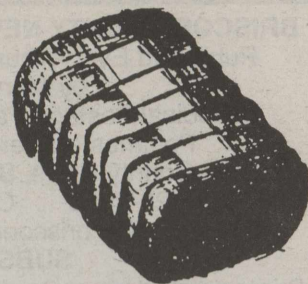

Lake Mackenzie To Be Scene of Woodstock 2003 June 13 - 15

The fifth annual Woodstock will take place at Lake Mackenzie on Father's Day weekend, June 13-15.

This benefit began when Todd Holly's cousin, Woody Miller, was killed in an industrial fire at work, and left behind five children. Todd organized a fundraiser for the family that year. It has been carried on in Woody's honor ever since.

Each year, 100% of the money raised has gone to a different burn victim from this area. Last year's Woodstock was a huge success in benefit of little Levi Cantrell who was flown into UMC as an unfortunate burn victim and later was adopted by his UMC nurse, Lori Cantrell.

This year, Woodstock is in coordination with UMC's Occupational Therapy Department and Lubbock Firefighters to send area children to Camp Amistad. It is the mission of Camp Amistad to provide a free summer camp experience to children ages 6-16 who have sustained a burn injury.

Woodstock is a weekend-long camp-out full of live music, camping, fishing, various contests and a silent auction.

Although there is no charge to be a part of Woodstock, donations are the heart of the fundraising efforts and a lake permit is required.

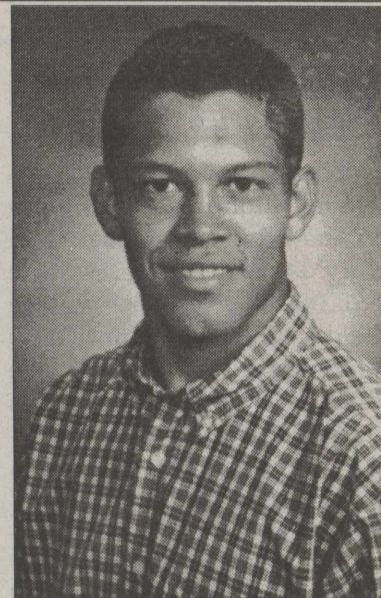

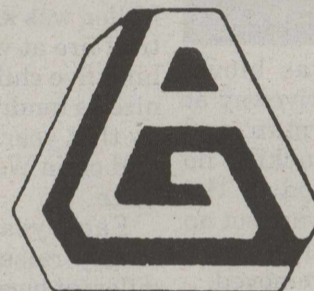

A Tent Revival is coming to Silverton and special services are planned June 15-16-17-18 on the parking lot across the street from First Baptist Church.

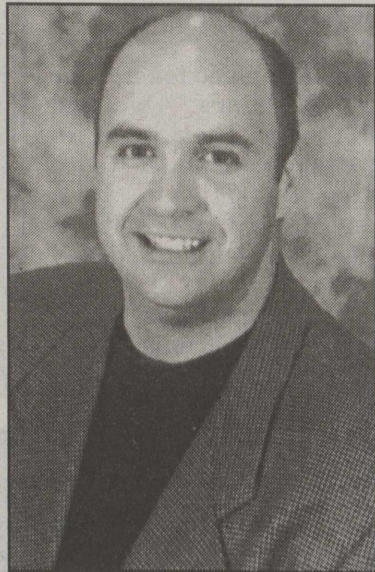
David Burk will be the visiting evangelist, and special music will be presented by Christy Stringer Newberry and Paul Newberry.
