legless torso also prompted a lengthy article in a national publication that inspired the movie.

But Gilley claims the trend also has encouraged "so many people to go into the mechanical bull business that the demand for the original may drop."

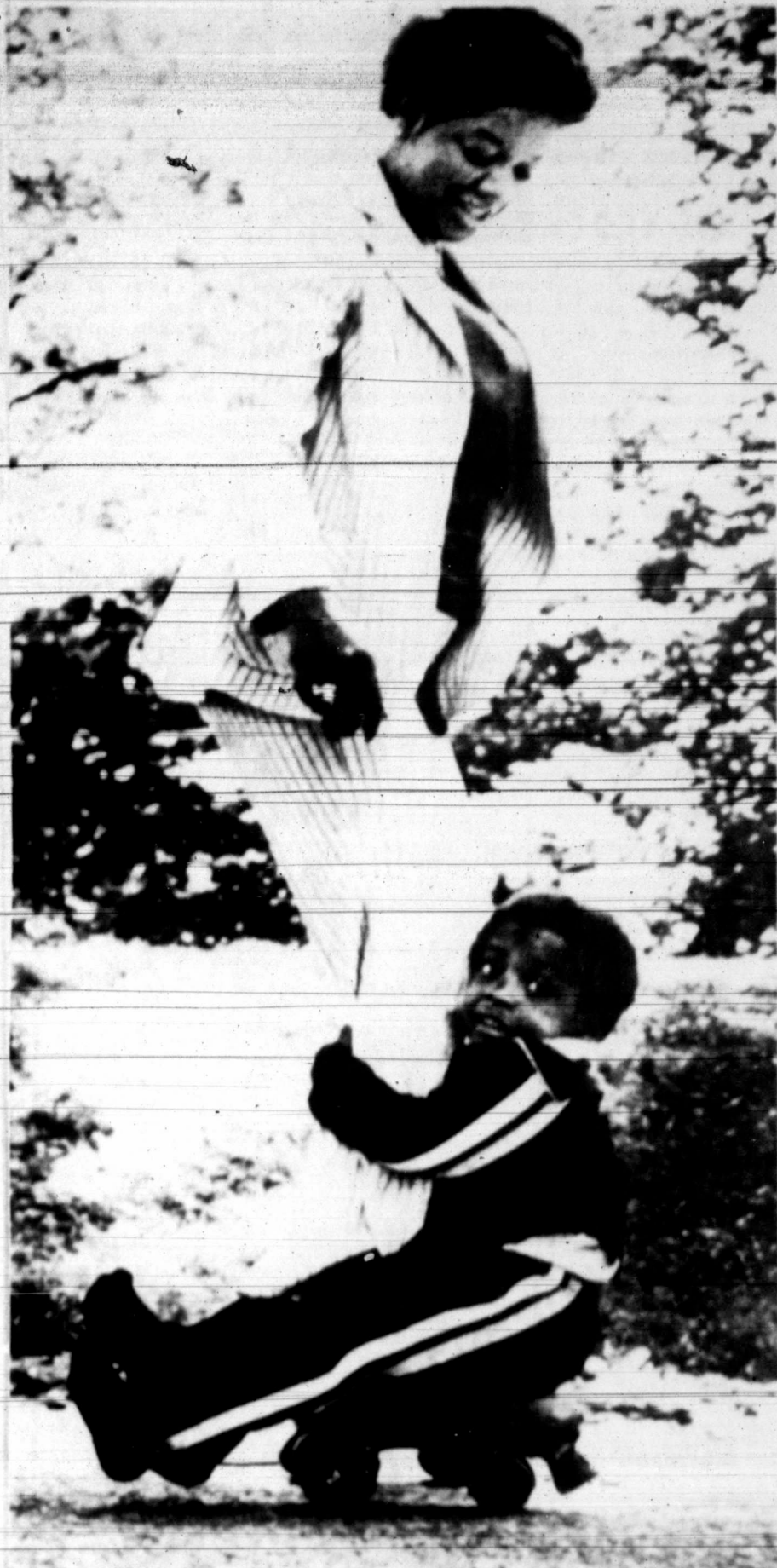

# The business of 'industrial spying'

### Some workers make it their job to snitch

DALLAS (AP) — Bob Harris makes his living as a professional tattletale. He has made a career out of spying on fellow workers, then going to the boss with juicy tidbits about dishonest or lazy employees.

