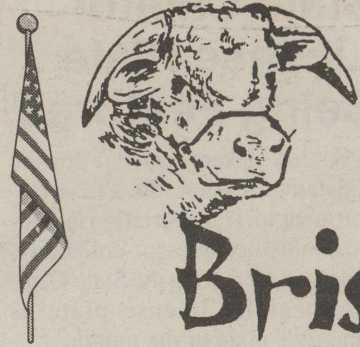
The Bible Study will be offered at two times: Monday mornings at 8:30 a.m. and Wednesday nights at 6:30 p.m.

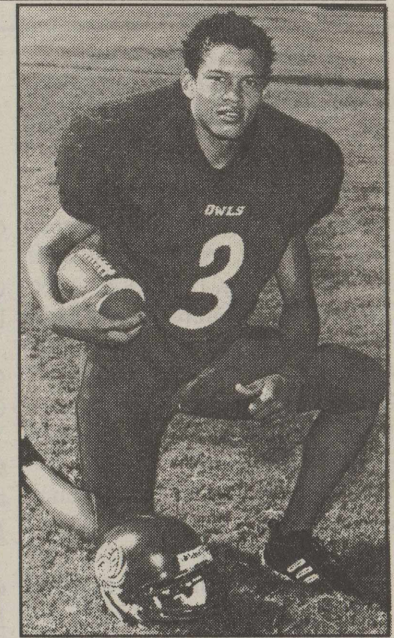
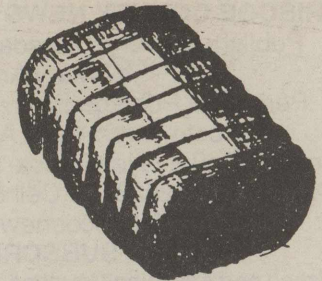

Red Ivory

Red Ivory is Player of Year

Red Ivory was selected as the Amarillo Globe-News Golden Spread Six-Man Player of the Year on the Super Team. He rushed for 1,991 yards on 201 carries and scored 31 touchdowns. He passed for 682 yards and 11 touchdowns.

Curtis Smith of Fort Elliott was chosen as Coach of the Year for guiding the Cougars to their first-ever playoff appearance as Fort Elliott finished 12-1 with a quarterfinal berth.

The six-man football season in the Texas Panhandle could be summed up on a bumper sticker or on a T-shirt: "Breaking Through in 2002."

Certainly, for Fort Elliott and Valley, it was a breakthrough year as they boldly went where no previous teams had gone before. The two teams represented the ying and yang of six-man enrollments. Valley suited up as many as 31 players, while Fort Elliott, with just 16 boys in high school, had 13 in uniform.

Valley had been stopped the previous two years in the first round of bi-district by Follett but turned the tables on the Panthers in the first round, winning 46-0, on the way to the quarterfinals.

Fort Elliott had never been to the playoffs in the brief history of the consolidated school. But the Cougars were barely slowed on their way to winning their first 12

