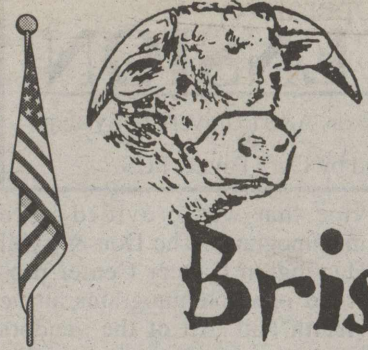

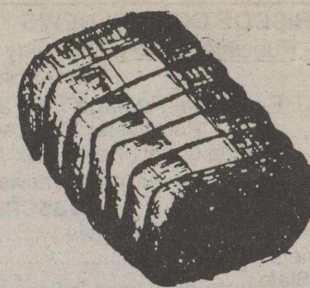

Voters across the area have the opportunity to mark their ballots early, selecting their choice for a state Senate seat and 19 constitutional amendments.

Early voting began Monday and ends November 2, and takes place in local county courthouses during normal business hours.

The District 30 Senate seat up for election came as a result of the July 12 death of Tom Haywood, R-Wichita Falls. The term expires in

January 2003. District 30 includes Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Cottle, Donley, Floyd, Hall, Hardeman, Motley, Swisher and Wheeler counties.

On the ballot are Republicans Craig Estes of Wichita Falls; Harry Reynolds of Sherman; Doug Jeffrey of Vernon and Kirk Wilson of Sherman; Independent Rick Bunch of Wichita Falls, and Democrat Greg L. Underwood of Bowie.

Traps Still Needed During Harvest

Cotton harvest is underway in much of the High Plains and Rolling Plains, and some growers may believe the boll weevil traps around their fields are no longer needed.

In some cases growers have been removing the traps that surround their fields, possibly because they believe the traps interfere with their harvesting equipment or because their fields have been harvested.

"Because the traps are very effective in eliminating boll weevils, especially as the weevil populations are reduced to low levels, leaving functional traps in the vicinity of cotton fields helps the eradication program eliminate weevils more quickly and at a lower cost to growers," said Charles Allen, program director.

If the traps are interfering with harvest, growers should contact their field unit supervisors to determine a new placement for the traps, Allen said. The supervisors will work with growers to move the traps so they don't interfere with operations.

Traps that have been taken down should be replaced as soon as possible after the fields have been harvested, he said. Foundation personnel will be happy to assist with replacing the traps.

Growers may contact their field unit supervisors or their district office for more information.

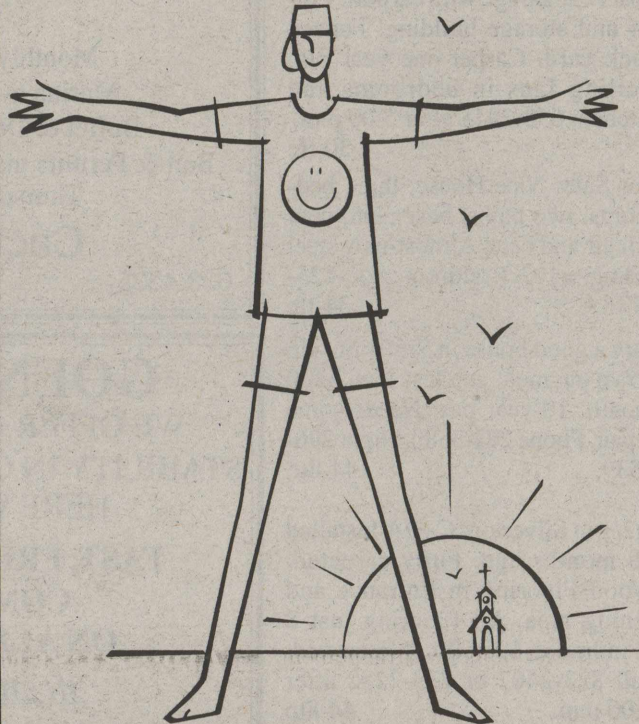

Letter to the Editor

I wanted to write to inform the readers of the *Briscoe County News* of the opportunity we have coming up in the November 6 election. There are several propositions up for vote in this election, but possibly none more important for those of us living near, using, and appreciating a state park than Proposition 8.

Proposition 8 would authorize the largest bond issue in Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPW) history, up to \$100 million over the next six years for repairs and improvements at state parks, wildlife management areas and fish hatcheries across the state. This \$100 million would be used for three things specifically. First, it would provide \$15 million to address the remaining critical repair backlog identified by TPW in the 1990's. Next, it would provide \$8 to \$10 million per year for preventative maintenance to ensure that these sites don't fall behind again. And lastly, it would fund a few new projects focused on urban youth outreach.

Proposition 8 includes \$850 million in general bond obligation bonding authority for 13 state agencies. The ballot language may be confusing because it does not mention any of the state agencies that will benefit from the passage of this bond. Here is how the ballot will read: *"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$850 million in bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for construction and repair projects and for the purchase of needed equipment."*

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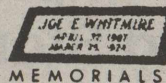

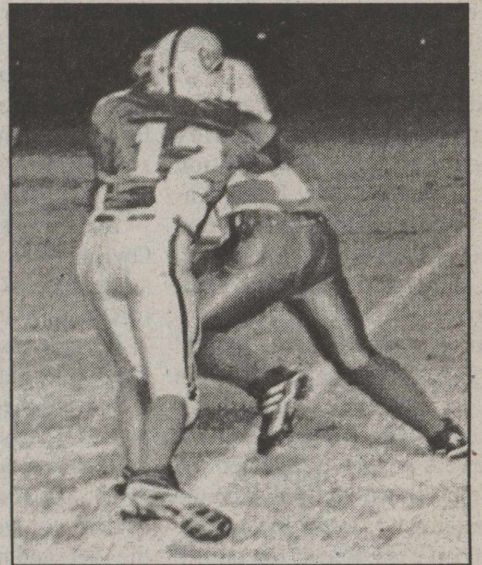