For the past few months, Harris has worked in the freight checking department of a local trucking firm. Soon, he will disappear from the job and a short time later some of his co-workers and supervisors may be fired — that is, if Harris has done what he was paid to do.

Harris' real job is not with the trucking firm or any other company he has ostensibly worked for. He is an employee of a Dallas security agency whose corporate clients sometimes need the kind of information on their workers that they cannot get on their own.

The company hires Harris — or any one of a legion of blue and white collar workers with the security company — and pays him the going rate for whatever job he's assigned to.

Harris mingles with the workers, becomes "one of the boys," and makes \$600 or \$700 more each month to tattle on his new-found friends.

"I don't care what somebody might think of me. If they were doing something wrong, they knew it was wrong and they shouldn't have done it," he said. "I am a camera, somebody else's eyes, that's all."

Bill Cannon, of Cannon Protective Services in Dallas, has 35 "operatives" just like Harris working in hospitals, warehouses, insurance companies and other area businesses.

The security workers are not private detectives, Cannon stressed.

"These people are recruited off the street, from the available labor force. They are people who would be driving forklifts or working in hospitals anyway," he said.

The security group regularly advertises in the papers, but the ads don't indicate anything about undercover work. The only hint is the unusually high wages and the mention of "special assignments."

A businessman who has employed several of Cannon's spies at various times over the past 10 years justifies the practice by saying, "somebody is getting away with something here. Either they're stealing time or product from the company and I have to get to the bottom of it."

Barry, a 29-year-old forklift operator at a Dallas warehouse who works as one of Cannon's spies, makes nearly twice as much as the other men he works with.

He says he has no qualms about the fact that he may endanger the jobs of those who trust him.

Stealing is wrong, whether it's the boss' time or

money, he said, "and if somebody is doing it, he ought to get caught."

Barry says his first few weeks are spent wooing the trust of fellow workers — "having the others gain confidence in you, and not letting them know anything about yourself."

"You can't just force yourself on others, because the average guy wouldn't be like that. So you just start out doing your job and staying to yourself, he said. "They will start coming to you."

When other workers gain confidence in Barry, he lets them know that he's "game for stealing or whatever."

"It usually works, but it can take time. With time and patience, though, it'll come through."

Assignments don't always involve theft, however. At a Dallas electronics company, executives suspected a male supervisor was sexually harrasing female workers.

They hired one of Cannon's female operatives to come in check out the situation.

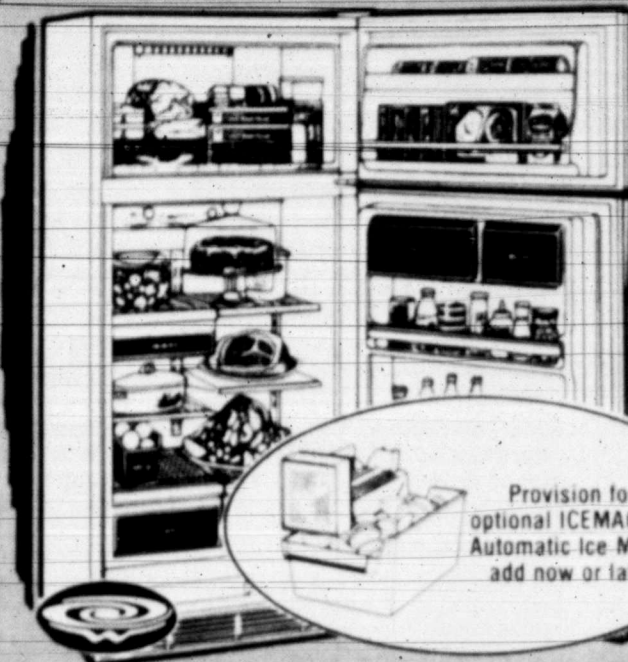
When a promotion came up, the supervisor told the woman that he would give it to her, "but intimated that the two of them ought to go to bed," Cannon

recalled. "The woman refused and the better job went to someone else."

When the undercover worker asked why, the supervisor replied that "it was obvious she cared more about her virtues than her job." Cannon said.

The company confronted the supervisor with the woman's report and the man resigned, he said.

