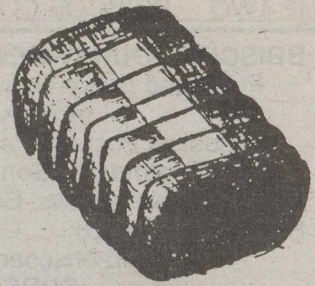

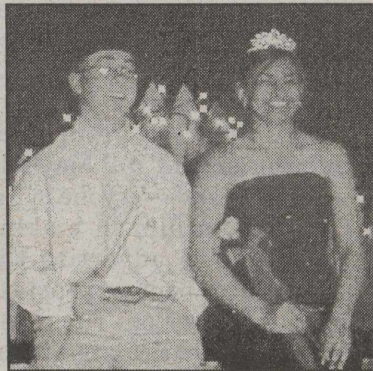

CEAP Funding Is Received

Panhandle Community Services has received funding for the Comprehensive Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) for the fiscal year 2003. This program provides emergency utility assistance for low-income families and utility assistance for elderly and disabled/handicapped families that have not received assistance this year.

The CEAP assistance is not an entitlement program. Assistance will be provided only to those families who have been determined by a priority matrix system as most in need.

To apply, you must have Social Security cards for everyone in the household, proof of income, current electric and gas bill, and a 12-month billing history of electric and gas bills must be furnished. Applicants may call their local Panhandle Community Services office, 806-874-2573, for more information.

This four-week series will cover Health and Safety, Nutrition, Child Development, and Communicating with Young Children.

Qualified speakers will be leading each lesson and will include a Physician's Assistant, a Dietitian, an Early Childhood Intervention Specialist and a Minister.

The classes will be held on Thursday evenings, Nov. 13, Nov. 20, Dec. 4 and Dec. 11, from 6:30 - 8:30 p.m. in the basement of the Silverton United Methodist Church. Refreshments, door prizes and babysitting services will be provided for those who attend.

