



AWP Increase Adds Costs To Loan Cotton

One of the trends many growers have been watching has been the steady increase in the Adjusted World Price for cotton.

The AWP effective for the week of July 10-17 has been announced at 50.37 cents per pound. That means the Loan Deficiency Payment rate for the July 10-17 time period is 1.63 cents per pound.

To a producer the increase in the AWP is evidence that cotton prices are moving up through a combination of tightening cotton stocks, increased demand and uncertainty of how much production there will be in 2003

crease does exist, however, for producers who still have 2002crop cotton in the loan. Should the AWP equal or surpass the

upland cotton base loan rate of 52 cents per pound, accrued storage charges and interest are forgiven when the cotton is redeemed and the loan is settled. The producer would only be responsible for paying storage charges accrued prior to the date the cotton entered the CCC loan.

If the AWP rises above the base loan rate then the grower is responsible for repaying all storage and interest charges

With strong fundamental when the cotton is sold and the loan is settled.

The net effect could add up creasing Adjusted World Price, to \$12-15 per bale in charges growers would have to pay if they wait until after the AWP passes the Loan rate to sell their crop, or if they decide to forfeit the crop to the CCC to settle the loan.

With prudent planning growers should be able to avoid these costs. The quickest route is to go ahead and sell their 2002 cotton before the AWP rises above 52 cents, or redeem the cotton themselves and avoid paying storage and interest charges.

This strategy would prove beneficial to the producer by protecting the full amount of the loan price through the combination of the cash sale price and the remaining marketing loan gain they realize by redeeming at a lower price per pound.


