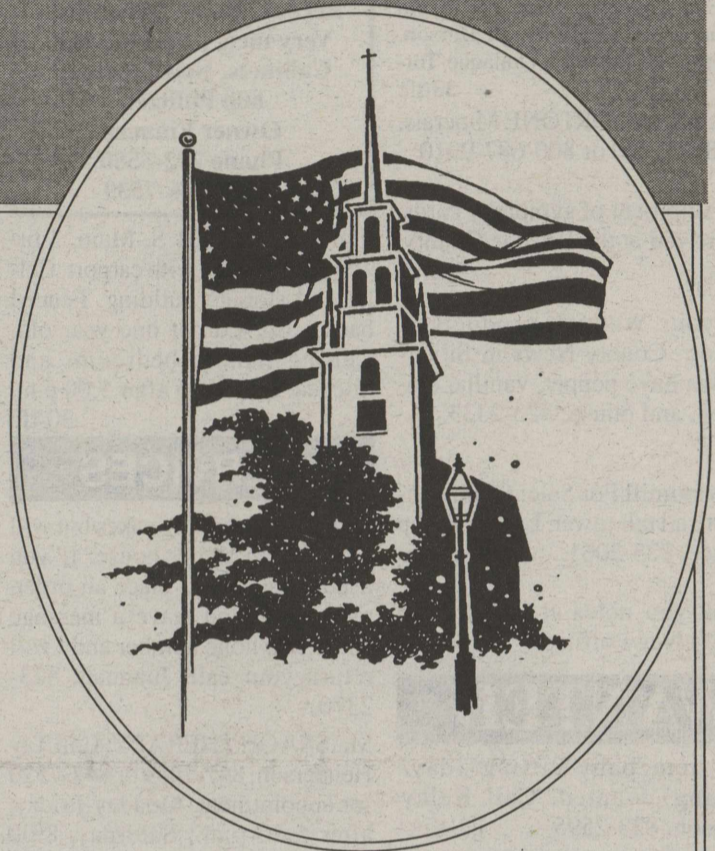

The 48th Annual Tax Assessor-Collector Association of Texas Conference was held in Fort Worth at The Green Oaks Hotel June 8-13. Theme for the conference was "Professionalism With Character, Through Communication and Education." Taking part was Briscoe County Tax Assessor-Collector Betty Ann Stephens.

Discussions covered a wide range of topics, including Secretary of State panel discussions, Texas on Line, GASB 34, Texas Parks & Wildlife Training, Truth in Taxation State Workshop, and round table discussions on motor vehicles and property taxes. Those attending the conference received CEUs.

The motivational speaker was Bob Ash, Life Lessons Seminars, Indianapolis, Indiana. His topic was "Great Tax Assessor-Collectors Always Wear Clean Underwear." Some highlights from the speaker were that what your mother and father taught you all those years go still apply today. Integrity, character, honesty are the ingredients for moral and ethical underwear. Mr. Ash wanted each one who heard him to know that one person can reach out to one person and so on and really make a difference.

Recordbooks are like journals—they're a way to keep track of what you do and when you do it. 4-H'ers can develop great organization and bookkeeping skills from completing a recordbook. Also, to win some awards, 4-H'ers are required to have completed a recordbook.

Breakfast is Key to Achieving Nutrition

Baylor Pediatrics Professor Theresa Nickles says teens who eat breakfast are more likely to consume a majority of the Recommended Dietary Allowance of several vitamins and nutrients. Of particular concern are calcium, magnesium, riboflavin, folacin, phosphorous, iron and vitamins A, B6 and D. Other vitamins and minerals as well as protein and carbohydrates are also higher in those eating a healthy breakfast. Also, fat consumption is lower. Breakfast consumption has declined in the past quarter century. Nickles says parents should encourage breakfast consumption to improve the nutritional well-being of adolescents.

Healthy Dessert: Peaches, Phytochemicals

Peaches may have more health benefits than previously believed. Horticulture specialist David Byrne believes new varieties of the fruit will yield greater amounts of cancer-fighting antioxidants and other phytochemicals. Consumers are becoming more health conscious and want fruit with more health benefits. Currently, peaches have "good" to "excellent" antioxidant activity, some antimicrobial activity, and potential for use as a natural food colorant. Also, they rank high in certain types of phytochemicals and have good to excellent antioxidant activity. Work is ongoing to increase the peach's health benefits and flavor. New varieties that may be in grocery stores in coming years include the Tropic Prince, TexKing and TexPrince.