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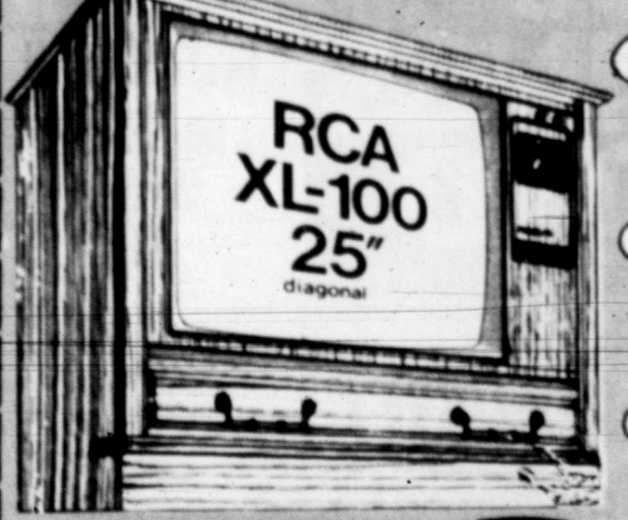

Midshipmen now face expulsion

ANNAPOLIS (AP) - Three midshipmen have been ordered expelled from the Naval Academy for their part in a sexual incident filmed with a home movie camera, but one of them has gotten a federal court order temporarily barring the Navy from kicking him out, officials say.

The expulsion order was issued by Navy Secretary Edward Hidalgo at the request of academy superintendent Vice Adm. William Lawrence, according to Clark Gammell, school public affairs officer.

Gammell on Thursday would not reveal the names of the midshipmen, nor would he say if the two midshipmen who were not covered by the court order had been dismissed.

The restraining order was issued Wednesday by a federal judge in Philadelphia, he said.

Six midshipmen, a woman and five men, were involved in the incident November 22 in a room in Bancroft Hall, a dormitory for more than 4000 midshipmen.

After an academy investigation, Lawrence recommended that Hidalgo expel the woman and two men. He recommended less severe disciplinary action against the other three men whose involvement was not considered as great.

Those three received a combination of demerits, restrictions and loss of privileges, according to Gammell. Midshipmen recommended for expulsion usually are given the option of resigning. The woman has decided to leave voluntarily, sources said, but Gammell would not confirm or deny that report.

The two men who are expelled are seniors. Under Navy regulations, they would be required to spend three more years in the Navy as enlisted men.

The woman is a junior and would have a two-year obligation. But she was seeking a medical discharge at the time of the incident, and academy sources said it is unlikely she will be required to serve any additional time in the Navy.

Council bans ticket scalping

DALLAS (AP) - Scalping has become a thriving business in Dallas, with hawkers selling scores of tickets - to everything from Dallas Cowboy games to the Dallas Symphony - at inflated prices.

But the Dallas City Council voted unanimously Wednesday to ban all ticket scalping on public property.

The council directed the ordinance toward the scalpers raking in lucrative profits at Reunion Arena, home of pro basketball's Dallas Mavericks. However, Assistant City Manager Levi Davis said the language of the ordinance covers all types of events and facilities, including the Cotton Bowl, the Dallas Convention Center, and the Music Hall.

People still will be permitted to sell tickets at face value or less.

"These prayers can affect the destiny of the country as much as the inauguration of the president," says the Rev. Jimmy R. Allen, a committee member and head of the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission. Its weekly "Baptist Hour" radio program on nearly 300 stations is appealing for participation. The committee coordinating the effort was set up as an adjunct to organizing of an evangelism festival in Kansas City July 27-30. "It is crucial that we call our people to prayer," says Allen of Fort Worth, Texas. "Not only because the Bible commands us but because the times demand it."

### Inaugural prayer to be done by one clergyman

Although it's a 40-year-old custom for a variety of clergymen to offer prayers at presidential inaugurations, this time it's to be done by one man, a former star athlete and now a stellar Presbyterian minister in California. By the personal choice of President-elect Ronald Reagan, the devotional aspects of the ceremonies Tuesday are to be led by the Rev. Donn Moomaw, the 49-year-old pastor of the Bel Air Presbyterian Church of Los Angeles. He's to offer the invocation at the start of the inaugural and the benediction at the close. An All-America football lineman at the University of California in Los Angeles in the early 1950s, Moomaw has led the 2,000-member congregation for the last 16 years. It's where Reagan worshipped most regularly in his California days, and on several Sundays since his election, even though he is not formally a member. Actually his membership and monthly contributions are lodged in the Hollywood Beverly Christian Church in Los Angeles, a part of the denomination to which he has belonged since boyhood, the 1.3-million-member Christian Church (Disciples of

Christ). But he generally has attended the Presbyterian church, situated on a residential plateau at the top of Mulholland Drive in Bel Air, overlooking the San Fernando Valley. The congregation is part of the 2.6 million-member United Presbyterian Church and its pastor, Moomaw, a 6-foot-4, 200-pound man, has built a vigorous, innovative and diversified ministry there. It's known for its lively adult Bible study groups, its busy counseling center serving both members and non-members and its intensive, 10-week communicant class for prospective members. They have to go through the class to join the church, says Moomaw's secretary, Shirley Brown. "This has made for a real depth of faith at Bel Air."

