## Another body of black child found in river

ATLANTA (AP) - For the fourth rivers, including four of the last five. time in six weeks, the body of a young black male has been pulled from one of the area's rivers - the apparent new dumping grounds of the killer or killers who have taken the lives of 24 young blacks in the past 21 months.

The badly decomposed body of 15year-old Joseph Bell, missing since March 2, was discovered Sunday afternoon in "an isolated and very inaccessi- at "an acute turn" in the river. ble" section of the South River in suburban DeKalb County by a couple testing a new trail bike, authorities said.

DeKalb Public Safety Commissioner Dick Hand said an autopsy would be conducted today to determine the cause of death. But he said authorities are treating the case as a homicide.

Officials said the body may have been in the river for several weeks.

## Burials, investigation follow blast

REDSTONE, Colo. (AP) - Fifteen coal miners who died in a coal mine blast will be buried this week as a team of experts working deep within a mountain tries to find out why they died.

Officials say they don't know what caused Wednesday's explosion in Mid-Continent Resources Inc.'s Dutch Creek No. 1 Mine. If methane was to blame, as some have speculated, authorities want to know why the miners' methane detectors didn't warn them of the danger.

"We just don't know the answers yet," said John Barton, district coal mine manager for the federal Mine Safety and Health Administration. "It's going to take us at least a week or 10 days to finish the on-site investigation. We have to look at every scrap of metal down there."

Pitkin County Coroner Dan Davis has finished autopsies on the miners bodies, but did not make public his

Barton said that when his search party found the first group of six bodies, "they were not badly charred, dismembered or disfigured." He said their clothes were intact, and they did not appear to have moved after the blast. That led him to believe they died from concussion rather than asphyxiation or fire,

Barton said. As to the cause of the explosion, he speculated, "it was probably mostly methane gas and very little or no coal dust."

Barton said a team of experts begin today to try to piece together the sequence of events that began last Wednesday just after 4 p.m. Their formal report would not be available for as long as 60 days, he

As the federal team gathered here, memorial services for the 15 dead miners were held Sunday. A bearded miner, his words catching in his throat and tears welling in his eyes, led 1,500 people in prayer.

"It is hard to find words of comfort," said the miner, Mike Rogers.

The mine where the men died is a 7,200-foot-long tunnel sloping at a pitch of 13 degrees into a rocky outcropping called Huntsman's Ridge, about 10 miles west of here up a narrow, winding road.

On Wednesday, there was an explosion in one of the deepest areas of the mine. It traveled up the tunnel 2,000 feet, burning four miners who tried to escape the searing heat in crevices in the mine wall.

Rescue workers removed the four injured miners within hours, but it was not until early Friday - about 38 hours later - that word came that all 15 miners trapped in the lower tunnel were dead. The search went painfully slow as rescuers were forced to rebuild the mine's demolished ventilation system as they went.

Mid-Continent environmental coordinator Doug Bowman has

speculated that the 15 dead miners may have encountered a pocket of methane that exploded suddenly

from a weak spot in the mine wall. Methane is the traditional enemy of soft-coal miners, and Dutch Creek No. 1 has been described by Mid-Continent as "one of the gassier mines."

To guard against explosions, miners constantly check methane levels with handheld instruments and automatic cutoff devices on their mining machine.

Some miners at Dutch Creek, who demanded anonymity, have con-tended there has been tampering with methane-detecting equipment at the mine in the past. Redstone Workers Association president Charles Corey said some miners turn down their methanometers to increase work time.

But Mid-Continent and federal Mine Safety and Health officials have said investigations have failed to support those claims.

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) - A British army vehicle killed two youths during the fifth night of rioting in Londonderry, and youths in Belfast stoned a police station as Roman Catholics observed the 65th anniversary of the Easter Uprising

in Dublin against British rule. Trouble was also reported in at

least six other towns. Rioting broke out again Sunday night in Londonderry, the province's second largest city, after a Roman Catholic march to the city cemetery commemorating the 1916 rebellion. Young people hurling gasoline bombs and rocks fought running battles with the police. Three policemen were slightly injured, and four of the rioters were arrested.

The deaths occurred after British troops fired four warning shots over the heads of about 100 stonethrowing youths in a Catholic district. Eyewitnesses claimed an army Land-Rover came over a hill at about 50 miles an hour shortly after the shots and plowed into the

crowd. Two Catholic youths, James English, 19, and James Brown, 18, were rushed to a hospital and

declared dead on arrival. British authorities said the deaths were accidental, and the army said it would make a full investigation.

The nine hours of rioting that fizzled out in the early morning hours was described by authorities as the worst the city had seen in several vears. Bands of youths hurled gasoline bombs at the police, set a building on fire and firebombed a civilian car.

Police reported the city was 'quiet but tense'' today.

All police leave was canceled Sunday as tens of thousands of Roman Catholics marched behind the Irish Republic's green and orange flag at eight cities and towns throughout Northern Ireland.

Police said about 100 youths in Belfast stoned a police station in a Catholic district of West Belfast shortly after a two-hour rally at a cemetery in the same district.

The rally drew about 5,000 people and was the largest in the province. Speakers warned of trouble if jailed IRA hunger striker Bobby Sands

Three pro-IRA politicians from the Irish Republic were smuggled into Maze Prison today in a bid to persuade Sands, 27, to end his fast. Troops and police ringed the sprawling prison complex, but threatened demonstrations by Protestants opposed to the visit did not materialize.

Sands began his fast "to the death" March 1. An earlier hunger strike by 34 convicted guerrillas, including four women, was abandoned last December when one of the protest leaders was close to death after 53 days. The British refuse to concede to the guerrillas' demands.

The overwhelmingly Roman Catholic IRA and its splinter groups are fighting to end British rule in Northern Ireland and unite the Protestant-dominated province with the Irish Republic, which is 97 percent Catholic.

Sands, who was jailed for 14 years in 1976 after a gunbattle with police but elected to the British Parliament earlier this month, was given the last rites by a Catholic priest Satur-

The Northern Ireland Office, the government department that governs the province, reported today that Sands' condition was deteriorating fast.

"He is extremely weak and getting worse," a spokesman said. "His condition will soon be critical."

Sands mother, Rosaleen Sands, saw him Sunday and said he is "losing consciousness." She added that his speech is slurred and he is having difficulty keeping down water, his only sustenance throughout his hunger strike.

The government also announced that Dolours Price, a 29-year-old IRA terrorist who is serving a life sentence for car bombings in London in 1972, has been moved from Armagh Prison to a Belfast hospital.

A spokesman said she became ill last week. The diagnosis was not disclosed, but she is believed suffering from anorexia nervosa, a nervous disease whose victims cannot eat. Her sister Marion, who was convicted with her and eight others, developed the disease last year and was released from prison. She is still under medical supervision.

## Stockman thrives on budget talk

WASHINGTON - He's dubbed the whiz kid. The architect. The genius. He almost gallops into the room. Plops onto the edge of a chair and waits impatiently the halfminute for his turn to speak.

