## Oil decontrol announcement rescheduled

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan is expected to lift remaining oil price controls by Wednesday, a White House official said. The White House had planned to announce the action today, at a briefing at 1:30 p.m. EST. But late in the morning, deputy press secretary Karna Small said, without revealing the subject of the planned briefing, that any announcements planned for this afternoon would be delayed until Wednesday.

"There's too much going on," she said, referring to the visit to the White House of the freed American hostages.

Controls are still in place on about 25 percent of domestic crude oil, all gasoline and propane. Removal of the controls could hike gasoline prices by up to 17 cents a gallon — but add as much as \$7 billion to the federal Treasury at the same time through increased tax revenues from oil companies.

One industry analyst said he doubted consumers would feel the impact of the action soon on gasoline prices because competition and relatively low demand are likely to delay some of the increases at least until spring. However, other analysts said heating oil users may feel the full impact of crude oil decontrol this winter.

With decontrol, domestic crude oil prices would be allowed to rise to world market levels. The latest Energy Department estimates are that domestic crude oil has an average price of \$23 a barrel, while foreign averages \$16.

The source, who asked not to be named, echoed comments earlier in the day by Senate Majority Leader Howard H. Baker Jr., who indicated after a White House meeting with Reagan that an announcement on the subject was imminent.

The Republican leader called to a hastily scheduled meeting, said the removal of oil price controls was discussed.

He said an announcement stemming from their discussion may be made this afternoon. Asked whether the subject of the announcement would be decontrol, he replied, "possibly."

Others invited to the meeting were House Republican Leader Bob Michel, Treasury Secretary Donald Regan and David Stockman, director designate of the Office of Management and Budget.

Stockman said last week that the administration was likely to move ahead with plans to remove controls from oil prices sooner than Sept. 30, when they were due to expire.

Stockman has argued that if the Iran-Iraq war causes a severe world oil shortage later this year, Reagan would find it difficult to lift controls at that time.

Former President Jimmy Carter had ordered a gradual lifting of price control beginning in June 1979. Reagan campaigned on a pledge to speed up decontrol of oil prices, saying such action was needed to spur domestic production.

The control had been imposed by President Richard M. Nixon as part of his wage-price control program and were continued through several periods of oil shortages.

Congress gave the president power to lift the controls in 1975, but that authority was not exercised until Carter decided to lift control gradually over 15 months, eliminating the unwieldy controls while not spurring inflation.

It indicated, however, its support would not include an oil embargo.

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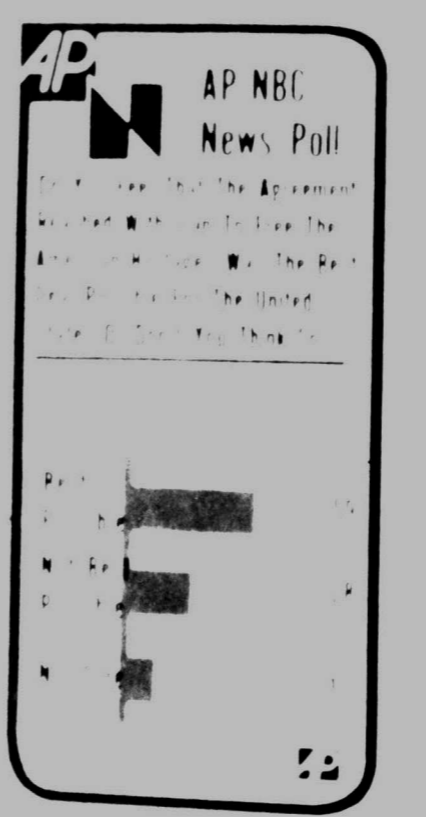

# Ex-inmates to be interviewed about experiments with dioxin

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Medical investigators will interview former inmates of Holmesburg Prison about experiments conducted on them with the toxic chemical dioxin, the Environmental Protection Agency says. Doctors from the EPA's National Pesticides Hazard Assessment Program will talk with 15 former prisoners who believe they were exposed to dioxin during tests in the mid-1960s, EPA spokesman George Bochanski said Monday. The agency began seeking out inmates who may have been contaminated as part of an effort to win a permanent ban on 2,4,5-T, a pesticide manufactured by Dow Chemical Co., Bochanski said. The pesticide, "a civilian equivalent of Agent Orange," contains dioxin, he said. The chemical has been suspected in cases of cancer, birth defects and fetal death. Because several medical experiments were conducted concurrently at the prison, it may be difficult to determine which inmates were exposed to the chemical, Bochanski said. Prison authorities say records identifying inmates who participated have been destroyed. The Philadelphia Inquirer has reported about 70 Holmesburg inmates were tested in the mid-1960s under a \$10,000 contract with Dow Chemical. The newspaper said government documents identified Dr. Albert M. Kligman, a University of Pennsylvania dermatologist, as the person who conducted the experiments that ended in 1967. Kligman applied the heaviest doses of dioxin to the backs of 10 prisoners, eight of whom later developed a skin disease that lasted up to seven months, the newspaper said. Kligman would not comment on the report. In November 1979, the Inquirer reported that Kligman tested mind-control, skin-hardening and other chemical agents on about 320 prisoners at Holmesburg under a \$386,000 contract between the U.S. Army and the University of Pennsylvania.

## Bill would give MHRM OK to lease property

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## Man blinded after birth gets \$2.8 million

NEW YORK (AP) — A 27-year-old New Jersey man who said he was blinded shortly after birth in an unauthorized hospital experiment has been awarded \$2.8 million from New York Hospital. The malpractice damages were awarded Monday to Daniel Burton Jr. by a state Supreme Court jury. The Union City resident, who said he was blinded in a test of oxygen levels while he was in an incubator, sought damages for suffering, injuries, loss of earnings and future medical expenses and costs. Burton said he was born six weeks prematurely on July 3, 1953, and weighed only three pounds but was otherwise healthy. He was placed in an incubator and received routine treatment. The next day, one doctor allegedly ordered that Burton's oxygen should be reduced to whatever level he could tolerate. However, two days later, according to court testimony, the doctor's superior, Dr. Mary Allen Engle, canceled the order and the oxygen was raised to a higher level. The hospital said it had been taking part in a federally financed program to see if low levels of oxygen caused blindness to infants in incubators.

## Officials nearly sure of man's identity

BEAUMONT, Texas (AP) — Jefferson County officials say they are "95 percent sure" that a man killed in a shootout with sheriff's deputies is a Texas Department of Corrections parole violator. Maj. Hal Shaw said Monday the man, who apparently was carrying false identification papers when he was killed by Jefferson County deputies early Sunday, had not been positively identified. But he said, "if he's who we think he is, he's a Texas Department of Corrections parole violator." Two others, including a teen-aged girl, were injured after deputies spotted a stolen car and shots were exchanged. A third person in the car was unharmed. The car was stopped after a chase that lasted about a mile, Shaw said.

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## Collecting 'bad bills'

Because the federal government has an apparently never-ending source of money from taxes, and borrowing, or printing, it seems no more concerned over defaulted debts owed the U.S. Treasury than it is over an average multi-billion-dollar deficit.

Little effort is being made to collect billions of dollars owed to Uncle Sam by all too many citizens who have no conscience when it comes to repaying the government.

As the Reagan administration takes a bead on reducing the deficit, the waste and the needless spending, it should lose no time in going after delinquent debtors. For example, the General Accounting Office recently discovered 14,000 audit reports gathering dust that showed at least \$4 billion due and recoverable from contractors and grantees who misspent government funds.

According to the Office of Management and Budget, a staggering \$175 billion is owed the government, of which \$47 billion is currently due, and \$25 billion is long overdue. A recent OMB report estimates debt losses as high as \$9 billion. The losses from defaulted loans would pay all the operating costs of the Justice and State Departments, the Congress and still leave \$500 million left over.

Surprisingly, the Internal Revenue Service, which most taxpayers regard as the ravaging tiger of all bill collectors, is owed almost

\$16 billion. Of this huge sum, the IRS is actively seeking recovery of less than \$4 billion.

The Department of Housing and Urban Development has 55,000 delinquencies in its loan programs. The GAO recently found 58 percent of those whom the Veterans Administration had written off as bad debts were, in fact, sufficiently affluent to have paid in full. Myriad farm and student loan programs are awash with uncollected receivables.

Washington is so careless as a lender that many of its loan programs have come to be outright giveaways.

There are some simple but effective remedies for recovering much more of the money owed to the U.S. taxpayers and these should be enacted by this Congress.

Changes can be enacted to put some teeth into existing laws. The government should aggressively pursue — and prosecute, if necessary — those delinquent in repaying government loans.

With the national debt standing at almost one trillion dollars, it is preposterous for Washington to lend out money at very low interest rates that it must first borrow at very high interest rates and then carelessly forget about collections. The little-noticed rip-off of the taxpayers from bad debts has gone on far too long and, we repeat, should become one of the first orders of business for the Reagan administration.

As intelligence sources explained it to my associate Dale Van Atta, it's a matter of cold military hardware.

By almost every measurement, North Korea exceeds South Korea in both quantity and quality of tanks. The North has a 2.5-to-1 numerical lead over the South in medium tanks and, within this category, a better than 3-to-1 advantage in numbers of first-line, high-quality tanks.

The two Koreas are approximately equal in ground troops: 520,000 in the South, 600,000 in the North. But a top secret Pentagon report concludes that "without U.S. combat and logistics support" (South Korea) ground forces would probably not be capable of successfully defending Seoul against a surprise North Korean attack.

In the air, the disparity is much worse. South Korea has a 33,000-man air force with 424 combat aircraft. North Korea has a 31,000-man air force with 721 aircraft. "Without substantial augmentation, the (South Ko-

reans) would be hard pressed to repel a sizable North Korean air attack," the Pentagon report declares. A small crumb of comfort is added with the estimate that the North Koreans would be "capable of performing a primary mission of air defense and limited offensive operations" on their own, but would need "outside assistance" to conduct sustained operations.