One of the founders and a former president of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Moomaw is on the organizing committee for the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles. He also served on the California state board of education in Reagan's governorship, and on former President Nixon's council on physical fitness and sports. He keeps himself trim on the tennis court. Moomaw got his theology degree at the Princeton Theological Seminary in New Jersey, was ordained in 1957, and served with the First Presbyterian Church of Berkeley, Calif., before becoming senior minister of the Bel Air congregation in 1964. At presidential inaugurations, both Protestant and Roman Catholic clergy have delivered prayers since Franklin D. Roosevelt's 1937 inauguration. In 1949, Harry Truman added a rabbi to participate with the Protestant and Catholic clergy. In 1957, Dwight D. Eisenhower made it a four-way representation, also including an Eastern Orthodox clergyman. This broad inclusiveness was continued until President Carter's 1977 inauguration when prayers were delivered by a United Methodist bishop and a Roman Catholic bishop, with Jewish and Eastern Orthodox leaders a bit aggrieved that they were left out. But this time, the task of putting petitions through to God is in the hands of one man, Moomaw.

### University to save money by heating with wood

HAMILTON, N.Y. (AP) — Colgate University in rural upstate New York plans to be heating with wood by next winter and saving more than a quarter of a million dollars a year on its fuel bill. A grant from the federal government will help the university pay the costs of installing a wood-fired boiler to take over most of the work now performed by three oil-fired units. Colgate's director of administrative operations, James C. Morrow, expects the new boiler to supply 80 percent of the university's demands for heat and hot water. Wood scraps purchased at \$15-\$16 a ton from sawmills, furniture manufacturers and related industries within a 50-mile radius of the Hamilton, N.Y., campus will fire the boiler. Colgate now heats its buildings by burning No. 6 fuel oil, which Morrow said had been selling in Hamilton for 46 cents a gallon. Based on that price,

a study done for the University by Mueller Associates of Baltimore predicts that Colgate will save nearly a-quarter of a million dollars a year by converting to wood heat. "But our suppliers tell us to expect to pay well over a dollar a gallon for fuel oil next year," said Morrow, "and computed on that rate, our savings could be half a million dollars a year, or more."

Morrow said another important factor figured in Colgate's decision to heat with wood: it will eliminate the university's total dependence on the availability of fuel oil to heat its buildings. A campus task force on energy had considered contingency plans in the event that oil supplies might some day be cut off. It now appears those plans can be shelved, he added.

13 injured in elevator crash

CHICAGO (AP) — A defective latch was to blame for an accident in which an elevator overshot the first floor of the First National Bank of Chicago, injuring 13 passengers, authorities said Friday.

"The latch, at the first floor, failed to halt the elevator, allowing it to continue on to a set of hydraulic buffers at the bottom of the shaft, according to Nick Fera, assistant commissioner of the city's Department of Inspection Services.

"The car did not fall. It traveled at a controlled rate of speed past the terminal floor," said Robert Duncan, region manager for Westinghouse Elevator Co., manufacturer of the elevator.

Eleven of the injured were treated and released from hospitals after Thursday's incident, but two remained hospitalized Friday. Eight others escaped injury.

Fera said the defect could not have been detected in routine city inspections. A Westinghouse spokesman said investigators had not determined why the latch failed.

A spokesman for First National said the bank has hired its own consultant to investigate the accident. Police Sgt. Edward B. Savage said firefighters rescued passengers through the elevator roof.

Elmer Tessner, a company maintenance superintendent, said the elevator came to rest in a basement 1 1/2 stories below the ground floor after slamming against the buffer.

"It seemed to be normal," said John Howland, 38, a passenger. "The next thing we knew, we hit the bottom. Everybody was scrunched down."

Howland, a Glenview resident, was among executives at a monthly meeting on the building's 56th floor. He said all the passengers entered the elevator at about 8:22 p.m. after the meeting.

