free to allow television and still photography coverage of criminal trials even when defendants object, the Supreme Court ruled today

Such coverage does not automatically violate a criminal defendant's constitutional right to a fair trial, the high court said

Today's unanimous decision upheld Florida's policy of allowing court room camera coverage, thus uphold ing the burglary convictions of two Miami Beach policemen who claimed they had been denied a fair trial

More than half the states have adopted some policy either permanently or on an experimental basis, for allowing broadcast media coverage of trials Not all those states howey er have allowed coverage of criminal trials over the objections of defendants or others involved

In other matters, the high court Allowed CBS to withhold infor mation gathered for its 60 Minutes' election program from two men-Living federal prosecution for alleged trand in the fast food franchising

business The court without comment left intact a ruling that journalists have a right to keep confidential information away from criminal defendants at least until a criminal trial begins

Agreed to decide whether a feder al law aimed at keeping racketeers from invading legitimate businesses can also be used against wholly criminal gang activities At issue is the power of RICO, the

Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations Act, which makes it a federal crime for racketeers to get involved in "any enterprise which is engaged in or the activities of which affect, interstate or foreign com Agreed to decide whether private



# One killed, two injured during chase-shootout

BEALMONT Texas (AP) One man was killed and two people were injured following a high speed, gun fire punctuated flight from sheriff's deputies, but officers said today they still had not determined the name of the man they killed

If he's who we think he is, he's a Texas Department of Corrections parole violator," said Jefferson County sheriff's Maj. Hal Shaw, adding that he was "95 percent sure" of the man's

The incident began before dawn Sunday. Shaw said, when deputies said they spotted a car reported stolen from Florida, parked outside a tavern near Nome, a small town about 15 miles west of Beaumont When officers approached the car-

he said, one deputy saw what he thought was a sawed off shotgun and

Occupants of the car then sped east on US 90 with deputies managing to pull the car over after about a mile. said Shaw

shaw said, officers found "several" weapons inside the auto, including a sawed off shotgun One man was pronounced dead at

# Safety inspectors seek mishap cause

FRESNO, Calif (AP) - State safe ty inspectors were searching again today for the cause of a scaffolding collapse that sent seven miners hurtling to their deaths at an unfinished hydroelectric plant

Granite Ball Groves Co., the threecompany consortium that is building the Pacific Gas and Electric Co's Helms Creek plant, released a statement over the weekend saying only. The cause of the failure is un-

Soon after Friday's accident, California Occupational Safety and Health Administration inspectors

were dispatched to the site in the wall. Three of the workers hit a ledge rugged Sierra Nevada, about 50 miles northeast of Fresno They had no comment about their findings

Frances Squires, PG&E spokeswoman, said Sunday she had heard nothing of that day's investigation The accident site has been sealed, she said, but work was to continue at other parts of the underground

The collapse occurred as a night crew neared the end of its shift. The seven men, all hard-rock miners, were on a circular platform suspended from four cables in a 970-foot ventilation shaft, applying concrete to the

about 300 feet below the platform. The other four fell 450 feet to the bottom.

PG&E spokesmen said responsibility for worker safety at the \$384 million plant rests with the consortium. The power company had safety en-

gineers at the site, but spokesman Ed Slingland said he was unclear about their exact responsibilities. The deaths bring to 10 the number

of workers killed at the site since

work began on the project in 1977.

The plant, which is to be completed next year, will generate 1.1 million kilowatts during peak use hours. PG&E officials said.



Hunger strike threatened

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) - IRA guerrillas in Maze Prison are threatening a new hunger strike for political status, claiming the British government reneged on promises made to end a "fast to the death" last month after 53 days.

The jailed members of the Irish Republican Army threatened to resume their fast in the coming weeks, according to a letter smuggled out of the prison and mad e public by Sinn Fein, the IRA's political branch

Radioactive rings creating concern

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) - The discovery of contaminated wedding rings has prompted state health officials to issue warnings about radioactive gold, which apparently caused cancer in at least two

A bulletin warning doctors and jewelers of the potential danger will be sent out "sometime this week," said state Department of Health spokeswoman Frances Tarlton.

She said a public notice would also be sent out advising people with "serious skin problems" to seek medical help and have their physicians or health-department offices in New York's 62 counties check gold jewelry with Geiger counters.

Radioactive gold jewelry has been blamed in at least two cancer cases in the past 14 years. Cancer spread through a Bradford, Pa., man's body and another patient's ring finger was amputated, offi-

Doctors and health officials have known of the radioactive gold's existence since the late 1960s, but the public wasn't warned for fear of triggering unwarranted panic, Health Department officials

'We don't want them to be hysterical. We do want them to be aware of the possible danger and if they have real problems to get them checked," Ms. Tarlton said. "We can't possibly check every piece of

Three rings already recovered apparently were made from hollow 24-carat gold "seeds" impregnated with radioactive radon gas. The seeds were to be injected into tumors to kill cancerous tissue We suspect that some were left over and some








Vice presidents usually do not get an opportunity to perform really meaningful tasks in the scheme of things in Washington,



# Dr. Martin Luther King left legacy of 'overcoming'

On Dr. Martin Luther King's birthday. I was thinking about him and how, even though they killed him, he defeated all of his enemies.

All the bad things that people who hated him knew about him or thought they knew, no longer matter. Dr King is now a symbol. I'd bet a paycheck his picture is hanging on more than a million humble walls. Millions of children read his words, some of the most eloquent ever written or spoken. A lot of those children will be inspired by him to become better human beings.

In life, the man had faults. Everybody does. When you are alive, you pack along everything - your finest impulses and your lowest, your best thoughts and your dumbest, your good luck and your bad, your successes and your failures. After you die, time sifts out the unimportant things and what's left in people's memories are the highest points. That's the way it should be. The

more you find out by people who achieve greatness, the more you realize that they all do it despite weaknesses and failings and mistakes. They pay a price for their achievements, but it's the achievement, not the price, that's important.

