President performing

Reagan is exercising, visiting with friends and performing limited official duties as he recuperates from a gunshot wound that the FBI says may have been made by a special, explosive bullet.

The bullet could have blown up at any time, even while doctors were removing it from the president's chest Monday night, FBI spokesman Roger Young said Thurs-

day.

But Young said the bullet that ricocheted off the president's limousine and lodged in Reagan's left lung never exploded, although the one that pierced press secetary James S. Brady's brain apparently did. Brady remained in critical condition, but was reported making satisfactory progress.

Reagan was reported making excellent progress at George Washington University Hospital, and White House aides said he probably will be released next week.

The White House said today that the president had another restful night and, when the report was issued at 6: 45 a.m. EST, was still sleeping after having been awake until about 10 p.m.

Reagan awoke within an hour, however, and held an early-morning meeting in his room with top aides Edwin

Meese III, James A. Baker III and Michael K. Deaver. "His progress is super," hospital spokesman Dr. Dennis
O'Leary said Thursday, but he added that Reagan would
not be fully recovered by April 23, when aides said he still
plans to begin a six-day trip to California and Mexico.

"He's had a major injury and he's had a major surgical

procedure and I don't expect him to be 100 percent of normal in three weeks," O'Leary said. "That's not a reasonable expectation for anyone."

O'Leary said the president is capable of making any decisions, but "there is some effort to limit" his activity so he'll get well more quickly.

Meanwhile, John W. Hinckley Jr., charged with attempting to assassinate Reagan, was found competent to stand trial. He wore a white bulletproof vest during a court appearance Thursday and was ordered to remain in an institution for further sanity tests while a federal grand

jury investigates the charges against him.

The FBI's tentative finding that the .22-caliber shots fired in Monday's assassination attempt were "devastator (exploding) bullets" raised further questions of whether Reagan was in graver danger than originally report-



Administration actively preparing Polish aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration, declaring that the Polish crisis has become "far more serious" in the last two days, is actively preparing for the possibility of Soviet military intervention while accelerating economic aid to Poland

Pentagon analysts said Thursday that new signs of intensified military preparations along the Polish border are sparking increased U.S. concern that the Soviets might use force to quell the trouble communist country's labor and political unrest.

At the same time, Vice President George Bush announced that the United States will send new food aid to Poland and will consider further economic assistance.

The Polish crisis appeared to ease early this week when the Solidarity union cancelled a threatened general

But this brought no relaxation of readiness among Warsaw Pact troops in and around Poland. Maneuvers continued and the Soviet Communist Party newspaper Pravda denounced what it called "anti-socialist" activities in Warsaw.

Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger said Thursday that the Soviet Union had taken military steps in the previous 24-48 hours that made the situation in Poland 'far more serious.'

'We are taking...steps" in case the Russians do move against Poland, he told the Senate Budget Committee.

The defense chief did not describe the steps being taken, but aides said he referred to consultations with allies on possible political, economic and diplomatic responses not military preparations. Sources in the U.S. military command structure said no American forces were being placed on alert.

The United States and other Western countries have been accelerating their assistance to Poland, reasoning that a political accomodation between the Polish government and the new independent union movement will be more difficult if Poland's economy continues to deterio-

After a meeting Thursday with Mieczyslaw Jagielski, the Polish deputy prime minister, Bush said the administration plans to sell Poland dairy products, including dried milk and butter, at concessionary prices.

Officials said Poland was given permission to buy \$73 million worth of dairy products payable in Polish zlotys. The offer, they said, represents a discount of about \$20

Bush said the administration is considering other forms of assistance. He did not elaborate, but sources had said Wednesday that the administration may allow Poland to defer repayment on a \$2.5 billion loan. The administration already has permitted Poland to defer \$88 million in debt

Prem's troops regain control of Thailand's capital

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) -Troops loyal to Prime Minister Prem Tinsulanonda seized control of this Thai capital today and crushed a two-day-old coup attempt by rebel generals. Two people were killed and five were injured in brief fighting.

The deaths were the first reported in six coups or attempted coups since

A passing civilian and one rebel soldier were killed when loyalists returned the fire of rebel troops at the royal palace, military and official sources said, adding that the civilian was killed by a stray bullet. Three other rebels were injured in the brief struggle, the sources said.

Later in the day, two more rebels were slightly wounded when they tried to run a road block, witnessess

The 60-year-old Prem, who had strong support from the Thai royal family, ordered his troops to march on Bangkok after all-night negotiations with rebel leader Gen. Sant Chitpatima produced no results, mili-

The loyalist forces met no opposition until they reached the royal pal-

At the same time, Prem ordered troops within the city who had not openly supported the cou to take contol of the approximately 30 radio and television stations in Bangkok. They complied and met no resistance.

Less than two hours after Prem's forces closed the airport and swept into the city in the early morning, the coup leaders fled or were captured.

Government forces surrounded the last band of about 300 rebels at army headquarters. The rebels gave up without a fight after an hour-long standoff and returned to their barracks to the cheers of thousands of civilians who had gathered in the area, witnesses said.

Military and embassy sources said the 59-year-old Sant fled to Burma in a helicopter. Sant's main supporter, 1st Army Commander Lt. Gen. Vasin Israngkul Na Ayuttaya, surrendered to Prem at the prime minister's emergency headquarters in Korat, 150 miles to the northeast, the government radio reported.

Four other coup leaders were under government "protection," according to a government radio report.

"The matter has ended peaceful-" Prem said in a statement released in Korat. "The officers and troops who joined in the coup were misguided, but it indicated they were well-disciplined and obey their com-

"I will give fair judgment to all. Let

us forget what happened and look to the future and continue to work for

our country," the statement said. The coup, which began early Wednesday morning, started unraveling during the night when the head of the national police force defected from the rebels, and the naval chief of staff denied he was part of the con-

Sources had said that Sant could count on the support of only 55,000 of Thailand's 160,000 army troops. The rest remained loyal to Prem.

If the proposal passes, \$5.6 million will go to construct two new elementary schools. One school will be located in north Midland and will take the overcrowding pressure off other ele-mentary schools. The other will be a new De Zavala School to replace the current one, whose main wing was built in 1928. School officials expect to locate the replacement next to the current school in an effort to begin

redeveloping the Hidalgo Park area. THE OTHER \$1.05 million of the bond issue will go for improvements

to Midland and Lee high schools, with Midland High also to get a new li-brary and a larger band hall.

None of the four candidates vying for two positions on the school board is against the bond issue per se. Seeking Place 3 are Ann Page, a

former board member, and Dickie Gatlin, an accountant with Gene Sledge Drilling Corp. Fighting it out for Place 4 are Gary Hopper, news producer for KOSA-TV, and Michael Butler, assistant director in the city's public works department.

Butler is the only candidate who strayed from the straight "yes" ticket on the bond issue. He is opposed to the idea of a new library for Midland High and criticized the school board's past negligence in not providing proper maintenance for the schools; thus leading to a need for the new De Zavala.





TESCO customers encouraged to replace old worn equipment

Texas Electric Service Co. will begin a program April 15 to provide financial incentives to encourage customers to replace worn or obsolete air conditioning and water heating equipment with more energy-efficient equipment.

Details of the program will be available at that time

"The goal of our Residential Load Management Program will be to hold down electricity price increases by holding down the number of new power plants we have to build," said TESCO President Bill Marquardt.

Equipment with a higher Energy Efficient Ratio rating costs more than lower-rated equipment. Therefore, to encourage customers to buy energysaving equipment, TESCO will pay part of the difference in cost, he

"We will be actively encouraging our customers to install this equip-

If enough customers do so, he said, "We will need to build fewer new power plants to serve our customers' peak load in the future, and this in turn will help hold down increases in the future cost of electricity for all

Marquardt said benefits to all customers will start coming about as soon as new equipment is installed. Each piece of equipment helps reduce the company's need to use highpriced natural gas fuel to meet summer peak loads, which in turn will mean smaller increases in fuel costs to customers.

Also, he said, each piece of new equipment will do its part to help delay the need to borrow money to design and build new power plants.

Customers who install high EER air conditioners or heat pumps and solar-assisted or energy-recovery water heaters will make a direct contribution toward this goal.

He noted that the cost of a new power plant today is more than three times the average cost of the plants now used by TESCO. Because high-efficiency equipment

uses less electricity, customers who install it will save money on their bills as long as the equipment is in use.

"But the initial cost of this equip-ment is higher than that of lower-efficiency units. So our program is designed to encourage customers to replace outmoded equipment sooner, and encourage them to invest in higher-efficiency units, than they might otherwise consider," Mar-

quardt said. Complete information on types of eligible equipment and amounts of financial assistance will be available when the program goes into effect on

Task force study blends scientific into supernatural

ATLANTA (AP) - In a workroom papered with graphs and maps, one chart shows the age of the victims. Another plots their heights and weights. There's even one that shows the temperature at the time each victim was last seen.

Nearby, science blends into the supernatural. Nearly 20 poster-size drawings are tacked to room dividers, each purportedly showing what the killer looks like, each submitted by an avowed psychic — and each different from the others.

At task force headquarters, where the hunt is on for the killer or killers of 22 young blacks, no lead goes ignored, officials say.