North Korea's navy is "markedly superior" to South Korea's in number of combat personnel, materiel readiness and firepower. It has 31,000 marines to South Korea's 22,000.

All things considered, the Pentagon experts conclude that "North Korea has the ability to launch and support a surprise attack against the Republic of Korea."

What's more, intelligence sources offer the ominous prediction that, despite infusions of aid from the United States, South Korea will be militarily inferior to North Korea for at least three years.

There are two things that make the simmering situation in Korea capable of boiling over at any minute.

One is the possibility that South Korean dissident Kim Dae Jung may be executed by the military regime. This, the intelligence experts fear, could precipitate the kind of unstable domestic situation in South Korea

### U.S. may find itself fighting in Korea again

WASHINGTON — While the foreign policy spotlight has been focused on the Middle East, another area of the world has been virtually ignored: Korea.

But highly classified intelligence reports indicate that the ideologically divided peninsula — scene of the first armed confrontation in the East West conflict after World War II — may become the next tinderbox that the United States will have to contend with. Indeed, the intelligence estimates give the communist North Koreans an overwhelming edge in any future outbreak.

The consensus of our experts in the Pentagon and the Central Intelligence Agency is that North Korea could roll right over its neighbor to the south — unless there is heavy U.S. assistance to South Korea.

### Bankers, multinationals de-industrializing U.S.

History does indeed repeat itself. Barring a war, the hottest debate in the early 1980s is probably going to be the old question of free trade versus protectionism.

A free trade policy is when you don't erect many barriers to imports. This is more or less what we are operating under now. Protectionism is when you put high taxes called tariffs on imports or bar them altogether. The idea is to protect domestic businesses from foreign competition.

Most of the 19th Century was spent arguing the question. The South which lived off cotton exports argued the free trade position. Exporters usually do since when one nation erects barriers to another's products, there is almost always retaliation. The North where most of the manufacturing was located favored high tariffs. Its market was primarily domestic and it wanted to keep the foreign competition out.

Today, the growing mood of protectionism is also coming from manufacturers and from some unions with some important exceptions. The multinational corporations and the international banks are free traders with a passion.

Personally, I'm for free trade in theory, but against it in practice. In theory, it's great. In the real world, it stinks because its basic premises are false. We have, for example, almost no barriers against Japanese imports, but they have bar-

riers against American products. Trade agreements are negotiated by politicians and as usual, ours aren't the best in the world when it comes to negotiating. We almost always lose our striped pants.

The free trade argument is that more efficient industries justly drive less efficient industries out of business, thus giving the consumer the best product at the lowest cost and making sure that capital and labor are utilized where they are most efficient. Nice theory, but it doesn't apply to the world as it really is.

For the theory to apply, the world would have to be one big United States so that industries, with everything else being equal, could compete on the basis of efficiency. Such, of course, is not the case.

American industry cannot compete with slave labor or with cooee labor. Any product coming out of a communist or totalitarian society is made with slave labor. There are no free trade unions. The people work for or they get shot or go to prison. Furthermore, the government which owns the factory as well as the workers does not have to price its products on the basis of market costs. It makes its pricing decisions on the basis of poli-

tics. Other socialist or corporate states differ only in degree. Japan, for example, willingly dumps products in overseas markets at or below costs rather than lay off Japanese workers. In nations where there is an excess of labor and a minimum of social legislation, capital can bid the price of labor to the dirt cheap level.

No American can compete with a Chinese in Hong Kong — especially when American capital is financing the Chinese. Which brings me to the multinationals. They love to move their money overseas, employ the cheap labor and export the product to the United States at a bigger profit than if they manufactured the product here. That's why they support free trade.

I think the situation is a scandal. The multinationals and their banker buddies are de-industrializing the United States. They have lobbied through special interest legislation to make the taxpayers help them. And dumb conservatives who can't tell the difference between a theory and reality are defending them.

It's time to leave the Ivory Tower and re-examine the theory in real world terms.

### Rise of Al Haig began with a 'presidential directive'

WASHINGTON — Within hours of his confirmation as secretary of state, Alexander Haig put final touches on a document for President Reagan's signature that would enthrone the State Department and its new boss as undisputed foreign policy makers in the Reagan administration.

The document, drafted by Haig and his staffers on the seventh floor in Foggy Bottom, would end 12 years of National Security Council (NSC) staff dominance over U.S. foreign policy. Specifically, it would establish two working committees to be chaired ordinarily by high State Department officials instead of, as in the past, by the NSC staff director.

The document is doubly significant because of its authorship. Though a presidential directive, it was written not by the new presidential assistant for national security (the NSC staff director), Richard V. Allen, but by Secretary of State Haig.

Haig knows more about how the NSC apparatus works than anyone else in the Reagan administration. Having gained that knowledge during the Nixon years as NSC director Henry Kissinger's top aide, Haig knows what he wants from Reagan: a return to the system of 20 years ago when State Department officials, not White House operatives, ran the committees that control national security communications to the Oval Office.

The rise of Al Haig and the decline of the NSC staff system draws mixed

reviews within the Reagan administration. Allen himself utters no dissent. Reflecting the president's wishes, he is helping Haig Eyebrows lifted when Allen hired Maj. Gen. Robert L. Schweitzer, one of Haig's lieutenants at NATO command in Europe, as a key NSC staffer. That gives Haig a potent ally in the White House.

But Haig as potential Cabinet strongman generates distrust in higher elevations of the Reagan administration. Edwin Meese, the president's closest aide, is said by insiders to consider California Supreme Court Justice William P. Clark as a counterweight to Haig. Clark's selection as deputy secretary of state, despite his lack of foreign policy experience, was based on loyalty to Reagan proven in service as the president's first chief of staff as governor of California.

Even with Clark at State, however, Haig's rise will not be stopped quickly. That was affirmed when Haig sent

his unprecedented proposal to the White House reconstituting the NSC, not along lines laid down by Allen but fitting his own desires.

Such a concession by Kissinger or Jimmy Carter's NSC director, Zbigniew Brzezinski, would have been unthinkable. The very fact that at this writing the new president has not yet issued his first directive on his desired NSC setup is revealing.

By Dec. 30, 1968, Kissinger had completed the most elaborate study ever made of the NSC structure, which was quickly approved by Richard Nixon in a series of directives that opened his presidency. On Jan. 19, 1977, Brzezinski got Carter's signature on changes he wanted in the NSC system, with Carter's approval going out Jan. 20 as Presidential Directive No. 2.

Allen's failure to perform with the same dispatch demonstrates the sincerity of Reagan's often-expressed dislike for the NSC's staff system of the last dozen years. Reagan simply does not regard the NSC as an invaluable tool of presidential policy-making, as did Nixon, Gerald Ford and Carter. Instead, known for his like of uncomplicated bureaucratic structures, Reagan has said he was appalled at infighting between State Department and NSC that accompanied the dominance of Kissinger and, to a lesser extent, of Brzezinski.

Reagan's attitude is Haig's launching pad, and few here doubt the secretary of state's capacity to exploit and expand his influence over foreign policy in the months ahead. Yet, beside

Meese's caution, stemming from his desire to protect the president, there are skeptics of Reagan's decision within the national security bureaucracy.

They say privately that whatever confusion the old system caused, it guaranteed the Pentagon and the intelligence community equal, sometimes superior access to the Oval Office. To give the State Department so much control over the national security system, they contend, could block that access, by accident or design. If they are correct, national security could suffer. Haig shows no such concern. Yet, his ability to deal with the critics and make the new system work will decide just how high will be the rise of Al Haig that began with a presidential directive drafted in the State Department.

Three Texas women have died from toxic shock syndrome (TSS) and 21 confirmed cases have been reported in the state as of Wednesday, according to the Texas Department of Health.

According to Debbie Martin, epidemiologist for the department, the most recent death caused by TSS was in San Antonio in December, 1980. The other two deaths occurred in East Texas in February of 1980, and in Dallas in 1978.

No confirmed cases have been reported from the Midland-Odessa area, according to the epidemiologist.

Toxic shock syndrome is a rare but serious illness primarily affecting young menstruating women of child-bearing age. The disease became well-known in September when federal government data reported an association between TSS and wearing tampons.

The production of Rely Tampons, a brand linked by the federal government to TSS, was halted in September after the Food and Drug Administration of the federal government and the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta, Ga., warned that women who used Rely Tampons seem to run a greater risk of contracting TSS.

The relationship between the tampons and TSS is still not known according to the Center for Disease Control. A spokesman for CDC said recently that experiments to try to develop TSS in laboratory animals had been unsuccessful, but the reason for this failure was also not known, according to authorities.

He added that an analysis of the confirmed cases reported would be available this month.

Although some women are using the sponges because of the relationship between tampons and TSS, two cases of the disease have been reported in women who were using sponges instead of tampons.

According to the Dallas Consumer Affairs Office, FDA has not approved sponges for sale as substitutes for tampons.

According to FDA, no medical studies have been done to show the sponges are safe and effective. Most directions for using the sponges call for re-using them after rinsing them in water and the department is concerned that this may leave germs on the sponges that could cause an illness.

The health agency also is concerned that the sponges may contain harmful substances when they are sold. A study done recently at the University of Iowa, found that sponges from a local clinic contained grains of sand that could

not be completely rinsed.

The Iowa researchers also found bacteria, fungus, arsenic, nicotine and other harmful chemicals in the sponges. The researchers believe these chemicals could be getting into the sponges because of pollution in the oceans, where the sponges grow.

The study also found that the sponges can crumble easily while being worn, with relatively sharp pieces breaking off.

Because researchers do not know why there is a relationship between tampons and toxic shock, the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) has

recommended the following:

● In general, women need not stop using tampons. However, it would be prudent, at present, to discontinue the use of the newly-developed super-absorbent tampons, until more conclusive scientific research has been conducted in this area.

● To reduce the possible risk of tampon use even further, women are advised to alternate tampons with sanitary napkins or mini-pads, during a given menstrual cycle.

● When tampons are used, they should be changed frequently — at least every six to eight hours — to reduce the risk of potential infection.