Dr. King has left a fine legacy for all of us. He broke the back of segregation. Because of him, black children don't have to suffer the humiliation of being refused a hamburg-

er or place to sit and whites don't have to carry the guilt of living with a system that did that to children. He didn't do it alone, but he was the catalyst that made it happen.

He left a legacy of personal courage, too. Not even the most meanspirited bigot can deny that Dr. Martin Luther King was as brave as any man who won a Medal of Honor on the battlefield. He never flinched; he never backed down; he never ran; he never surrendered. He died on his feet facing the enemy and that's a good example for every American to

you want to be technically correct, it was the lawyers and politicians who dismantled the segregation laws, but it was Dr. Martin Luther King who taught black Americans to stand tall and to walk proud. Because of him, people today speak of black men, not black boys

He left a legacy of idealism. He forced us all to live up to our own ideals of equality and freedom. In the face of hate, he preached love; surrounded by violence; he urged

sacrifice to a cause greater than himself. It is a lesson especially relevant today. Too many people today are so busy playing with themselves they won't even suffer an inconvenience to help their own children much less a neighbot's, and God forbid that their country should ask something of

enemies, he overcame his own frailties, he overcame the people who used him, and he overcame the people who tried to stop him. He overcame them all, for long after they are forgotten, Martin Luther King will be remembered and his words repeated.

# Democrats face 'largest rebuilding job ever'

Carter led his intrepid irregulars back to Georgia and political oblivion. they took with them scant sympathy from the shellshocked Democratic survivors of the November election disasier. The Democrats' depleted, dispirited leadership is badly in need of a scapegoat, and Carter is the handiest one around.

The mood of some embittered party wheelhorses was perhaps best illus trated at the Democratic National Committee's executive board meet ing in Washington on Dec 9. Don Michael, the amiable Indiana state chairman, moved that the DNC provide a "full financial accounting" of its expenditures during the four years dominated by the Carter peo

'I'm not hard to get along with, Michael assured my reporters Jack Mitchell and Allen Myerson. "I'm not being critical of (Chairman) John White, but we should have more than a re-elect the President committee.

What was significant about Michael's motion - which the assembled party poohbahs approved - is that it wasn't necessary: Federal law requires the committee to make a detailed disclosure of its finances any-

But the demand for a full accounting showed that the recriminations aren't over for the Democrats. On the positive side, it signaled the possible start of a move to make the national committee less of a White House appendage and more of a tool to support party candidates across the board particularly in Congress.

The Democrats' historical inclina-





tion to fratricidal feuding has been exacerbated by the loss of the White House and Senate and their diminished majority in the House About the only thing the leaders agree on is that the party is in deep trouble - not unlike the post-Watergate Republians of 1974.

Congressional Democrats, led by Speaker Tip O'Neill, are determined to reassert the influence at the committee which they lost to the Georgia good ole boys. No fewer than 125 senators and congressmen signed a note to White last month demanding a more "aggressive" fundraising effort and a voice in the selection of his successor, who they said should be free of any close association with presidential aspirants.

The legislators' stew has plenty of beef in it. In several of the close Senate races the Democrats lost, the Republicans outspent them several times over. In the tight Florida contest, for example, Republican winner Paula Hawkins got \$400,000 from party funds, while Democrat Bill Gunter got a mere \$45,000 from his party. In Pennsylvania, Arlen Spector drew \$523,000 from the Republican Senatorial Committee, while Pete

Flaherty was allotted a meager \$42. 711 from the senatorial Democratic eampaign chest It's true that the Senatorial Com-

mittee isn't controlled by the Democratic National Committee. But the unhappy losers see their financial shortchanging as a reflection of the national party's singleminded devotion to Carter's re-election effort. The DNC's own spending practices

have also been called into question by knowledgeable insiders. One board member, for example, calculated that the national committee had spent roughly eight times as much on polling and mass media advertising just prior to the election as did the Repub The chief beneficiary was the presi-

who collected a whopping \$1.4 million from the DNC in 1980.

One prominent senatorial loser, Birch Bayh of Indiana, says the Democrats' problem goes deeper than the nuts and bolts of finances and organizing. "It's time the party stood for something," he said: "It hasn't for too

With this goal in mind, the party is expected to revive the Democratic Advisory Council of a generation ago, to formulate party positions on im-

Whatever route the Democrats choose, it will be "the biggest rebuilding job this party has ever had," according to DNC finance chairman Charles Manatt, a likely successor to White as chairman.

Footnote: In fairness to Caddell, a knowledgeable source explained that DNC had custody of campaign funds that Caddell could have spent earlier, but he had delayed billing. A DNC spokesman refused repeated calls for

COSTLY CHAUVINISM: Government action designed to help one ailing American industry can often hurt businesses in another field. # Can Reaganism survive without Reaganites running show?

By ROWLAND EVANS AND ROBERT NOVAK WASHINGTON - The prospect of

Reaganite policy carried out by non-Reaganite officials in the new administration was dramatized by the contrast between the inaugural address and a backstage battle over who will be the nation's civil service chief. Ronald Reagan's faithful followers,

in Washington inaugural week to watch six years of dreams and work become reality, were overjoyed by an uncompromising address that committed the new president to radical change. But their joy was diluted by the apparent failure of one of their own, Dr. Donald J. Devine, to become director of the Office of Personnel Management (OPM).

OPM, successor to the old Civil Service Commission, certainly will not set the administration's philosophical course. Yet, continuing struggle behind the scenes over whether Reaganite Devine will be there represents the last sounding of this transition protest: Those who so clearly share Reagan's ideology have been systematically excluded from much of his administration.

That Reagan himself since the election has remained faithful to his political movement is not questioned by his own followers. Rather, it is political opponents and news commentators from the first hour of his election victory who have perceived that Reagan was about to abandon his ideology now that power beckoned and was embracing "pragmatism."

