She is the granddaughter of LaRue and L. B. Garvin, jr. and Ann Weaver Coleman, and is the great-granddaughter of Valeria Weaver.

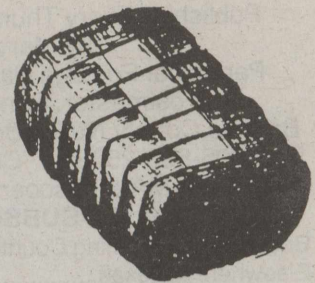

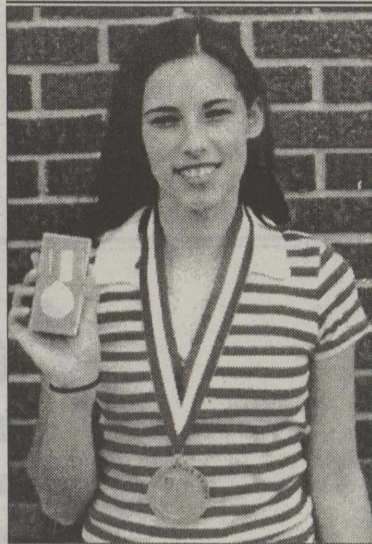

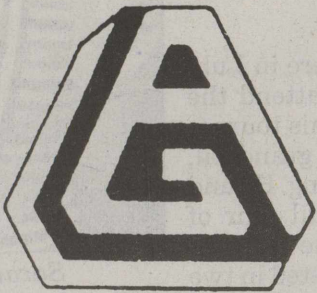

Monkeypox Being Investigated

Texas Department of Health and other federal, state and local agencies in multiple states are continuing to investigate an outbreak of monkeypox. CDC reports that 81 illnesses are under investigation in Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Missouri, Ohio and Wisconsin.

Initial illnesses in the Midwest were linked to captive prairie dogs that may have been infected by Gambian rats or other rodents imported from Africa.

There have been no reports of monkeypox in humans or animals in Texas yet, and officials say there is nothing to indicate that monkeypox is in Texas' wild prairie dog populations. TDH advises anyone who has obtained prairie dogs, Gambian rats or other exotic pets from a pet store, distributor or in a pet swap need to be alert for signs of illness in the animals and especially alert for symptoms of monkeypox in people who have had contact with the animals.

Under no circumstances should any ill or suspect animals be released into the wild.

The monkeypox virus is from the same group of viruses (orthopoxviruses) as the virus that causes smallpox, but monkeypox illness is not nearly as severe or life-threatening.

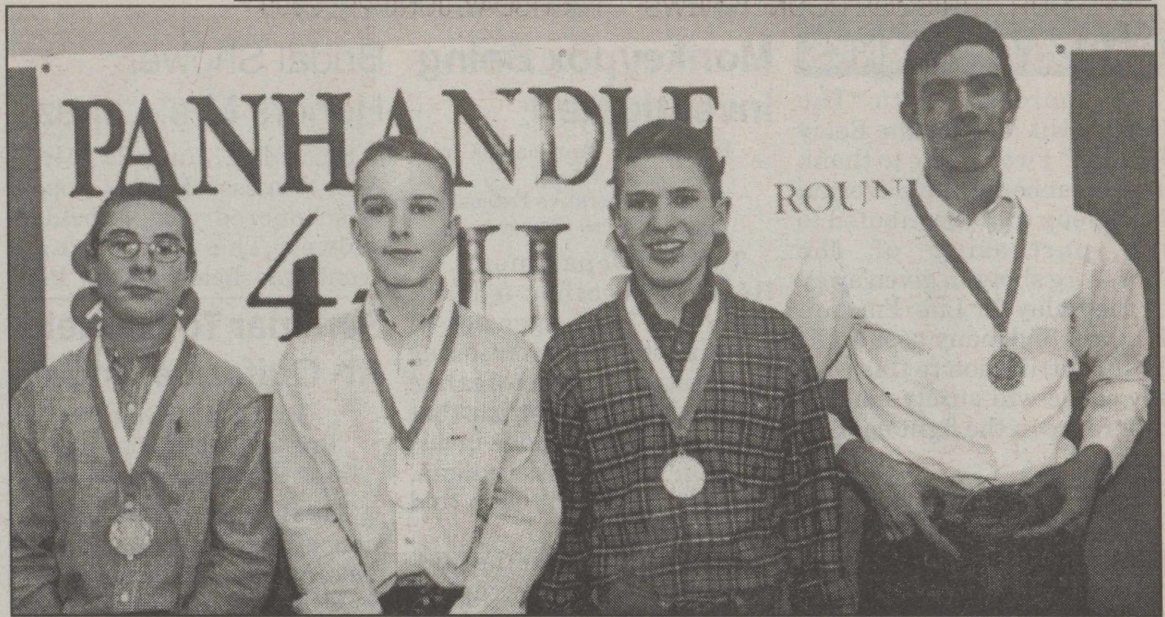

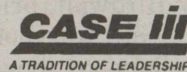