The headquarters was opened to reporters for the first time Thursday, and Public Safety Commissioner Lee

Brown gave a guided tour. Meanwhile, Hartford, Conn., television station WFSB quoted sources as saying a Hartford man was being questioned there in connection with the Atlanta killings. Police Chief George Sicaras refused to comment on the report.

But in Atlanta, Brown denied anyone from Atlanta was questioning the man, identified as Larry Marshall, "about 34." And a spokesman for Brown said the special task force investigating the slayings had "no interest" in Marshall. Marshall's extradition to Georgia was being sought tradition to Georgia was being sought in connection with an attempted robbery warrant, not for the child slayings, the spokesman said.

Almost 90 people, including 40 investigators, are assigned to the investigation, and it's costing the city an estimated \$170,000 a month. No arrests have been made, and the list of victims is growing.

Two new victims — 13-year-old Timothy Hill and his friend, 21-yearold Eddie Duncan — were fished from the Chattahoochee River this week and added to the task force's list of unsolved cases, which now totals 22 deaths and two missing children since

Among the investigators' theories is that a killer is responding to publicity. Duncan, the oldest victim so far but retarded and described as child-like, was last seen March 20, the same day bat-carrying vigilantes began pa-trolling the housing project where he

In some other deaths, investigators have said the killer might have placed the bodies in certain locations in reaction to publicity.

At the task force headquarters, computer terminals sit atop rows of desks, giving investigators access to thousands of bits of information gleaned from police records and pub-

"We're not overlooking anything," said Brown. He described the computer system as "state-of-the-art."

While conducting his first news conference in task force headquarters, Brown packed reporters, technicians, photographers and cameramen into a tiny conference room with walls covered with charts.

He said the charts indicate the task force is looking for any combination of factors that link the victims to some common factor and that could lead police to the killer or killers

The index, which is adjusted for seasonal variations, usually gives a good indication of the future trend of prices at the consumer level.

It has risen at an annual rate of 12.5 percent for the first three months of 1981, above the 11.7 percent rate for all of last year but well below the 17.5 percent recorded in the first quarter of 1980, a department spokesman

The 6.1 percent rise in energy prices was well above the 3.6 percent increase in February and was the fifth straight large monthly advance, the

Black farmers' sit-in just 'the first step'

COVINGTON, Tenn. (AP) — The leader of a group of black farmers that occupied a Farmers Home Administration office for 21 days says

the protest was only the beginning of a larger movement to prevent blacks from being forced out of farming.

But as the sit-in ended, officials of the federal agency charged that the farmers' complaints of discrimination in crop loans didn't hold up.

"Covington is not isolated," said Thomas Burrell, a spokesman for the farmers. "It is part of the system. ... If we don't do something about it soon, blacks will be out of agriculture by the end of the decade."

Burrell said he thought the protest, originally intBnded as a one-day rally, had drawn attention to the plight of small farmers, both black

rally, had drawn attention to the plight of small farmers, both black and white. The farmers at one point said they would stay until they got loans from the agency, but they were unsuccessful in that effort. Burrell

did not say why the protest was called off Thursday.

William Timberlake, the agency's district supervisor, said he couldn't persuade the farmers to be specific about their allegations.

"Tell them to give me a name and a number — there's one set of regula-

tions for blacks, whites, big farmers and little farmers....Their complaints just won't stand up," Timberlake said as the sit-in ended.

The protest began March 12 when a group of about 25 farmers, led by Burrell, went to the Tipton County FmHA office to complain that their crop loan applications had not been processed. Burrell charged that the agency routinely postponed action on loan requests by blacks. Timberlake and other FmHA officials denied the allegation.

Burrell said delays in receiving crop loans frequently meant farmers were unable to plant at the right time, with the result that their yields

were unable to plant at the right time, with the result that their yields were inadequate to repay the loans.

About a dozen farmers stayed for the entire protest, eating food that was brought in by supporters and sleeping on sofas.

Plant may help in fight against cotton pests

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — A search for environmentally safe pest controls has turned up a plant that may help farmers wipe out two dreaded cotton pests, researchers report.

After being fed ex-tracts from the Ajuga remota plant, caterpillars of both the pink boll-

worm and the fall armyworm starved to death inside their cocoons, said researchers from the University of California.

The plant is used by tribal doctors in East Africa to treat malaria and high blood pressure, said Isao Kubo, a Berkeley entomologist. He presented the finding Thursday at an American Chemical Society meeting in Atlanta.

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
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The republic endures

After the hectic events at the start of this week in Washington, it's worthwhile to take a few moments to ponder the way the government operated immediately following the shooting of the chief executive and three others outside the Washington Hilton Monday.

In retrospect, it should be noted that this government weathered the domestic crisis admirably. And it wasn't the first time,

Shortly after the announcement that President Reagan had been shot and before the severity of his wound had been determined, Secretary of State Alexander Haig made his now-famous statement that he was in control of the White House. Much has been said concerning Haig's statement and his meaning. But looking at the statement realistically, Haig stepped in during a period in which authority was uncertain and gave the government a semblance of unity. That appearance of unity was crucial and Haig is to be commended for his boldness in taking charge.

One must keep in mind that Haig only said he was in command at the White House. He didn't say he was next in line for the presidency in the line of succession. Haig was correct in what he said. He was merely trying to reassure a startled nation.

Vice President George Bush, upon hearing Reagan had been shot, immediately boarded his plane and began the return trip to the nation's capital. Once there, the former Midlander properly assumed his role and with calm dignity carried out his duties in the absence of the chief execu-

There was never an appearance of disunity or disarray in the government during the first few days of the potential crisis. Rather, everything operated smoothly, much like a fine-tuned, well-oiled

In fact, even during the darkest days of the Watergate scandal when the nation could have been brought to its knees, the government operated. Ironically, it was Alexander Haig, then serving President Richard Nixon, who has been credited by some with keeping the government afloat.

This government has weathered some pretty dangerous storms presidential assassinations, attempted assassinations including the most recent, corruption and political scandals - and come out all the stronger. That fact is a testimonial to the American people and our elected leaders. The republic will endure.

Saving Soviet daylight

Twenty nations in Europe set their clocks ahead one hour March 29, moving to daylight-saving time to save energy,

The United States - with the exception of Arizona — will make the change April 26.

But nowhere, probably, is the resistance greater than in the Soviet Union. The clock adjustment at midnight there March 31 was the first Soviet venture into daylight savings in 50 years. Citizens are afraid they won't sleep properly, that transit schedules will. be confused, that children will be

The Russian reluctance to go along is understandable. Even after years of experience with daylight savings, many Americans are unable to cope - as they will discover again April 26 when they pull into church parking lots to meet fellow parishioners on their way out.

Remembering the goose and all those egg-eaters

People who squawk about Reagan's welfare cuts remind me of myself. I lived in the Deep South 26 years before I could afford to buy an air-conditioner and the day after it was installed, I swore I'd never live below the 30th parallel without one. It no longer seemed possible to do what I had just been doing for 26 years.

We could, of course, do more than what the new president is proposing, reducing the rate of spending, and cut out all welfare. In that unlikely event, I doubt seriously if anyone in the United States would starve except the same drunks who are killing themselves anyway.

Secondly, a great many people taking advantage of the welfare system have additional and unreported income. I know a poet, for example, who has a negligible amount of income but also happens to own a quar-ter of a million dollars worth of first editions. Needless to say, he does not

There is an enormous unofficial economy operating in the United States and anybody but a liberal would have enough common sense to know it. After all, it is reasonable to assume that if millions of Asians manage to survive without an enormous welfare state or even a United Way, then Americans are no less ingenious when the old tummy actually starts to twitch.

We are without a doubt the only nation in the world where our "poor" suffer from obesity, drive to the unemployment office and watch color television while they complain about their plight.

I realize of course - in fact, I made the point - that hardship is a relative proposition, but we need to regain our perspective in the midst of all this liberal hysteria, half of which is orchestrated for purely partisan rea-sons and the other half of which is orchestrated by upper middle class bureaucrats and special interests.

We need to remember that the one force which is creating the most hardship for the largest number of people is inflation and that the only way to stop it is to stop spending money we don't have.

Reagan, Brezhnev develop 'understanding'

WASHINGTON - The dialogue between the United States and the Soviet Union occurs at two levels. There is a direct line of communication by diplomatic note, oral exchange and, on occasion, the hot line. But there is also a covert communications network, which carries unspoken mes-

Diplomats are in some respect like rare tropical birds. They have learned to communicate with one another through near-inaudible sounds, poses and gestures. If there is to be an accommodation between them, they may prefer that it be implicit rather than explicit. than explicit.

An arrangement may be reached through a process of almost imperceptible movements, coincidences, discreet whispers, raised eyebrows and knowing smiles. Through this delicate process, an understanding appears to be jelling between the Ronald Reagan White House and the Leonid Brezhnev Kremlin.

Here is the tacit, tentative, ten arrangement as it is understood by my sources at the highest levels:

Reagan will hold down U.S. intervention in El Salvador and seek to cool the crisis. Brezhnev, in return, will restrain Soviet forces in Poland and try to keep a lid on that crisis.

- Any Soviet move against Poland, it is also understood, would be countered by U.S. action against Cuba. The United States may not be able to stop a Soviet invasion of Poland, but the Soviet Union is in an equally weak position to prevent a U.S. military move against Cuba.