It is mostly wishful thinking. Breakfasting with reporters Jan. 16, presidential counselor Edwin Meese in answers to questions laid down a general pattern of no retreat on all





issues. That previewed Reagan's inaugural address four days later when he declared "there will be no compro-Seeming policy retreats during the

transition were either false alarms or misunderstandings. Treasury Secretary Donald T. Regan, who in his confirmation hearing suggested a sixmonth delay in the tax cut, during a Jan. 21 interview over ABC's "Good Morning America" changed his tune: "We're not talking about any delay." Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger in his confirmation hearing seemed to be abandoning a 3 percent arms spending increase for NATO members. Confirmation hearings for his deputy secretary, Frank Carlucci, corrected the impression; Carlucci said 3 percent was only the "starting

Nevertheless, the Reagan political movement has been in declining spirits since Nov. 4 because ideology and political loyalty have not counted for much in appointments. Particularly intense was a long fight over a role in the administration for campaign defense adviser William Van Cleave, which ended inaugural weekend. Cut down from high expectations to a

place on the National Security Council (NSC) staff because of what Reagan aides termed abrasiveness, Van Cleave decided to go back to the University of Southern California fac-

The appointment as deputy defense secretary of Carlucci, a non-ideological civil servant, instead of Van Cleave has triggered more complaints than have been publicly revealed. One meeting of the steering committee, the informal group of conservative Republican senators, was consumed by unhappiness about Carlucci (especially from newly elected members)

The most pained complaints have come from Reagan's regional political directors, who have looked askance at filling high office with non-political, non-ideological, non-Reaganite administrators. This is not merely the usual post-election grievance of the grass roots worker. Reagan's operatives are committed often doctrinaire - conservatives. They fear their exclusion from office is preparation for dilution of policy. and the Devine case has become a

symbol. Whereas Meese has privately cited lack of qualifications to justify rejecting Reagan's political operatives for office, that cannot be done with Don Devine, a political science professor at the University of Maryland. At least three other names have been floated in series for the OPM post against Devine, suggesting the search is for anybody-but-Devine.

# Kidnapped minister kept chained to chicken coop

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP) - The daughter of an American minis ter who was dragged from his home in Guatemala and kept chained in a chicken coop for part of a 27-day confinement says she doubts her father will ever go back to the Central American country:

The Rev. Laverle "Lon" Cummings, who was freed Wednesday, spent the weekend visiting relatives here. In an interview Sunday night with WRCB-TV, the 50-year-old minister said he was kidnapped because of stories that he was rich.

The Seventh Day Adventist minister had been associated with a school-clinic for more than 10 years in Santa Lucia, 23 miles southwest of

After stories were spread by villagers that he was wealthy, a group calling itself The Army of The Poor kidnapped him on Christmas Day, he His captors demanded \$10 million for his release. Cummings has

refused to say whether any ransom was paid. They handcuffed me, put me in a chicken coop .. there were no chickens in the coop," Cummings told the station. "I was threatened

Since returning to the United States on Thursday, the minister has visited his brother and and his daughter, Kathie, who is studying at Southern Missionary College in Collegedale, Tenn.

Miss Cummings said Sunday her father was uncertain of his plans, but added, "I doubt very seriously that he will go back.

On Friday, Cummings, a Boise, Idaho, native, told the Union Bulletin of Walla Walla, Wash, that he remained healthy despite his ordeal. He said efforts of American officials at the U.S. Embassy in Guatemala had no bearing on his release.

There was nothing they could do," he said. Cummings was left idle much of his captivity. He spent up to 10 hours a day writing a book about his experiences, he said, but before he was released the kidnappers confiscated his writings.

LONDON (AP) -Labor Party leader Michael Foot appealed today to rebellious leaders of the party's right wing to abandon their plans to form a new party. But one of the rebels, former Education Minister Shirley Williams, said: "We are almost inevitably on our way out.

The left-right split in the party, which governed Britain for 17 of the 35 years since World War II, widened Sunday night when four leading right-wing Laborites and former Cabinet members announced they were forming a "Council for Social Democracy' because of the ascendancy of the left wing in the party.

The four - Roy Jenkins, David Owen, Shirley Williams and William Rodgers - did not quit the party yet. But they are expected to do so in the summer and announce formation of a

new democratic socialist party after lining up sup-

porters. The formation of a new party seeking the middle-of-the-road vote between Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher's Conservatives and the Labor left would be the biggest political shakeup in Britain since Labor's emergence as a major force in the 1922 general

The development came after Labor's increasingly powerful left-wing, led by former Energy Minister Tony Benn, at a special party conference Saturday ended the moderates' control of the process by which the party elects its party leader, the politician who would be prime minister if Labor won control of





# DR. NEIL SOLOMON Life normal minus gallbladder

Dear Dr. Solomon: I've been having problems with my gallbladder for several months, and have finally been told that it will have to come out. I would like to know what the gallbladder is and just what it does. If it can be removed, does it serve any purpose? - Mrs. A.U.

Dear Mrs. U.: The gallbladder is a sac-like organ that is located under the liver in the upper-right-hand portion of the abdomen. Its function is to store and concentrate bile, a fluid that is produced by the liver and used to help digest fatty foods. When bile is needed - that is, when eating stimulates its release - it leaves the gallbladder and enters the intestines, where the process of digestion is completed

From your description, it appears that your surgeon is planning to perform a cholecystectomy — removal of the gallbladder. In such cases, after the operation the bile will flow directly from the liver to the intestine. Therefore, even without a gallbladder, a person can lead a completely normal life.

Dear Dr. Solomon: I've often wondered why people would use a substance such as Laetrile when there is no sound evidence that it works; now, I'm beginning to understand. I have a painful arthritic condition and a neighbor of mine tells me that snake venom can be useful in its treatment. However, my doctor suggests I stick with the more conventional methods of therapy. Do you know anything about the snake venom treatment and would you recommend it? - Mr.

