

County Judge Writes Letter To The Editor

Briscoe County Judge Ted Kingery says that many of you have already received and others will be receiving notices to appear for jury duty. He says that too many will say "Oh, no!" when they receive their notice. Please consider the following letter:

"There are many things that set our country apart from most of the world. One thing that is most envied by others and therefore should be most treasured by us is our judicial system. The very heart of this system is the right to a trial by a jury of our peers in open

"The only way this system can function as a democratic process is for each and every one of us to be a part of it.

"It is so sad that what should be counted a privilege by us is counted as a burden by so many. 'I am too busy,' 'I have great responsibilities,' 'It will interfere with my work,' etc. etc.

"What should we do? Should we search our county for those who choose not to work, have no Kids Program responsibilities or have nothing to do? Serving on a jury might not be an inconvenience to them, but are these the only people you want making decisions concerning you or your family if you were accused of a crime or were being sued?

"I know it will be an inconvenience for you just as it will be for everyone else. However, what a privilege it is for the Common Citizen to take a vital and active special program the kids have part in the greatest judicial system in the world.



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

Protecting Yourself From Information Crooks

Identity theft occurs when personal information like a Social Security number or credit card number falls into the wrong hands and is used to open new credit accounts, apply for loans or make unauthorized charges or withdrawals from your accounts. It has been estimated that half a million people will become victims of identity theft this year, but there are actions you can take to avoid being a statistic.

"The most important thing you can do to protect yourself from identity theft is to take the necessary steps to keep your personal information out of the hands of thieves," said Mike Kidwell, vice president/and co-founder of Myvesta, a financial health center. "Know who is on the other end when you are giving out your personal information. Thieves often pose as creditors or bank representatives. So if you get a call from someone claiming to be from your bank, but you are unsure of who it is, hang up and initiate the call yourself."

Kidwell offered these tips on protecting yourself from identity

•Shred or tear up bank statements, credit card statements and other bills;

WIC Comes to Silverton Once a Month

Residents of Briscoe County who are eligible for benefit through the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program do not have to drive to Shamrock to receive these services. The staff of the Outreach Health Services WIC Clinic in Shamrock come to Silverton once a month to serve clients from this

The designated date for the WIC staff to be in Silverton is the Thursday before the second Saturday of each month. Hours are 9:15 a.m. until noon and 1:00 to 3:30 p.m., and the place is the First Baptist Church, 500 Loretta Street, in Sil-

Next scheduled visits to Silverton are December 12, 2002; January 8, 2003; February 6, 2003; March 6, 2003; April 10, 2003; May 8, 2003.

WIC is a well respected, federally funded program that gives children a healthy start by encouraging optimal nutrition during the critical stages of development. WIC participants have access to vouchers for healthy foods, ongoing nutrition education classes, meal planning assistance and breastfeeding instruction and sup-

In addition, WIC staff administer immunizations free of charge to the children of WIC families and at a cost of \$20 per child per visit for non-WIC participants. Immunizations offered by WIC are hepatitis B; polio; diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (DPT); haemophilus influenaze type B (Hib); pneumococcal conjugate (Prevner®); measles, mumps and rubella (MMR); varicella (chickenpox); diphtheria (Td); and tetanus. No