- Brezhnev will halt, or at least restrict, the flow of military supplies to the insurgents in El Salvador. Otherwise, Reagan will start supplying the guerrillas who are battling Soviet troops in Afghanistan.

Reagan also wants the Kremlin to stop encouraging and supporting anti-American movements in Central America, or else he will stir up anti-

Soviet activity in Eastern Europe.

- Reagan is most concerned about a possible Soviet thrust into Iran, which would threaten the Western World's oil supply in the Persian Gulf. Hints have been relayed to Brezhnev, therefore, that the United States would resist any overt attack and respond to a covert move by sending mass arms shipments to Communist

- Reagan has also sent discreet signals to Brezhnev that the United while the Kremlin sets up pro-Soviet governments in Africa. If Brezhnev sends his Cuban allies into another African country, Reagan might encourage the Egyptians to move against Libya.

Of course, these arrangements are precarious at best and could be upset by new developments. But it would be accurate to report that Reagan and Brezhnev are beginning to understand one another.

CHANGE OF PART: Budget Director Dave Stockman wants to cut back and eventually eliminate entirely a federal planning program he stoutly defended when he was a member of Congress.

The program comprises more than 200 grass-roots groups called Health Systems Agencies, initiated in the Nixon administration. The agencies, which are run by local volunteers, pass judgment on proposals for construction or expansion of hospitals and other health facilities in their communities. The purpose is to pre-vent the building of hospitals where they aren't needed - and to encourage construction where the need is

Last June, then-Congressman Stockman felt impelled to defend the HSAs against proposed cuts by the Carter administration. In a letter to a constituent, Stockman cautioned that "budget tightening efforts ... must be carried out in a judicious and discriminating fashion," and added:

"(This is) particularly true in the field of health planning, where local and regional HSAs have proven to be the most effective coordinators of the health planning effort.'

In an earlier letter to then-Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Joseph Califano, Stockman expressed similar high praise for the

WATCH ON WASTE: While funds for school lunches are being cut back, the administration has managed to increase federal funding for the nation's gun aficionados. The Army's Department of Civilian Marksmanship, with its customary support from National Rifle Association lobbyists, will be given \$444,000 this year. The money will go for "trophies and classification badges" won by private gun club members, who are presumably prospective Army recruits. Incredibly, the NRA had talked Congress into nearly doubling last year's target-shooting largesse, but the budget cutters were able to hold the increase to "only" \$19,000.

- Energy Department poohbahs have three methods of getting cars to use on government business: The cheapest option is to requisition a car from a General Services Administration motor pool. The second, slightly more expensive way is to have the GSA lease a car from a private firm. The third and far more costly method is for the bureaucrat to lease the car himself and send the bill to the government. Under Option No. 3, the official gets to use the car for private business, as long as he pays the modest mileage cost. Predictably, investigators found that three out of every four DOE bureaucrats entitled to cars choose the third method.

 Some developers have been tak-ing advantage of federal housing subsidies for the poor to add unnecessary luxury items that in effect increase the subsidies they get. In Santee, Calif., for example, a government-subsidized project included a swimming pool, recreation rooms and paved parking. In Lima, Ohio, a developer padded his subsidy by providing carpeting, balconies, patios, paved parking and a community building. It all eats into the money available for low-cost housing.

Anti-Soviet alliance being forged in Western Europe

WASHINGTON — Soviet invasion of Poland would instantly enshrine President Reagan's toughened stance toward Moscow as foreign policy gospel for the Western world, a political change that has led the new president's advisers to see benefits resulting from the dangers confronting Po-Reagan's own skepticism over the

effectiveness of nuclear arms control would become a conviction shared by leaders and major political parties among U.S. allies. Reagan could give up the present pretense of being for arms control talks with the Soviets once U.S. rearmament has started to advance Soviet intervention, as measured by

these presidential advisers, would accomplish in one swift transition what has been beyond U.S. reach since the late 1960s and Vietnam: true Western unity under U.S. leadership. 'No one wants Poland to bear the cost or pay that price," one administra-tion official told us, "but it is a fact that the redemption of American leadership is what the Russians buy if they intervene.

Until March 29, when the central committee of Poland's ruling Communist Party met in Warsaw, the Kremlin seemed to be moving toward imposing hard-line leadership on Poland's Politburo and Central Committee. Western officials privately pre-dicted hard-lining Stefan Olszowski

would be elevated as party chief in the prelude to a major internal crack down on Solidarity, the free workers'

Instead, moderate party leader Stanislaus Kania surprisingly strengthened his control. That casts doubt on whether an internal crackdown by Polish police and militia, privately predicted by Secretary of State Alexander Haig as far more probable than outright Soviet intervention, will now take place. If it does not and Solidarity continues to undermine central communist authority, Soviet invasion becomes more proba-

Once invading troops cross the Polish border, the Soviets would elevate the U.S. as the acknowledged leader of the West. That is partly because of the impact in Europe of the AFL-CIO and its liberal political friends be-

coming Reagan's steadfast allies. AFL-CIO President Lane Kirkland is in close touch with Western European labor unions, including leftist unions in Britain, West Germany, Scandinavia and the low countries. All have a deep stake in the fate of Solidarity.

This new U.S. stature would dry up increasingly appeasing calls by the European left for the U.S to return to the pre-Afghan invasion detente. Even the left wing of Chancellor Helmut Schmidt's West German Social Democratic Party would not risk turning its back on Solidarity.

"The Germans would buy nuclear modernization overnight if Poland gets invaded," one West European diplomat predicted. "Reagan wouldn't have to say another word about it."

In France, confidential polls taken by political ailies of President Valery Giscard d'Estaing show that the Communist Party vote in this fall's presidential election would drop from its normal 20 percent to about 15 percent
— a 40-year low — if Moscow marches

Nobody can predict the effect on the Soviet Union of the sudden coming together of the Western alliance, which reached its lowest state during the Carter presidency. Officials both here and in Europe have not been subtle in spelling out their sentiments to Soviet leaders.

That message comes down to this: The certainty of the United States moving toward a position of military power greater than the Soviet Union's and backed by the power of all its European allies for a long time to

Such a program is exactly what the Reagan administration wants to accomplish in the next four years. That the Kremlin would become its unwitting agent may influence deliberations in Moscow. In using force against Poland, the Soviets are delivering to Washington the most elusive goal of the past two decades: aknowledged leadership of the anti-Soviet

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



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White House staff returns to normal schedule after shocking week

WASHINGTON (AP) - Jim Brady's blue, high-backed judge's chair is no

longer empty.

A furry black toy bear, wearing a Chicago Cu'os baseball hat, sits there, in place of the White House press secretary gravely wounded in Monday's attack on President Reagan. Brady's nickname is "the bear."

The stuffed creature was placed in the chair sometime after doctors reported encouraging signs about Brady's progress in recovering from a bullet wound in

It is one of the few upbeat symbols around the White House. The initial shock of the attack outside a Washington hotel has worn off. The immediate fears that Brady would lose his fight for life have dissipated. Gone, too, is the euphoria that came with reports that the 70-year-old president was making progress in

his recuperation from a gunshot wound in the left lung.

They have given way to an effort to return to business as usual, and humor,

some of it of the gallows nature. The shooting, cracked one White House staff member cognizant of questions raised while Reagan campaigned for the presidency, "puts the age issue to

A deputy White House press secretary began a briefing for reporters Wednesday by saying he was prepared to offer "excruciating detail" about the room the president was occupying at the George Washinton University

At 8 a.m. EST Tuesday, the day after the shooting, and again at 8 a.m. Wednesday, 20 to 25 White House officials who make up the senior staff gathered in the Roosevelt Room across a corridor from the Oval Office, as they do each

weekday morning, to discuss their work for the day.

One participant said that both days, the initial topic was the progress being made by the president and Brady, as well as the Secret Service agent and the District of Columbia policeman who were hit at the same time.

But "then it's right into the schedule," he said, listing discussion topics as current legislation, policy decisions and how the president's program was

"There was great upset about what had happened, and there was enormous concern about Jim Brady. But we are going forward," said this well-placed White House staff member. "Everybody's thankful and tickled."

Railroad break up proposed

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Reagan administration, noting that labor concessions and "other blue-sky conditions" needed to make Conrail profitable may never materialize, says the Northeast would get better freight service by breaking up the railroad.

Speaking with report-ers Wednesday, Transporation Secretary Drew Lewis said the continuation of subsidies to Conrail for two years, as proposed by the railroad and the U.S. Railway Association, might only delay establishment of profitable rail service in the Northeast.

The USRA oversees Conrail operations and funnels federal subsidies

Lewis' department, the railroad and the USRA, were required by law to send reports Wednesday to Congress on the future of Conrail, a 16-state carrier with 17,700 miles of line stretching from Massa-chusetts to Missouri.

All agree that major labor concessions are needed, regardless of the railroad's future, although the final decision rests with Congress.

Conrail was formed under federal sponsorship in 1976 out of the Penn Central and five other bankrupt railroads. Since then, the federal government has given it \$3.3 billion in operating and capital subsidies.

In their reports, Conrail and the USRA said the railroad could become profitable in two years with labor concessions and additional limited subsidies. Conrail already is asking its unions for \$200 million in contract concessions each year for the next five

Lewis said the administration's proposal provides a practical solution 'consistent with our goal of removing the federal government from the railroad business.'