David Alan Stockman, 34, the youngest member of Ronald Reagan's cabinet and the primary designer of the controversial economic package, has the shortest biography in the packet of material on administration officials.

Despite the graying hair, Stockman's face is devoid of wrinkles. / tall, slender man, he speaks swiftly, mentions figures and caculations as easily as someone talks of yesterday's lunch, and smiles seldom. most never is there a wide grin across his face, but something more like a Mona Lies half-emile

He jumps up and plunges into an explanation of Reagan's "Economic Recovery Program" A talk he has given nundreds of times in only two months since

it was announced

Ready to defend Reagan's economic program on all atacks. Particularily the one by Rep. Jim Jones of Oklahoma a few days prior to the talk. David Stockman focused on the advantages of the four-point program before a group of 60 sunbelt area

Although he listed all four points, Stockman concentrated his battle maneuvers on defending what he knows best - budget cuts. The ideas didn't pop into his head this year, according to one Washington reporter. He tried pushing the idea for these cuts the four years he served as a congressman. But the house wasn't ready

The budget cuts for fiscal year 1982 would amount to \$8.6 billion, he states. Not increasing any of the cuts in succeeding years, this would translate into \$67.2 billion in 1983 and \$82.2 in 1984, he

Totaled, these cuts add up to '\$200 billion worth of savings over the next three The budget cuts for fiscal year 1982 would amount to \$48.6 billion, he states. Not increasing any of the cuts in succeeding years, this would translate into

He criticized the last administration, claiming it allowed government to grow at 12 percent ayear. When the books were closed on Oct. 1, 1979the budget reporting spending totaling \$493 billion. In January 1981, the plan for 1982 called for 1740 billion in spending. This is one-fourth of a trillion increase in size and scope. It is totally in-

Despite the president's hoped-for cuts in the budget, Stockman explained that Reagan is still allowing for 140 billion increase in spending. We're only trying to hold down the budget growth to 6 percent.

That's only what the country can handle."
Normally, he added, most people would think that if spending is increasing that taxes shoulkd in crease. But he believes a tax increase would have a detrimental effct on the credit market." Rather, a tax cut would stimulate the economy.

However, when it was mentioned that he had agreed to a one-year tax cut instead of the planned three, Stockman vehemently

denied the statement. He supported the planned cuts in social programs, saying that "they are across the board. We cut dairy subsidies by \$1 billion. We're cutting synfuels subsidies by \$3-4 billion." He said in citing examples.

And instead of cutting deeply into those social programs, which the administration refers to as "Safety Net" programs, the economic plan calls for increasing it, ac-

cording to Stockman, while those programs comprise 37 percent of the current budget, they will be increased to 41

percent of the total pie by 1984.

A four-year congressman before his appointment as director of the office of management and budget last winter, Stockman pointed to complaints he's heard that the budget cuts "play favorites" with certain sections of the



## Debit cards alternate cash, credit

**Associated Press Writer** A growing number of Americans are paying for their purchases with a new kind of money called the debit card - a sort of "plastic check" which provides an alternative to cash or credit

The most widespread debit cards are the ones from Visa and Master-Card. They are used in conjunction with computer terminals. When a customer makes a purchase and pays for it with a debit card, the money is automatically transferred from his or her bank account to the merchant's. Charges for the service vary from bank to bank.

The Visa debit card was introduced five years ago, but the real growth did not occur until 1980. "The time (for the debit card) has come," said Cynthia Chaddick of Visa. "It certainly is picking up.

Ms. Chaddick said there were several reasons for the recent success of the debit card. "People are being more prudent with their financial resources," she said. They want to avoid interest charges for credit

purchases, but they do not want to carry large amounts of cash or face the inconvenience that sometimes

accompanies the use of checks. As of the end of last year, Ms. Chaddick said, there were 1.4 million holders of Visa debit cards issued by 193 banks. She said the company expects the number of issuers to double this year and estimates that volume will triple.

The MasterCard II - the debit card companion to the MasterCard credit card - made its appearance late last year. A spokesman for MasterCard said 42 financial institutions now issuing the debit card and added, "They're piling up so fast that it's hard to keep an accurate count." The institutions have a potential cardholder base of "well over one million," said the spokesman who asked that his name not be used because he works for the public relations company which represents MasterCard rather than for MasterCard itself.

The spokesman said that while the popularity of debit cards with banks was "growing by leaps and bounds," it is too early to measure reaction from the general public.

Debit cards have, however, been a success with depositors at the Wilmington (Del.) Savings Fund Society.

The society started offering debit cards - unconnected with either Visa or MasterCard - late in 1972. Customers who use the cards for purchases at participating merchants get a bonus; 2 percent of the value of their purchases is deposited in their savings account each month. If, for example, you buy \$500 worth of goods or services using your debit card, \$10 will be deposited in your savings account at the end of the month.

William Robinson, senior vice president of the society, said 45,000 of the bank's 53,000 depositors have the type of account with which they get a debit card. Half of the debit card holders use their cards at least once every month, he said, adding that retail purchases on the debit cards in Delaware in 1980 added up to almost \$50 million.

Are the cards popular? "Very

much so," said Robinson. He said the number of transactions has grown by 75 percent a year since 1975. Robinson added, however, that he was watching the Visa and MasterCard debit cards with interest to see whether they would be successful without the incentive of the savings bonus.

One possible drawback to the debit cards for consumers is the loss of the "float" that occurs when you make a purchase, write a check. then run to the bank the next day to make a deposit. The computer ter-minals have the potential for instantaneous deductions, although in practice there is still a time lag in most cases.

The Wilmington debit card is different from the Visa and Master-Card II in that it is not, at the present time, used with a computer terminal. The transaction is recorded on a three-copy paper form and the merchant must deposit one copy with his or her bank, then wait for the "check" to clear the purchaser's

## Gospel singers taken hostage, freed

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) -Nine gospel singers taken hostage at a state prison by two knife-wielding prison inmates say the incident, while frightening, makes them all the more determined to preach to prisoners

"That's what we're here to do, to bring Jesus to them," Mike Capello said after he, eight other "Parable Players" and prison chaplain Al

Fry, were released unharmed. Capello said the two captors were threatening at first, then ended up praying and singing with the troupe, showing remorse and even "a soft-

The incident began Sunday afternoon at Nevada Maximum Security Prison when Albert See, 33, serving a life term for murder, and Carlos Sanders, 21, serving a 12-year term for burglary, allegedly seized hostages as the Catholic group completed an Easter musical play. Four were let go within two hours. The others were held for five hours.

The two inmates were taken into

"I was a little scared at first," said Katie Came, 17, who had makeshift knives held to her neck.

Fry said that after the inmates held knives to the girl's throat, "there were no threats of violence. We sang gospel hymns. They talked and prayed with us. . . . It was calm, but we were all scared and ner-

At the same time, prison negotiators heard the inmates' demands for a helicopter to take them out of the prison. The inmates gave up after they realized the demand wouldn't be met, according to Steve Robinson, prison administrative services officer.