Dear Mr. J.: Aside from the fact that it would be both foolish and unethical of me to try to presribe a course of treatment for a patients I've never seen, I can tell you that the Food and Drug Administration has asked the manufacturer of a snake venom product to stop marketing the substance until it can be tested for safety and effectiveness. The FDA is concerned that a number of people throughout the country have been using the snake venom in the treatment of arthritis and multiple sclerosis, even though there have never been any scientific studies confirming its usefulness. According to Dr. Harry M. Meyer Jr., direcors of FDA's Bu-reau of Biologics, the agency wants to protect people from using the substance that may be toxic and that has been found to be of varying composition and quality.

The FDA nores that adverse reactions have been reported among some individuals who have been given the snake venom; however, there is little information about these reactions because adequate records were not kept. In addition, FDA tests have shown that there are significant variations in different batches of the snake venom product.

In view of these factor, I would strongly urge you to follow your doctor's recommendations. If you shop around long enough, you may eventually find someone willing to presribe some exotic form of treatment. Following that course of action can affect your pocketbook as well as your arthritis, and in both instances the effect may be bad.

# Sun provides powerful additions to language

WASHINGTON (AP) - To keep up with the new technology of harnessing the sun's power to heat, cool and light the nation's buildings, a special lexicon has emerged to describe the principles and concepts surrounding solar energy applications, according to the Solar Energy Research Institute (SERI).

A sample of the solar glossary includes:

Absorptivity - the ratio of solar energy absorbed by a surface to the solar energy striking it. All solar-heating systems are based on storing solar energy within a material for a period of time, whereas cooling systems use materials with low absorptivity to do exactly the opposite.

Clerestory - a window that is placed vertically (or nearly so) in a wall or roof above one's line of vision in order to supply natural light to a build-Convection - the

Glazing - covering with one or more panes of glass or sheets of plas-Greenhouse Effect refers to the tendency of

# 'It's Willink's light' in eyes of painter

AMSTERDAM, Netherlands (AP) — Dutch painter Carel Willink lit another cigar and looked out the window of his flat in downtown Amsterdam, just a block away from where he

was born 80 years ago. He noticed a bright afternoon light on the old buildings nearby, even though the sky was dark. "It's Willink's light," the artist said, referring to the threatening clouds and colors in his paintings. The scene is Willink's world — reality with a question mark, familiar things like buildings, skies, mountain ranges and light taking on strange combinations.

Willink's 80th birthday tribute at Amsterdam's Stedelijk Museum last spring is gone, as are two of his wives and models, Wilma and Mathilde. But Willink, considered by many in the art world to be the master of "fantastic" or "magical" realism, isn't one to let wars, wives, criticism or old age change his style or keep him from his studio, where he has produced some 300 works - portraits, nudes, landscapes - all in the same Willink style.

He has been commended for his compulsive urge for detail and refinement, for his camera-like technique of presenting realistic scenes and then adding "something curious," flirting

with surrealism, often doom-laden.

MOSCOW (AP) - The nation that produced Dmitri Shostakovich, Aram Khachaturian and Igor Stravinsky is searching now for its next generation of leading composers — and Soviet cultural authorities may be growing more lenient about new musi-

cal trends. Several new composers, mostly between 45 and 55 years old, have moved to the front of the Soviet musical world following the deaths of Shostakovich in 1975 and Khachaturian, perhaps best remembered for the "Saber Dance," in 1978.

Stravinsky, an emigrant to America, died in 1971. The new composers of symphonies, operas and ballets include Andrei Eshpai, 55, the energetic composer of the "Angara" ballet and a fast-moving concerto for orchestra, trumpet, piano and vibraphone; Rodin Shchedrin, 48, a ballet and opera composer and husband of prima ballerina Maya Plisetskaya; and Alfred Schnitke, 46, known particularly for his violin concertos.

There are a score of others, many of them littleknown in the West. Some of the best compositions are likely to be heard at the Soviet Union's firstever international festival of classical music, scheduled for Moscow in May.

Some Soviet musicians see the very decision to hold the festival as an important sign of increased interest in Western music — in a country that asserted in a recent interview that an ideolo once viewed music as another dangerous battle- cal element is "impossible" in instrumental mus ground of East-West struggle.

In Stalin's day, authorities proclaimed sternly that "the best composers have always been linked with progressive social movements" and warned composers of "hostile elements and alien influences." Shostakovich and others suffered harassment for their work.

But 67-year-old Tikhon Khrennikov, who has headed the Soviet Composers' Union since Stalinist times, downplayed ideology at a recent press conference.

"The most important thing in music is to appeal to the human heart," he insisted. Composer Eshpai

geois or fascist." Not everyone agrees that the Soviet musical world has been greatly liberalized. Arvo Pyat, 45, a leading Estonian composer of modernist music known for his 12-tune works, emigrated from the Soviet Union this year. Friends said he was angered by continuing attacks on modernist music by some officials and restrictions on his vists abroad.





# 'Gang of Four' followers warned

PEKING (AP) - China's Communist Party today praised the conviction and sentences of Chairman Mac Tse-tung's widow and her nine co-defendants but warned that their followers must also be suppressed.

"Pouring out the waters of the Yangtze River could not wash away their crimes," said the Communist. Party newspaper, the People's Daily "Without punishing them according to law, there is no way to uphold justice and assuage the people's in-

dignation. The most publicized trial in China's history ended Sunday with the sentencing of Mao's 67-year-old widow Jiang Qing, and former Vice Premier Zhang Chunqiao to death sentences that were suspended for two years and the other eight defendants to prison terms ranging from 16 years to

There was no right of appeal from

the verdicts or the sentences. The People's Daily said remnants of the factions responsible for the 1966-76 Cultural Revolution "still have not been dealt with as they should be, and the poison still has not been thoroughly eliminated."