Lewis said he is certain a number of railroads will want to buy portions of Conrail, and said any purchaser will have "to take the bitter with the

But he acknowledgd that Congress must first shift Conrail's commuter responsibilities away from the railroad, change the labor protection provisions that now apply to laid-off Conrail and former Penn Central workers and reduce terminal operation costs. Some of those laid-off workers are guaranteed their salaries for life.

Stephen Berger, chair-man of the U.S. Railway Association, has said selling Conrail's routes would be just as expensive as giving it two more years.

"We must not continue to limp along, funding Conrail on a hand-tomouth basis, when a pri-vate-sector solution is clearly possible. It is time to take new hope, by taking a new direction, Lewis said.

The administration plan gave no clear indication of how many shippers would be left without service if Conrail were dismantled, although the report ack-nowledged "there will be some adverse impacts on shippers located on lines not immediately transferred to other Tail-

roads. In addition to some 540 miles of line already marked for closing, Conrail's survival plan calls for dropping 127 lines covering 907 miles next year and possibly another 126 lines stretching 1,442 miles after that. The USRA proposes to cut 4,000 miles of routes.







Residents threaten boycott

LAVERNE, Okla. (AP) — Residents here, angered by legislation that would change the way schools are financed, are threatening to strike back by boycotting Oklahoma City busin-esses and the State Fair of Oklahoma.

'And it's not just us" who will be boycotting. Laverne attorney Bill Armor said. "It's people all over rural Oklaho-

Plans for a boycott haven't been formulated. Armor said, but the subject was discussed Wednesday at a joint meeting of the Lions Club and directors of the Laverne Chamber of Commerce

The legislation, which already has passed the House, would take all dedicated taxes for local school districts and place them in a common pot to be shared by all school children in the state.

Armor predicted that if a boycott starts, rural residents in southwest Oklahoma could be doing their shopping in Wichita Falls, eastern Oklahomans could go to Fort Smith, Ark., and rural residents of northern Oklahoma could shop in Wichita, Kan.

Residents here said Wednesday that the 10 percent of gross production taxes now going to schools in the oil-producing counties would be redistributed to all school

Big winners would be Oklahoma City's school district, which would gain \$2,076,645, followed by Midwest City at \$1,-761,180 and Putnam City with \$1,127,515.

Laverne schools. whose annual budget is \$1.7 million, would lose about \$700,000, said Pete Jayroe, superintendent.

Gerald Daugherty, school superintendent in Seiling, said they plan an April 7 rally in the House chamber at the state Capitol. Daugherty said delegations from 25 communities have been invited to attend, and he expects as many as 200 rural Oklahomans could participate.

State Rep. Rollin Reimer, D-Cheyenne, is arranging for legislators to be on hand to hear what the delegates have

to say, Daugherty said. Daugherty said he doesn't know what effect the rally will have on the state Senate, which hasn't voted on the measure or on any compromise legislation, "but we're just not going to let it go without doing some-

Dear Dr. Solomon: Some time ago you had an item in your column dealing with the Food and Drug Administration's procedures for approving new drugs. How long does it actually take from the time an application for a new drug is submitted until approval is granted? — Herb

Dear Herb: An analysis by the General Ac-counting Office (GAO) can help answer your question. The GAO reviewed 132 new drug applications submitted to the Food and Drug Administration in 1975. By the end of May 1979 (almost three and one-half years later), 69 (52 per-cent) had been approved

Dear Dr. Solomon: A friend of mine tells me that he has been trained in meditation to control a tendency to high blood pressure. If what he says is true, it seems to me to be a much better way of lowering blood pressure than by taking pills, which I am now doing. Can you suggest a type of meditation that would permit me to chuck my pills? - Barney

Dear Barney: Al-

though various studies have shown that behavior therapy, including meditation and relaxation techniques, may be helpful in the treatment of high blood pressure, it is often used in combination with drug therapy rather than by itself. 

Subject: How and by whom the business of Midland County Hospital District and Midland Memorial Hospital is conducted.

You the people elect 5 directors (3 one year, 2 the next) to represent you on the Board of Directors. Thus you always have at least two directors who have at least one year of experience.

The directors as a board meet once a month, in open meeting, to perform their duties. In these meetings, the majority rules. (Just as in our society as a whole, where the majority elects those they choose to govern the society and do its business.)

The directors of Midland County Hospital District have chosen to operate Midland Memorial Hospital through a management contract with the Trustees of Midland Memorial Foundation (the former owner of the hospital, and its operator for 28 years).

The directors, under the legal contract with the trustees, thus delegate to the trustees the responsibility for operating the hospital and the authority to conduct its business. They, however, keep the trustees accountable to the Board of Directors as a whole.

The trustees are generally a cross-section of the community - bussinessmen, educators, attorneys and housewives. They, acting as a whole, employ qualified, experienced, professional management to perform the day to day operating functions of running Midland Memorial Hospital. Thus, trustees delegate responsibility and authority but keep the management accountable to them.

Each level of this organization reports on its operations which has given it those duties and responsibilities, and to which it is ac-

The organization chart looks like this:

The system and the organization work very well when each part of the team which is directly involved neets its responsibilities, discharges its duties and reports the results to the level above.

WHAT IS THE POINT OF THIS LETTER?

There are two.

First, to better inform you, the public, as to the organizational structure, which has been set up and tested over the past 3 years, by which your hospital is governed, operated and serves its patients.

Second, to let you know that the system will still be in place after Saturday's election. The will of the majority will still rule.

There is one candidate for Director in Saturday's election whose statements to you indicate an intent to act individually rather than as part of the team.

That candidate has singled out one group of employees for particular concern, attention and action. It would be highly improper for a member of the Board of Directors to individually become directly involved in the day to day supervision of any individual or group of employees.

The employees alone have the primary responsibility of caring for the patients in the hospital. They should not have the extra burden placed on them of answering to, or reporting to or through a Director who is acting individually instead of according to the will of the majority. The employees cannot serve two masters. The confusion and uncertainty created by such actions on the part of a director would result in lowering the quality of care the employees would have time to exert in attending to the needs of their patients.

You should know that this candidate cannot carry out that intent, nor act other than by the will of the entire Board of Directors. Each director is as accountable to the public as any other director; the strength of the Board is exercised collectively, not individually.

I have not written this letter out of animosity toward anyone. I have not written it to further my candidaey nor anyone else's, nor to hinder anyones candidacy for the post of Director in Saturday's election.

I have written it out of sincere concern for the continued operation of a carefully planned organization. The system as it now exists provides for management by planning toward meeting goals and objectives. Each member of the team, director, trustee, manager, employee and staff physician has inputs into the proceedures that are prescribed to meet the challenges and solve the problems with which we are faced. The system will work well if every part of the team plays the game by the rules set out by the team as a whole.







PHILADELPHIA and trolleys in the na-AP) — Transit workers tion's fourth-largest city (AP) — Transit workers began rolling buses, subways and trolleys for 400,000 riders again today after their union tentatively settled a 19day strike that cost the city an estimated \$35

"The first bus left the depot at 12:10 a.m.," said James Obey, a spokesman for Southeastern Pennsylvania Transportation Authority. "We hope to have things near normal by the morning rush hour." Some of the subways

began running around 1 a.m. EST, Obey said. While the end of the walkout meant good

news today for travelers who have been forced to join carpools or find other ways to get around, the cost of the settlement may not please them as much. SEPTA board Chairman David Girard-DiCarlo said the new pact could mean an increase in the 65-cent fare, although he did not speculate on the amount of the hike

A beaming Gov. Dick er Thornburgh announced the tentative agreement late Thursday afternoon between SEPTA and the 4,900 drivers, mechancs and cashiers represented by Local 234 of the Transport Workers Union.

Local President Dominic DiClericsaid it will take about 10 days to vote on the new contract.

The contract calls for a pay increase of 14.5 percent over two years, according to two of the city's newspapers, the Bulletin and the Inquir- use of part-time workers



For some time, brunch has been a favorite way to entertain at Easter. And for a good many years food writers have ur:ged cooks to bake traditional ethnic yeast breads for that meal. For example, an amusing Dutch creation - individual buns, each in the shape of a gingerbread

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boy holding a small, col-red egg-in-the-shell; or a fanciful Italian work of culinary art in the shape

This year I suggest you take another baking route: serve a Viennese Sandtorte (a kind of pound cake) at Easter brunch. Baked in a fluted tube pan, the Sandtorte is most attractive looking and slices beautifully. Its flavor is blessedly simple: it comes from

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with confectioners' sugar and serve "as is."-But best, in my opinion, is to lightly toast slices of it and slather them with sweet butter. At brunch time I like to have the Sandtorte and my oventoaster on a side chest in my dining room so the toasted slices may be offered as hot as possible.

The fine texture of this Sandtorte comes in part from the combination of all-purpose flour and cornstarch used in it. I found the recipe in a 1918 international cookbook; only the method needed updating so it could be made easily and perfectly in an electric mixer.


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
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Hinckley's lawyers object to testing

insanity. Although defense psychiatrists were Over his lawyers' objections, John W. Hinckley Jr. faces up to 90 days of psychiatric tests at an experimental, campuslike federal prison to determine if he was sane when he allegedly shot President Reagan.