● If a woman is using

tampons, and experiences such symptoms as high fever, vomiting, diarrhea, or a sunburn-like rash, she should discontinue tampon use and consult her physician immediately.

The ACOG said recently that while they recognize an association has been established between TSS/menstruation/tampon use, it should not be assumed there is a definite cause-and-effect relationship until the mechanisms that create the condition are better understood.

## Obesity expert warns of how extra pounds can creep up

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) —

The average American gains one pound a year after age 25, and it takes the energy requirement of five cities to produce the food to make up all that extra fat.

Those are the facts used by Jack Wilmore, physical-education professor at the University of Arizona, in his symposiums on obesity. He campaigns constantly to get people to push themselves away from the table and exercise, because dieting alone will not do the job.

When a person diets without exercise, he loses some fat but other fat replaces muscle, Wilmore explains.

"That means we are actually gaining one and a half pounds of pure fat every year," he said. "So by age 65, we will have gained 30 pounds in total weight but 45 pounds of total fat."

The best way to determine how much of your body weight is fat is to weigh under water because fat tends to float, Wilmore said. An easier way to determine whether you need exercise is to look in a mirror.

If you don't like what you see, start exercising. But start slowly and build to a moderate level, said Dr. Michael L. Pollock of Mount Sinai Medical Center in Milwaukee, one of Wil-

more's symposium members.

"I've seen dramatic changes in overweight people who started out just walking," Pollock said.

"For some reason,

people eat less as they become more active," said Pollock. "However, when the exercise regimen changes from moderate to heavy, they begin eating heavily again."

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Educational grants awarded

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — Grants of about \$5 million have been made by Eastman Kodak Co. to 181 academic institutions and 26 educational organizations.

### Bani-Sadr using settlement in power struggle

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr is trying to use the hostage settlement with the United States as a weapon in his power struggle with the ultra-conservative Islamic clerics who dominate Iran's Parliament and its government.

In newspaper editorials and interviews, Bani-Sadr, the leader of the Westernized moderates among the Iranian revolutionaries, is attacking the hard-line clerics and their man Prime Minister Mohammad Ali Rajai on four counts.

1. That the agreement negotiated by Rajai and his associates will return to Iran only \$3 billion of the \$11 billion in assets it claims were frozen by President Carter in retaliation for the seizure of the U.S. Embassy in Tehran and its staff.

2. That Iran could have reached a much more favorable agreement earlier.

3. That the agreement does not conform to the conditions set for the release of the 52 captive Americans by Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, the leader of the revolutionary regime.

4. That the seizure of the hostages and their imprisonment for 444 days by militant young supporters of the clerical faction was responsible for most of Iran's present difficulties, including the war with Iraq.

"It stimulated anti-Islamic, anti-Iranian feelings on an international scale, spread a culture of deceit and hypocrisy in domestic political contentions and quarreling, caused the economic boycott, the draining of our remaining free foreign exchange and consequently the stagnation and downfall of national economic growth, and finally provided the grounds for the Iran-Iraq war under unequal economic conditions and their unavailing results," said an editorial in Bani-Sadr's newspaper Enghelab Islami, Iran's best-selling daily.

Bani-Sadr also divorced himself from the agreement as well as the hostage-taking by accusing Rajai and his government of failing to keep him informed of the progress of the negotiations with the United States during the final two weeks in which the settlement was worked out.

### Iranians reacted strongly to hostage's suicide attempt

WEST POINT, N.Y. (AP) — One of the American hostages tried to commit suicide while being held in Iran and the militant captors took steps to prevent other attempts, according to former hostage Moorhead Kennedy Jr.

"I don't know how serious it was or whether it was just somebody demonstrating something to the students," Kennedy said Monday in an interview with Barbara Walters of ABC television.

Kennedy said he knew who had made the attempt, but would not reveal the person's identity.

He said he learned of the incident in February 1980 after the Iranian militants roused him and several hostages from their rooms and forced them into a cold hallway, where they were lined up before a mock firing squad.

Afterward, Kennedy said, the Iranians would not let him have his belt back and he discovered that his room had been ransacked and his tie taken.

"We didn't know then that there had been a suicide attempt. And what they were doing was shaking us down for anything which might be used to help somebody commit suicide," Kennedy said.

A hostage suicide, he said, "would have been very bad for the students. They didn't want any suicides."

In an interview with The Associated Press, Kennedy said the "only mistake" America made during the hostages' captivity in Iran was the rescue attempt last April.

"Even if it had succeeded, a lot of us would have been killed," Kennedy said. "Even if the planes got in, we would have been shot up on the way out."

Kennedy, of Washington, D.C., also said he thinks the United States should honor its agreement with Iran.

"It's terribly important that we honor it," Kennedy said. "It's important to the Third World that we maintain our position of leadership. We're a great nation because we're morally strong."

In another interview, broadcast by ABC-TV, Kennedy spoke vividly of others being tortured by the militants.

"We heard torture, uh, long howls and the little yelps at the end as the pain was eased," he said. "Whipping's bad, you hear the crack of the whip, and then this uh, the person lets out his or her breath — ahhhh!"

In the AP interview, Kennedy said that except for the aborted rescue mission, he approved of the way former President Carter handled the hostage crisis.

"I think President Carter's way of handling it, not panicking, was the right one," Kennedy said. "Our restrained posture gave us credit. We should have used this restrained posture all along."

Kennedy, who was an economic attache to the embassy when it was seized, was spending his second day of freedom relaxing with his wife, Louisa, who has been a spokeswoman for the hostage families and their four sons.

Exhausted but exhilarated, he said he was overwhelmed by the reception the hostages were receiving. "I have been terribly, deeply touched."

Kennedy described his captors as "crazies" and said that what he missed most about America was its "civility."

### Belli planning to file lawsuit on behalf of hostage families

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Attorney Melvin Belli says he plans within two weeks to sue Iran for damages on behalf of the families of several former hostages.

Belli said Monday he had been retained by the families and that, unless they changed their minds, he would file the suit in federal court in Washington.

Belli said he believes the families could sue for at least \$1 million each plus punitive damages. He said he believes the unusual step of suing a foreign government in a private lawsuit has precedent and is permissible under federal law.

He said he did not consider the freed hostages subject to former President Jimmy Carter's

guarantee to Iran that they would not sue for damages.

"They (the hostages) aren't bound by the agreement signed by Carter because they were not parties to it," Belli said. "Also, an agreement made under duress is not valid."

The attorney said he has been in contact with six families and one spokeswoman who said she represented most of the hostage families. He said he was contacted about six months ago and has done considerable legal research on legal precedents for the case.

He declined to identify the families, saying they wish to remain anonymous at least until they decide whether they definitely want to file suit.

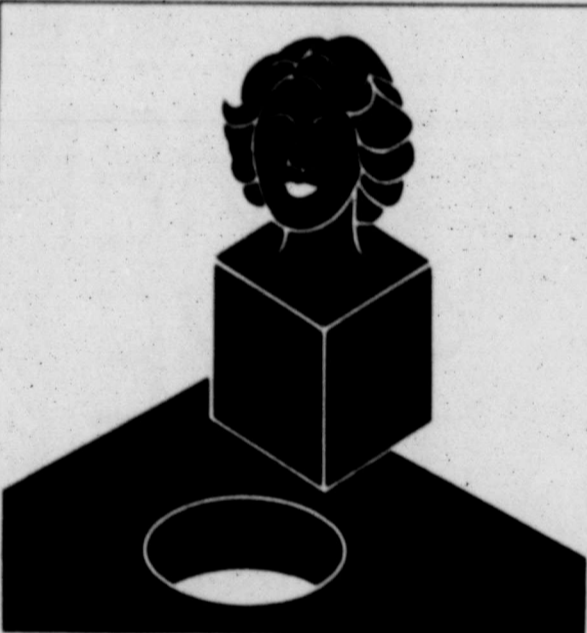
Belli said the families might change their minds if the government decides to give the former hostages special compensation for their ordeal. He said that if there is no action by the State Department and Congress, "I'm satisfied that we will sue."

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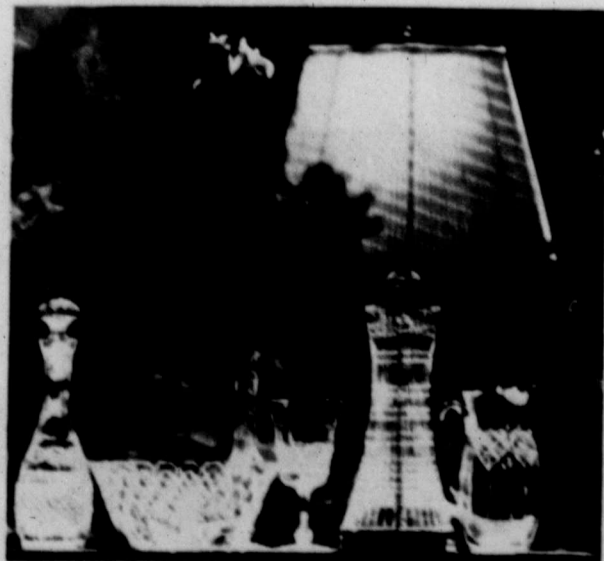

# Colleagues block appointment

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Tradition-minded senators rallied behind one of their colleagues Monday in blocking the appointment of a Pan American University regent the senator called "personally obnoxious."

As a courtesy to Sen. Carlos Truan, the Senate voted 28-0 against the appointment of Billie Pickard of Raymondville, a former school board president in that Lower Rio Grande Valley city.

Traditionally, governors clear appointments to state boards and commissions with the hometown senators. Truan, D-Corpus Christi, said Gov. Bill Clements named Mrs. Pickard to the board although the governor "knew full well" Truan was opposed to her.

Truan said Mrs. Pickard as a member of the Raymondville school board in 1968-77 was "beyond a doubt, insensitive to the needs of children."

The rejection was a political defeat for Clements and a personal loss for Tobin Armstrong, the governor's special assistant for appointments and a close friend of Mrs. Pickard.