After turning over their hand-

fashioned knives, the two inmates were taken to the Medium Security Prison nearby for requested medical and psychiatric evaluations, Robinson said. He said no charges had been filed against the two.

It was the fifth time in nine months that hostages have been taken at the prison. No one was injured in any of the cases.

Medium Superintendent John Slansky, who conducted the negotiations, said a review of prison security would be made to determine whether some changes are needed to prevent future incidents.

About a dozen other inmates from the prison's 335-inmate population were in an education room when the two inmates took over as the troupe was completing its program, Robinson said. However, he said the other inmates left the room. No guards were present.

Miss Came said the "Parable Players" has been putting on religious shows every month or so at the prison. Her father, Carl Came, also taken hostage, added that the incident "makes us even more determined to come out here."

"All's well that ends well," said Melbourne Motley, 75, who with James and Carolyn Walsh, two other members of the Reno-based troupe, were released about 30 minutes after the incident started at 2:15 p.m. PST. Dan Kelley of Loyalton, Calif., was freed about two hours later.

The others - Came, his daughter and his wife, Nancy; Fry, Don Robb Jr. and Capello - were let go around 7:15 p.m.

The prison is on the outskirts of Carson City, Nevada's capital, which has a population of 38,000.

## Texas legal services illegally advising aliens

WASHINGTON (AP) - Legal services groups in Dallas, Fort Worth, East Texas and Hereford have been violating federal law by representing illegal aliens, Rep. Jim Collins of Dallas has charged.

He wrote Milton Socolar, acting U.S. comptroller general, last month asking for an investigation. Collins' office was informed late this past week that the General Accounting Office has begun an investigation.

The Republican congressman told GAO he had learned of active representation of illegal aliens by:

- Al Campos and Barbara Belejak, employees of the Dallas Legal Services Foundation, in matters involving the Immigration and Naturalization Service;

- Yolanda Ayala, an attorney with West Texas Legal Services of Fort Worth: - Edward Juddenham of Texas

Rural Legal Aid, Inc., in a suit against law enforcement officers in Hereford and Deaf Smith County;

East Texas Legal Services, Inc., particularly through its participation in a recent suit involving the right of children of aliens to attend Texas public schools.

"These actions are in direct viola-

tion of federal law, and this waste of public funds must be stopped. While the entire federal government is trying to cut back, expenditures in violation of the law cannot be tolerated," Collins said.

It became illegal last Oct. 1, the beginning of the 1981 fiscal year, for legal aid groups to represent illegal aliens. Inserted in the appropriations bill for the Legal Services Corporation was the following:

"Provided further, that none of the funds appropriated . . . may be used to carry out any activities for or on behalf of any individual who is known to be an alien in the United States in violation of the Immigration and Nationality Act or any other law, convention or treaty of the United States relating to the immigration, exclusion, deportation or expulsion of aliens."

Collins said immigration officials in Texas called him about the apparent irregularity, wondering if the legal aid groups had found a loophole in the law.

Dallas Legal Services Foundation receives 100 percent of its operating funds from the federal government, Collins said.

The Legal Services Corporation, which provides free legal representation for those unable to afford it, has been one of the targets of President Reagan's spending cuts in his proposed new budget.

"Legal Services has insisted the administration's proposed budget cuts for them are not feasible because there is nowhere to cut back." Collins said.

"If they have used their federal funds in direct violation of the federal law to represent illegal aliens, there is obviously some fat in their budget that is not necessary to represent the poor." Former Texas Congressman Bob

attorney who ousted Eckhardt, has announced the results of a questionnaire he sent out. It went to residents of his district - northeast Houston, the area around the Houston Ship-Channel, north Pasadena and the towns of Baytown, Deer Park, Galena Park, La Porte, Channelview, Jacinto City and Humble, his hometown

The answers indicate his constituents generally back Reagan's economic recovery plan, favor less government regulation and want a strong military, Fields said.

More than 95 percent said they go along with the president's freeze on hiring new federal employees; more than 93 percent agree foreign aid should be slashed; more than 70 percent oppose government-paid abortions for the poor, and 68 percent said both the departments of energy and education should be eliminated.

Asked if they want a constitutional amendment to permit voluntary prayers in school, 91 percent said yes.

illegal immigrant flow from Chinese mainland

HONG KONG (AP) - Cold and starving, a 21-year-old commune worker from China sneaked into town aboard a rickety boat, hoping to find refuge with her relatives. Instead of a joyful welcome, she was given only a hot meal and commands to get out.

A skilled mechanic from Canton took a different route, swimming through shark-infested waters to reach this British colony, his dangerous journey made bearable by expectations of plentiful work and good

Desperate and weary after wandering the city for days without finding anyone willing to employ him, he finally walked up to a police officer and asked to be sent back to China. Both were victims of Hong Kong's

tough new immigration laws designed to curb the flow of illegal immigrants from the Chinese mainland. Before the laws were introduced

aged to reach the colony's urban areas were allowed to remain here.

This was dubbed the "touch base" policy - meaning that those illegal immigrants lucky enough to evade capture near the border and to reach the city proper were granted the right to live in Hong Kong.

But the touch base regulation was scrapped following a visit by the governor of Hong Kong, Sir Murray Maclehose, to the neighboring Chinese province of Guangdong last October. The governor told the Chinese authorities that the influx had to be halted and that all Chinese entering Hong Kong illegally would be deported regardless of where they were caught.

The Chinese raised no objections and promised to do everything they could to stem the flow.

They have increased troop numbers along the border and Chinese gunboats have not hesitated to fire on boats they believe are smuggling human cargoes into Hong Kong. Illegal migrants who are captured are repatriated to China almost immediBefore the new laws were passed.

the Hong Kong government granted a three-day amnesty for Chinese who had entered the colony without permission. More than 7,000 turned up at a round-the-clock registration office for their Hong Kong identity cards, required for employment.

One unexpected development of the amnesty was the surfacing of illegal migrants from India and Pakistan. and Chinese from the nearby Portuguese colony of Macao. Most of these aliens were deported to their countries of origin.

The government has also made it an offense punishable by one year in prison or a fine of the equivalent of \$10,000 for an employer to hire anyone without the all important identity

The government's "get tough" policy was triggered by the huge flow of inese across the border in the last two years. More than 80,000 slipped into Hong Kong in 1979 and some 65,000 last year.


Hong Kong's chief secretary, Sir Jack Cater, said the government's hardline policy was made necessary by the financial burden to Hong Kong of the flood of recent arrivals from China The cost of additional social spend-

ing to provide for the illegals who arrived here between 1978 and 1980 was almost \$800 million in U.S. terms,

The authorities have said they plan to tighten the screws even further on the human tide. Cater announced that no second

amnesty will be given to illegal aliens and that the government will soon introduce new identity cards to eliminate the possibility of people using forged ones.