The 25-year-old drifter is being held at the Federal Correctional Institution in Butner, N.C., a maximum-security facility with dormitory-style rooms instead of cells and a special unit that one federal official said is "for people with se-vere psychotic condi-

Deemed "mentally competent" to stand trial on a charge of attempting to assassinate the president, Hinckley was whisked by helicopter Thursday from a federal courthouse near the Capitol to Butner on orders of a U.S. magistrate who ruled that more intensive tests are needed.

THE MAGISTRATE then sent the case to a federal grand jury to decide whether to indict Hinckley, whose alleged attempt on Reagan's life Monday is thought by federal investigators to be linked to an unrequited romantic obsession with 18-year-old film star Jodie Foster.

The link is based on an unmailed letter to the actress in which he vowed to "get Reagan" at the risk of being killed him-self to prove his love for her, according to sources. The letter was written less than two hours before Reagan was shot, the sources said.

Attorney General William French Smith told reporters Thursday that we do not have any solid evidence that more than one (person) was involved" in the assassination attempt, in which Reagan, White House Press Secretary James S. Brady, a Secret Service agent and a local policeman were wounded by .22-caliber bullets.

THE FBI, meanwhile, said "devastator-type exploding" bullets may have been used in Monday's assassination attempt, although it was not known if the bullet that hit Reagan was one of the exploding shells.

Hinckley's attorneys block further government-administered mental tests until defense medical experts could examine him and decide

granted access to Hinckley at Butner, his attorneys said they were considering filing an appeal

Hinckley's chief attorney, Vincent J. Fuller, said he has yet to decide on a line of defense.

Butner, located near Durham, N.C., was opened in 1976 as a combination experimental prison, where new inmate programs are tested, and psychiatric center, where mental competency tests are conducted for the federal courts.

A FEDERAL official, who asked not to be iden-



Chance that bullet 'exploding' variety leads to surgery

WASHINGTON (AP) - The FBI said Thursday night that "devastator-type exploding" bullets may have been used in the assassination attempt on President Reagan and a policeman wounded in the shooting successfully underwent emergency surgery to remove one of the bullets from his neck.

Roger Young, a spokesman for the FBI, said, "our seat of the pants determination is that all six bullets were devastator (exploding) bullets." He emphasized that more lab tests would be required to confirm that.

District of Columbia policeman Thomas Dela-hanty was shot during Monday's attempted assassination of President Reagan. Doctors at Washington Hospital Center, where he was previously listed in stable condition, had earlier decided to leave the bullet in his body for the time being.

But when the FBI told the hospital about the chance the bullet in Delahanty's neck might explode,

doctors decided to remove it.

The bullet was successfully taken out of Delahanty by three surgeons after an operation that ended shortly before midnight, said District of Columbia Police Chief Burtell Jefferson.

After the operation, Delahanty was listed in "serious but stable" condition.

Dr. Howard Champion, who observed the surgery, said "the bullet probably was an explosive type of bullet. If it had blown up inside him, it could have done significant damage.

Young said it wasn't positive yet if the bullet taken from Reagan was one of the exploding shells. The bullet that hit the president will be tested Friday, he Neither Young nor hospital officials could explain

why the bullet hadn't exploded when it hit Delahanty in the neck. If it is an exploding bullet, said Young, it could still blow up, even though it hadn't done so when it hit Delahanty.

Richard M. Loughery, chief executive officer of the hospital, said the FBI told hospital officials Thursday of the "great possibility" that the shell in Delahanty was an exploding bullet. After being told

of the potential dangers, Delahanty elected to have the bullet removed from his neck.

Loughery said the surgery began about 8 p.m. EST Thursday. He explained that the surgical team had been told of the dangers posed by the bullet. Hospital personnel wore no special protection, such as gog-

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Brady recovering movement, still 'long way from home'

James S. Brady is recovering more movement in his left arm and leg, the White House says.

A medical bulletin issued late Thursday said Brady is becoming clearer mentally and is trying to

Asked how he was feeling, Brady replied with a thumbs-up sign and said, 'fine, fine,' " the White

Brady suffered a gunshot wound to the brain during Monday's assassination attempt on President

Doctors are encouraged by his speech and the minimal voluntary movement of the proximal (central) muscles of his left arm and leg" because the right side of the brain, which controls movement on the left side of the body, sustained the most extensive damage.

Movements of Brady's right limbs, controlled by the left side of the brain, have recovered more rapidly, doctors say

Doctors say that while Brady is making "satisfactory progress," his condition remains in question because of potential complications. "We are a long way from home on Mr. Brady," Dr. Dennis O'Leary, spokesman for George Washington University Hospital, said Thursday.

"There is no evidence of any complications at this time," he told a White House news briefing. But he cautioned that a "whole spectrum" of complications could arise, such as brain swelling, seizures and

"It's far too early to indicate any neurological assessment," O'Leary said. It could take 6-12 months

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WASHINGTON (AP) — Although he remains in critical condition, White House press secretary age Brady sustained, and even a preliminary assessage Brady sustained, and even a preliminary assessment could take weeks, he said.

Until then, no one knows how much and what kind of mental capacity would remain after substantial injury to the right side of Brady's brain and minor damage to the frontal lobe of the left side.

However, doctors say he is vulnerable to some degree of paralysis and speech impairment.

During five hours of surgery soon after the shooting, doctors reportedly removed large amounts of brain tissue from the right frontal lobe of Brady's brain and a small amount from the left.

Drainage tubes placed in Brady's head after sur-gery were removed Wednesday and Brady was able to see and count three fingers held in front of his

His eyes still are swollen shut by the injury, and had to be held open for him to see the fingers and be tested for his reactions to light, doctors said.



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

WASHINGTON (AP) — In his first major trip as secretary of state, Alexander M. Haig Jr. leaves tonight for a 10 day trip to the Middle East to stress President Reagan's commitment to an Arab-Israeli peace and advance the U.S. strategy for defending the area against Soviet aggres-

Haig also will try to work out the basic framework for a peace-keeping force in the Sinai Peninsula that will include U.S. troops and serve as a buffer between Israel and Egypt.

While the exact size of the force Department official said Thursday that it could include 2,000 to 4,000 troops, with as many as half from the United States and the remainder from other nations.

Haig will go first to Egypt and then to Israel, Jordan and Saudi Arabia, with further stops in Spain, Great Britain, France and West Germany on the way back.

Although the 10-day trip was planned a month ago, it has taken on added significance because of the assassination attempt on President Reagan. The trip is seen here as a signal to the rest of the world that the U.S. government is functioning normally.

U.S. forces permanently stationed on Egyptian soil in the Sinai, and Haig will seek to reassure them there is not any other choice. There have been suggestions that the U.S. peace-keeping unit could also serve as a forward unit for a rapid deployment force that could be used anywhere in the re-

The official said there is "no question" that the United States would agree to a condition that the U.S. contingent function only as a police unit if necessary. "We'll have a role in formulating the ground rules, and we're going to abide by them," the official said.

Sadat to let Haig do the talking

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — When Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. comes calling this weekend, President Anwar Sadat plans to let him do most of the talking, Egyptian sources say.

According to the sources, Sadat and other Egyptian leaders are hoping to learn "what Haig is all

"We don't expect any surprises in policy," said an Egyptian source who asked not to be identified. "We want to meet the man and listen to him as a representative of his government.'

Haig is coming to Egypt, followed by stops in Israel, Jordan and Saudi Arabia, on his first mission outside the United States since taking the job as

President Reagan's secretary of state.

As he prepared to leave Washington, Haig drew some criticism for his actions immediately after Reagan was shot Monday, including his statement, 'As of now, I am in control here in the White

Arab officials declined to discuss Haig publicly, but some said privately his image had been hurt. In Saudi Arabia, sources close to the royal family said Haig will be "given the cold shoulder." The independent Lebanese daily Al Bayraq said Haig





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Philadelphia rolls Indiana out of NBA playoffs

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — The Phila-delphia 76ers' playoff experience, and Indiana's lack of it, helped end the Pacers' first-ever appearance in the National Basketball Association playoffs with a two-game 76ers sweep.

Philadelphia's Julius Erving had a game-high 23 points as the 76ers advanced to the Eastern Conference semifinals against Milwaukee with a 96-85 victory ever Indiana Thursday night. The Bucks-76ers series will open Sunday in Philadelphia.

PHILADELPHIA led all the way against Indiana, turning back the Pacers' attempts to rally in the second half.

We got up on them, they challenged us, but we had enough to reach back," said Erving. "Our playoff ex-perience helped us."

The victory gave Philadelphia an 8-0 record against the Pacers this season - six of the victories coming in the regular season and two in the

'Playoff experience might have been the difference," agreed Indiana Coach Jack McKinney, who guided the Pacers to their first winning season and first playoff berth since the team joined the NBA in 1976. "We did make a lot of costly errors and we missed a lot of nice shots.'

The Pacers shot just 38 percent from the field, making 35 of 91 shots.

"We were right there in the game," said Indiana guard Johnny Davis, who topped the Pacers with 21 points. fourth quarter that enabled them to build the lead back. From then on it was an uphill struggle.'