Although Armstrong was quoted last month as saying "there's not much we can do about" Truan's opposition, Truan maintains that Armstrong's "parting shot" to him was, "We'll run over you on this one."

Truan said Mrs. Pickard consistently opposed federally funded bilingual education programs as well as other remedial programs and school lunches for children from low-income families. He noted most of the school children in Raymondville are Mexican-Americans.

Sen. John Leedom of Dallas stated in voting with other Republicans and the Democratic majority that he was doing so as a courtesy to Truan and not judging Mrs. Pickard's qualifications.

The Senate voted 28-0 to confirm the appointment of former Gov. Preston Smith to the Texas College Coordinating Board. Smith was named to fill the unexpired term of Tom Rhodes of

Dallas, who resigned to accept Clements' appointment as a University of Texas regent. The Coordinating Board term extends to Aug. 31, 1985.

Smith, 68, was governor from 1969 to 1973. Senators delayed a vote on the appointment of Dr. S.L. Abbott of El Paso, a former GOP state representative, to the Texas 1986 Sesquicentennial Commission. Sen. Tati Santiesteban, D-El Paso, asked for the postponement.

"I want to meet personally with Abbott and ask him a few questions," Santiesteban told a reporter. He said he had no plans to call Abbott before the Senate Nominations Subcommittee for a public hearing.

## Officers quizzed on alien's death

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — A state grand jury has begun questioning police officers who were at the scene where a Piedras Negras, Mexico, man was shot to death by a police officer on Christmas Day.

Police patrolman James Cammack reported he shot Hector Santoscoy, 25, because the burglarly suspect threatened him with a brick after seeking refuge beneath a house.

Cammack and his police dog went beneath the house where Santoscoy was hiding after officers saw a man run from a fast-food restaurant whose windows were broken, police reported.

The Bexar County grand jury is expected to take several days to complete its investigation. On Monday, the panel began interviewing nine police officers who were at the scene when Santoscoy was fatally wounded.

A trio of local civil rights attorneys, who said they were employed by the Santoscoy family and the Mexican government, also lined up witnesses to support their claim that Cammack used unnecessary deadly force in subduing Santoscoy.

Attorneys Ruben Sandoval, Augustin Mata and Vicente Gonzalez, of the local Civil Rights Litigation Center, said Eusebio and Adelia Castillo, residents of the house beneath which Santoscoy was hiding, and police buff Paul Hernandez, a member of the local REACT citizen's band club who was at the scene, would support their contention that Cammack was unwarranted in firing at least four bullets at Santoscoy in the cramped 18-inch crawl space under the house.

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## House leaders pushing raise

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — House leaders have placed a "rush" priority on an emergency pay raise bill for state employees but there will be plenty of argument over how big the salary increase should be.

Senators passed a bill Monday raising paychecks by 6.8 percent and shot it over to the House.

The House Appropriations Committee took up the bill just a few hours later and OK'd it for House floor debate but only after voting 9-7 to cut it to 5.1 percent.

House members will debate the bill on Wednesday.

Rep. Bill Presnal, D-Bryan, committee chairman, recommended the reduction, citing the possibility Gov. Bill Clements would veto anything bigger than 5.1 percent.

"I don't know what the governor will sign or won't sign," Presnal said.

Both the Senate and the House committee versions of the bill set a \$50 a month minimum on the emergency pay raise to protect employees in the lower job classifications.

The governor recommended a 3.4 percent raise, costing about \$54 million. A 6.8 percent raise would cost \$110 million, while a 5.1 percent pay hike would add \$86 million to this year's state government expenditures.

Clements indicated Monday afternoon he would not accept anything above 5.1 percent but would not set a definite figure.

"It goes to the House now. They'll reach a compromise somewhere that will be acceptable, not necessarily 5.1—but one that would be acceptable to everyone, something between 3.4 and 6.8," Clements said.

The bill must be passed this week and signed into law by Saturday if the pay raises are to take effect in February.

Senate Republicans failed, 20-7, to cut the increase to 5.1 percent before senators passed the pay raise bill, the first measure of the 67th Legislature to clear either chamber.

Sen. John Leedom, Dallas Republican, and others argued that Clements would be more likely to accept the 5.1 percent.

Later, most of the Republicans joined with Democrats in giving final Senate approval, 25-2.

"My bill is a compromise," said Sen. Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin. "Statistics show that the actual cost of living increase for our employees is 7.6 percent just to keep up with inflation."

"This is false economy," said Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, about Leedom's 5.1 percent amendment. "The state has become a training ground for private industry just because we have chiseled a little bit here and there from our state employees."

"Money alone will not attract employees," Leedom said.

Speaker Bill Clayton said last week he believed Clements would accept a 5.1 percent increase, although the governor once said he would veto any pay raise over his recommended 3.4 percent.

"I have found from the governor's stand on the employees raise that he is always a man of his most recent word," Doggett said later.

Doggett said after the House committee voted on its trimmed-down version of the bill that he felt there was a strong chance the House as a whole would restore the full 6.8 percent raise.

Of the possibility of a veto by Clements, Doggett said, "I don't believe if we in fact put it on his desk that he would reject it."

Senators voting against the 6.8 percent raise on final passage were Leedom and Sen. Walter Mendon, R-Houston.

State employees got a 5.1 percent raise in September and will get another raise — the amount to be decided by this legislative session — on Sept. 1, 1981.

Human Rights director kidnapped in El Salvador

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — Unidentified gunmen kidnapped Victor Medrano, director of El Salvador's Human Rights Commission, a spokesman for the commission announced.

The spokesman said Medrano was abducted Monday, but no details were available. Police could not be reached for confirmation.

The commission incurred the enmity of the rightist side in the leftist-rightist war raging in this tiny Central American country by blaming rightists for 80 percent of the 13,000 political killings last year. A member of the commission, Magdalena Enriques, was kidnapped, tortured and killed in November, and the president, Marina Garcia, is living outside the country.

At least 1,000 more people have been slain in El Salvador this year, most of them in a leftist guerrilla offensive against the moderate military-civilian junta. The national

guard, El Salvador's army, is reported attacking guerrillas holding out in mountainous areas, but skirmishes continue in slum areas of San Salvador.

Air force jets destroyed a twin-engine plane carrying arms for the guerrillas at a dirt landing strip about 70 miles east of San Salvador on Sunday and a second small plane Monday after it landed in the same area, officials said.

The junta said the pilot of the first plane was captured and was an employee of the Nicaraguan airline, Lanica. Lanica said today that the pilot, Julio Talavera, quit the company last month.

No information on the second plane was reported.

The junta and the U.S. government accuse Nicaragua's left-wing government of complicity in the smuggling of Soviet and Cuban arms to the leftist guerrillas. The revolutionary regime in Nicaragua is openly sympathetic with the Salvadoran leftists but claims it is providing no support to them.

Victim didn't realize he was shot in head

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) — Police say a 66-year-old robbery victim was shot in the head but didn't realize it and apparently walked around for three days before going to a hospital with a headache.

"The victim claims he didn't hear a bang, didn't see a gun and didn't realize he had been shot," Ann Arbor police Staff Sgt. Harold Tinsey said Monday.

The man, an Ypsilanti resident whose name was not released, told police he thought he had been hit with a chain Friday as he returned to his car in a shopping center parking lot. A mugger escaped with the man's wallet and \$23, Tinsey said.

Doctors at University Hospital found the bullet lodged behind the man's left ear on Monday after taking an X-ray.

Polish stage more warning strikes

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Workers staged warning strikes in southern and central Poland today, the state radio reported, while labor sources in the northeast said factories there shut down to protest a ban on the publication of an independent union newsletter.

In Warsaw, Politburo member Mieczyslaw Moczar called for a wide spread purge of functionaries who wielded power and influence under Edward Gierk, the party chief ousted after last summer's crippling strikes that gave rise to the independent union movement.

As the possibility of a general strike in southern Poland's industrial heartland loomed, Solidarity leader Lech Walesa traveled to the southeastern city of Rzeszow for talks with private farmers demanding recognition of their independent union.

Polish state radio reported work stoppages today in Lodz, the nation's second largest city, where students continued a sit-in to protest compulsory classes in Marxism. The radio said city transport was temporarily shut down.

The broadcast said workers in the Katowice area in southern Poland also laid down their tools for a few hours. It singled out the Tichy car factory that makes Polish Fiat 126 autos and said other enterprises in the Podbeskidz region were affected.

The work stoppages were to press demands for a five-day work week and implementation of other government-labor accords reached last year, the radio said.

The broadcast emphasized that railways were operating normally. Some observers saw this as an attempt to assure the Soviet Union that lines of supply and troop movement were in order.

The continuing labor unrest in Poland has raised the possibility of a Soviet-led military intervention similar to that in Czechoslovakia in 1968.

In Bialystok, in northeastern Poland near the Soviet border, most

enterprises, including city transport, staged a four-hour warning strike to protest a ban on publication of a recent Solidarity newsletter, according to a spokesman for the independent union.

Politburo member Moczar commented on continuing labor unrest in the Communist Party newspaper Trybuna Ludu.

"Obviously we could have avoided such great social tremors. They had long been forecast by political seismographs. Those signals were ignored and the accumulated conflicts led to a mighty quake," he wrote.

"I believe that in this great historic renewal of social life there is and there can be no place for the enemies of socialism, who prey on great social movements, seeing them to be the field for their destructive activity."

"I also believe that the renewal of personnel must continue. Not only those who out of thoughtlessness or depraved by power showed destruction and damage around them must leave. Also those who do not understand the new times and the new tasks must change jobs."

Moczar, a former interior minister who suppressed worker riots in 1970 under then party chief Wladyslaw Gomulka, is a long-time political survivor who was elevated to Politburo rank Dec. 2, roughly three months after Stanislaw Kania replaced Gierk, Gomulka's successor.

According to a spokesman at Solidarity headquarters in Gdansk, Walesa would ask some 300 protesting farmers and peasants in Rzeszow to tone down their militancy "because of the very tense situation in Rzeszow and elsewhere in southern Poland."