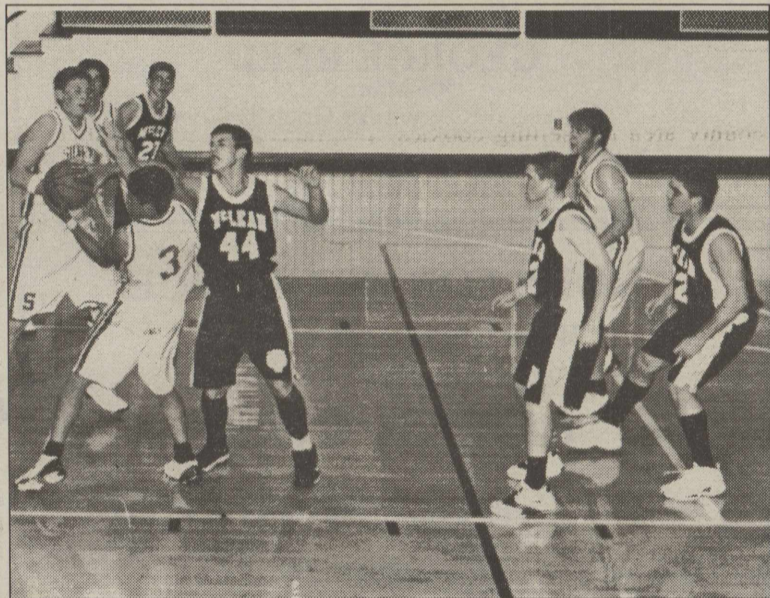

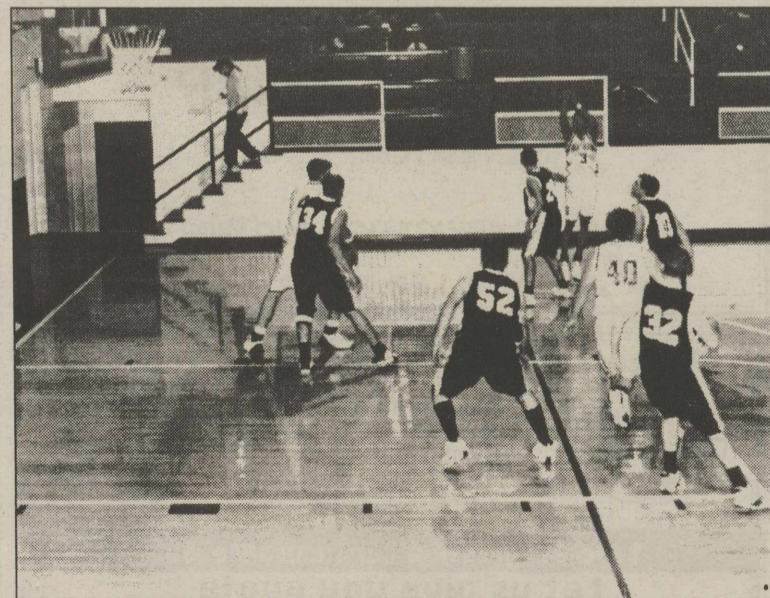

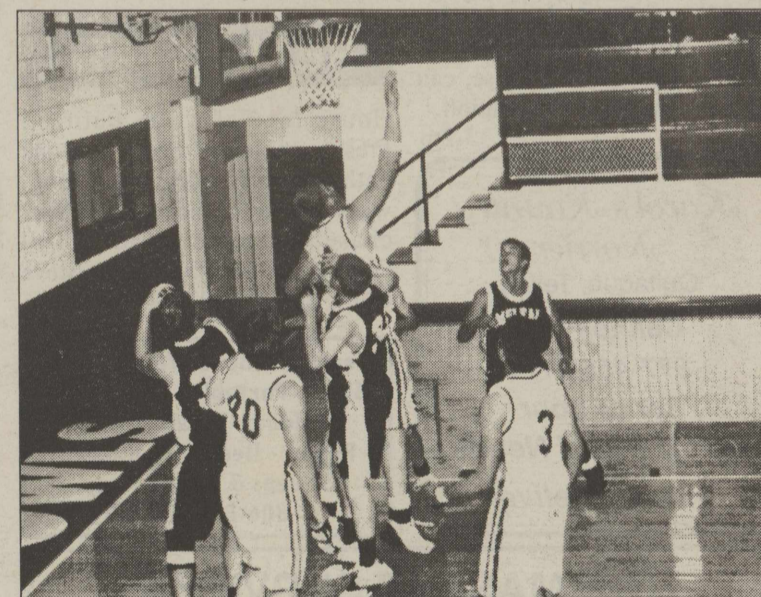
Lady Owls in action against McLean are Tarran Forbes (11), Kassie Strange (30) and Lori Griffin (12).

Lady Owl Kassie Strange (30) hits the basket, as Jenny Young (10) watches the action against McLean.

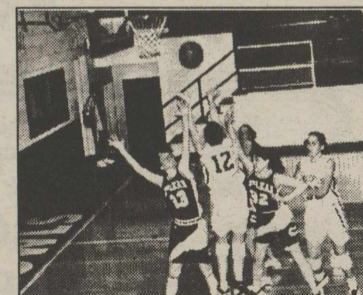

State Capitol License Plate Being Featured

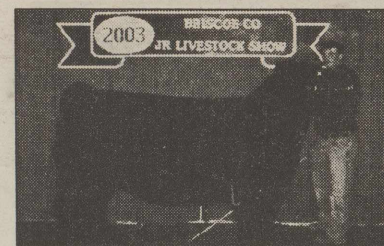
As lawmakers convene for the legislative session, the Texas Department of Transportation and local county tax assessor-collector's offices are featuring the State Capitol specialty license plate as January's plate of the month.

"The Capitol dome is one of Texas' most recognizable landmarks. Purchasing a State Capitol license plate is a great way to show your support for the State of Texas and it looks good on your vehicle," said Rick Crawford, executive director of the State Preservation Board. The license plate features a graphic of the Capitol dome on the left side with the words "State Capitol" to the left of the graphic. The license plate was first issued in 1990 and it was the first specialty license plate issued by Texas.

The State Capitol plates are available to motorists for a \$30 annual fee, plus \$40 if personalized, in addition to regular vehicle registration fees.

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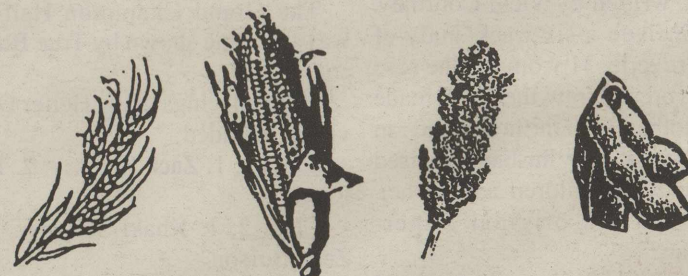
more rally, moving into Silverton territory before the Owls held on in the final seconds for the win, 52-48. It was the Owls' first playoff berth since 1997.

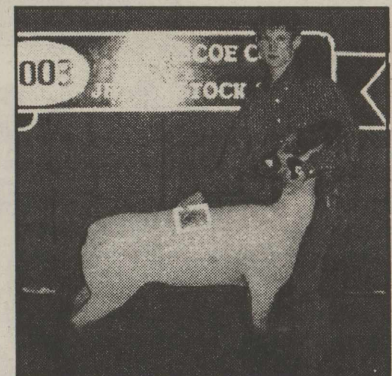

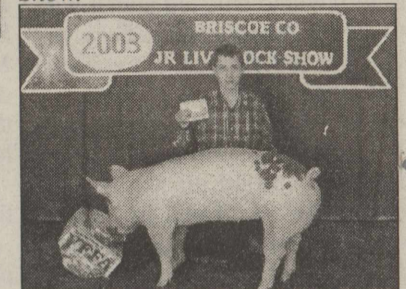