INDIANA, WHICH trailed 52-41 at halftime, closed to within three points, 68-65, with 1:55 remaining in the third quarter. Darryl Dawkins then scored the final points of the period on a layup to start a 9-0 Philadelphia spurt. Dawkins also got the final basket of the surge to give the 76ers a 77-65 advantage with 10:29

"The key was that we played defense as well as you can play it early in the fourth quarter," said Cunningham. "Our agressive defense was magnificent. We helped each

other and closed off the lanes."

Cunningham and Dawkins both said an improved performance by Indiana center James Edwards made victory more difficult than Tuesday, when the 76ers coasted to a 124-108 triumph in the first game of the best-of-three series. Edwards was scoreless in the first game but had 14 points this

"Edwards was a different ball-player tonight," said Cunningham.

"We couldn't give our centers any help and we got in foul trouble."

"They looked to go to Edwards more tonight," said Dawkins. "He moved around a lot more. It did create some problems and he got a lot of good screens."

For the second consecutive game,

the 76ers got double-figure scoring from two reserves. Forward Bobby Jones contributed 14 points and guard Andrew Toney 10 to Philadelphia's

FOR INDIANA, rookie Louis Orr came off the bench to score 16 points.

The other three mini-series resume tonight with New York at Chicago, Los Angeles at Houston and Portland at Kansas City. All three home teams are trying to wrap up their series.

Artis Gilmore was the dominant player in the Bulls' 90-80 victory in the opener at New York with 13 points, 16

rebounds and seven blocked shots. Instead of driving the middle and challenging the Bulls' 7-foot-2 center, the Knicks are expected to pull up and take jumpers. New York also is hopeful of running against Chicago rather than playing a slower, half-court

Houston surprised the Lakers 111-107 in Los Angeles in their opener as Moses Malone outplayed Kareem Abdul-Jabbar in the battle of the pivot. Malone outscored Abdul-Jabbar 38-25 and outrebounded him 23-

Jim Bouton is 'resident deviant'

In 1969, while essaying a baseball comeback at the age of 30, Jim Bouton admitted that he was consumed by the wildest fancies.

'I dream my knuckleball is jumping around like a pingpong ball in the wind," he said, "and I pitch a two-hit shutout against my old team, the New York Yankees, single home the winning run in the ninth inning and, when the game is over, take a big bow on the mound at Yankee Stadium with 60,000 people cheering wildly."

After pitching four consecutive shutouts for the Seattle Pilots, in his etherial imaginings, he is bought in August by Detroit where he pitches the Tigers to the pennant and gets his picture on the cover of Sports Illustrated as "Comeback of the Year."

OF COURSE, it doesn't happen that

Instead, today at age 42 - 43 next Wednesday - he must settle for a different niche in sports history maverick author, "resident deviant" (his own accolade) and leading manufacturer of bubble-gum.

Jim Bouton is not disappointed. "I prefer where I am to what I aspired to be," he said. "I am not disappointed that I will not be enshrined in the Hall of Fame

"Some day, after I'm dead, I hope some kid will read my book in the library and get a realistic picture of baseball. That will be my mark of immortality." The book is "Ball Four," a reveal-

ing treatise of the great American pastime which reflects not only base ball's virtues but its warts and callouses as well

The baseball establishment didn't like it. Former teammates snubbed him. Commissioner Bowie Kuhn, he said, summoned him to the inner sanctum and urged him to apologize and renounce his book as a "bunch of lies." He refused.

HE DID more than that. He proceeded to write an addenda to that best-selling volume which is going on the book stalls this month. The title is: "Ball Four Plus Ball Five, an Up-

It should make him a bundle. It is every bit as controversial and provocative as the first, detailing the negative reaction of his "kiss and tell" revelations in the first book plus his unusual experiences as a sportscas-

He also tells how he got into the bubblegum business - an enterprise that may foot the college bills for his restructured family of five kids, aged

The invention is called "Big League Chew." It's shredded bubblegum in a tobacco-style pouch designed for both grownup players and kids. Little Leaguers can chew and spit just like Luis Tiant and Don Zimmer.

This also has drawn frowns from baseball brass and mothers.

"My partner and I dreamed it up out in the Portland Maverick bullpen while we were sitting around one day drowning bugs in tocacco juice,

Bouton explains. "Our motives were pure. Both of us thought there was something disgusting about tobacco chewing — the way it looked in the mouth and the way ball players spat. We tried to think of

an alternative. "'Why not shredded bubblegum?' we said. 'Just like real tobacco. Same effect without all that mess.' We sent away for some gum base, mixed it up in a saucepan, colored it brown with molasses and sliced it up like chewing tobacco."

THEY WENT around to the big gum companies. A couple weren't interested. But they sold the idea to Amural Products, a division of Wrigpouches by the gross in Napierville. ley's, which is now turning out the

"We now have 100 per cent of the marketing area," Bouton said. This venture plus occasional free-

lance writing endeavors and working on a pilot for a new TV series have brought a new sense of achievement to Bouton's turbulant life.

"I pitched in the big leagues, I won 20 games," said Bouton. "I've been a star and a bench-warmer and, having done both, I feel I have a broader perspective of baseball and life.

"My first book 'Ball Four' was revolutionary because it told the truth. I when he was loaded. I said Whitey Ford scuffed up the ball for pitches. Both admitted it in their own books later. Now so many people are writing revealing books that 'Ball Four' seems tame.

"Ballplayers as a whole lose perspective. Big salaries make them more convinced they are better than other people. And TV — it's become the partner of sports promotions. It no longer reports. It's part of the ac-



If you believe in trends, then the National League rookie of the year will be a Los Angeles Dodger pitcher, following in the spikesteps of Rick Sutcliffe (1979) and Steve Howe

That's just fine with Manager Tommy Lasorda, who thinks he has the perfect candidate for the job in 20-year-old Fernando Valenzuela, a left-hander with almost impeccable credentials.

Valenzuela was burning up the Texas League and had won seven straight games, posting an 0.87 earned run average over that stretch to push his season's mark to 13-9 when the Dodgers, locked in a tight division race, called him up last September.

LASORDA WASN'T shy about using the bulky Mexican, sending him against pennant pressure. Valenzuela responded brilliantly, pitching 17 2-3 innings in 10 relief appearances without allowing an earned run. He won two games, saved another and displayed an awesome screwball that bordered on the unhittable.

Of course, for September statistics, no rookie can match the achievements of Philadelphia pitcher Marty Bystrom. The Phillies were suffering from the mound shorts when they beckoned Bystrom from the American Association. The young righty merely reeled off five consecutive victories in the midst of the pennant race and was named pitcher of the

Bystrom also started a playoff and World Series game and the Phillies won bo th those contests as well. So the team is 7-0 in games in which Manager Dallas Green handed the baseball to Bystrom.

Valenzuela wasn't the only Texas League pitcher impressing the scouts last y ear. Andy Rincon helped Arkansas to the league championship, posting a 10-7 record and then winning two playoff games. He was enroute home when the Texas Highway Patrol intercepted him with a message to report to St. Louis. He joined the Cardinals in time to post a 3-1 record in the final weeks of the season and is counted on for regular duty by Manager Whitey Herzog.

THE REBUILDING New York Mets have a live arm of their own in righty Tim Leary, who was 15-8 at Jackson of the Southern League. The Mets are a little leery a bout rushing Leary and would prefer to give him another full minor league season . But his brilliant work in spring training made it tough to cut the tall ex-UCLA

The Mets are already depending on one rookie, turning left field over to fle et Mookie Wilson, the prize of their farm system. Wilson batted .295 and stole 50 bases at Tidewater of the International League last year.

Wilson carries a can't-miss tag and the scouts talk the same way about young Tim Raines, who will open the season in left field for the Montreal

Raines was the minor league player of the year at Denver where he won the Am erican Association batting championship with a .354 average and stole a record 77 bases. The Expos also have another hot-shot rookie in Tim Wallach, who slugged 36 homers and drove in 124 at Denver. He can play first, third or the outfield.

He's won the American national championship two times, along with two British Opens, and last year won the Vardon Trophy with the lowest stroke average in 20

"I like these courses where you know nobody is going to burn it up, where par is a good score," Trevino

He was tied with George Burns, Larry Nelson, Leonard Thompson, Doug Black and rookie Tim Norris.

Lanny Wadkins topped a big group at 70. Tom Weiskopf, needing a victory here to qualify for next week's Masters, shot a 71. Defending champion Craig Stadler was another stroke

Rankin, who won the Dinah Shore in 1976, said she "has been fortunate in the wind," adding that the key to playing when it's blustery is adapt-

The tournament, in its 10th year, will be nationally televised Saturday and Sunday. The winner will collect \$37,500, the most lucrative prize on the LPGA circuit.





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


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

South showed a balanced hand of 16-18 points, and North's 11 points were adequate for game with something to spare, but not

enough for slam.
West led the seven of diamonds, and South captured East's jack with the queen. There were now eight tricks on top and several possibilities for developing a ninth: the hearts could split evenly, which would give declarer the fulfilling trick with his long heart; or either black suit finesse could succeed. Though the combined odds on one of these chances materializing are tremendous, notice that, as the cards lie, all are fated to come to naught. Yet declarer ex-perienced no undue difficulty in bringing home his con-

First declarer tested the hearts, and he was only mildly disappointed when West sluffed a club on the third round-that meant that West's diamond lead was almost surely from a long suit. Rather than commit himself to either black suit finesse, he next cashed the ace of diamonds, and was highly gratified when East discarded on this trick. The contract could now be underwritten.