The farmers have been occupying the former headquarters of a defunct government-controlled trade union since Jan. 3 to press their demand for official recognition of "Rural Solidarity." The organization, whose charter is pending before the Supreme Court, would represent many of the nation's private farmers, who produce about

three-fourths of Poland's agriculture. It would be allied with Walesa's organization, which claims some 10 million members.

The farmers have said they would call on fellow independent unionists in southern Polish factories to strike if a government commission did not arrive today to negotiate their demands.

Observers said the strike might be called for Wednesday, which Solidarity has designated a day of unity with the farmers.

Independent union spokesmen in Rzeszow denied earlier reports that workers staged warning strikes in the region today.

George Logan, city parks director and chairman of the county extension landscape and horticulture committee, says that the trees pruned will be identified by markers. This will give those persons who missed the demonstration a chance to go by the park at their convenience to observe the proper pruning techniques.

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Basic Skills test program scheduled for next month

The Texas Assessment of Basic Skills test program is scheduled for the first week in February according to Bryant Saxon, program director for the Midland Independent School District.

The test is scheduled once each year under requirements set by the Texas Legislature during its 1979 session.

Third, fifth and ninth grade students as well as tenth graders who failed the test last year will be among 700,000 expected to take the reading, writing composition and mathematics tests during the testing period. Each of the tests will require a maximum of 40 to 60 minutes to complete. Third graders are included for the first time this year.

"District and campus aggregate scores will be reported to the public at a May meeting of the board of trustees," Saxon said. "However, individual student scores will be reported only to the student, parents or guardian and the school personnel directly involved."

"Each test question will relate to a specific objective or a skill students are expected to

learn by the time they complete a particular grade," Saxon pointed out.

A Midland school board directive requires ninth grade students who do not make a satisfactory score to retake the test each year that they remain in high school in Midland.

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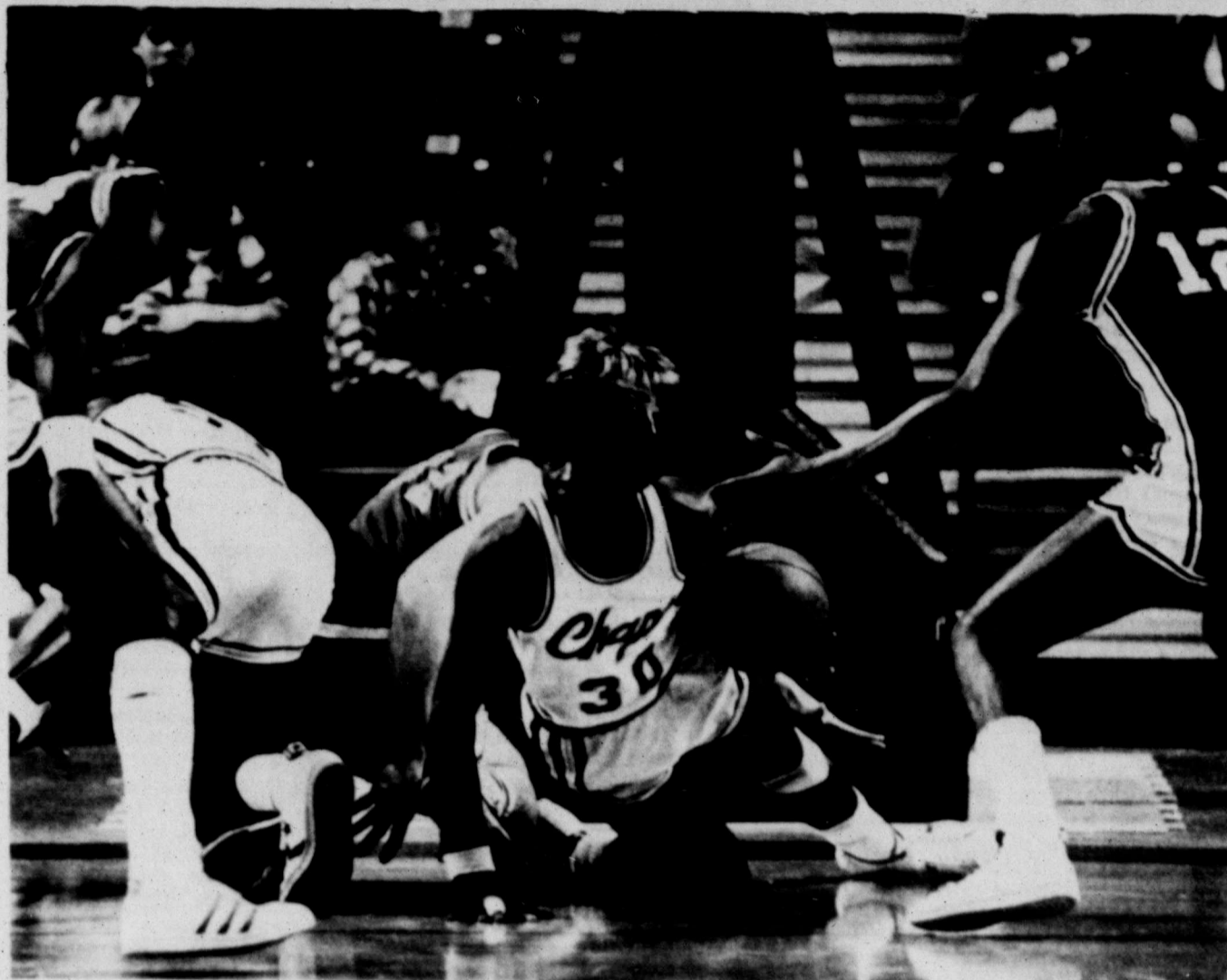

# Chaps dump Westerners

## WTC coach banished to showers before 2-minute mark

Midland College treated old nemesis Western Texas with disdain in dropping to a 111-76 victory at the Chaparral Center Monday night, but Westerner Coach Larry Dunaway missed the 38 minutes and 43 seconds of the game after being banished by three technical fouls that came so fast, it was like a Joe Louis knockout.

Scotty Tutwiler hit a jumper from the circle to make it 4-0 and umpire Dennis Cunningham called an intentional foul.

"All I said," Dunaway related later, "was that that was the first time in years I'd seen that foul called. And he said, 'That's one technical.' He and Nolan Richardson (TWC's coach last year) almost had blows last year and I think he has it in for TWC. Anyway, I said, 'I guess what I've heard about you is true' and he said 'That's two technicals.'"

AS TUTWILER sank both free throws resulting from the field goal, Dunaway shouted, "You better make a bunch. You'll need them." He explained, "I was yelling at the shooter, trying to fire my kids up. I wasn't even talking to the ref, but he came over and said, 'That's three technicals. You're gone.'"

As Cunningham came to the scorer's table, he told Dunaway, "We aren't going to take that stuff to night." Dunaway responded, "Neither are we going to take that stuff." Cunningham settled matters quickly. "You've got 30 seconds or it's a forfeit."

By the time Tutwiler finished shooting free throws it was 10-0 and the Chaparrals were off and running toward their 19th win in 21 starts in bringing their WJCC record to 7-2.

AFTER THE game, Dunaway apologized for the incident. "I hated for that to happen. Perhaps we couldn't have beaten Midland, but it soured the whole evening for the fans and the teams. I didn't even say 'damn' or 'hell' on the first two technicals and I wasn't even talking to the official on the third."

Midland, coming up with its second straight 100-plus offensive effort, led 59-29 at half against the team that handed it four of six losses last year and led by 40, 99-59, at one point in the final half.

Puntus Wilson pumped in 21 points to lead the Chaps while Virgil Slay, 6-for-10 long rangers, and Charles Johnson, scoring all of his points in the final half, each had 14. Also in double figures was Kevin Willingham

with 13.

DENIS KEITH was 8-of-14 from the field and 10-of-13 from the line to lead WTC with 26.

While Coach Jerry Stone was pleased with a free-wheeling offense that hit half of its 82 field shots, he said, "We are trying to get the defense going again. We won big like this early in the season, but then began to read about how good we are and lost our concentration. Now we are trying to get them to play hard again. So I can't get excited about beating somebody bad," not even if it's WTC.

# Oregon State, Virginia share top cage poll slot

Oregon State and Virginia, the nation's only 40-19 first-place college basketball teams, shared the No. 1 position in The Associated Press poll Tuesday after finishing in a tie for the top slot.

Oregon State, which held No. 1 alone last week, and Virginia, 16-0, each received 29 first-place votes and 1,147 points from a nationwide panel of sports writers and broadcasters. Three members of the poll did

not submit ballots this week, while one other tabbed Louisiana State for the No. 1 position.

The Beavers, who held a 40-19 first-place vote advantage over Virginia last week, raised their record to 15-0 with two victories last week, including a 97-91 overtime thriller against Washington.

The Cavaliers, ranked second a week ago, were simply awesome last week. They pounded their No. 19 Clemson 74-59, thrashed George Washington 86-56 and whipped highly regarded Ohio State 89-73 in a nationally televised game as

sophomore center Ralph Sampson poured in 40 points.

DePaul edged Louisiana State for the No. 3 position, collecting 1,039 points — 14 more than the Tigers. The Blue Demons, 16-1, edged La Salle in their only game last week. LSU, 17-1, moved up a notch in the poll following triumphs over then-No. 6 Kentucky and then-No. 8 Tennessee.

Arizona State, which was an impressive winner over intrastate rival Arizona last week, jumped two positions and claimed the No. 5 slot with 880 points.

# Sutter inks hefty pact

When Sutter tosses his split-fingered fastball at catcher Darrell Porter, the pair will represent nearly \$8 million in talent. The Cardinals are paying Porter, signed as a free agent from Kansas City earlier, \$3.5 million in a five-year pact.

"Sutter is the best relief pitcher in the history of baseball, according to (Whitey) Herzog, and we're delighted to have the contract matter settled," said August A. Busch, Jr., Cardinals president. "We feel this makes the Cardinals definite contenders for years to come."