Although illegal immigration dropped drastically after the new laws were enacted, there are still people in China willing to risk their lives to get here.



## Bush says alternatives

The vice president's comments came in a speech prepared for delivery at Southern Methodist University in Dallas. A copy of his remarks was released in Washington.

"One of the messages I bring here today," he said, "is that we can't afford to accept these substitutes that water down or otherwise weaken the cure needed for our country's economic

## Children return to local schools as busing ends in Los Angeles

schoolchildren were going to school where they chose today as mandatory busing came to a halt in the nation's second-largest public school district.

One of the last challenges to the school board's decision to stop forced busing was set aside, at least temporarily, late Sunday as public schools were winding up a 10-day Easter break.

U.S. Supreme Court Justice William Rehnquist refused to order the desegregation busing of 23,000 students to continue, although he said his final decision on an appeal by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People would not come at least until the middle of the week

"There is no trace of doubt at all that this is the end of mandatory busing," a jubilant Los Angeles school board President Roberta Weintraub said as it appeared the 18-year legal battle over desegregating the city's school system finally was drawing to an

Officials said parents of 7,300 students forced to board buses to school up to one hour each way accepted a board offer to get out of the mandatory busing program starting today. Parents of the other children being bused decided to continue voluntarily in the program until the current school year ends June 19, they said.

'Seven thousand children will be coming home to their neighborhood schools — I feel very good about it," said state Sen. Alan Robbins, a longtime busing

The battle over busing began to intensify in 1978 when a state judge ordered busing in grades 4-8 as a way to start integrating the 529,000-pupil school system, even though state officials blamed desegregation problems on housing patterns rather than the intent of the school board.

Busing was expanded to grades 1-9 and 153 schools

The controversy came to a head in 1979, when voters approved an amendment to the California Constitution, allowing busing only in cases of inten-

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Some 23,000 Los Angeles tional desegregation. The amendment was upheld by the California Supreme Court in March - opening the way for the school board to start dismantling the busing program.

The NAACP appealed to the federal courts, winning a Friday decision by U.S. District Judge A. Wallace Tashima that busing be continued. But the judge was overruled Saturday by the 9th U.S. Circuit

The NAACP filed a 17-page emergency petition with Rehnquist on Sunday, but the U.S. Supreme Court Justice refused to order busing to continue. In 1978 and again last September, Rehnquist declined to interfere in the busing dispute.

Rehnquist, however, said the school board had until Wednesday to submit arguments against the NAACP petition to continue busing before he makes a final ruling on the appeals' court decision. So the possibility remained that Rehnquist could order the mandatory busing plan back into force.

#### Black students win scholarships

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP) - More than 500 students have been awarded scholarships in the 17th annual competition of the National Achievement Scholarship Program for Outstanding Negro Students.

The recipients of the awards, which are valued at more than \$1.5 million, are black high-school seniors from schools in 38 states, the District of Columbia, U.S. commonwealths and territories and overseas schools that enroll U.S. citizens.

The awards are supported by grants from 145 corporations, foundations and businesses and by individual and company donors.

The winners were chosen from 1,500 semifinalists on the basis of a scholastic test and the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. More than 70,000 students entered the competition.



## Anti-U.S. interests boosting guerrillas

WASHINGTON - The long line of Land Rovers pulled up at the rim of a natural amphitheater formed by huge drifts of sand. The scores of visiting dignitaries stepped out of the vehicles, dusted themselves off and stared in disbelief at the spectacle spread out below them.

In the desolate wastes of the Sahara, without a tree or manmade structure visible for miles, the military display arranged by the Polisario guerrillas seemed unreal, like a scene from an old Alexander Korda movie. But the "props" were ummistakably, grimly real.

The occasion for the theatrical production was the fifth anniversary of the Polisario's declaration of independence; they had proclaimed the Western Sahara to be an independent nation. In celebration, the guerrillas were now showing off the booty they had won in their hit-and-run war with Morocco

On either side of the desert arena were long lines of captured Moroccan tanks, jeeps and troop carriers. In the center was a gruesome display hundreds of identity cards taken from dead Moroccan soldiers. And at the far end stood 400 miserable-looking prisoners of war, squinting uncomfortably into the windblown sand.

My associate Peter Grant was there. He has spent a month covering the little-known war between troops of Morocco's King Hassan and the rebel forces of the Polisario's Saharan Arab Republic. Though the guerrillas have uncontested control of the largely worthless desert that constitutes most of the former Spanish colony, Morocco occupies the few population centers and the Western Sa hara's rich phosphate mines

Grant reports that the three-day

independence celebration was a diplomatic success. Delegations showed up from most of the 45 nations that have

recognized the guerrilla regime. But it was also evident that the Polisario's support is heavily anti-American in orientation and that radical political ideology is being pushed on the rebels by such allies as Libya, which is the desert tribesmen's biggest financial backer, and Cuba, which provides medical and military

Large delegations at the festivities came from Iran, Nicaragua, Mozambique and Ethiopia, as well as Palestinian groups and communist parties of several Western nations. Though the Soviet Union doesn't recognize the Saharan Arab Republic, presumably because it needs Moroccan phosphates, a camera crew from Soviet television was on the scene.

Grant spoke to many of the delegation members and concluded that several of the nations supporting the Polisario are doing so because they oppose Hassan's pro-Western regime, not from any dedication to Saharan

## 'High noon' approaching for budgets, conservative demos

WASHINGTON - Passing out 50,-000 copies of a Washington newspaper editorial on the streets of Tulsa, Okla., April 10, Republican operatives began the battle for Ronald Reagan's budget that will be the first decisive test of the 97th Congress


The Washington Star lead editorial the previous day, sarcastically titled 'Jim Jones for President?" criticized Rep. James R. Jones, chairman of the House Budget Committee, for presuming too much in presenting an alternative budget to Ronald Reagan's. The Republican congressional campaign committee hastened to spread the word in Rep. Jones' conservative Tulsa district, plotting to cut him down.

Whatever impact this might have on Jones' 1982 re-election campaign, it certainly will not soften his opposition to the Reagan budget. Rather, the concerted campaign against Jones by Republicans and right-wing operatives is intended to frighten conservative Democrats and make them support Reagan's budget in the floor vote early next month following the current Easter recess.

The House will be choosing between rival budgets put forth by Reagan and Jones in a high noon gunfight that will shape the Reagan administration's first two years. While the budget merely sets upper limits on spending and tax cutting, the battle is a vote of confidence or no confidence in the Reagan economic plan, certain to have repercussions on the tax cut

Jimmy Jones is central to this.





As such, Jones' alternative looks a little as though it emerged from the hip pocket of his old boss, Lyndon B. Johnson, who as Senate majority leader gave a little here, a little there for all kinds of Democrats, enveloping the whole scene in soft lights and draperies. Whereas two months ago Jones was thought by many Democrats too conservative to be a future speaker, now a few important liberal activists tout him as presidential tim-

Even if all Republicans support the president on the budget resolution, he will still need at least 26 votes. Their primary source is the 44-member Conservative Democratic Forum (CDF) - the "Redneck Caucus" whose members long have regarded Jones (with his 33 percent liberal voting record) as a kindred soul.