Robert E. Burmeister, 56, of Hinsdale, said the elevator stopped with "a sudden crash and a bump" and a ceiling grating — including a light fixture — fell on some passengers.

Burmeister, the executive vice president of the Chicago Board of Trade, said his feet hurt and were swollen.

Dallas votes on tax cuts today

DALLAS (AP) — Voters faced with a mountain of conflicting information will decide Saturday whether to slash city taxes in a charter amendment referendum that has charges flying between two opposing citizens groups.

More than 75,000 voters were expected to turn cast ballots on the proposed city charter amendment, which calls for a reduction in the city tax rate from 56.6 cents to 40 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation and a 5 percent annual limit on the amount an individual's taxes can be increased as a result of reappraisals.

If the amendment is approved, however, authorities on both sides of the issue say a suit is almost certain on grounds it violates the state constitution.

The referendum was forced by a petition rounded up by the Tax Equality Association, a grassroots citizens group that calls itself the TEA Party, after a citywide property revaluation last summer raised some owners' taxes by 300 percent.

Opponents, led by the SOS Dallas Committee, say the rollback is self-defeating, would cut vital city services and unfairly afflict the poor.

A coalition of black organizations, the Dallas Homeowners League, the Dallas AFL-CIO, League of Women Voters and Greater-Dallas Planning Council have urged residents to turn down the tax rollback.

The TEA Party says the tax cut would force the city to find \$10 billion in unassessed business and apartment property to make up for lost revenues from homeowners.

**BIG SPRING** — For one fleeting half, the Big Spring Steers were carrying major upset visions in their heads, but this District 5-5A basketball game here Friday night ended in a shell-shocked 70-55 nightmare for the Steers as the Midland High Bulldogs finally found their Mr. Hyde personality.

The Bulldogs, now 19-3 on the season and 2-0 in loop play, led by a mere 27-25 margin at the half after a miserable 31 percent shooting effort from the field, hitting only 11 of 36 shots. They even trailed 18-11 with 6:36 left in the second period.

The Steers had come to play, or at least, that is what they would have you believe. The score was tied nine times into the third period, before the Big Spring gym roofed caved in and fell on every Steer in the house. If it wasn't a Bulldog explosion, then it certainly looked like one.

The Bulldogs hit eight of 14 shots in the third period and eight of 12 in the fourth quarter to win going away. The final verdict was nothing like what the first half had promised. They simply put the ball up and it went in — at least it looked that simple.

## TED BATTLES Don't despair, fans, basketball is there

"So much basketball is flooding the tube these days, that the Mrs. is ready to join frustrated housewives everywhere with a plaintive plea to 'Bring back the football season, please!'"

It's not just a game every night, it's two or three channels carrying games and sometimes a station will carry two or three games a day.

Remember when about the only game in town was the SWC's Game of the Week, a weekly torture session, and the only treat was the Sunday game or a Notre Dame game during the week.

**IT SEEMED** the Southwest Conference was dedicated to destroying the image of the basketball in Texas. It was almost as if the football coaches selected the schedule. The game of the week might more appropriately have been called the Worst Game of the Week. If Houston and Arkansas were playing, the TV viewer would be given a treatment instead of the treat, like Texas-Rice.

Or if Texas squared off against Houston, it would be Arkansas against Baylor. Or if it were A&M-Texas, Arkansas-Houston, they'd come up with Baylor-Rice, with apologies to Baylor on the basis of this year's play.

At any rate, so many SWC games are being televised that the tube actually might create some enthusiasm this year. Last week, on a Tuesday, SMU's double-overtime upset of Houston was seen and before that SMU's upset of Texas, and how about lowly Texas shocking the Hogs in Fayetteville last Monday?

**IN FACT**, there's so much basketball in the air, one no longer has to wonder how good the Atlantic Coast Conference really is, or the Big East, or the Big Ten or the Pac-10 over even the Wac. They are all available with the twist of a dial.

Now, one can see what the ACC's four-corner is really like and after witnessing North Carolina's execution of the four-corner against Virginia, one has to question Dean Smith's credentials as a master basketball strategist as he has been depicted in folklore. In fact, one even wonders if perhaps the four-corner isn't basketball's answer to the prevent defense.

The Prevent, of course, is that built in device used in the NFL during the last two minutes of each half by the team in the lead. One suspects at times it is employed solely to give the trailing team an opportunity to catch up, thus extracting every last drop of drama from the proceedings. There is no visible evidence that the commissioner has decreed that the Prevent be used, but there are suspicions.