Declarer continued with another diamond, and West found himself on play. He could cash two more diamonds, but there was no escaping declarer's web. He was down to nothing but

black cards, and he was reduced to a Hobson's choice. Whether he led away from his queen of spades or king of clubs, it would be into one of declarer's tenaces and would present South with a gift of the game-going trick.

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

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

Nation's unemployment may spurt up again

WASHINGTON (AP) - The nation's unemployment rate, virtually steady since last summer but pressured by deepening slumps in the housing and construction industries, may be ready to spurt up 'again,

New figures on unemployment and producer prices were being released today, and government officials were braced for more signs of a weakening national economy.

Unemployment has been dropping slowly — from 7.6 percent of the labor force in August to 7.3 percent in February - but other statistics already released seem to indicate that trend is



"Fortunately, continued modera-tion in food inflation and the impact of price rebates on passenger cars should restrict the magnitude of the decontrol factor," Donald Ratajczak, director of Georgia State University's Economic Forecasting Project, said in his advance report.

Ratajczak forecast a 0.7 percent rise in the PPI in March, and added that the figure could begin accelerating again in April if food prices begin to rise faster.

Open meeting bill passes in Senate

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Senators caught the eyes of state bureaucrats Thursday with passage of a bill that would require all closed door meetings of statewide agencies to be tape recorded.

"Public business should be discussed in a said Sen, Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin, whose bill was sent to the House on a 21-6 vote.

Doggett, sponsor of the bill, said present law prohibits government bodies from holding closed meetings with certain exceptions, such as personnel matters and land acquisition. His bill would require that all executive sessions be tape recorded and kept on file for two years.

"This is an effort to get the bureaucrats to do their business in public," Doggett said, stressing that it applied only to state agencies, not local school boards or county commissioners courts.

What you are going to do is force those who hold closed meetings now to say what they want to say in restaurants and cafes, not in official meetings," said Sen. Dee Travis, R-Garland.

"We don't think so," Doggett told the Senate. "We believe this bill will discourage those who now use closed meetings to discuss public affairs.'

The tapes would be available only to those taking part in the meeting or on a district court's order.





FTC may end probe of TV advertising

By RANDOLPH E. SCHMID Associated Press Writer

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Trade Commission is considering ending its investigation into whether commercials on children's television are deceptive following a staff report that there would be no practical solution in any case.

The report, issued Thursday, said the only effective remedy would be a ban on all such advertisements but added, "Such a ban, as a practical matter, cannot be implemented."

The report was criticized by a spokeswoman for Action for Children's Television, one of the groups that originally requested the FCC investi-

These FTC staff recommendations threaten the health of American children," spokeswoman Peggy Charren said.

She charged that many ads aimed at young children are for sugary cereals and other sweets that can lead to tooth decay, a major childhood

Ms. Charren said her group plans to carry on its work, "concentrating on a case-by-case basis," whatever the final decision of the commis-

The National Association of Broadcasters, on the other hand, was pleased with what it termed a "reasonable recommendation." "Broadcasters and advertisers have their responsibilities. Parents

must be keenly aware of what their children watch, it is not the role of government or television to be their surrogate," said NAB president Vincent T. Wasilweski. Although the report concluded that nothing can be done about the

problem, it said the staff investigation found support for three basic conclusions that children aged 6 and under: -Do not possess the ability to adequately evaluate advertising directed

-Place indiscriminate trust in televised advertising messages. -Do not understand the persuasive bias of ads.

The report noted that since the investigation was launched in 1978, the adverising and broadcasting industries have voluntarily increased the amount of nutritional and health information provided for youngsters. The final decision on whether to discontinue the investigation will be

made by the full commission, following a period of public comment.

As to the sugared cereal advertising aimed at children under age 12, the staff said the evidence is inconclusive as to whether these ads affect

children's attitudes about nutrition. While tooth cavities are a major childhood disease and sugar contributes to forming cavities, the staff said, "there is no accepted scientific methodology for determining a specific food's capacity to cause cavi-

Meanwhile, the Federal Communications Commission has been developing regulations covering children's programming. That group decided in 1979, however, not to take any action on advertising aimed at children beyond the guidelines that have been in effect since 1974.

The Federal Trade Commission came under considerable fire in Congress last year over several of its investigations, and the FTC Improvements Act of 1980 prohibited it from making any rules concerning the fairness of television advertising aimed at children.

It had continued the investigation, however, to see if regulations were needed to prevent deception.



Workers describe modern sweatshops

NEW YORK (AP) — Describing rooms reminiscent of those where freedom-seeking immigrants worked in near-slavery at the turn of the century, two women have testified that the sweatshop is thriving in New York and New Jersey.

Wearing a ski mask to protect her identity, one woman said Thursday at a state and federal labor hearing she sews dresses with 30 other women in a large windowless room with a single door that almost always is locked.

She said she is paid \$1.30 for a dress that takes two to three hours to make and sells in fancy department

Authorities seeking legislation to prevent the abuse of workers in the garment industry say the woman is one of thousands who work in sweatshops under poor health and safety conditions

The findings of the hearing conducted by the New York state and federal labor departments are to be used in a report to Congress and the New York Legislature in support of laws to end abuses in

Suggestions for improving conditions included licensing owners of garment shops and forcing them to keep accurate books, with stiff penalties for The other masked woman, who called herself


Sarah, said at her sewing job in The Bronx, when someone is accidentally stabbed with a needle by a sewing machine, her employer "uses pliers" to pull it out but doesn't take her to a doctor. The employee must continue working.
Sweatshop workers can make as little as \$57 for 40 hours work, according to testimony.

Frederick Siems, an executive vice president of the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union, testified at the hearing he was "surprised to learn" sweatshops still existed.

But he said it was easy to see how the shops can exist with the large influx of immigrants who "are so exploitable that it's enough to make you cry.'

Other fireworks seized after blast

NEWPORT, Ky. (AP) - Enough fireworks to fill several trucks were seized in raids on four locations near here after an explosion in a secret fireworks

factory killed two people and injured 25.

The explosion rocked the town's main shopping area Thursday and damaged 100 homes and 80 businesses, Fire Chief Ralph Quitter said. Debris was scattered over a wide area.

'There were tons of fireworks in there," said Thomas Stokes, assistant supervisor of the Cincinnati office of the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms. Fireworks are illegal in Kentucky.

Kentucky Adjutant General Billy Wellman or-dered 33 National Guardsmen into the city to prevent looting of the damaged six-block area.

Stokes said he wanted to question Victor Scharstein, 40, of Newport, in connection with the blast. Three weeks ago Scharstein rented the garage that was ripped apart by the explosion, City Manager Ralph Mussman said.

Stokes said the four unspecified locations where agents and police conducted the raids were connected with the operation in Newport. He did not elaborate but said the investigation still was under way.

The four locations where other fireworks were seized — in the cities of Covington and Ludlow and in Kenton County - were within five miles of New-

The two dead men apparently were employees of the factory, Stokes said, adding it would take some time to identify them although some identification was found

"I have about five names, but the condition of the bodies will make it extremely hard to identify them," said Dr. Fred Stine, Campbell County Coro-

Officials in Newport, a city of 21,000 people across the Ohio River from Cincinnati, could provide no cost estimate for the damage, but Mayor Irene Deaton said she would ask Kentucky Gov. John Y. Brown today to declare Newport a disaster area.

"There wasn't a window left on Monmouth Street," said Lenore Bacon, director of the Campbell County Chamber of Commerce.

St. Luke Hospital reported 25 people were treated, but no one was seriously injured or admitted. Quitter said there were two craters five feet deep in the garage floor. The two bodies were found 20 feet

ON THE ROAD Use extreme caution around school areas

By SUE ALFORD Traffic Safety Planning Midland College

Though Midland has a good safety record around schools, it is a picture that could change in an instant if we don't observe school zones ... and that "we' means students and drivers. With increasing outdoor activity for youngsters, especially around school grounds, it is appropriate to discuss those often maligned school zones.

Is my concern unwarranted? I don't think so.
Statistics on school related accidents in general show that most of them occur 45 minutes before and within two hours after school closes for the day. These accidents tend to be on week days, in areas without traffic controls, often in midblock, with a child running or crossing from behind a parked

vehicle.

Now, Midland youngsters are walking and biking to school more often with our nice weather or if they're bused to school, they are biking and playing around neighborhood schools in those high risk hours after school. Thus, it becomes imperative that each of us drive with care around schools during these final months of school because kiddos will have their mind on the soccer or baseball game on the school and playgrounds rather than on safety.