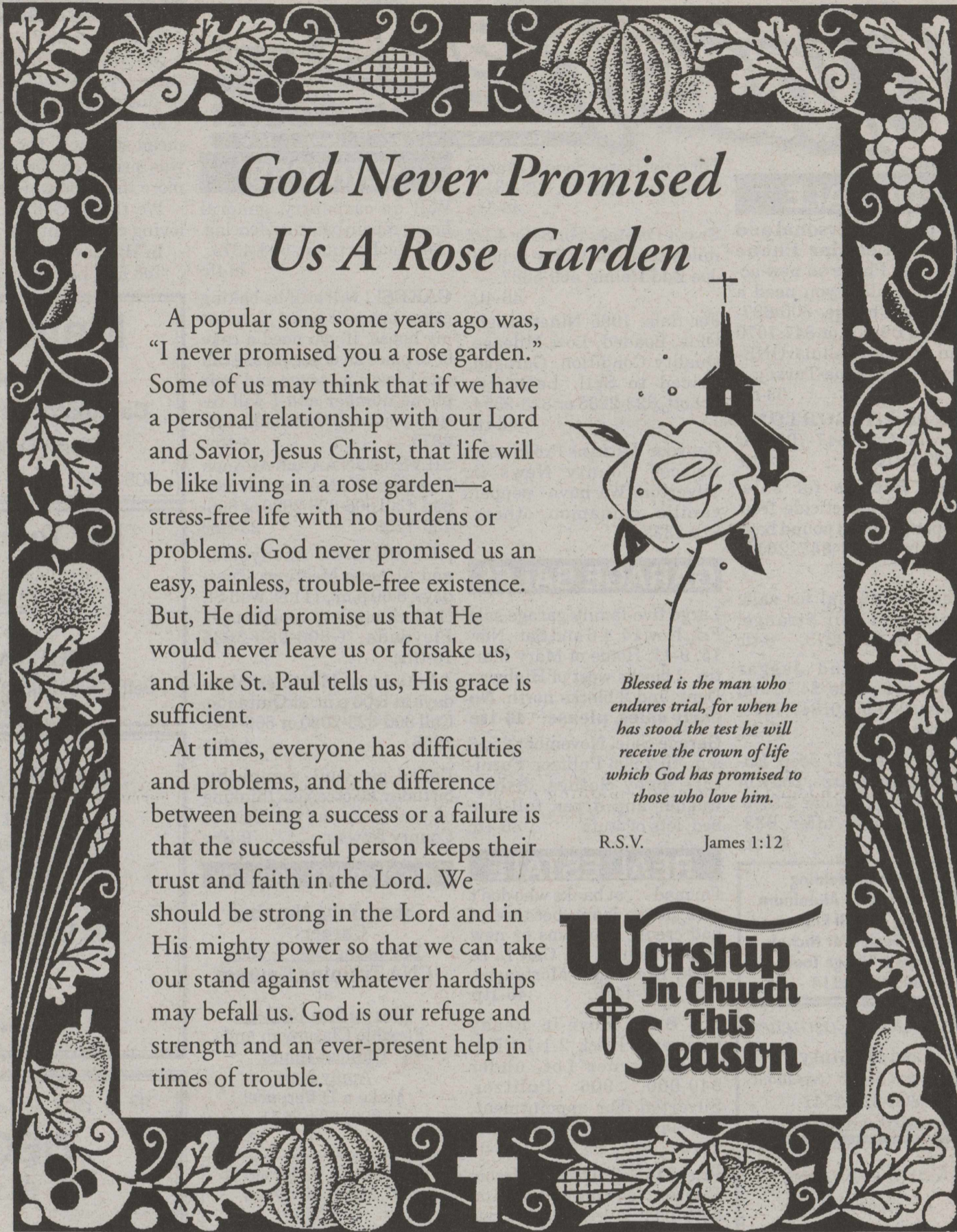

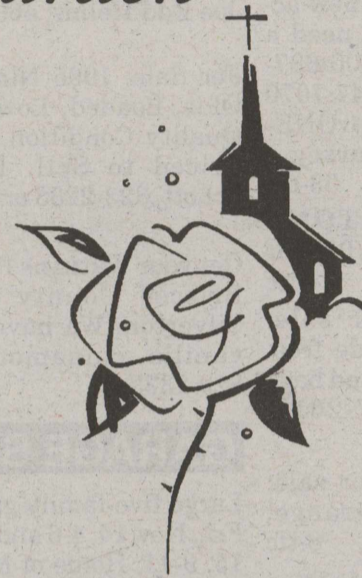

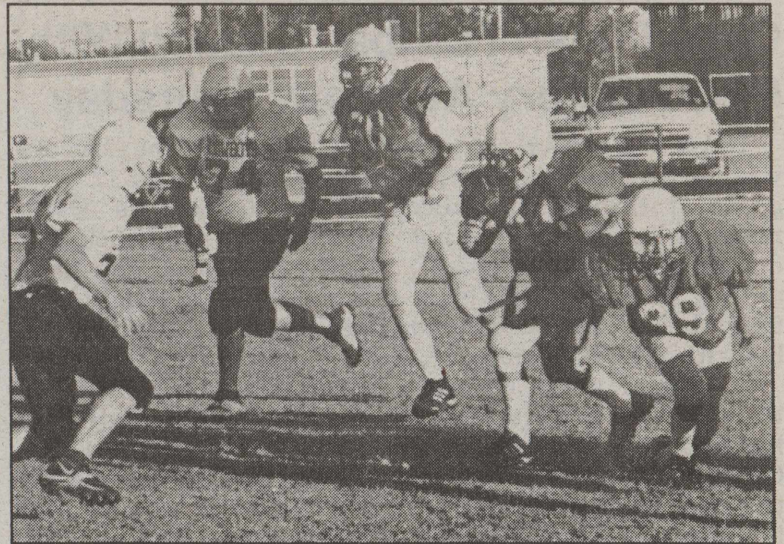