That explains the intensifying assault on Jones: Make him disreputable as a standard for conservative Democrats. The strategy of Rep. Ed Bethune of Arkansas, a Republican Budget Committee member and a comer, is to convince conservative Democrats they must choose between two antithetical poles: Speaker Tip O'Neill and President Reagan, with no Jones middle ground.

Besides stigmatizing Jones as a born-again liberal, the Republican tactic is to pressure the redneck caucus. Word is being spread that any Democrats representing conservative districts - Rep. Marvin Leath of Texas is singled out as typical - can expect Republican colleagues campaigning on their doorsteps if they vote against Reagan. But such a vote in Leath's case is highly unlikely.

'We want to warn CDF ... members," says a House Republican stategy memo, "that talking conservative while voting liberal is very dangerous." More lethal, the National onservative Political Action Committee (NCPAC) has sent letters to members of the redneck caucus threatening dire consequences if they oppose the Reagan program.

Rep. Kent Hance of Texas, who entered Congress from the conservative Midland-Odessa oil-drilling district by beating George Bush Jr. in 1978, received one such threatening letter. Simultaneously, Ways and Means Committee member Hance was being coaxed by Democratic leaders to be a loyal party man. His fellow Texan, House Majority Leader Jim Wright, fed him dinner before Easter to ask just that. Hance gave no

## Former Tennessee governor facing federal court

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — His brother is being tried on tax charges. An uncle pleaded guilty to bid-rig-ging. A former aide is being tried on charges of conspiring to sell pardons and paroles.

Today, former Gov. Ray Blanton, eased from office three days early by his fellow Democrats in 1979, was going to federal court to face charges of taking liquor license payoffs.

Visiting Judge John W. Peck of the 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals was to question the prospective jurors. All three U.S. District Court judges in Nashville have excused themselves.

Blanton's lawyer, John McLellan Jr. says he fears no impartial jury

can be seated because of intense pub-

U.S. District Judge Thomas Ballantine of Louisville, Ky., who is to try Blanton's brother, Gene, on highway bid-rigging charges in June, said, "Frankly, I'm concerned about an impartial jury." He said publicity was widespread even in neighboring

Two of Ray Blanton's 1974 campaign officials are being tried with him in the liquor case on charges of mail fraud and conspiracy. They are James Allen of Johnson City, his campaign manager and 1975 legislative aide, and Clyde Edd Hood Jr., campaign finance chairman and special assistant to the former gover-

The three are accused of conspiring to take a cut of the profits from several of 12 Nashville liquor stores licensed April 23, 1976, by the state Alcoholic Beverage Commission. The commission's three members were appointed by Blanton.

One of those licensed, former Blanton booster Jack Ham, is a chief prosecution witnesses. Blanton is accused of issuing Ham's license for \$22,000 — or 20 percent of the first year's profits. The ailing Ham has videotaped his testimony.

But Peck, hearing the case as a

district judge, has ordered him to appear in person.

Down the hall, a third visiting judge

- U.S. District Judge James Churchill of Detroit — was trying Blanton's former extradition officer in another courtroom.

Charles Benson, the former extradition official, is accused of conspir-ing to sell pardons and paroles to prisoners while Blanton was governor from 1975 to 1979. Three others tried with Benson on the charges in 1979, before the then-presiding judge had a heart attack and a mistrial was declared, have since pleaded guilty.

Gene Blanton, at 44 seven years younger than the former governor, is in the midst of a federal trial in Memphis on charges of failing to report \$68,000 in income. In testimony last week, Assistant U.S. Attorney

Katherine Carlyle attempted to prove that he diverted money from family businesses and his brother's political

fund for personal use. The Blantons' uncle, Jake, pleaded guilty two weeks ago to bid-rigging. After pardoning three former pris-

oners and reducing the sentences of 49 others, making most eligible for immediate release, Ray Blanton was ousted from office early by fellow Democrats. His Republican successor, Gov. Lamar Alexander, was sworn in without ceremony.

At Alexander's prompting, the 1979 Legislature reconstituted the old state Board of Probations and Parole as the state Board of Paroles and gave it the authority to review executive clemency.

One of Blanton's few recent public

appearances was at the recent funer-al of his former finance commissioner, William Jones. The former chief executive sat alone for several minutes until a few of the former officials who once paid him homage joined him. He later left alone.

## Researcher says running, having babies don't mix

ATLANTA (AP) - Women who run a lot and want, to have babies may have to ease up on their training to get pregnant, an Emory University researcher says.

Strenuous exercise eliminates the body fat women need to have regular menstrual cycles, said Dr. Edwin Dale of the McCord-Cross Laboratory of Reproductive Physiology at

Irregular periods are one cause of infertility, Dale said in a recent interview, but the condition in runners is temporary and women resume having normal cycles severcl months after they cut back on exercise. Dale compared 112 women runners

with 56 non-runners between the ages of 18 and 48 and found that more runners than non-runners had irregular menstrual cycles or no periods or

Among long-distance runners, 66 percent had normal periods. Among recreatiofal runners, or joggers, 77

percent had normal periods. By contrast, 96 percent of the non-runners had normal periods.

Dale said the study began in 1977 when he received a telephone call from a physician who said, "I have a strange lady with a problem. This lady runs 13 or 15 miles a day. She hasn't had her periods for a while."

The woman told Dale she had a runner friend with a similar prob-

'One patient led me to another and all of a sudden the phone was ringing off the wall and a number of women runners were saying, 'I would like to get into your study.' They sort of created the study for me.'

Not all the women were interested in getting pregnant, Dale said, but they all wanted to know if they were sterile, or if running was a contraceptive. The study, completed in 1979, found that the answer to both ques-

"Because a woman is not having

her period does not mean she is con-tracepting," Dale said. "She proba-bly is not going to get pregnant, but a person can't make that statement. It could get you in trouble."

Runners and women who participate in other strenuous activities like basketball, swimming and gymnastics don't have to stop exercising to have babies, Dale said, but they should cut back alittle and gain some

weight.
"A woman who wants to become pregnant who has been running 50 to 60 miles a week should cut back to 15 or 20 miles a week," Dale said. "She still runs enough for the cardiovascular benefit, but she will begin to gain some weight, to gain some body fat and to relieve the stress of running. She gets pregnant."

A gain in body fat is the key, Dale said, because the fat may serve as the storage site for estrogen, the female hormone, and possibly may serve as a source of nutrients for a developing

embryo.
"She has to have a certain percentage of body fat to initiate menstrual periods and to become pregnant," he

# Doctors still puzzled

by treatment effects

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) -Some 100 cancer patients in New Mexico, most of them terminally ill, have smoked marijuana over the past two years to ease their chemotherapy-caused nausea and vomiting. Doctors still don't know why it works - or why it fails with other patients.