Cotton Market weekly

A Service Provided by Plains Cotton Cooperative Association

The May cotton consumption report and the weekly export sales report provided little fundamental support for the market. The release of USDA's planted acreage survey on Friday provided no surprises and was deemed neutral by the industry.

According to the Census Bureau, U. S. Mills consumed an average of 30,937 bales of cotton per day during the four-week reporting period ended May 25. Daily use proved to be 3.8 percent above the revised April rate of 29,816 bales, against a normal in-

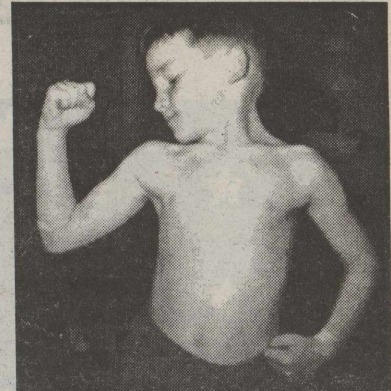
crease of approximately 1.3 percent, but only because the agency surprisingly lowered April consumption from the provisional 30,550 bales reported a month ago. Annualized consumption, based on the May report, suggests an offtake of slightly more than 7.7 million bales, which compares with the USDA's current forecast of 7.6 million.

The report was a disappointment as the figure was at the bottom of industry expectations. Analysts had anticipated a mild bounce in consumption, calling for a figure between 7.7 million and 7.8 million bales from the originally estimated 7.67 million in April.

Meanwhile, USDA's weekly

export sales report showed net upland sales for the current crop totaled 19,900 bales in the week ended June 20. The figure was down 69 percent from the week earlier and 60 percent below the four-week average. Net sales for delivery in 2002-03 totaled 78,400 bales, while shipments reached 218,000 bales, up 15 percent from the four-week average. For the fourth consecutive reporting period, Mexico and Turkey were the main recipients of U. S. cotton.

Based on the cotton export figures for the week ended June 20, USDA's official estimate for 2001-02 crop shipments of 10.5 million bales should be exceeded by July 31.

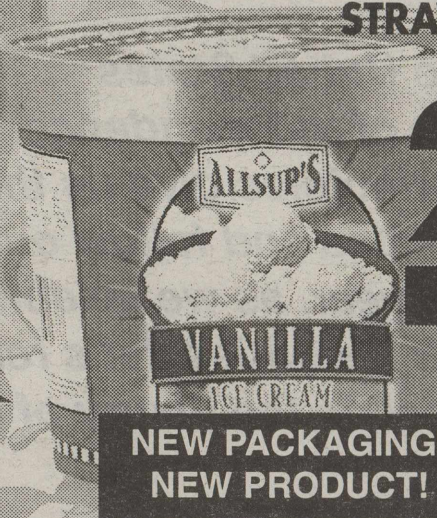

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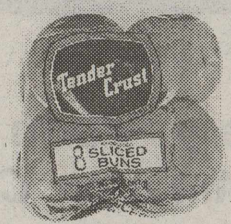

West Nile Virus Found in Harris Co.

Texas' first case of West Nile Virus has been reported in Houston. Although Texans should be alert, there is no need to panic. Most infected people do not feel any of the mild symptoms associated with the virus. Those who do may experience fever, headache, body aches, and skin rashes.

Less than 1% of those infected will develop further illness, such as meningitis or encephalitis. In order to reduce the chance of infection, precautions such as going outside during the brighter times of the day or wearing protective clothing and insect repellent should be taken.

Around the home, get rid of mosquito breeding sites such as long-standing water. Maintain window screens and be sure to have weather stripping around exterior doors. The use of yellow-colored outside lighting also helps prevent mosquito bites.

Researcher Studies Cancer Prevention

In the past, links between healthy lifestyle and dietary habits have been linked to preventing heart disease. Texas A&M graduate student Laura Bancroft's research has shown similar links may prevent cancer.

Two major contributing factors connected to various types of cancer are cigarette smoke and nutrition. The type or source of dietary fat is important as well. Bancroft used rat models to perform tests.

One group was fed corn oil as its fat source for two weeks, while the other was given fish oil. Both were given drinking water containing a chemical which increases oxidant generation in the intestines.

The fish oil was found to reduce oxidative DNA damage in the intestine and promoted the deletion of cells with DNA damage in the colon. In short, deep, cold-water fish such as salmon and mackerel should be increased in the diet. Vegetable oils such as corn oil, sunflower seeds, cottonseed and soybeans should be decreased. Both of those help in preventing colon cancer.