One document introduced during the trial listed 60 other persons who were implicated, and trials of these lesser figures and others are expected to start soon.

Jiang Qing and Zhang were the only two defendants who did not plead guilty, and that apparently was why they got the death sentences. But Deng Xiaoping, the leader of the new regime, and others reportedly argued against executing them. The court said if they "repented" during their next two years of confinement, their sentences would be commuted to life

Jiang Qing was as defiant as ever at the final trial session Sunday. In a replay of her performance at previous sessions, she shouted when she heard the word "death" in her sen tence: "Down with the revisionists led by Deng Xiaoping! Making revolution is no crime, it is right to rebel!

A television broadcast showed her struggling with two women bailiffs who snapped handcuffs on her and marched her out of the courtroom as 800 invited spectators applauded

Jiang Qing, the other three radical leaders of the party who with her were dubbed the "Gang of Four" and Mao's former secretary, Chen Boda, were convicted of persecuting 700,000 people and causing the deaths of 34,-000 during the Cultural Revolution and plotting to take over the government after Mao's death.

The other five defendants, all former generals, were convicted of plot ting with former Defense Minister Lin Piao to assassinate Mao and take over the government.

The trial started Nov. 20 and the public sessions ended Dec. 29. Western reporters were barred on the ground that state secrets might be disclosed, but the official Chinese press and persons attending the sessions gave them information about what went on

The defendants were tried under a new criminal code adopted in January 1980 that guarantees defendants the right to attorneys and sets out investigative procedures.

The People's Daily said the significance of the trial "lies especially in

restoring the dignity of law, upholding the authority of law and establishing an example of handling affairs and ruling the country by laws " But in London, the human rights organization Amnesty International said the trial was unfair and appealed to the Chinese government to commute the

The trial confronted China's current leaders with the dilemma of how to handle the involvement of Mao, still officially the revered "Great Helmsman" of Chinese communism, in the crimes charged to his wife and other close advisers.

# Saudis seek unity of Islamic nations TAIF, Saudi Arabia (AP) - Pakistani President also heard a prayer asking Allah, the God of Islam,

Mohammed Zia ul-Haq today told the 37-nation Islamic summit "the highest priority" should be given to ending the 18-week-old Iran Iraq war which he said weakens the entire Persian Gulf region.

The attrition of the resources of these two Islamic states weakens the entire region and makes it more vulnerable to outside pressure," Zia said in a pre-

Therefore, he added, "it is a matter of the highest priority for the Islamic world to explore all possible ways and means to bring this conflict to an end. Hopes that a truce might be arranged at the

summit to halt the war were dashed when Iran refused to attend because Iraqi President Saddam Hussein was coming. Iraq has demanded Iran recognize its sovereignty over the Shatt al-Arab waterway, its only outlet to the Persian Gulf, which it captured early in the war.

Iran says it won't negotiate until all Iraqi troops leave its territory. Zia also called on the conference to take, "decisive action" against Israel to force the return of occupied

Arab land for a Palestinian state. Meanwhile, Saudi Arabia, the summit host, lobbied the Islamic leaders to get the divided Moslem world to unite and drive Israel from East Jerusalem and Soviet troops from Afghanistan.

"I call on you individually to unify your ranks, unite your views and mobilize your full potentials to defend Islam, rescue and aid your (Palestinian and Afghan) brothers and restore their rights," Saudi Crown Prince Fahd told the leaders from 37 of the 41 Islamic nations and the Palestine Liberation Organi zation who assembled Sunday in Mecca, Islam's holiest city, for the opening of the three-day meet-

Libya, Iran, Afghanistan and Egypt were absent The kings; princes, presidents, sheiks and others

The first tangible result of Saudi Arabia's peace-

making was a handshake between King Hassan II of Morocco and Algerian President Benjedid Chadli, whose North African nations have been at odds over the former Spanish Sahara. Morocco annexed the northern half of the big territory on its southern border when Spain pulled out, and Algeria arms and supports the Polisario guerrillas fighting the Moroc-

Those this handshake will be the forerunner of an agreement," said an Arab diplomat present when the two foes shook hands and smiled at each other host of other problems divided the Moslem leaders as they left Mecca and drove to Taif, the Saudi summer retreat in the mountains 40 miles to the southeast, where they are talking for two days in a new \$250 million conference center complete with gold plated doorknobs and bathroom fixtures.

## Fishermen seek aid

NANTUCKET, Mass. (A) - Scallopers around this Massachusetts island, contending ice has rvined a month of fishing worth about \$500,000, want state officials to declare their trade a "disaster" and make them eligible for emergency federal loans.

Alan Holgate, Nantucket's shell fish warden, said the harbor where much scalloping takes place was locked in ice up to 18 inches thick. Two Coast Guard icebreakers are needed to help a ferry carrying essential supplies make one daily trip to the island of 6,000 year-round residents, he said.

The collapse of scalloping during a recent cold wave has thrown at least 300 fishermen and other scalloping workers out of work, said Jim Gross, past president of the Nantucket Fishermen's Association.

"It's a bad situation," he said. "If you go down to the local bars, you'll see nobody.

Gross said the fishermen are preparing a letter asking Gov. Edward J. King to declare a "disaster," permitting them to seek low-interest loans from the federal Small Business Administration. He estimated the loss at \$500,000 for Jan-

The scalloping season, which runs from Nov. 1 to March 31, brings in up to \$2 million annually for Nantucket fishermen, said William R. Klein of the island's economic development and planning





# Daring roof-top jail break attempt with helicopter fails

NEW YORK (AP) - Authorities were trying to determine today who was targeted for freedom in a daring but bungled attempt by a man and a woman to pluck an inmate from atop a Manhattan federal prison by using a hijacked helicopter.