"I see the drug as being useful, but not a panacea," said Dr. Dan Dansak, assistant professor of psychiatry at the University of New Mexico. "There are still a number of patients who don't respond too well to it and we don't know why.

'More work certainly needs to be done to see why people respond and why they do not — we still need something for those who do not re-

On Jan. 16, 1979, New Mexico became the first state to begin giving cancer patients marijuana or its active ingredient, delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol or THC, to combat the side effects of chemotherapy.

Dansak is one of three members of

a review board, composed of a psy-chiatrist, a cancer specialist and an ophthalmologist, that reviews appli-cations of cancer patients to receive

marijuana. The Legislature had been urged to adopt the marijuana program by a 28-year-old cancer patient from Albuquerque, Lynn Pierson. On Feb. 21, 1978, then-Gov. Jerry Apodaca signed into law the Controlled Substances Therapeutic Research Act. The state received approval from the Food and Drug Administration Dec. 1, 1978, for use of marijuana by cancer patients.

Pierson died in August 1978. Seven months later, Gov. Bruce King repealed the 1978 law and established a permanent program - the Lynn Pierson Therapeutic Research Pro-

SINCE THEN, Louisiana, Illinois, Florida and Washington state have started similar programs and at least a dozen other states have enacted laws modeled after the New Mexico statute, Dansak said.

Dr. Edward Deaux of the New Mexico Department of Health and Environment said that among the New Mexico patients, the marijuana in cigarette form seems to work better

than the THC in capsule form. "The inhaled version works better than the oral version," Deaux said. "It could be the absorption is different. It could be the drug gets into the blood faster through smoke. It could be that different drugs used in chemo-

therapy react differently." The eight patients currently in the program declined to discuss their experiences for reasons of privacy, Dansak said.

'They have concerns about neighbors and how the neighbors will receive them, concerns about ... how churches and relatives will receive them," he said.

The marijuana used in the New Mexico program is grown at the University of Mississippi and distributed by the National Institute on Drug Abuse. It comes pre-rolled in tins of about 300 cigarettes each, with each cigarette containing 14½ to 15 milligrams of THC.

The capsule form of THC is mixed with sesame oil and comes in gelatin capsules of five to 15 milligrams.

The cigarettes or capsules are ad-

ministered every 4-to-6 hours over two-day and five-day cycles, he said.

DANSAK SAID roughly 60 percent of the patients who have been in the program have had positive responses and 40 percent have had negative

responses.
"Older women don't seem to respond as well to the drug as younger women, and younger women seem to respond as well as older and younger men. I think in general, male patients are a little more willing to use it. ... They might be a little more adventurous," he said.

"And there are religious reasons that people are reluctant to take it." Marijuana relaxes some patients, while others get giddy, he said. Still others seem completely unaffected.

Appetites, sometimes seriously curtailed by chemotherapy, are occasionally revived by marijuana, Dansak said. "We have some patients who get appetite stimulation. They maintain their weight better with marijuana.



## opulation growth triggers modern-day range war

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) -Rancher Jim Breithaupt has dug in is booted heels and is waging a modern-day range war against a prooosed 50,000-acre reservoir that would wallow up a hefty chunk of his

It's land his family has worked ince the turn of the century. His ather is buried on it. Breithaupt wants it for himself, his grandchildren and their grandchildren.

Let the new Texans streaming into he Sun Belt quench their thirst, prinkle their lawns and water ski omeplace else, he and other landwners are saying.

Breithaupt isn't just battling to stop reservoir. He's trying to lasso

"I'm not going to leave if I can help

it," Breithaupt said. "I hate the durn thing coming.'

Tarrant County water officials say the rapidly growing population in Fort Worth and suburban Arlington and Mansfield will be left with parched throats when the water supply is depleted as early as the 1990s.

Their \$342.7 million project, which would create the Richland-Chambers reservoir straddling the Central Texas counties of Navarro and Freestone, has been snagged by two court appeals and valuable mineral disco-

The court roadblocks were thrown up by a group called Tehuacana-Richland Enemies of the Dam, or TRED - as in "Don't Tread On Me," a motto of their colonial forefathers.

"They're stealing our land and ruining our entire lives," says TRED president Verna Bonner of Streetman, who has been battling to turn off

control the lives of people through water projects and the like to a commission in Austin that is totally deaf to anything the people have to say," Mrs. Bonner said. "The water district has so much power," said Breithaupt, also one of

'The Dallas-Fort Worth area is growing faster than everyone expected it to grow. It will grow and need more water," he said. "Droughts are cyclical, but this is not a new norm we're experiencing. It can happen, and if it continues, we're going to be in serious trouble.

"I think for the most part, the TRED members are sincere in their desires to just not have the area disturbed at all, to keep the rural agribusiness-oriented lifestyle and low density of residental units -

everything that goes along with rural lifestyle. And they have the typical concerns of probably running taxes up, and lots of new people and cars on the highway, and having to worry about their kids."

Seven houses would be submerged when the waters immerse the twocounty area, and more than 700,000 Tarrant County-area water-users would be digging deep into their pock-

ets for the project. "My mother's house will get to stay," Breithaupt said, "but water will be within 100 feet of her door. If she had wanted a house on a lake, she would have built it. But now they're

bringing it to her."
Hilliard said the water district has satisfactorily worked out relocation processes with those who would be forced to move.


But Breithaupt said that even though his family wouldn't be uprooted, the fair market value he receives for his land couldn't hope to match the intrinsic value it holds for a rancher.

"What I have left will be split up in about seven pieces and I'll only have one sizeable block of 1,200 acres left," he said. "It's hard to make 1,200 acres economically self-sufficient. But ranching has been by sole support and it was my father's."

About 40 TRED members caravaned to Austin to present evidence to the Texas Water Commission during a two-day hearing on the reservoir, Breithaupt said, but the commission refused to listen to most of it.

"They didn't want to hear it," he said. "Those people are on a first name basis. They all know each other and it's hard to get your foot in the door. I'm not saying anything illegal is going on. I just mean they don't want to hear what we have to say."







#### Chinese call halt to artistic freedom

PEKING (AP) - The Chinese Com- the Communist Party, the superiority munist Party called a halt to artistic of socialism, the dictatorship of the freedom today and pilloried a promiproletariat and Marxism-Leninism nent writer for a story that indirectly criticizes China's leaders and satirizes the worship of Mao Tse-tung.

The Peking Daily published a scathing attack on writer Bai Hua for his story "Unrequited Love." It was made into a controversial film "The Sun and the Man" which has been withheld from public showing. Chinese sources who asked not to be identified said the authorities ordered 22 revisions in it.

The article, which was reprinted from the army's Liberation Daily, said Bai Hau's work shows he is "antagonistic to the party and the people" and violates the four principles of communism and socialism: acknowledgment of the leadership of Mao thought

Chinese sources reported some army intellectuals wanted to expel the writer from the Communist Party, but the party's Central Committee refused.

