This collection belongs to Gene and Phyllis Williams of Hollis, Oklahoma. It started out with approximately 250 nativity sets, but has grown to 550. They range in size from 1/4 inch to four feet, and originate in the Philippines made of straw, pewter, to well-known makers such as Fenton, Lladro, Goebel, Hummel, hand-carved olive wood from the Holy Land, etc. The Williams started collecting in 1973. They come from as far away as Egypt, China, Italy and some beautiful American Indian creations from Oklahoma. The nativity sets fill numerous shelves with the more fragile and expensive encased in glass.

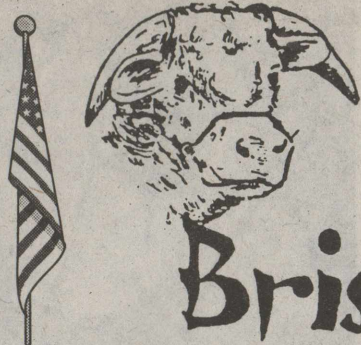
The Texas Education Agency has implemented a program, effective August 12, 2001, to award high school diplomas to eligible World War II veterans. This program acknowledges the service of those who left high school before graduation to serve in World War II.

Under Texas Education code 28.0251, an eligible veteran is one who:

- a. is an honorably discharged member of the armed forces of the United States;
- b. was scheduled to graduate from high school after 1940 and before 1951; and
- c. left high school before graduation to serve in World War II.

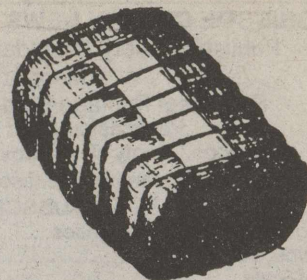

Estes, Underwood Will Vie For State Senate Seat Dec. 4

A runoff election on December 4 will decide who will represent Texas Senate District 30 for the rest of the term of the late Senator Tom Haywood, and the candidates are Republican Craig Estes and Democrat Greg Underwood.

A special election was held on November 6 to elect a state senator to fill Haywood's unexpired term. Of the six candidates on the November 6 ballot, Estes was favored with 49.3% of the vote while Underwood finished second with 20.9%.

Since no candidate won a majority in the special election, the top two vote-getters will square off in a runoff election on Tuesday, December 4. Polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. that day.

Briscoe County voting precincts have been combined for the upcoming State Senate District 30 runoff election scheduled for December 4, 2001.

Voting precincts 1, 3, 4 and 5 will be voting in the Pioneer Room at City Bank in Silverton and voting precincts 2 and 6 will vote at the Community Center in Quitaque.

Early voting by personal appearance will begin November 26 and continue through November 30 in the office of County & District Clerk Bena Hester in the Briscoe County Courthouse.

The winner of the special election will serve until January 2003, and a legislative session isn't planned unless Governor Rick Perry calls a special session.

District 30 includes the counties of Archer, Armstrong, Baylor, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Clay, part of Collin, Collinworth,

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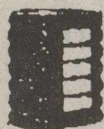

Beet Armyworms: What Do They Really Want?

South Texas producers face their share of crop pests. The beet armyworm is currently on their "least-wanted list." USDA scientists are following the pest's tracks, looking at clues to help control them. One important new clue is that beet armyworms grow bigger when they eat pigweed than when they eat cotton plants. The findings suggest pigweed might have an effective role in diverting some of the armyworms from cotton. It is believed that an abundance of pigweed will decrease damaging outbreaks of armyworms in cotton. The pest will move to its preferred host of pigweed and stay away from cotton.



Orders Being Taken For Windbreak Trees

Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District is once again taking orders for windbreak trees. All varieties of evergreens are \$2.50; hardwoods are \$1.50. Larger trees of both varieties are available from a new source this year. Call for more information on these.

A limited number of wildlife seedling packets for quail, deer, pheasant, and turkey also are available for farmstead plantings. Each wildlife packet contains 100 trees and is available for \$75.00 per packet.

Minimum orders are required on windbreak seedlings, but the Natural Resource Conservation Service will work to try to get what you need. There is a smaller minimum on the larger trees available. Order early as many of the more popular varieties sell out fast.

Windbreaks properly located and containing the right tree species will provide wind and snow protection for farm homesteads as well as livestock. Living windbreaks also provide nesting places for small insect-eating birds as well as food and cover for numerous High Plains game birds. Windbreaks for shelter or wildlife habitat are permitted under CRP contracts.

Advanced planning is very important for the successful establishment or renovation of windbreaks. The installation of a drip irrigation for windbreak establishment is highly recommended.

Technical assistance is available from the Natural Resource Conservation Service in planning and designing your windbreak, drip irrigation systems, and windbreak management. Drip irrigation systems and information on installation are available through the Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District.

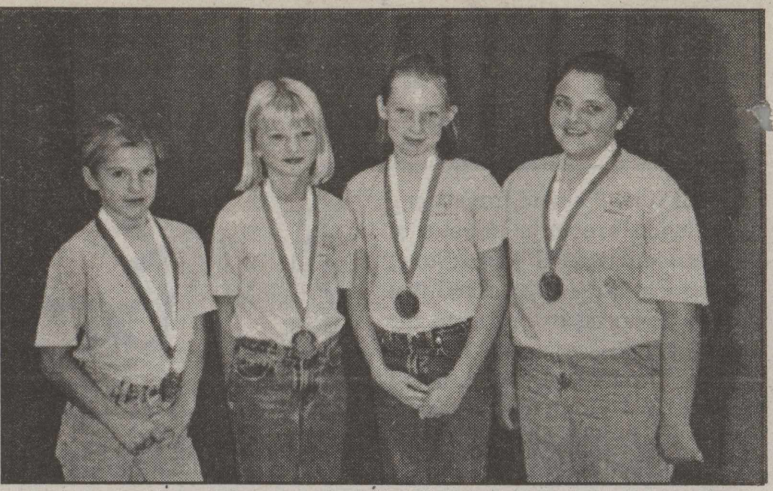

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Pheasant Forecast

The pheasant season opens Saturday, December 8, and continues through December 23, and features a slight increase in pheasant numbers according to recent roadside surveys conducted by Texas Parks & Wildlife Department (TPWD).