A couple of specific safety practices which are not nearly as time consuming as often lamented by motorists, are: (1) stopping when approaching the front or rear of a school bus that is stopped on an undivided roadway; (2) slowing down in school zones to allow reaction time and room in case there is an

to allow reaction time and room in case there is an unexpected darting pedestrian; (3) stopping for pedestrians in crosswalks; and (4) teaching traffic safety to our children (either actively or by exam-

Safety practices which should be taught to kids at safety practices which should be taught to kids at home and school are: (10) proper bus behavior—
especially coming and going to the bus stop by the safest route and staying seated on the bus; (2) bicycle safety rules—especially riding with traffic and walking bikes across intersections; and (3) pedestrian safety rules—especially walking facing traffic, crossing at intersections or crosswalks and never going into the street from between parked never going into the street from between parked

All this may seem cliche, but traffic safety is far from a household word and very few families consciously discuss traffic safety practices. The best way to initiate the traffic safety habit in our families is by setting a good example and, then, by explaining the safest route to and from school to any children in the family. The safest route would be a route with the most sidewalks, designated crosswalks, marked intersections and regulated speed limits.

Prevention of accidents can be a reality of each of us assumes the necessary responsibility and allows the necessary extra time to get safely through school

Navy to begin talks for Trident submarine

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy says it will begin negotiations for the ninth Trident ballistic missile submarine before Sept. 30, but it has not said whether it plans to award the contract to the nation's only Trident-building shipyard.

The Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics Corp. in Groton, Conn., and Quonset Point, R.I., is constructing the first eight Tridents.

The Navy said in a statement Wednesday that the contract for the ninth Trident submarine will contain different terms and conditions those in the contract for the first eight submarines.

The Navy did not say with whom the negotiations would be conducted. The only other U.S. shipyard that builds submarines is the Newport News Shipbuilding & Drydock Co. in Newport News, Va.

The Electric Boat Division has been criticized in recent weeks for its performance in building subma-

rines, and Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger has said he may consider building Tridents outside the United States. Meanwhile, an option under which Electric Boat

would have built the ninth Trident submarine under the same contract terms as the first eight expired at midnight Tuesday. Navy Vice Adm. Earl B. Fowler, Jr., told The

Associated Press that the corporation refused to extend the Navy's option to build the ninth Trident under the contract terms of the eighth. "We asked the company to extend it and they did not wish to extend it," he said.

The option set the price for a ninth Trident submarine at \$400.6 million. The Navy's latest estimate is that one Trident costs \$1.2 billion.

Funds have been authorized for a ninth Trident submarine in fiscal year 1981, but a contract has not yet been awarded.

Proposal for investors to buy oil for reserve outlined

WASHINGTON (AP) — To hear Rep. Phil Gramm tell it, investors throughout the country are just waiting to use their money to become mini-oil barons - and save the government billions of dollars in th pro-

The Texas Democrat went before a Senate Energy Committee panel Monday to hawk his proposal to use private money to fill the nation's Strategic Petroleum Reserve.

His idea is that investors will be eager to buy shares in the reserve, based on current oil prices, in hopees the shares will increase in value as the price of oil rises.

The petroleum reserve is intended

to cushion the nation from the impact of a major supply disruption, but the cost of buying the oil to stock it is enormous and the Senate is looking for alternatives.

The Congressional Budget Office estimated Monday that filling the reserve to 750 million barrels will cost some \$36.6 billion over the next eight

years. Gramm wants to shift that cost to the private sector, but allow speculators to make a profit on their investment

Gramm said his idea of allowing speculative investors to buy government-issued shares representing barrels of oil would "put that quest for an inflation-proof investment to work for the public good."

Under Gramm's scheme, investors would buy equity shares denominated by barrels of oil; a 10-barrel share would mean the investor owned the market value of 10 barrels stored in the strategic reserve. The purchase price would be based on the going market rate for oil.

"In such a crisis, oil would sell at a premium and those who finance the SPR would be rewarded for the public service they have provided," Gramm told the subcommittee on energy and

mineral resources.
"If no such shortage occurs and the bonds are held to maturity, the investors would simply be speculating on the price of oil, which has risen consistently over the last decade."

Natural Gas Pipeline seeking rate increase

CHICAGO (AP) - The Natural Gas Pipeline Co. of America is seeking a 4.7 percent rate increase, which would boost natural gas bills for customers in nine states.

The increase requested Tuesday, if approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, would not take effect until October.

The company said the proposed rate increase, which would generate \$109 million annually, would affect natural-gas users in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Texas and Wisconsin. Jean S. Gaertner, spokesman for Peoples Energy Corp., parent company of

Natural Gas Pipeline, said the rate hike would result in an increase of \$1.60 a month for the average Chicago homeowner. Currently, the average Chicago homeowner pays \$73.80 a month for natural gas, she said. If the increase is approved it would be the second for Chicago-area

customers in less than a year, after last December's boost of about \$1.50 a month. That hike was designed to bring in \$88.8 million annually George L. Morrow, president of Natural Gas Pipeline, said higher rates

Alpha 66 commandos plot revolution

MIAMI (AP) — Within sight of the glittering hotels of Miami Beach, 24 Cuban exiles in fatigues sit around a campfire and watch two instructors demonstrate how to break an enemy's neck while stabbing him in the kid-

ney.
The commandos of Alpha 66 are plotting revolution.

There are several groups of Cuban exiles with anti-Fidel Castro aspirations. Some train publicly, even inviting television coverage, and say they are hoping to join an insurrection within Cuba or a U.S. invasion.

But Alpha 66, probably the oldest and largest of these groups, is different. Alpha 66 keeps a low profile. Alpha 66 wants to start the revolution and says it already has begun.

Andres Nazario Sargen, secretary general, says Alpha 66 has been infiltrating Cuba for months. "Skeleton units" of commandos - he won't say how many - have committed several acts of sabotage against the Cuban government, he says. He claims three members of Alpha 66 were jailed in Havana in January, and another group assassinated an officer of the Cuban secret police in December. The State Department says it cannot verify those claims.

FBI agents arrested seven Alpha 66 members Jan. 16 aboard a small boat off the Florida Keys that was loaded with weapons and explosives. The Cuban exiles, apparently en route to a raid on Cuba, were charged with vio-lating federal firearms laws. They go on trial next month.

The group's infiltration plan may be against the law. The Neutrality Act forbids use of U.S. territory by private groups as a springboard for military activities in a foreign country, and the FBI says it is investigating possible violations.

There is no overt support from the U.S. government. But the groups say they have taken heart from what they perceive as President Reagan's tough stance on Cuba.

Last weekend, Tampa Times reporter Danny Alarcon was permitted to watch two days of Alpha 66 training. He told of a trip by battered car and rickety boat to a wooded island. where trainees with explosives in yellow rafts learned to disembark and sneak into the woods for a surprise

At one point, he said, a trainee nearly drowned when his \$1.98 air mattress began leaking. He couldn't

The man who nearly drowned, Eduardo Herrera, and the man who rescued him, Jose Miguel Delgado, talked about their commitment to the anti-Castro group as they warmed up

"I could be in a disco with a girl, but I have more on my mind now," said the 24-year-old Delgado, a brawny man in a U.S. Army field jacket.

Delgado came to this country as a child and served in an airborne division of the U.S. Army.

but I would leave it with pride. I would rather fight tomorrow against Fidel than live the good life here."

Herrera said the ranks are growing. The group has taken in about 50 refugees from the "Freedom Flotilla" boatlift who are receiving free room and board while participating in training, he said.

Trainees spend hours in a cramped classroom in the group's headquarters, hearing lectures on military theory from Cubans or other Latin exiles who once served in the U.S. Army or a National Guard unit.

A map of Cuba at Alpha 66 headquarters is dotted with flags. Sargen says each flag represents a act of sabotage. Infiltrators, working with an underground of anti-Castro Cubans, torch sugarcane fields, blow up empty buses, warehouses and factories and create whatever havoc they can, he said.

"People used to see us, and they didn't want to help," said Herrera. "Now they realize it's actually hap-

Project planned to raise ship of Henry VIII

NEW YORK (AP) - A group that includes underwater archeologists, maritime historians and England's Prince Charles is trying to interest adventurous American businessmen in a plan to raise a famous ship from its watery grave of 436 years.

The project is to raise Henry VIII's flagship, the "Mary Rose," built in 1509 and sunk in 1545 before the king's eyes during a battle with the French off the Isle of Wight. The project has already resulted in the salvage of thousands of artifacts giving new insight into Tudor life and times.

The "Mary Rose," named after the King's sister, is to be raised in the spring of 1982 from the silt where it sank, and moved to nearby Portsmouth.

Margaret Rule, the British archeologist in charge of the excavation and salvage, said the ship, one of the first designed specifically for war, will eventually be the centerpiece of a huge museum at Portsmouth.

The ship and its artifacts remain well preserved, she said, in the 40 feet of water where they were buried beneath tons of cold mud. The vessel was found in 1967 after a two-year search by divers.

The ship went down as it maneuvered against a French vessel just off the southern English shore, but the cause of the sinking remains a controversy. French histories say the "Mary Rose" was damaged by cannon fire, but the English version cites poor

seamanship and poor design. Part of the reason might have been that the ship was simply overloaded. Its normal complement was 415 men, including about 250 soldiers, 120 sailors and assorted servants and trumpeters, but when the "Mary Rose" sank she was carrying 700 men, and nearly all the additional 285 on board were soldiers in half armor on the upper decks in preparation for

boarding the French ship.
"The Errol Flynn bit," Mrs. Rule noted. Only 35 of the men on the "Mary Rose" survived. As it sank, Henry and the crowd on shore at his Southsea castle could hear the cries of the drowning men. Ladies whose husbands were on board