"Unrequited Love" is the story of an artist who returns to China to help in the development of his country but is persecuted to death during the 1966-76 Cultural Revolution. His last footprints form a question mark.

Bai Hau, who is about 51, has been one of China's most controversial writers. He was persecuted as a rightist in 1957. In November 1979 he addressed a conference of writers and complained about the party's restric tions on artistic freedom.



West, superintendent of the North East School District in San Antonio, after U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice denied a state's request to delay a court-implemented bilingual education program for Texas public schools. Larry Ascough, director of communications for

the Dallas schools, said the shortage of certified bilingual teachers is so severe that "even if we hired all the teachers coming out of the Texas colleges, there wouldn't be enough for the Dallas district.'



## Refugee resettlement camp quiet

FORT CHAFFEE, Ark. (AP) - A Cuban refugee resettlement camp here was quiet today after a weekend of violence apparently sparked by frustration at long detention and the shooting of a refugee by a security officer, authorities said.

More than 40 people were injured and three cars burned in the two weekend incidents, according to federal officials.

Charlie Hughes, a spokesman for Cuban-Haitian Task Force here, said several refugees celebrated the end of the disturbances Sunday by "going around shaking hands with the ... officers.

"They're beating drums, singing and chanting," he said.

Officials said the incidents began Saturday afternoon when Federal Protective Service Officer Ray J. Barnes shot a refugee, Jose Mariron, 22, who allegedly was attacking another refugee with a homemade machete. Padron turned on Barnes with the weapon, Hughes said.

Barnes has been relieved of his duties pending an investigation, Hughes said. Padron was in stable condition Sunday.

After the shooting, three bands of between 30 and 40 refugees roamed the compound, threw rocks at security officers and military police and overturned seven federal cars, burning three, Hughes said.

Officers used tear gas to turn back refugees who stormed a gate leading out of the compound and evacuated the base of 50 to 100 civilians.

Sunday morning, about 100 Cubans protested the detention of a fellow refugee whom authorities were holding for breaking curfew. Task Force public information officer Mike Sweeney said some of the refugees tossed a few rocks across a fence at military officers. He said he knew of no injuries or damage.

Hughes said the Cubans had turned in the names of five men allegedly involved in the Saturday night riot. The men were detained but no charges filed immediately.

According to Sweeney, many of the compound's 2,700 refugees were frustrated because they have not been relocated, as have most of their 127,-000 countrymen who came to America in the "Freedom Flotilla" a year

'We're dealing with people who've been rejected by one country in a sense, and now they're beginning to wonder if they're being rejected by another." Sweeney said

Camp Director Barbara Lawson went on closed circuit television Sunday to tell the refugees that any future disturbances would reduce their chances of placement. But she said in an interview that officials were well within the timetable to close the camp by August.

All 120 FPS officers assigned to Fort Chaffee were called in to assist in the riot control Saturday, Hughes said. Bill Howard, a spokesman for the task force, said about 120 military police were also assigned at the

Howard said many of the refugees involved in the rioting are violent and can't get along with people.

"Those people have been confined, some since last May," Howard said. 'That puts the frustration level pretty

Sweeney said 97 percent of the refugees at the base were males between 18 and 35 years old, had no relatives in the United States, were poorly educated and had poor English language and job skills.

'They're frustrated and tired of being in the compound, and we do have some troubled people." Sweeney said. "We have a number of sociopaths, people who just don't agree with society."

charged. He wrote Milton Socolar, acting U.S. comptroller general, last month asking for an investigation. Collins' office was informed late this past week that the General Accounting Office has begun an inves-

The Republican congressman told GAO he had learned of active representation of illegal aliens by:

- Al Campos and Barbara Belejak, employees of the Dallas Legal Services Foundation, in matters involving the Immigration and Naturalization Service;

- Yolanda Ayala, an attorney with West Texas Legal Services of Fort Worth:

- Edward Juddenham of Texas Rural Legal Aid, Inc., in a suit against law enforcement officers in Hereford and Deaf Smith County; and

- East Texas Legal Services, Inc., particularly through its participation in a recent suit involving the right of chidlren of aliens to attend Texas public schools

'These actions are in direct violation of federal law, and this waste of public funds must be stopped. While the entire federal government is trying to cut back, ex-

penditures in violation of the law cannot be to-lerated," Collins said.





## Supreme Court overturns ruling on mentally retarded

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congress has not given mentally retarded persons a legal right to be treated in settings that are the "least restrictive to personal liberty," the Supreme Court ruled today.

By a 6-3 vote, the justices overturned a federal appeals court ruling that would have required the transfer of most of the more than 1,000 patients at Pennsylvania's Pennhurst State School and Hospital.

Interpreting a section of the federal Developmentally Disabled Assistance and Bill of Rights Act, the court said, "We find nothing in the act or its legislative history to suggest that Congress intended to require the states to assume the high cost of providing 'appropriate treatment' in the least restrictive environment to their mentally retarded citizens.'

The high court, however, stopped short of stating that mentally retarded persons have no constitutional right to such treatment.

The justices also left unresolved another important question: whether such patients have the legal right to sue state officials in attempts to force them to comply with conditions required under the

Writing for the court's majority Justice William H. Rehnquist agreed that Section 6010 of the federal act created no legal right for mental patients to be treated, when possible, in neighborhood settings rather than in institutions such as

"We are persuaded that Section 6010 . . . does no more than express a congressional preference for certain kinds of treatment," Rehnquist said.

His opinion was joined by Chief Justice Warren E. Burger and Justices Potter Stewart, Lewis F. Powell and John Paul Stevens. Justice Harry A. Blackmun filed a separate opinion agreeing in the

Justices Byron R. White, William J. Brennan and Thurgood Marshall

In an opinion authored by White, they said, "Section 6010 cannot be treated as only wishful thinking on the part of Congress or as playing some fanciful role in the implementation of the act. The section clearly states rights which the developmentally disabled are to be provided as

against a participating state." The disputed section of the act

"Persons with developmental disabilities have a right to appropriate treatment, services and rehabilitation for such disabilities."

-"The treatment . . . should be designed to maximize the developmental potential and should be provided in the setting that is least restrictive of the person's liberty."

"The federal government and the states both have an obligation to assure that public funds are not provided to any institution" that does not provide appropriate services and treatment.

Rehnquist's opinion noted that Section 6010 of the act, unlike other sections, lacks wording that specifically cuts off federal aid for non-compliance.

Terri Lee Halderman, a Pennhurst resident, sued the institution in 1974. She charged that she and other patients were forced to live in inhumane and dangerous conditions.

Named as defendants were the institution itself, located in the Philadelphia suburb of Spring City, Pa.; state officials in charge of its operations; and five counties -Bucks, Chester, Delaware, Philadelphia and Montgomery from which persons are admitted to

The justices, citing a lack of jurisdiction, turned down an effort by General Atomic Co. to overturn rulings that it reaped huge, illicit windfalls from price increases orchestrated by an international cartel joined by Gulf Oil.