Pheasant roadside surveys are conducted annually in the Texas Panhandle during October and November. This year 43 roadside surveys were conducted across the Panhandle and results showed an average of 13 birds per route compared to 11 birds per route last year. Charlie Newberry, TPWD Wildlife Biologist, predicts a fair hunting season. "Pheasant numbers appear to be higher this year, so hunters should expect better success than last year," Newberry states.

"The highest concentrations of birds appears to be in Deaf Smith, Hansford and Sherman counties,"

Newberry said. Several counties such as Castro, Swisher, Randall and Carson are showing a higher number of birds than their 5-year survey average, according to Newberry.

The up and down change in peasant numbers that landowners and sportsmen hve been experiencing can be attributed to the availability of quality hbitat, amount and timing of precipitation and land management practices. Precipitation at the right time promotes the growth of grasses, weeds, seeds and insects, which are essential for feeding, nesting, protective cover, and rearing of young birds. Areas that consistently have healthy pheasant populations ar areas that are near weedy playa lake edges and basins, weedy field borders, weedy roadside ditches, edges of grain sorghum fields, shelter belts and CRP land.

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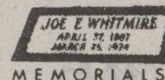
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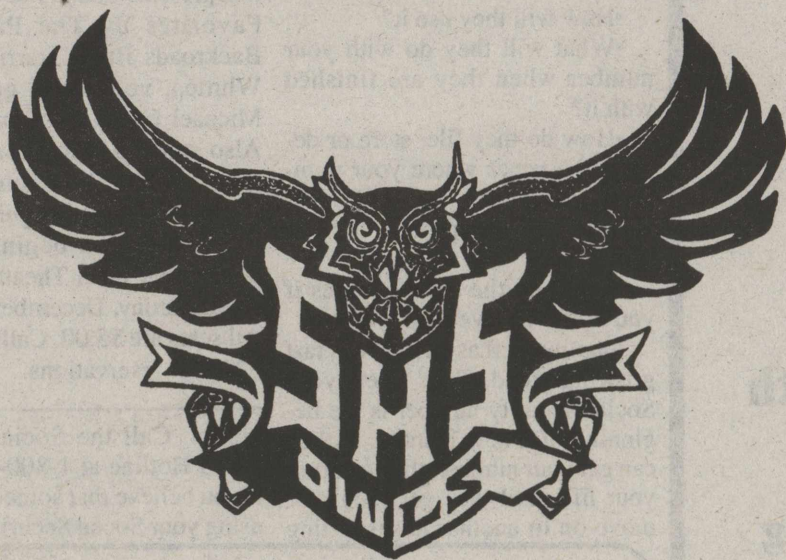

Cotton Market weekly

A flurry of switching and rolling positions in anticipation of first notice day for December deliveries dominated cotton futures trading in the shortened, three-day trading week ahead of the Thanksgiving holiday, as the market consolidated recent strong gains in a largely sideways pattern.

Market attention now is focused on the National Cotton Council's annualized domestic cotton consumption figures for October and revised September data that were set for release on Wednesday, Nov. 28.

"Imports of textiles and apparel have slowed, but the bleeding of the U. S. textile industry appears to have shown no visible signs of clotting," one analyst said. Huge losses in U. S. textile and apparel jobs totaling 118,000 were reported this year alone.

Cotton textile and apparel imports during September declined six percent from a year ago. The slowdown could ease competitive pressures on domestic mills if it continues, analysts say, but it probably reflects a weak retail environment. Domestic use during October generally is expected to show little improvement from the preliminary estimate at a seasonally adjusted annualized rate of 7.8 million bales in September.

However, as reported earlier, retail sales at clothing stores surged a seasonally adjusted 6.9 percent during October compared with a 5.9 percent plunge in September. The rebound, though attributed to heavy discounting and despite doubts about whether it could be

sustained, revived hopes that mill consumption might increase later this season amid signs of an improving U. S. economy. However, some U. S. textile mills planned to take off up to seven days and more for the Thanksgiving holiday.

On the farm front, U. S. producers continue completing the final stages of this year's cotton harvest with the work now 86 percent complete as of November 18, according to weekly USDA data. The figure is up from 80 percent one week ago and ahead of the 81 percent average at the same time last year.

The harvest essentially is finished in Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi and Missouri. Among the states where work is lagging its usual pace, Alabama's harvest is now 80 percent complete, up from 65 percent the previous week, but below the 89 percent average. In most other key growing areas, work continues to progress ahead of schedule.

USDA reported Texas producers had 77 percent of their cotton out of the field as of November 18, however, the figure could be significantly higher in the coming weeks. A hard freeze was reported in some areas of the Texas High and Rolling Plains this week. Many growers on the northern Rolling Plains who have been awaiting a killing freeze likely will commence harvesting in about two weeks. More seasonable temperatures are in the near-term forecast which will help saturated land to dry.
