# Tips Given For

The Fourth of July holiday seasonnot only means fireworks and celebrations, but also typically is hot, dry summer weather in Texas. While much of the state has seen above-average rainfall this year, summer heat will quickly take its toll on vegetation.

Texas Forest Service chief of operations, Mark Stanford, encouraged Texans to safely celebrate Independence Day.

"Recent rains across Central and East Texas have greatly reduced the risk of wildfire ignitions due to fireworks," Stanford said. "Even though the fire danger is low across much of the state, people should still exercise caution and common sense."

Stanford said parts of the Trans-Pecos region and far West Texas are still very dry, so residents or visitors to theGuadalupe or Davis Mountains in particular need to be wary of the high fire danger.





Complicating the July 4 weekend is the fact that more traffic fatalities occur on Saturday than any other day of the week. Also, more motorcyclists are killed on July 4 than any other day.




