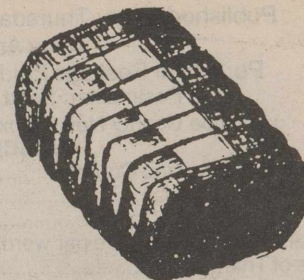

Cotton Turn-Row Meeting Set For August 14

A Cotton Turn-Row Meeting will be held on Tuesday, August 14, 2001, from 10:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon at one of Brad Ziegler's cotton circles.

The circle of cotton is located one mile east on Highway 145 from Highway 207 and one-half mile south on the first county road, then right on the next county road to the east.

There are four circles of cotton and the meeting will be located at the third circle on your left.

Texas Agricultural Extension Service will have an Integrated Pest Management Agent there and the Boll Weevil Foundation also will have representatives there to discuss insect problems, spray timing, cotton failure, and some scouting techniques.

There will be two CEU's offered (1-IMP, 1-General) at this meeting.

This will be an excellent opportunity to have several questions answered about the fall diapause program.

Walk Across Texas Destination Will Be on South Padre Island

South Padre, Texas is the chosen destination for *Walk Across Texas* participants to strive for. It is approximately 750 miles from Briscoe County to South Padre Island. To reach South Padre in eight weeks, each *Walk Across Texas* team member (in teams of eight) would have to walk only 1.7 miles per day.

If any bikers (including stationary) are interested in joining *Walk Across Texas*, you may either have

a biking team of four or be on a team of eight and count only half of your total miles.

Come join us on August 20 at 6:00 p.m. at the Briscoe County Courthouse for the kickoff of *Walk Across Texas*. We'll hand out all the mileage logs and information you need. We'll also have a silliest team name and poster contest, door prizes, snacks, and we'll all walk our first mile together.

School Zone Safety Emphasized

More than 23 million students across the country make their journey to school via buses every year, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is reminding motorists to do their part in helping to increase safety around school zones by using extreme caution when approaching a loading or unloading school bus.

According to Texas law, a mo-

torist can be cited for failure to yield to a school bus with flashing red lights, which indicates children are boarding or exiting the bus. This fine could cost the motorist between \$200 and \$1,000.

To increase safety, TxDOT offers motorists the following tips:

•Slow down. Always obey the speed limit when traveling through neighborhoods and school zones.

•Be attentive. Watch for children gathering near bus stops and walking in the street, especially where there are no sidewalks.

•Remain alert. Hurried children may dart into the street without looking for traffic.

•Flashing yellow lights indicate a school bus is preparing to stop to load or unload children. Motorists should be prepared to slow down and stop.

•Flashing red lights or an extended "STOP" arm indicate children are loading or unloading a school bus. Motorists must stop.

•Vehicles can begin moving again when the flashing red lights are turned off or the extended "STOP" arm is withdrawn.

•Motorists traveling on roads separated by a median are not required to stop for school buses traveling on the opposite side of the road.

"By keeping these tips in mind, motorists will help make the children's rides to school safer by reducing the number of school bus-related injuries and fatalities each year," said Carlos Lopez, TxDOT's director of traffic operations. "Keeping our school children safe is important and requires vigilance around school buses and school zones."

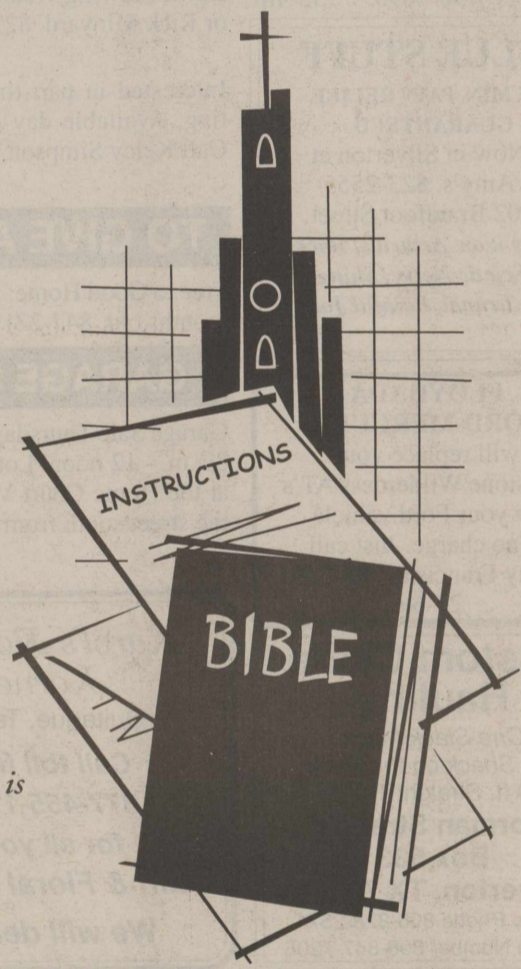

Cotton Market weekly

The cotton futures market lazily drifted downward in a week characterized by light trading activity. Persistent doubts concerning the size of the U. S. cotton crop pressured the market as weather conditions continue to favor excellent

crop development in all of the major cotton producing areas of the United States with the exception of Texas.

The market appears to be waiting for guidance from USDA's first survey-based U. S. crop esti-

mate and updated world supply/demand forecasts scheduled for release on August 10. Analysts expect USDA to confirm market forecasts of a huge U. S. cotton crop.

