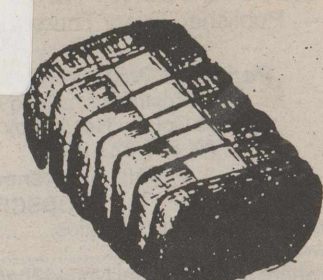
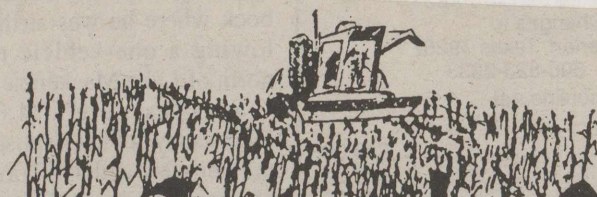

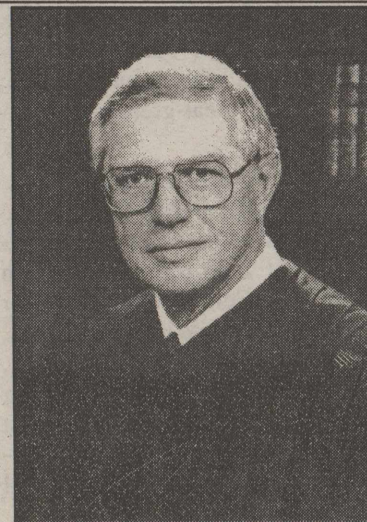
Free Blood Sugar, Pressure Clinic

Hollums Seeking Re-election as District Judge

Randy Hollums announces he is running for the office of District Judge of the 110th Judicial District. At the present time, he is serving as District Judge, and has had many years of experience in the courtroom. These years include 13 years as District Attorney and 11 years as District Judge of the 110th Judicial District.

His family consists of his wife of 38 years, Teresa Hollums, who is presently a high school teacher

at Floydada High School, and two married sons--Jay Hollums, who lives in Greensburg, Pennsylvania, and D. G. Hollums, who is presently attending Asbury Theological Seminary in Wilmore, Kentucky in preparation for the Methodist ministry. His roots go very deep in West Texas, with his great-grandfather, A. B. Duncan, being the first settler in Floyd County. With the exception of his educational and military service years, he always made the 110th Judicial District his home.

He graduated from Floydada High School in 1961, attended McMurry University and Wayland Baptist University, and received from West Texas A&M University a bachelor of science degree in 1966. After serving five years in the United States Air Force as a logistic officer during the Vietnam War, he obtained his law degree from Texas Tech School of Law in December 1973. He has continued to stay current with the changes in the law by attending courses designed for this purpose, some of which were given by the National Judicial College. He is a member in good standing of the Texas Bar Association with his 24 years of elected offices at the judicial dis-

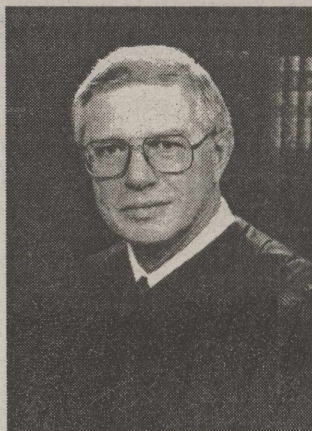

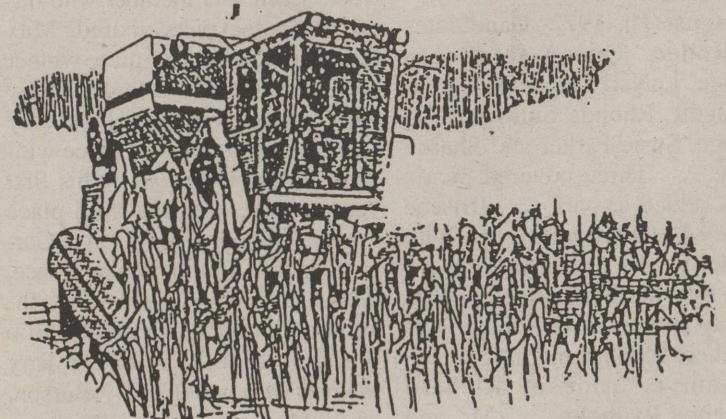