**THE FOUR**-corner can be an effective tactical weapon, used properly, to drive an opponent to distraction, but last Saturday North Carolina had Virginia, 7-4 Ralph Sampson and the Cavaliers 15-game winning streak strapped in the electric chair. Then Smith sued for peace, waved the white flag and sent his team into the four-corner with seven minutes to go. It was Virginia's only hope for victory, especially when the Tar Heels made no legitimate attempt to exploit the Cavaliers' scattered defense for the high percentage basket. Smith was, in effect, gambling that North Carolina could handle the ball for seven minutes without making a mistake.

They couldn't, of course, and Virginia won going away.

Last year on national TV, Duke trailed Louisville by 22 with 12 minutes to go. The Blue Devils caught fire and zoomed past the Cardinals with something like four minutes to go. In the tradition of the ACC, Coach Bill Foster called for the four-corner. Duke lost it's momentum and the game, naturally.

Don't get us wrong, the four-corner adds an extra dimension to the game, supplies an ingredient of suspense to the proceedings, but sometimes it's almost as if the TV producer order it just to keep the audience glued.

**Domed stadium**

VANCOUVER, British Columbia (AP) — Work on a 60,000-seat domed stadium that could serve professional football and soccer teams may begin next month, says the project's chief executive officer.

"We've been promised the Grey Cup (the Canadian Football League championship game) in 1983 and we plan to be ready," Alvin Narod said Thursday.

Cost of the covered stadium is estimated at \$115 million. Narod told a panel discussion before about 200 marketing executives. And completion has been set for July 1, 1983.

Besides football, the stadium would have soccer, baseball, basketball and even rodeos.

# Lomax tries again to impress pros

MOBILE, Ala. (AP) — Neil Lomax, who passed for more than 7½ miles in his career, makes his final bid to improve his position in professional football's draft Saturday in the 32nd Senior Bowl football game.

Lomax, a Little All-American quarterback from Portland State, completed only 10 of 24 passes for 105 yards in last week's East-West Shrine game, well below his final season averages when he threw for 4,094 yards and 37 touchdowns.

The 6-foot-3, 211-pound Lomax will direct the North attack in Saturday's game, a nationally televised (CBS) event set for a noon kickoff at Ladd Memorial Stadium. The forecast calls for chilly 40-degree temperatures at game time.

"I think Lomax will be better in this game than he was in the East-West game," said Red Miller, the Denver Broncos coach who will handle the South squad in the Senior Bowl.

MILLER said he thought Lomax might have been a little nervous last week in his first effort against major college opposition. He said the week of intense practice under the San Francisco 49ers' coaching staff, headed by Bill Walsh, will have Lomax better prepared.

Miller's South squad will counter with Wake Forest's Jay Venuto, who threw for 21 touchdowns and 2,624 yards, an Atlantic Coast Conference single season record. He also participated in the East-West game, hitting only 1 of 5 passes for 3 yards.

Neither Miller nor Walsh was predicting which side might win this

annual struggle in which collegians receive their first professional paychecks — \$1,500 to the winning team members and \$1,250 to the losers.

"I think it'll be a good football game, a very competitive game," said Miller.

"An injury can throw things off balance but I expect the game to be very competitive," said Walsh.

The coaches stressed the injury situation following last year's Senior Bowl, won by the North 57-3 when injuries left the South struggling all day on the snap exchange between the center and quarterback. The South leads the series 15-13-3.

ALTHOUGH he declined to pick a probable winner, Walsh did say he would make a guess as to the game's outstanding player — running back James Brooks of Auburn.

"He's got so much speed, but he's not the typical size for an NFL running back," Walsh said of the 172-pound Brooks.

Brooks, who set the Auburn career rushing record of 3,523 yards, hopes to follow two teammates into pro ball — William Andrews, the Atlanta Falcons fullback who was at Auburn two years ago, and Joe Cribbs, a rookie sensation with the Buffalo Bills in 1980.

The game also features such defensive standouts as linebackers Ricky Jackson of Pittsburgh and E. J. Junior of Alabama, wide receivers Ken Margerum of Stanford and Mardye McDole of Mississippi State, tight end Benjie Pryor of Pittsburgh, running back David Overstreet of Oklahoma and placekicker Rex Robinson of national champion Georgia.