All cotton producing states but drought-stricken Texas are expected to produce an abundant cotton crop with weather forecasts ensuring excellent yields in California, the Mid-South and Southeast.

Isolated showers were reported across parts of parched West Texas this week; however, the moisture is unlikely to provide significant benefit to most dryland fields where plants are blooming at the top and already have halted boll production. According to BridgeNews, the

drought now has devastated many areas, and 17 counties in Texas are said to be applying for federal disaster payments.

Without rain, the cotton crop continues to decline in Texas. The National Agricultural Statistics Service reported only 23 percent of the state's crop was in good to excellent condition during the week ended July 29 compared with 27 percent a week earlier.

Beltwide, cotton considered good to excellent amounted to 50 percent against 51 percent the previous week. The number of cotton plants categorized as poor to very poor totaled 22 percent, up one percentage point for the week.

"Overall crop conditions are below where they were a year ago," a trader said. "But I'm not willing to say yields will be below last year's. We're still going to produce a big crop and add to surplus ending stocks," he added.

Online trading of Texas/Oklahoma/Kansas cotton totaled a healthy 18,642 bales compared to the previous week's sales of 16,241 bales.

Spot cotton prices for the week also were higher as online trading occurred within a range of 32.90 to 35.34 cents per pound compared to 32.08 to 34.27 cents per pound the prior week.

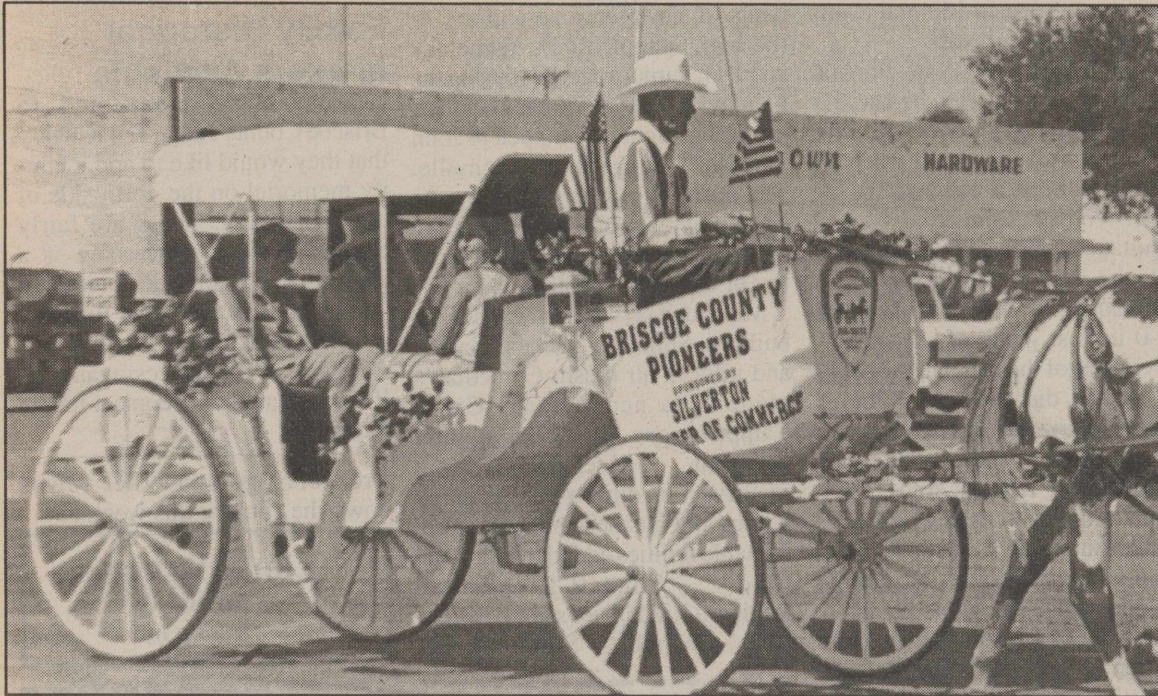

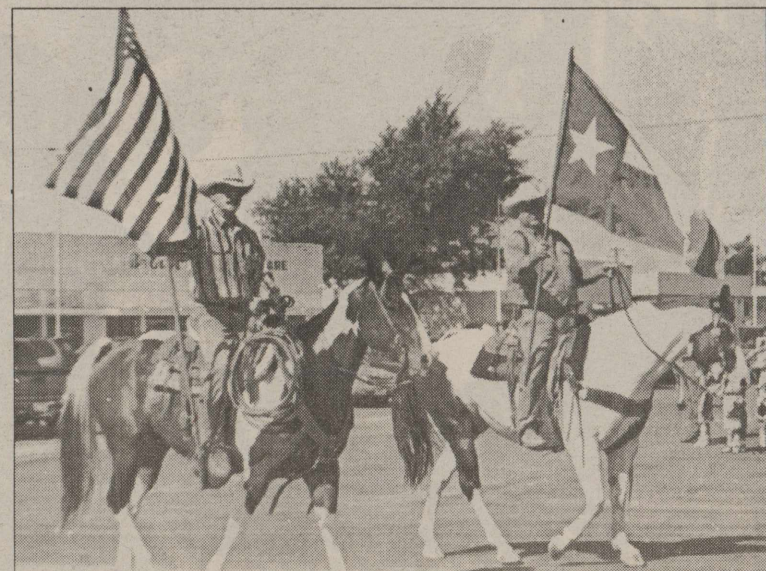