The former Chicago Cub, obtained in a trade for Ken Reitz, Leon Durham and Ty Waller, may well prove to be the salvation of a club whose bullpen led the way to a fourth-place finish in the National League East last year.

Sutter has 133 saves in five years with the Cubs. He equaled a league record in 1979 with 37 saves and led all league relievers with 28 last year.

In 300 appearances, Sutter is 32-30 with a 2.65 earned run average. His strikeout-walk ratio is nearly 4-to-1.

# Houston Cougars take SWC lead

It was a bad night for the home teams Monday night as all four home-standing Southwest Conference basketball teams lost.

Houston edged Baylor, 53-51, to move into first place for the first time this season. Southern Methodist surprised Texas Tech, 68-48; Arkansas beat Rice, 57-52, and Texas had to go into overtime to beat the slumping Texas Aggies, 67-63.

With the score tied at 51-51, Houston coach Guy Lewis ordered the Cougars to go into the spread offense. He didn't intend for it to be a stall, but that's what it turned out to be.

The Cougars tried for a shot by Rob Williams as the clock wound down, but Baylor's Pat Hunley grabbed the rebound only to have it stripped from him by David Bunce. Freshman Michael Young's uncontested layup with two seconds remaining gave the Cougars the victory and the top spot in the SWC roundball standings.

"He picked it up and stuck it in the hole for the win. Maybe not too artistic, but it got the job done," said Lewis.

Lewis said he didn't intend to stall away more than seven minutes.

"I felt like we'd score off of it (the

spread offense) much sooner than we did. It wasn't meant as a stall," Lewis added.

Williams was the only Cougar scoring in double figures with 19. Terry Teagle, who connected on 9 of 13 field goal attempts, was the leading scorer for the Bears with 23. His performance drew praise from Lewis.

"Teagle shot out of this world. He shot some that if my team shot them, people would say we're undisciplined. But he hit them, too," Lewis said.

The SMU Mustangs continued their roller coaster season with a 58-48 victory over Texas Tech in Lubbock. The victory came on the heels of the Mustangs' 60-59 loss to Rice in a game where SMU squandered an 18-point second-half lead.

Asked how the Mustangs were able to turn in such a fine performance against the Red Raiders after the loss to Rice, SMU coach Dave Bliss shrugged and said, "It beats me."

Tech held a 24-20 halftime lead, but coach Gerald Myers said, "We were just too impatient and took too many bad shots."

David Gadis had 18 points for SMU. Jeff Taylor had 12 for Tech and Bubba Jennings had 10.

Texas coach Abe Lemons was pleased with the 67-63 Longhorn victory over Texas A&M, but doesn't think the Horns "are out of the woods yet."

"I thought we played better than they did and deserved to win it. We shouldn't have let it go into overtime. We needed a win tonight, we needed it bad," Lemons said.

It was another night of disappointment for the Aggies and coach Shelby Metcalf.

"We had the game won. We had the ball and a 2-point lead in overtime. I was real proud of our team up to that point," said Metcalf, who described the loss as the most disappointing of the season.

LaSalle Thompson was the leading scorer for Texas with 32 points. Reggie Roberts had 16 for the Aggies.

Scott Hastings had 18 points to lead the Arkansas Razorbacks to a 57-52 victory over Rice. Ricky Pierce had 18 for the Owls.

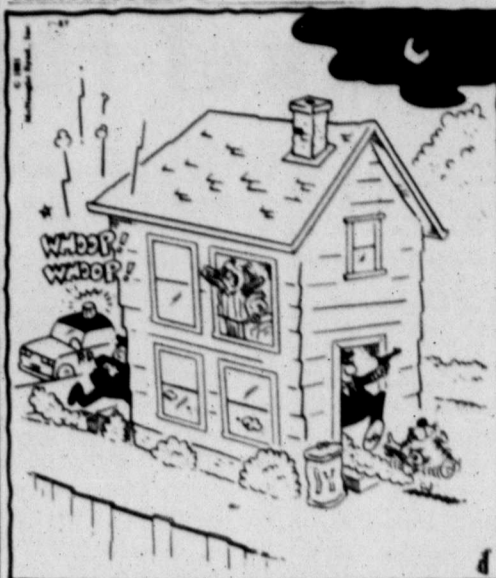

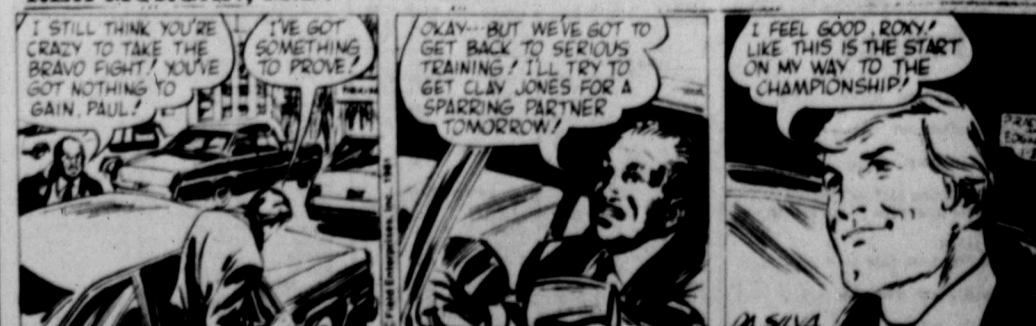

But it is not enough to shift to the ace of spades. You should cater to the possibility that partner has the doubleton king of spades. Lead a low spade. Partner wins the king, returns a spade to your ace and ruffs the spade continuation for a one-trick set.

The price of the book may be slightly high, considering that it is a paperback. But buy it all the same—you should recover the outlay in one evening's bridge even if you play for very low stakes.

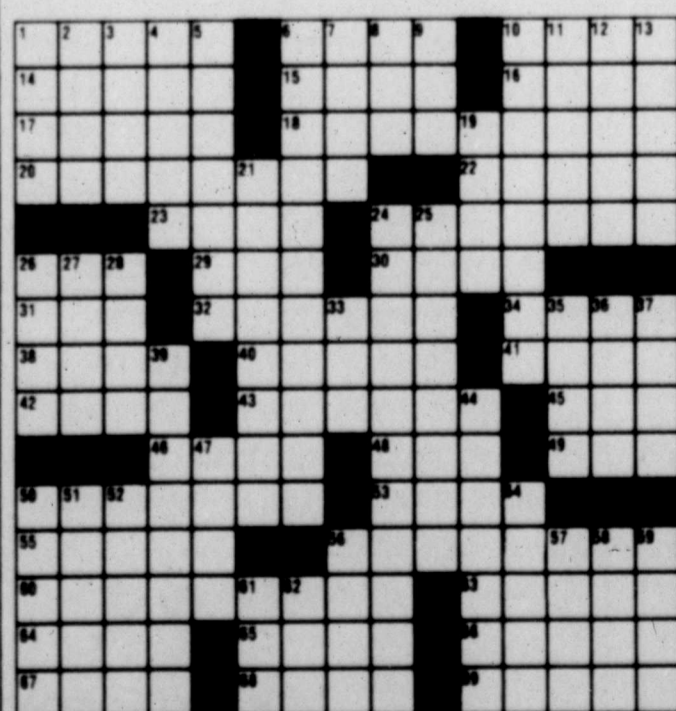
Note one point in the bidding. South had no hesitation in going to game after his partner made a jump raise. Two aces is an excellent holding opposite a partner who could make a jump rebid.