# Schramm wants vow before issuing tickets

DALLAS (AP) — All Dallas Cowboys players and personnel have been ordered to sign affidavits stating they will not resell their Super Bowl XV tickets for more than the \$40 face value, president and general manager Tex Schramm says.

The affidavits, which must be signed before tickets are issued, were drawn up as a result of reports that scalping tickets to professional football's championship game has become a multi-million-dollar black market business.

Scalpers reportedly are earning as much as \$500 a ticket for this year's game.

Several former and current Cowboys players have told of reselling tickets to past Super Bowls for as much as \$200 apiece. Cowboys players, like all National Football League players, receive two tickets to the Jan. 25 game.

# Borg, McEnroe upset victims

NEW YORK (AP) — Giant-killer Gene Mayer continued his masterful play Friday, shocking Sweden's Bjorn Borg 6-0, 6-3 in the \$400,000 Volvo Masters Tournament.

Earlier, Jose-Luis Clerc of Argentina handed the tourney's top seed, John McEnroe, his third straight loss, 6-3, 6-0.

Seeded fifth here, Mayer has stopped McEnroe, Clerc and now Borg en route to Saturday's semifinals. Borg also advanced to the semis despite the loss, which left him with a 2-1 record.

The other two players in the group with Borg and Mayer are Clerc, who finished with a 1-2 record, and McEnroe, the tournament's top seed. The other group consisted of Lendl, Solomon, Connors and

Vilas. Lendl and Connors clinched semifinal berths Thursday.

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
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
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# Boston College players suspected of point-fixing

BOSTON (AP) — Officials at Boston College retreated to draft a public response Friday to a probe of allegations that some former basketball players engaged in point-shaving during the 1978-79 season.

Athletic Director Bill Flynn confirmed that federal authorities are looking into "fix" charges stemming from statements by an informant.

Point-shaving entails holding the margin of victory under the established betting line.

Basketball Coach Tom Davis was said to be unavailable for comment and a spokesman for Flynn said the school would issue a statement later.

Flynn said the players allegedly involved no longer attended BC. He refused to say how many players were involved and said he did not know how many games — or which games — federal authorities were looking at.

"The Justice Department advised us a short time ago that they are conducting conversations with a very, very few former student athletes who are under investigation," Flynn said. "However, they did assure us that

neither the university nor any of its employees is under investigation."

THE WASHINGTON Post reported Friday that the allegations surfaced last July during an unrelated investigation into the December 1978 theft of \$5.8 million from the Lufthansa cargo terminal at Kennedy International Airport in New York.

The New York Post reported that the FBI and the Organized Crime Strike Force in Brooklyn have determined that a "few" Boston College basketball games during the 1978-79 season "were fixed."

A key informant in the Kennedy Airport probe, convicted felon Henry Hill, told federal authorities he paid off at least two players — reportedly \$1,000-\$2,000 per game to each — to fix games, the Washington Post said. Flynn said the investigation apparently concerns the shaving of points.

The Eagles posted a 21-9 record in 1978-79 under Davis.

"If you watched a Tom Davis team, you'd feel it was impossible to fix a game," Flynn said.

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
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# Wide-open Japan Bowl game forecast

TOKYO (AP) — Purdue passing phenom Mark Herrmann and 61 other all-star seniors get together for their last fling as collegiate amateurs Sunday in the sixth annual Japan Bowl East-West football game at Yokohama Stadium.

The game also will be a finale for Notre Dame Coach Dan Devine, who heads the East squad along with Johnny Majors of Tennessee. Devine is retiring after a 33-year coaching career that included Missouri, Arizona State and the National Football League Green Bay Packers before he took over as the Irish mentor in 1975.

"It should be a wide-open football game," said Warren Powers, head coach of Missouri, who is handling the West team along with SMU's Ron Meyer. "The Japanese fans are going to see the ball in the air a lot."

Most of the players flew directly to Japan Monday from East-West encounters at the Shrine Bowl at

Palo Alto and the Hula Bowl in Honolulu, both played the previous Saturday. The Japan Bowl will in some respects be a showdown match after the East captured the Shrine Bowl 21-3 and the West the Hula Bowl 24-17.

POWERS said the East "should be favored by at least 14," and if passing is the game Sunday, the East would appear to have the edge.

Herrmann, major college football's all-time passing king, will be targeting on sticky-fingered receivers like Cris Collinsworth of Florida and Doug Donley of Ohio State. Backup quarterbacks are Tim Clifford of Indiana, named most valuable player in the East-West Shrine game last week, and Nickie Hall of Tulane.