The escape attempt fizzled in midmorning Sunday when the hijackers gave up trying to cut through a grating over a rooftop recreation area at the Metropolitan Correction Center in downtown Manhattan's Foley Square near City Hall.

But for the next three hours, 20 prisoners held a guard hostage in the recreation area while police trained rifles on them from rooftops and hun dreds of people watched from nearby

Warden Dale Thomas said a recently convicted narcotics dealer. Robert Wyler, was one of the inmates under investigation as a possible target of the incident. The FBI declined com-

Wyler was accused of heading a three-state cocaine ring and was alleged by prosecutors to be a member of the Mafia.

The escape attempt ended without injury, and no shots were fired. After lounging in the sun and playing basketball in the shadows of whirring police helicopters, the inmates on the roof, including Wyler, negotiated a

surrender at about 1 p.m., officials The incident began at 7 a.m. when a dark-haired woman who wore a maroon jogging suit and said her last name was Sanchez rented a helicop-

ter from Island Helicopters Corp. at

New Jersey's Teterboro Airport,

about seven miles from Manhattan. The pilot, identified by police as Thomas Nietsche, took the woman over the Hudson River and the island of Manhattan to a heliport on Manhattan's East Side, where they were

The second woman gave the first woman two bags, the women and the pilot had breakfast at a nearby restaurant, and Ms. "Sanchez" and the pilot returned in the helicopter to Teterboro, where they picked up a man who appeared to be in his 40s. authorities said.

Anthony Amanzio, general manag er of Island Helicopters, said the man and woman asked the pilot to return

In the air, the two passengers of fered the pilot money to land on the roof of the federal detention center, Amanzio said. When he refused, they placed a sawed-off shotgun to his head and told him it no longer was a request.

Nietsche landed the helicopter on the cage over the 12 story jail shortly after 10 a.m. and the prisoners there overpowered their unarmed guard and locked him in a washroom:

The woman in the helicopter let down a chairi-link ladder, lowered herself to the wire mesh and tried to sever the quarter inch thick wire with a bolt-cutting tool, authorities said

Her companion also tried to cut the wire, without success. In a final effort to puncture the

cage, the hijackers ordered the pilot to bounce the helicopter on it. But that One of the hijackers tossed a pistol

to the prisoners through the cage and the pilot was ordered to fly to another heliport beside the Hudson River on Manhatta n's West Side.

There a woman was waiting in a Cadillac, and the three drove away. authorities said.

On the jail roof, the inmates ap parently realized there would be no escape route, and one of them picked gun and tossed it onto a lower ledge. The inmates also released the





# Baptists plan to have network

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — A Southern Baptist church official says his will be the first American religious denomination to have its own television network, under a license application the Federal Communications Commission is expected to act on

The Rev. Jimmy R. Allen, president of the Southern Baptist Convention's Radio and Television Commission, said Saturday that the commission had earlier voted to develop a 115-station network that would use satellites to link newly allowed low-power stations across the nation

Programming is expected to begin by the end of the year, according to Allen. He said the stations will operate on either 100 or 1,000 watts and will have a radius of 10 miles.

Allen, who was keynote speaker Saturday at a meeting of Southern Baptist Men in suburban Columbia, will also serve as president of the network to be known as ACTS - the American Christian Televi-

Allen said ACTS plans to begin with six hours of prime time programming each evening. He said the programs would include evangelistic preaching, pastoral nurture, and Bible study.

He said other programs would be "clean wholesome" situation comedies, programs for children, drama and news magazine features.

"For the first time, technology and government regulations have worked together to provide us with an occasion to get into television on a low economic threshold," he said.

The former Southern Baptist president from San Antonio, Texas, said the proposed network is not designed to compete with existing "electronic church" broadcasters, such as the PTL Club and the Christian Broadcasting Network in Virginia Beach,

Atlanta broadcaster Ted Turner and Sears Roebuck and Co. have also applied for similar networks of low-power stations, but apparently no other religious denominations have done so, Allen said.

We picked 115 cities across the U.S. - including one in Anchorage, Alaska - and prepared licenses for the FCC," Allen said.

"Our philosophy of tying everything to the local church has been largely ignored by the electronic religionists," said Allen, noting the network will allow the commission to be a partner with the local church in proclaiming the Gospel

Local Baptist groups - churches, associations, even groups of local businessmen - would construct \*. the stations, which are expected to cost between \$50,000 and \$100,000

The biggest hurdle is getting on the satellite," Allen said. ACTS already has some \$1.1 million, but a total of \$5 million will be needed by March 1 to sign up for time on the RCA Comstar D-3 satellite by April

Allen said the stations are designed to reach 90 percent of the church's members within eight





# Davis' monsters mug Eagles

NEW ORLEANS - The Oakland Raiders, regarded by the National Football League as men molded by a monster, won the Super Bowl Sunday. They won by keeping the Philadelphia Eagles from their season-long pattern of success

Eagle runners could have run more easily in a sea of gumbo than they did against the Raider marauders. Forced to throw, Ron Jaworski was sometimes spectacular and sometimes spectacularly stupid, never was he consistent enough to keep everything but the final Oakland margin of victory in doubt much beyond halftime.

The winning quarterback, of course, was the one loved by nearly everyone whose heart or wallet was not committed to the Eagles. The NFL season's Super Sentimental Saga came true. By completing 13 passes, Jim Plunkett also completed the most special comeback of any player in recent memory

But Plunkett had what Jaworski did not time - the most important element in any game. While Plunkett could have counted the times his future was considered hopeless over the years. Jaws was being eaten alive by a Raider defense vastly underrated until Sunday.

THE EAGLES had feared that what happened just might, that the best secondary in the league might do such a splendid job of man for man coverage that their pals could rush Jaworski in waves of six and seven at a time. Instead of stickum, that glue-like substance they smear all over their hands, the Raider defenders. seemed equipped with magnets Sunday

Why else would Rod Martin, an otherwise obscure linebacker, set a Super Bowl record with three interceptions? Did Al Davis pull his ultimate prank'

Normally as cautious as a Republican with a welfare budget, Jaworski threw two passes to Martin that the most green high-school quarterback would consider ill-advised. The first gave the Raiders the ball on the third play from scrimmage - and the momentum necessary to take a fine team completely apart.