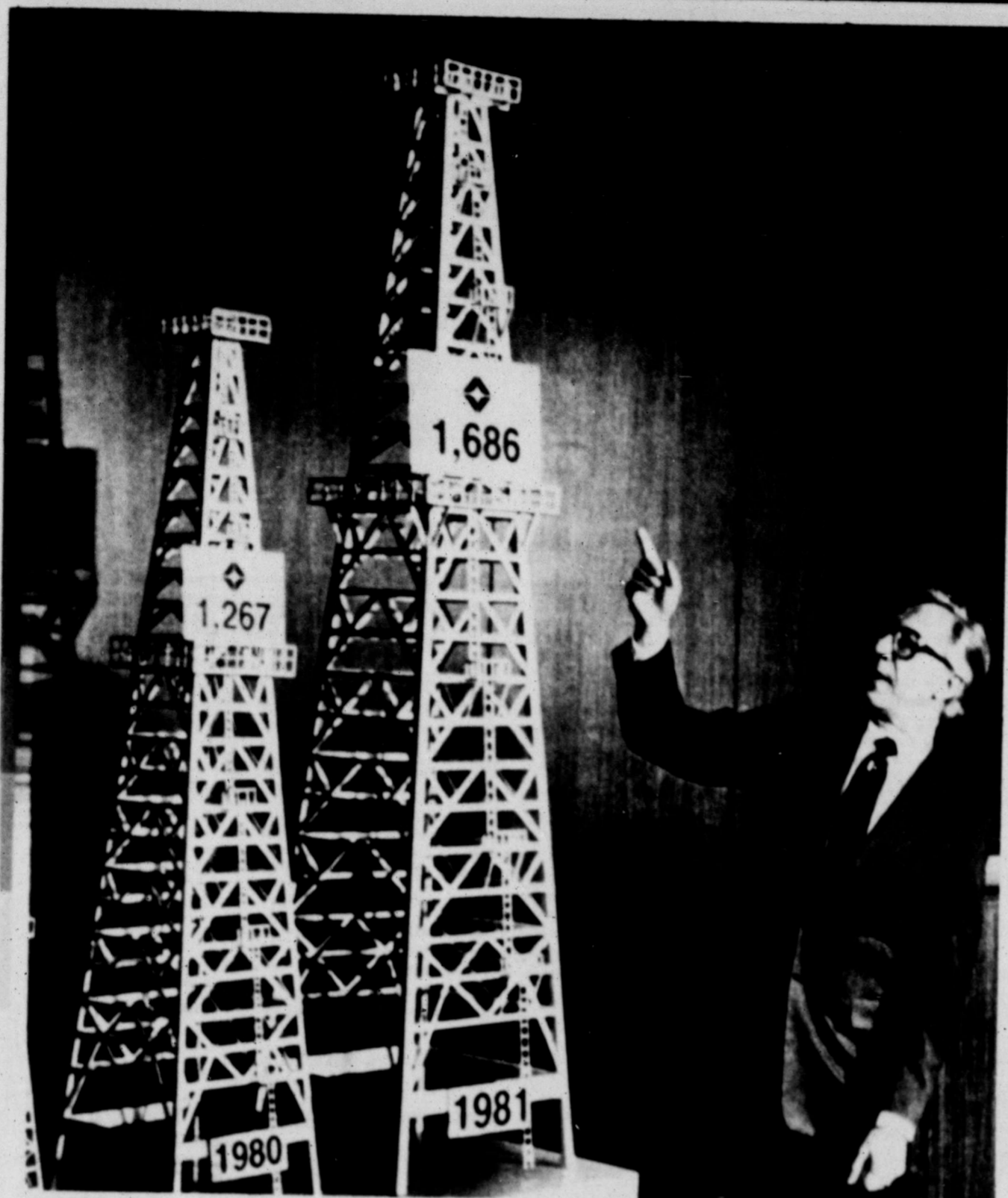

Exxon looking at Iran oil purchases

WASHINGTON (AP)—Exxon, the world's largest oil company, is exploring the possibility of resuming oil purchases from Iran, a company spokesman said Monday.

The spokesman, Bill Smith, said: "We're studying the possibility of resumed buying" from the Iranians. But Smith said no final decision on the matter had been made.

Meanwhile, The Washington Post in Tuesday's editions quoted administration sources as saying that many American companies have received requests from Iran to resume "business as usual."

The Exxon spokesman said no one representing the firm had discussed terms of any new sales with the revolutionary government of the Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini.

Former President Carter imposed a ban on trade with Iran, including oil imports, following the takeover of the U.S. Embassy in Tehran on Nov. 4, 1979. However, trade with Iran is now technically permitted as a result of the agreement that freed the 52 American hostages last Tuesday.

Some industry sources predicted last week there would not be a surge in resumed U.S.-Iranian trade, mainly because of continued anti-American feelings and Iran's war with Iraq.

The Exxon statement came only a day before the former hostages were

to attend an official welcoming ceremony at the White House, to be hosted by President and Mrs. Reagan.

Before the Iranian revolution, Exxon was a member of a consortium that bought a considerable quantity of oil from Iran. The consortium was called OSCO, which stands for Oil Service Company of Iran.

Among the other American members of OSCO were Mobil, Texaco, Chevron and Gulf. Several smaller U.S. firms also were involved.

Asked whether her company also is considering a resumption of oil purchases from Iran, spokeswoman Susan Breon of Gulf said: "It's just too early to say."

But she said company executives were "looking at some legal aspects" of such an arrangement.

Phil Block, a spokesman for Ashland Oil Co., said his firm had no plans to resume importing oil from Iran.

Spokesmen for a number of other firms with past ties to Iran did not return phone calls after questions about the possibility of future Iranian purchases were asked.

Until the trade cutoff, the United States depended on Iran for as much as 700,000 barrels of oil a day, accounting for about 4 percent of U.S. petroleum needs.

Industry sources said last week that Iran is now exporting nearly 1 million

42-gallon barrels of crude oil a day—about what it was selling overseas before its war with Iraq began.

The sources said war damage to Iran's refineries has forced the country to import about 250,000 barrels of petroleum products a day.

The Post, meanwhile, said that during the past few days Iranian firms have sent telex messages asking for a range of goods, from animal feedstuffs to industrial gas turbines to safety valves for heating and plumbing.

The newspaper added that many of the American firms have contacted the Commerce and Treasury departments in the last week to find out whether they may now start trading again with Iran.

However, The Post said, Commerce officials on Monday pointed out while the agreement to free the 52 Americans technically lifted the trade embargo, the department has been cautioning firms that since the agreement is under review by the Reagan administration, it might be wise to wait for an official announcement before resuming trade.

Commerce officials have already reported they have been besieged with calls from American businesses seeking to resume trade with Iran.

Oil shale abounds

HELENA, Mont. (AP)—There's enough oil shale in central Montana to meet the nation's petroleum needs for 28 years at the current level, but commercial extraction isn't yet possible, according to a preliminary report by the U.S. Geological Survey.

Officials in this coal-rich state said they were surprised by the agency's announcement Monday that newly surveyed shale deposits contain an estimated 180 billion barrels of recoverable petroleum.

"If this is true this is a tremendous amount of oil," said S.L. Groff, head of the state Bureau of Mines and Geology.

USGS geologist Forrest G. Poole of Denver said the Montana shale contains significant amounts of valuable metals and is therefore "worth a whale of a lot more" than shale deposits in the Green River Formation under parts of western Colorado, southwestern Wyoming and northeastern Colorado.

The oil shale deposits in Montana have been known for years, but their extent and association with valuable metals has only recently been established, the USGS said.

Completion was through a two-inch opening and perforations from 6,562 to 6,586 feet after 2,500 gallons of acid and 3,500 gallons of fracture fluid.

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# Kelly convicted, but 'war goes on'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former Rep. Richard Kelly, declaring "I have not been a crook," is vowing to press his challenge of the propriety of the FBI's Abscam investigation as he appeals his bribery and conspiracy convictions.

"The war goes on," the former Florida congressman told reporters after a jury deliberated 6½ hours Monday before convicting him and two co-defendants of taking part in a \$250,000 bribery conspiracy.

U.S. District Judge William Bryant set sentencing for Feb. 23. Each defendant faces a maximum prison term of 25 years, including 15 years on the most serious bribery charge.

Kelly, 56, the only Republican member of Congress indicted in the Abscam probe, was convicted of taking a \$25,000 bribe from an FBI agent posing as a representative of two Arab sheiks seeking legislation to immigrate to the United States. He testified he accepted the payoff only to conduct his own investigation of men he said he regarded as shady characters.

Kelly, former state judge, said he will continue to press that assertion and expand his own probe of Abscam to include the government, which he claimed entrapped him by inducing him to take the money.

The government "has not proved that I've been involved in any kind of corruption," Kelly insisted. "The story of my life has been that I have not been a crook. I have not tried to save my own hide at the expense of the people."

Vowing to appeal, Kelly said the verdict was disappointing, but he added: "The process is a good one, and the trial part is an important part... but that's only one part."

The government is now six-for-six

in Abscam trials involving members of Congress, with Sen. Harrison A. Williams Jr., D-N.J., scheduled to go on trial March 30.

Previously convicted were Democrats Michael Myers of Pennsylvania, John Murphy of New York,

Frank Thompson of New Jersey, John Jenrette of South Carolina and Raymond Lederer of Pennsylvania. Of those, only Lederer is still in Congress, although he may face disciplinary action in the House. Myers was expelled after his conviction and

Jenrette resigned as the House ethics commission considered recommending his expulsion. Murphy and Thompson both were defeated for reelection.

Kelly, who was defeated in a Florida Republican primary last year, was shown on videotape stuffing packets of \$100 and \$20 bills into his suit and pants pockets and telling undercover FBI agent Anthony Amoroso, "It's a deal."

Kelly returned \$24,826 of the payoff to FBI agents who questioned him 24 days after he took it.

The government said Kelly's co-defendants, businessman Gino Cluzio of Longwood, Fla., and accountant Stanley Weisz, of Smithtown, N.Y., were middlemen in a scheme in which Kelly eventually was to receive a total of \$100,000.

Kelly was convicted of bribery and Weisz and Cluzio of aiding and abetting bribery, punishable by up to 15 years in prison. All three were convicted of conspiracy, which carries a maximum term of five years. And each was convicted of a separate count of traveling across state lines to further an illegal activity, a crime punishable by up to five years' imprisonment.

Attorneys for Weisz and Cluzio said they would base their appeal on arguments of government misconduct in the Abscam investigation.

Weisz, 54, was shown on videotape taking a \$50,000 payoff from the FBI agent posing as a representative of the fictitious Arab sheiks at a hotel at New York's Kennedy Airport. Weisz testified he regarded the money as a legal finder's fee for introducing Kelly to the supposed Arab sheiks' representatives.

# Judge at Billie Sol's trial took 'bad rap'

TYLER, Texas (AP) — For almost 16 years, Judge Otis T. Dunagan was convinced he took a "bad rap" at the hands of the U.S. Supreme Court for his conduct of Billie Sol Estes' state criminal trial, that he was merely ahead of his time.

Monday, the Supreme Court agreed — in a way.

Dunagan, retired Chief Justice of the 12th Court of Civil Appeals, was a district court judge when he presided at the 1962 trial where Estes was tried on state swindling charges.

He permitted live television and Estes used that as the basis to successfully appeal his conviction to the Supreme Court. Justice Tom Clark wrote for the majority that radio-TV coverage of criminal trials "will inevitably result in prejudice."

On Monday, however, in a Florida case, the high court changed that opinion, ruling that television and still-photography coverage does not automatically violate a defendant's constitutional right to a fair trial.

"I really wasn't surprised," Dunagan said of Monday's decision. "I was just a little early, a little ahead of my time. Somebody had to break the ground."

"The Estes trial should never have been reversed," he continued. "Justice (John M.) Harlan — who cast the deciding vote (in 1965) — said there was not a thing you could point to in the conduct of the trial that was wrong, that it was all the publicity — newspapers, magazines, what have you — and adding television might make the difference."

In the landmark 1965 decision, Clark wrote of Estes' pretrial hearing.

"At least 12 cameramen were engaged in the courtroom — taking motion and still pictures and televising the proceedings."

"The heightened public clamor resulting from radio and television coverage will inevitably result in prejudice."

# More court-TV battles ahead

WASHINGTON (AP) — Whether most Americans ever get to see or hear for themselves what goes on inside their local courtrooms now depends on what state they live in. That could change, but probably not in the immediate future.

