



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

"Too old" and "too frail" are not, in and of themselves, reasons to prohibit physical activity. In fact, there aren't very many health reasons to keep older adults from becoming more active.

Contrary to traditional thinking, regular exercise helps, not hurts, most older adults. Older people become sick or disabled more often from NOT exercising than from exercising. Those who have chronic diseases, or risk factors for them, may actually improve with regular exercise, but should check with their doctor before increasing their physical activity.

If you plan to work your way up to a vigorous level, check with your doctor first if you are a man over 40 or a woman over 50.

The bold move was set in motion by technical factors and continued strong weekly export shipments that contributed to the bullish sentiment of the market.

Shipments for the week ended March 14 were impressive at 237,400 bales with Turkey, Thailand and Mexico as the main destinations, according to USDA. Meanwhile, net export sales of U. S. cotton for the same week totaled 77,200 bales. Hong Kong, Bangladesh and Thailand were the featured buyers.

"Export sales were routinely good," one cotton analyst said. "However, shipments continue at a terrific pace and are well above that needed to reach USDA'S target for the season," he added.

The spot market also was healthy as online sales of cotton by Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers in the week ended March 21 totaled 20,307 bales compared to the previous week's 18,068 bale total. Prices received by growers selling their cotton online ranged from 27,307 bales compared to the previous week's 18,068 bale total. Prices received by growers selling their cotton online ranged from 27.08 to 30.68 cents per pound compared to a range of 27.40 to 28.84 cents per pound the prior week.

Thursday, online cotton sales surged to 10,737 bales, the largest daily total since January 8, 2002. The same day, the average price received by producers reached 30.68 cents per pound, the highest since Decembe 3, 2001. Industry observers attributed the boom to a widening gap between the adjusted world price (AWP) and futures prices which gave producers with "upper end cotton" a chance to sell at a price where they could receive some equity.

In other news, cotton traders will be watching for the latest developments out of Washington on a farm bill in an effort to ascertain whether the final measure will be supportive or hurtful for prices. The legislation is important due to its potential to influence the number of acres producers will plant to cotton this year.


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