As the game's most valuable player, Plunkett was quick to praise an offensive line that allowed eight sacks the last time the teams met but just one Sunday, and receivers that ran remarkably precise routes and outwrestled the Eagles for important catches during Plunkett's 13-for-21 performance.

And the class postgame gesture was Eagle Coach Dick Vermeil forcing his way through a field-load of slightly loaded Raider fans, shaking Plunkett's hand and affectionately patting his

THE POSTGAME collision so many thought might be as nasty as any on the field. Davis versus Commissioner Pete Rozelle during the trophy presentation, was tame - a Super bust. They were polite to the extreme, with Rozelle recognizing the Raiders as the first team to win a Super Bowl championship without winning a

This is a game where nearly everything assumes a magnitude greater than most players. have experienced. Sunday there were ever so many Super "ifs" that made otherwise Super piayers seem like Super stiffs.

If, for instance, Harold Carmichael had turned

toward the line of scrimmage an instant after he did while in motion on third and 10 at the Oakland 41 in the first quarter, Rodney Parker's end-zone catch would have counted and the Eagles would have gained a 7-7 tie.

On the next series, if Raider center Dave Dalby had not gotten away with grabbing Carl Hairston's face mask and tackling him to the ground. Plunkett probably would not have had time to scramble into position to combine with Kenny King on an 80-yard touchdown pass and

Poor Hairston. The first half he always seemed either a step too fast or a step too slow at the wrong moments.

ON THE Raiders' first touchdown drive, Hairston was offside on a third-down incompletion. With another chance, from the Eagle 23, Oakland ran for the first down. The next play Art Shell cut Hairston's legs at the line of scrimmage - and a Plunkett pass that would have hit Hairston in the face had he been standing hit Cliff Branch for a first down.

The difference a game makes was best illustrated in one number - Wilbert Montgomery's rushing yardage. Against the Cowboys in the NFC championship game, Montgomery ran for 194 yards. Sunday, he rushed for 44 - in 16

Whenever there seemed a chance for a rally, the Eagles were a few inches late - and unlucky. On a fumbled kickoff that was not ruled such, when Oakland's Keith Moody might have been out but not down, an Eagle and a Raider dove for the ball. The Raider got it. When Branch. and Roynell Young fought in the air for a Plunkett pass, Branch twisted away with it and into the end zone.

An Eagle fan dressed as some sort of Super Eagle dashed onto the field midway through the third quarter. Like his team, the man was too slow and too disorganized to evade security for long. Even the Eagle players and coaches were harsh with him as he was being led off.

THERE ALSO was at least one Super premonition. That came during a pretraining-camp workout, when Superseer Davis approached Matt Millen and said: "You're gonna be the first rookie middle linebacker since Jack Lambert to take a team to the Super Bowl.

Millen, a second-round draft choice from Penn State, tucked that so far away in his mind that he was dumbfounded when Davis came up to him after the Raiders' victory over the Chargers for the AFC title and said: "Told you so, didn't I?" Then Davis reminded Millen of his prediction

so many months before. Millen is no ordinary rookie on or off the field.

Before Davis could leave the dressing room after that bit of bantering. Millen stepped into his path and said:

"Me and (rookie quarterback) Marc Wilson are retiring after the Super Bowl. Why? Davis wondered.

"Because," Millen said, "we'll never have anything more important to look forward to.

LaSalle Thompson, Texas' 6-101/2 center, scored 26 points and pulled down 15 rebounds, and his 10 first-half rebounds were two more than the entire Baylor team, which found itself outbattled 25-8 on the boards the first 20 minutes.

"There's nobody in the league who can match up with him (Thompson) when he plays like he did tonight," Texas coach Abe Lemons said.

Although Texas was a preseason projection to be among the conference contenders, the Longhorns took only a 1-4 SWC record and 6-9 season mark

# Plunkett completes amazing comeback

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - On a day that America's heart was wrenched by the homecoming of its hostages from Iran, it was warmed by a timid. Indian-featured young man who wrote one of the most dramatic chapters in the annals of sport.

If there's anything we Yankees relish as much as a happy ending to a period of travail - as in the case of the hostages - it is seeing some kid overcome almost every conceivable obstacle and rise to the top.

That's the reason our dads went heavy for those 10-cent Horatio Alger throbbers and so avidly followed the pulp paper exploits of Frank and Dick

Now Jim Plunkett has made pikers of them all.

When this 32-year-old Mexican American, son of blind parents, a college football hero later scorned by the pros, quarterbacked and passed the rag tag, underdog Raiders to a 27-10 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles in Sunday's Super Bowl, script writers were sent scurrying for a scenario to top it. Let them just dare

Standing in the glare of a spotlight, a battery of microphones at his chinand sweat cascading down his square. rugged face. Plunkett disdained the hero's mantle

Now that you are the MVP in the Super Bowl, do you feel you are a storybook story?" a reporter asked.

don't," Plunkett replied. "I just read

· 'You were the Heisman Trophy winner in college and you quarterbacked Stanford to a win over Ohio State in the Rose Bowl," someone else interjected. "Is this just as great a thrill for you?

PLUNKETT'S brow furrowed in meditation.

When I did those things in college," he answered, "I thought they were the biggest things in my life. But they were at a different time and a different place. Because of the circumstances, this is more satisfy

When he was a tyke back in San Jose, Calif., he suffered rickets. It was thought he might be an invalid. But he persevered, became a fourstar athlete in high school and got a scholarship to Stanford.

His blind father died when he was a sophomore in college, leaving him with a mother who couldn't see. She listens to all his games back home.