Today's action marked the fifth time General Atomic appealed to the Supreme Court in its six-year battle to avoid responsibility for the results of the cartel's actions.

Courts in New Mexico never got to judge all the evidence about General Atomic for themselves because, they concluded, General Atomic, Gulf and the Canadian government cooperated to withhold key evidence.

A state trial judge in Santa Fe, accusing General Atomic of "the utmost bad faith," drew his own conclusions assessing damages and contract performance which may cost the firm more than \$1 billion.

That decision was affirmed by the New Mexico Supreme Court in a 205page opinion.

Several other damage suits stemming from revelation of the uranium cartel are wending their separate ways through the courts.

As the New Mexico courts reconstructed it, this case had its roots in contracts of 1973 and 1974 when United Nuclear Corp., a uranium producer, agreed to sell 27 million pounds of uranium oxide, a semi-processed fuel base, to General Atomic at stated prices.

General Atomic, in turn, had contracts to sell uranium fuel to various utilities including Indiana and Michigan Electric Co.

Meanwhile, in secrecy, General Atomic's parent Gulf Oil allegedly was participating in a conspiracy of uranium-producing companies in Canada, France, South Africa and Australia to limit production and

drive up prices, apparently with the approval of those governments.

From 1972, when the cartel apparently began, to 1975 when these lawsuits were filed, the price of uranium oxide soared from about \$6 a pound to about \$40 a pound, and kept on rising.

In 1975, General Atomic was paying United Nuclear a contract price of \$7.50 a pound for uranium which it could resell at market prices around

At the same time, General Atomic stopped delivering uranium fuel at old contract prices to Indiana and Michigan Electric after providing

only half of a 3.4 million-pound order it owed the utility.

United Nuclear sued in 1975 to break its contract with General Atomic, charging it was being victimized by a price-fixing conspiracy.

General Atomic counter-sued for enforcement of the low-priced contract, and then dragged the electric company into the lawsuit.

General Atomic's lawyers said that if the court tears up United's contract to sell 27 million pounds of uranium oxide to General Atomic, it should also tear up General's contract to deliver the remaining 1.7 million pounds it owed the utility.



## Tuberculin test believed to be outdated as screening process

reason we don't have screening tests for tuberculosis the way we used to? There seem to be mass screenings for a number of other diseases, such as for high blood pressure, but not for tuberculosis. Isn't it considered important any more? - Don

Dear Don: Some physicians believe that the tuberculin test is no longer appropriate as a screening procedure, but should only be used on an individual basis when a patient is suspected of having the disease. There are two reasons for this change in approach? First, the incidence of tuberculosis today is so low that the cost of widespread screening outweighs its benefits. Second, the test is not conclusive — that is, a negative test does not exclude the possibility that a patient has tuberculosis, and a positive test does not necessarily indi-

cate an active infection.

Dear Dr. Solomon: Our neighborhood pharmacist offered to fill a prescription for my father with a less expensive generic drug rather than a brand-name drug; however, my father refused the substitute until he could check with his doctor. I told my father that I thought he was being unnecessarily cautious, but he replied that he was just being careful. Do you feel that his refusal to accept a substitute until he could check with his doctor was unusual? - Mr. T.V.

Dear Mr. V.: At least one study suggests that your father's caution was rather typical. A recent survey in Florida showed that two-thirds of the patients questioned said they would not accept their pharmacists' advice about substituting a generic for a brand-name drug without first checking with their doctor. Among elderly people who were interviewed, 80 percent said they would first want to

obtain their doctor's approval.

Dear Dr. Solomon: My question is simple and yet terribly complicated. I have been married for three years and would like to start a family; that seems simple enough. My problem is that I am on anticonvulsant medicaion, and I'm concerned that this may have an effect on the child during my pregnancy. Do you know if this is so? Mrs. A.H. Dear Mrs. H.: I wish I could be

completely reassuring and tell you that you have nothing to worry about, but that would not be honest. I must tell you that some studies have shown a higher-than-average number of birth defects in women who took anticonvulsant medication during pregnancy. Bear in mind, however, that the overwhelming majority who take such medication give birth to normal

In addition, I don't believe that this one factor should deter you from your desire to have a family. There is some evidence that the possibility of damage to the fetus is related to the dose and plasma levels of the drugs, particularly during the first trimester of pregnancy. Your obstetrician and the doctor who is currently treating you might be able to adjust the dose so as to minimize the risk to the fetus.

## Lead-footed Nevada legislators like new speeding law

CARSON CITY, Nev. — They've taken some of the sting out of speeding here in jackrabbit country, and for hard-driving, gas-guzzling Nevada legislators like "Old Leadfoot," the thrill of driving may be coming

Old Leadfoot - state Sen. Jim Gibson - earned his nickname before Nevada bowed to federal pressure in 1973 and adopted a 55 mph limit on the straightedge highways that cut

through the Nevada sagebrush. Be-fore 1973, there was no speed limit on open roads.

Gibson said the 55 mph limit made him angry. "I can't stand driving 55 miles an hour," he said.

But on Tuesday Gov. Bob List signed a measure relaxing penalties for driving between 55 mph and 70 mph. Now there's only a \$5 "energy wasting" fine - not a traffic violation - for driving within that range. Pre-

viously, there was an average fine of \$2 for each mile per hour over 55 and the violation was part of the driver's

traffic record. The vote in favor of the measure was overwhelming in both houses of the Nevada legislature - 36-4 in the Assembly and 13-4 in the Senate.

Assemblyman Bob Price said he was "tickled to death" about the new law. Price said he has "always consistently exceeded" the 55 mph limit,

with the help of a radar detector. Assemblyman Marion Bennett, a Methodist minister with a white Mercedes, said Price is the "real speed

demon" in the lower house. But Price, a North Las Vegas Democrat, said he doesn't deserve the reputation as the fastest accelerator in the West. At least not nowadays. He's "reformed."

"Me a speed demon?" Price asked. "I was going over Goldfield Summit about four years ago, when I was fast, and was doing about 110 — and he (Bennett) passed me."

Bennett, who said he sometimes drives his Mercedes at speeds over 110 mph, admitted, "I normally drive pretty fast myself."

"It's wide open and there's nothing out there — so why not?" he asked. The 55 mph limit was imposed after the federal government threatened to cancel highway-construction funds.

The Nevada "energy wasting" law is modeled on a law passed in Montana in 1974. Nevada is the second state with such a measure on the books.

Although there had been a growing movement to relax speeding laws in Nevada, some said the real push came after the Reagan administration announced it expected to take no action against states that reduced the penalty for violations of the 55 mph

IF MARTIN couldn't get pumped up about the A's record-breaking accomplishment, however, baseball purists can. Their blazing start surpassed the accomplishments of the 1955 Brooklyn Dodgers, the 1962 Pittsburgh Pirates and the 1966 Cleveland Indians, all of whom won 10 in a row at the start of their respective seasons. 