The East's defense also will be formidable, with defensive end Hugh Green of Pittsburgh, runner-up in the Heisman Trophy voting and winner of

the Vince Lombardi Trophy, joined by All-American linebackers Lawrence Taylor of North Carolina and David Little of Florida.

Also representing Pittsburgh, the second-ranked team in the nation this year behind Georgia, will be offensive tackle Mark May, winner of the Outland Trophy for outstanding offensive lineman.

IF THE Yokohama air proves not to their liking, the West can turn to the ground with Nebraska's Jarvis Redwine, top running back in the nation this year, UCLA's fleet-footed Freeman McNeil or Washington's Toussaint Tyler.

Other top names on the West are three-time All-American defensive back Kenny Easley of UCLA, repeat All-American Mike Singletary of Baylor, defensive end Derrie Nelson of Nebraska and punt return specialist John Simmons of SMU.

One prominent figure missing will be Heisman Trophy winner George Rogers of South Carolina, who returned home after playing in the Hula Bowl.

"We have assembled most of the greatest players in America," said Devine, whose Irish finished 9-2-1 and ninth in the final Associated Press ranking this year after a 17-10 New Year's day loss to Georgia in the Sugar Bowl.

Sunday's game will be televised nationally in this country where football always has taken a backseat to baseball. Introduced in Japan 45 years ago, amateur football still is a minor sport here, but the import of U.S. teams in the past few years has proved to be a popular and commercial success.

CBS will show the game live by satellite in the United States, with kickoff at 10:30 p.m. today.

## Wreck killed major conference

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Georgia Tech's decision to join the Atlantic Coast Conference killed prospects for another major athletic conference in the Southeast, North Florida State Athletic Director C.W. "Hootie" Ingram said Friday.

At a press conference on his first day in his new post, the former associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference indicated that any change in Florida State's conference status apparently died when Georgia Tech left the Metro Conference in 1977 for the ACC.

"If Georgia Tech had acted a little different there could have been another league on a par with the Southeastern Conference," Ingram said.

In addition to Georgia Tech, the conference might have included Florida State, Miami and South Carolina, which all play independent football schedules.

"And you would be surprised at who would jump a league to get into that one," Ingram

added.

Florida State competes in the Metro Conference in other sports, but the Metro doesn't have football competition and isn't likely to in the future if Florida State has anything to say about it, Ingram said.

"I'd oppose it," he said "We don't have compatible football schools. I'm open minded, but I've got to be candid and honest."

The Seminoles did play three Metro schools in 1980, whipping them all by impressive margins: Louisville, 52-0; Memphis State, 24-3; and Virginia Tech, 31-7.

Two other Metro members, Tulane and Cincinnati, also play independent football schedules. The seventh, St. Louis, doesn't have a football team.

In addition to the competitive aspects, Florida State needs to play teams with larger stadiums than those of the Metro schools, Ingram said. Larger crowds, of course, mean larger financial rewards.

## Hagler makes title defense

BOSTON (AP) — Marvin Hagler, a champion out "to prove I should have been here a long time ago," makes his first defense of the world middleweight title Saturday night against Fulgencio Obelmejias, a mysterious figure despite his No. 1 ranking.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Senior pitcher Doug Laufer says he will play his final season with the Texas Longhorns even though the Philadelphia Phillies drafted him Tuesday for the second time in his career.

Laufer, who played schoolboy baseball at Midland Lee, was 5-0 with a 3.88 earned run average last year for Texas.

"I wanted this," the 28-year-old Hagler, of nearby Brockton, said of the defense in the Boston Garden. "It was a dream to win the championship and then come home."

"He hasn't fought anybody in the top 10," said Goodie Petronelli, who with his brother Pat

manages Hagler. "But is questionable, he did knock out Rudy Robles in the fourth round.

Boxing people who have seen Obelmejias, say he stands straight up, taking advantage of his height and reach and that he does not fight well going backwards.

Hagler, who is 5-9½, likes to go forward also, but he has good speed and boxing ability. In fact, he is more a boxer-puncher than a slugger despite scoring 11 knockouts while posting a 50-2-2 record. His knockouts come more from rapid and well-placed combinations rather than from sheer power.

It's obvious that the 27-year-old Obelmejias has power in those hands. Of his 28 knockouts, 22 have been in four rounds or less, and while the quality of his opposition

is questionable, he did knock out Rudy Robles in the fourth round.

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
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
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
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