Most of the time she has listened with pride swelling in her breast Other times - more recently - dis appointment and sadness have gripped the Plunkett household.

DRAFTED OUT of college by the New England Patriots, he threw 19 touchdown passes his first season and was NFL Rookie of the Year.

After four years the Patriots traded him to San Francisco where his fortunes suddenly went sour. His statistics fell off. Critics said he was a poor passer in the mold of Minnesota's former Joe Kapp. He had a wobbly delivery and no poise

San Francisco dumped him. He put out feelers to other pro clubs. For a disheartening period, the phone never rang. Then one day Al Davis, mayerick owner of the Raiders, brought him into the fold with Oakland's band of rascals, rejects and retreads.

We took people nobody else wanted," says Oakland Coach Tom Flores. One of them was Plunkett.

."Plunkett at first was a stand-in for the veteran Kenny Stabler. When Stabler was traded to Houston, the Raiders brought in hotshot Don Pas torini. At Oakland he didn't get to handle the ball once during 1978.

"I was really down," Plunkett confessed. "A couple of times I said to myself. The hell with it. I should try something else ...

THE RAIDERS insisted he stay. In the fifth game of the 1980 season, Pastorini broke his leg. The Raiders had to give Plunkett the ball.

The quarterback reject proceeded to carry the team the rest of the way. winning nine of the last 11 games of the season and then sweeping three playoff games leading to the Super

He was tremendous in the AFC title

game against San Diego. Against the Eagles Sunday, he was nothing short of marvelous, completing 13 of 21 passes for 261 yards and three touch-

His arm was a siege gun. He handled the ball like a sleight-of-hand magician. He never lost his poise or gutsy instincts.

'Vindication? What vindication?" he repeated a question. "It was just a good football game. The whole team was great. And I'm happy we won.

# Ex-Eagle coach Kuharich dies

PHILADELPHIA Kuharich traded away (AP) - Joe Kuharich, several popular players, 1964-1969, died Sunday quarterback Sonny Jurshortly before his old National Football League team performed for the first time ever in the Super Bowl

Kuharich, 63, of suburban Philadelphia, died at Graduate Hospital, a hospital spokeswoman said. Details were unavailable but Kuharich for years had battled multiple myloma, a form of bone cancer

Kuharich's over all record with the Eagles was 28-11-1, including his best season, 1966, when the Eagles won the last nine games of the season for a 9-5 record and a second-place tie with Cleveland in the National Football Conference.

Former Eagles owner Jerry Wolman rewarded Kuharich with an unprecedented 15-year contract as head coach and general manager after that season but the Eagles were 6-7-1 the following year. In 1968 they were 2-12-0.

Kuharich was fired in 1969 when Wolman sold the franchise to present owner Leonard Tose. During his years in charge of the Eagles,

# Sampson leaves critics speechless

AP Sports Writer Ralph Sampson could only have been more impressive if he had hopped a jet to New Orleans, donned football pads and earned himself a Super

Virginia's 7-foot-4 center quieted all critics of his aggressiveness and durability Sunday on national television when he turned University Hall at Charlottesville, Va., into his private showcase.

He scored a career-high 40 points, grabbed 16 rebounds and blocked three shots to lead secondranked and undefeated Virginia to an 89-73 rout of Ohio State. He scored 14 of his points in a seven-minute streak midway in the first half during which the Cavaliers outscored the Buckeyes 24-6 and grabbed a 19-point lead..

HE PRODUCED his points from a variety of locations and angles — a sky-high layup, a hook, a short jumper, a slam dunk and a jump shot from the perimeter among them.

"It was one of my better games, I'd say. I felt like I could be devastating from the beginning," said Sampson, who led the Cavaliers to their 21st consecutive victory - 16 this season - and kept alive the nation's longest winning streak.

Sampson's offensive display nearly overshadowed the defensive work he did against opposing center Herb Williams, who scored only 10 points and fouled out with 13: 24 to play.

"If there's a better player in the nation, I've never heard of or seen him," Williams said. "This was a frightening experience."

Sampson did it all despite playing on a gimpy ankle that kept him out of 31/2 minutes of the first

"He has shown a remarkable ability to play on that ankle," Virginia Coach Terry Holland said. "He realizes a player who's as important to us as he is has to be ready to play."

THE GAME was Ohio State's second in two days, coming 24 hours after a 69-63 upset at Columbus of No.16 Michigan. Buckeyes Coach Eldon Miller was not sure how to measure the effect of the consecutive games against ranked opponents.

"I really don't know if it was a factor. It is hard to measure," Miller said. "We are used to playing every Thursday and Saturday, but this week we had a tougher schedule."





# Wind River producer admits to payment error

FORT WASHAKIE, Wyo. (AP) -Officials for one oil company involved. in production on Wind River Indian Reservation lands concede they failed to make a \$20,000 royalty payment, but deny it was deliberate.

Private investigators for the Shoshone and Arapahoe Indians have been researching allegations of massive thefts of oil from the Indian lands for several months, and federal authorities are conducting their own check. The federal investigation has produced a grand jury indictment accusing one man of mail fraud and conflict of interest.

A story that appeared in the Los Angeles Times earlier this month said Gulf Oil Corp. sold 12,035 barrels of contaminated oil from the reservation to a reclaimer without paying the proper royalties. Gulf representatives appeared be-

fore the Joint Business Council for the two tribes this week and conceded the company failed to pay the \$20,948.48 it should have paid immediately, but denied the error was deliberate. Kent Ware, of Gulf's public relations office, said the nonpayment was

simply an "administrative error, and it was corrected with a payment to the U.S. Geological Survey after the story broke. The USGS handles royalty payments for oil on Indian The correct records had been sub-

mitted to the company's office, he said, but Gulf does not normally sell oil to reclaimers and the apparent oversight went undetected. In a prepared company statement, Gulf said it resented the implication