The Supreme Court ruled Monday that states are free to allow radio, television and still photography coverage of criminal trials, even when defendants object.

A defendant's constitutional right to a fair trial, the court said, is not automatically jeopardized when the news media are allowed to augment their paper, pencils and chalk with cameras and microphones.

The ruling provided no new "right of access." What it did was beat back arguments — advanced by the influential American Bar Association and the American College of Trial Lawyers, among others — that televised trials never can be constitutional if one or more parties object.

The immediate effect of the decision depends on geography.

Only criminal trials held in the state courts of Florida, Iowa, Massachusetts, Montana, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Ohio, West Virginia and Wisconsin can be televised without the consent of all participants.

Monday's decision left unanswered whether states which flatly ban broadcast and photographic coverage of courtroom proceedings have any constitutional duty to provide such access.

That is likely to be the basis of a future First Amendment fray.

Last July, in a case entitled Richmond Newspapers vs. Virginia, the Supreme Court ruled 7-1 that the public and newspaper reporters enjoy a First Amendment right to attend criminal trials over a defendant's objection.

In writing for three of the court's members Monday, Chief Justice Warren E. Burger said: "Instead of acquiring information about trials by first-hand observation or by word of mouth from those who attended, people now acquire it chiefly through the print and electronic media."

"In a sense, this validates the media claim of functioning as surrogates for the public," Burger wrote.

In upholding Florida's cameras-in-the-courtroom policy by an 8-0 vote Monday, the justices may have set the stage for a new test case on whether radio broadcasters and still photographers should be excluded.

The nation's highest court, which based much of its latest ruling on a respect for state court experimentation, might not be as willing to beef up so soon the First Amendment right of access it discovered only last July.

If broadcasters are found to have a constitutional right to use the tools of their trade to record a criminal trial, they might argue that the same right extends to appeals court proceedings.

That could include federal as well as state courts.



## Watchful waiting may be best course of action

**Dear Dr. Solomon:** My father is 79 years of age and has been living alone since my mother died three years ago. His home is in another city, about 250 miles from where I live. His main concern seems to be that his children not worry about him, and he has a habit of withholding information that he thinks will upset us.

He recently told me that his doctor has found some problem with his prostate and that there is a possibility of malignancy, but that nothing has to be done about it and that I should not worry. It seems to me that if there is a possibility of cancer, something should be done and done quickly.

I know my father has my best interest at heart, but I find his tendency to withhold information aggravating. I don't want to ignore the situation, but I don't know exactly what I can do. Do you have any suggestions?—Mr. T.L.

**Dear Mr. L.:** One thing you can do, with your father's permission, is to call his physician and discuss the situation with him. However, it is very possible that your father is telling you everything there is to tell. Even assuming that tests have shown that your father does have prostate cancer, if there are no symptoms he may not require immediate treatment for the condition.

According to doctors at the Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Research Institute in New York City, prostate cancer in two-thirds of asymptomatic men who have a malignant nodule up to one centimeter in diameter does not progress for at least eight to 10 years. In your father's case, therefore, watchful waiting may be the best course of action.

I should emphasize that this assumes that the cancer is in its early stages, and that your father is without symptoms. Of course, very close follow-up is essential to detect any change that would indicate the cancer is growing. You might want to speak with your father to impress him with the importance of staying in close touch with his doctor, and keeping any appointments arranged for him.

**Dear Dr. Solomon:** I've made it a point to have yearly physical examinations without failure, and they seem to have paid off in terms of good health. Now that I'm in menopause, however, I'm

wondering if these annual visits to the doctor are so important. It seems to me there isn't that much for the doctors to check. What would you suggest?—Mrs. D.L.

**Dear Mrs. L.:** The menopause does not make annual physical checkups any less important than they were. In fact, an argument can be made that these visits are even less important now.

For example, during the menopausal years women are more prone to a number of cancers — breast, bowel, ovary, and lung — as well as to heart disease, high blood pressure, hypothyroidism, and gastrointestinal and gallbladder disease. Almost without exception, early detection and prompt treatment are essential to a successful outcome, and this can best be assured through a pattern of regular physical checkups.

Apparently you have established such a pattern and, as you say, it has paid off. Why change now?

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## Panel examines major quake predictions

**GOLDEN, Colo. (AP)**—A prediction by two government scientists that there will be massive earthquakes in Peru this summer is being scrutinized by a panel of scientists formed to evaluate such forecasts.

Geophysicist Brian Brady of the U.S. Bureau of Mines said Monday that a series of three quakes, starting about June 28 and ending about Sept. 9, will tear apart the ocean floor 30 miles west of Peru.

Brady, spent five hours outlining and defending his controversial prediction before the National Earthquake Prediction Evaluation Council. His colleague, William Spence of the U.S.

Geological Survey, spoke and fielded questions for an hour more.

The council, a team of government and university scientists formed to judge the validity of earthquake forecasts, is meeting here, where Brady and Spence worked. Both men have emphasized that their predictions are personal and are not endorsed by the agencies they work for.

The predicted series of Peruvian quakes, including a huge tremor with a magnitude of 9.9 on the Richter scale of ground motion, is the first forecast to come before the council, which was formed more than a year ago.

The largest quake ever

recorded killed 5,700 people in Chile in 1960. It had a magnitude of 9.5.

The council's agenda today included additional questions for the researchers followed by the members' deliberations. A USGS spokesman said the council might announce its decision on the prediction late today.

Late last year, a member of the council, Barry Raleigh of the Geological Survey center in Menlo Park, Calif., said he doubted the prediction.

"A prediction so specific in terms of date and place and magnitude so far in advance of the event is surprising," Raleigh said. "Just on the

face of it, it seems highly improbable."

Brady has said he bases the prediction on a theory of rock fracturing he developed while studying "rock bursts" — stress-induced explosions of rock caused by mining operations.

"We have done it in the mines," he said earlier. "We have evacuated miners prior to rock bursts and lives have

been saved.

"The physics of the fracture are the same" in a mine or along a giant earthquake fault, he said.

"There is a clock at work here, I'm convinced," he told the panel. "The problem is reading the clock."

He said later the critical period for his prediction will come this May.

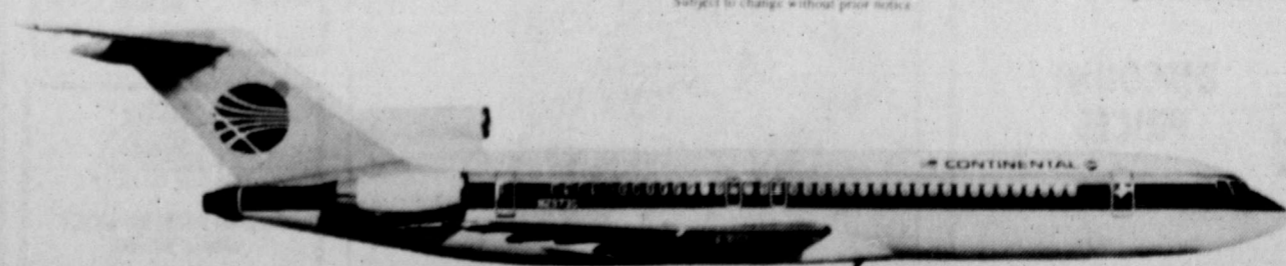

Mary asked the angel, "But how can I have a baby? I am a virgin!"

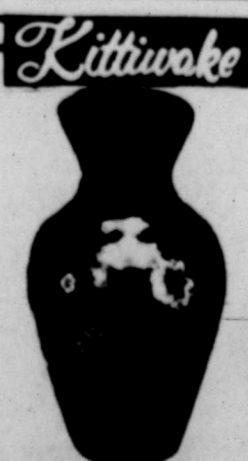
The angel replied, "The Holy Spirit shall come upon you, and the power of God shall overshadow you; so the baby born to you will be utterly holy—the Son of God."

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## Plant applies to relocate

**LITTLE ROCK (AP)**—The operators of a pesticide plant closed by a Texas court last month have applied for a permit to locate a facility at East Camden to manufacture similar chemicals.

The pesticide plant near Corpus Christi, Texas, was closed by the Texas Air Control Board because it failed to control toxic emissions.

The plant's one-time operator—Vapor Industrial Chemical Corp. of El Dorado—said the East Camden proposal should not be judged by what happened in Texas. Company officials said an entirely new manufacturing process will be used at East Camden.

The Arkansas Gazette reported today that heavy pressure has been applied to the state Pol-

lution Control and Ecology Department to quickly issue a permit for the East Camden facility.

Interest in the project has been expressed by former Gov. Bill Clinton, a lawyer, who called Pollution Control and Ecology Director Jarrell Southall to inquire about procedures needed to be completed for the permit to be granted.

Clinton said he was not

representing anyone in the case, but had been approached about representing John Milam of El Dorado, a Vapor Corp. official.

After the PC&E Commission heard a proposal about the plant last Friday, it delegated authority to Southall to let construction of the East Camden facility begin. Southall, however, has yet to act.

## Businessman pleads guilty to second degree assault

**RIVERHEAD, N.Y. (AP)**—A Manhattan businessman has pleaded guilty to charges that he beat and kicked actress Melonie Haller after escorting her to a party at a Long Island mansion last spring.

Robert McKeage, 42, pleaded guilty Monday to a charge of second degree assault before Suffolk County Judge James White.

McKeage, who remained free on \$1,000 bail, was expected to be sentenced to a year on

probation starting March 16. That would be the stiffest sentence given to any of the four people investigated by a grand jury after Miss Haller charged she was raped and beaten during a weekend party at the Southampton mansion of the theatrical producer Roy Radin.

Miss Haller, who played the role of the female "Sweathog" high school student in the "Welcome Back, Kotter" TV series, was found semi-conscious by a conductor on a Long Island Rail Road train last April 13.

No rape charge was filed. Last fall, Radin pleaded guilty to a reduced misdemeanor charge of possession of a weapon and was fined \$1,000 and placed on three years probation.
