Ty Reed was named to the Dean's List at West Texas A&M University. He is a freshman wildlife biology major.

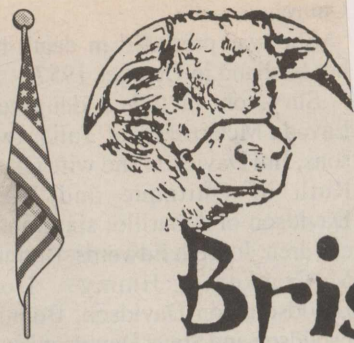

Swisher Electric Membership Meeting Set For March 31

The 65th annual membership meeting of Swisher Electric Cooperative is set for March 31, 2005, at Ezra Jones School Cafeteria in Tulia. Registration for the meeting starts at 6:30 p.m. with a catered buffet super by Jeff's Restaurant of Kress. The business meeting will follow, commencing at 7:15 p.m.

In the cooperative's annual report to members, board president Eddie Bryan and general manager Charles Castleberry discuss the effects of the abnormally wet year 2004 had on the cooperative's operations. Sales to irrigation members were down 39% from the year prior, with a corresponding effect on total sales. Despite this, the cooperative managed to have a small operating margin supplemented by non-operating margins. Members' ownership share in the cooperative rose to nearly 60%.

Three director positions are up for election. Seeking re-election are board president Eddie Bryan, vice-president Richard Tye, and Mace

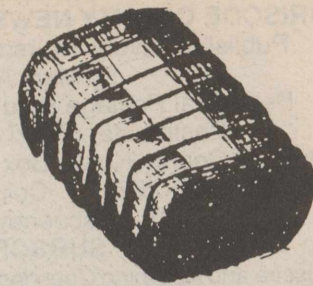
Middleton. They are opposed respectively by Tom Ferris, Ted White and Dwain Strange. A nominating committee of members met in January to select the candidates.

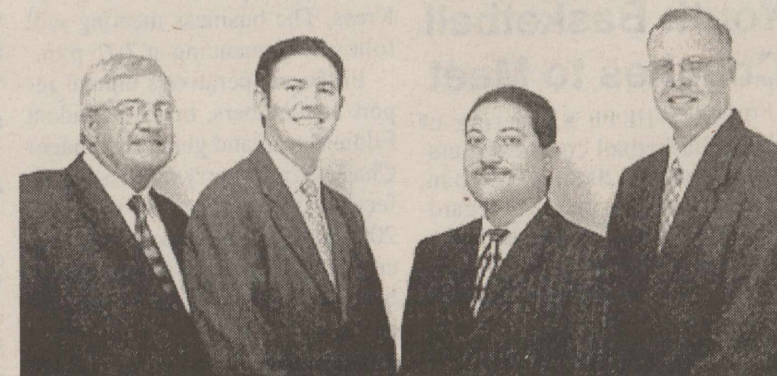

Project Graduation Donations Sought

Donations are being sought to help with Project Graduation 2005. Door prizes, gifts, food and admission charges for the activities are paid for with donations made by parents, friends and supporters of this project.

It was determined that traffic crashes, half of which involve alcohol and other drugs, are a leading cause of death and serious injury for young people (ages 15-19). Therefore the State of Texas and interested citizens are supporting "Project Graduation," a program promoting drug/alcohol-free parties for high school students. The Texas Department of Transportation pledges \$250.00 each year to provide mini-grants as "seed money" to high schools who support Project Graduation activities, and concerned citizens are asked to join in.

Project Graduation committee's purpose is to offer students the opportunity to have drug/alcohol-free celebrations in lieu of traditional drinking parties. It is hoped this effort will curb deaths and disabilities associated with drinking, taking drugs and driving.

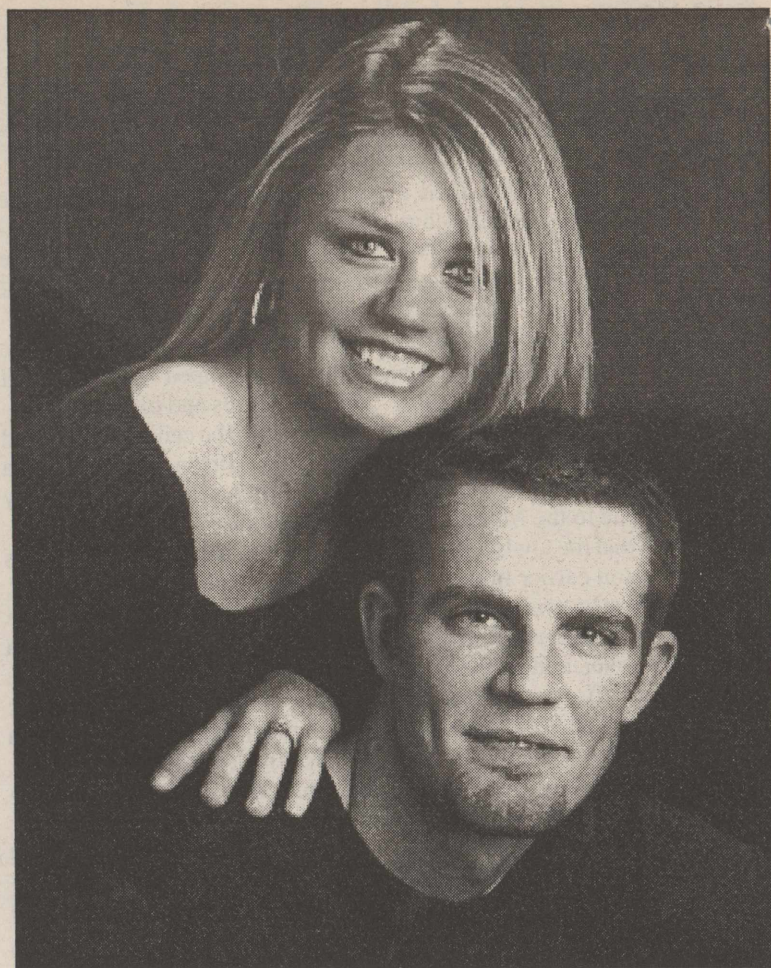

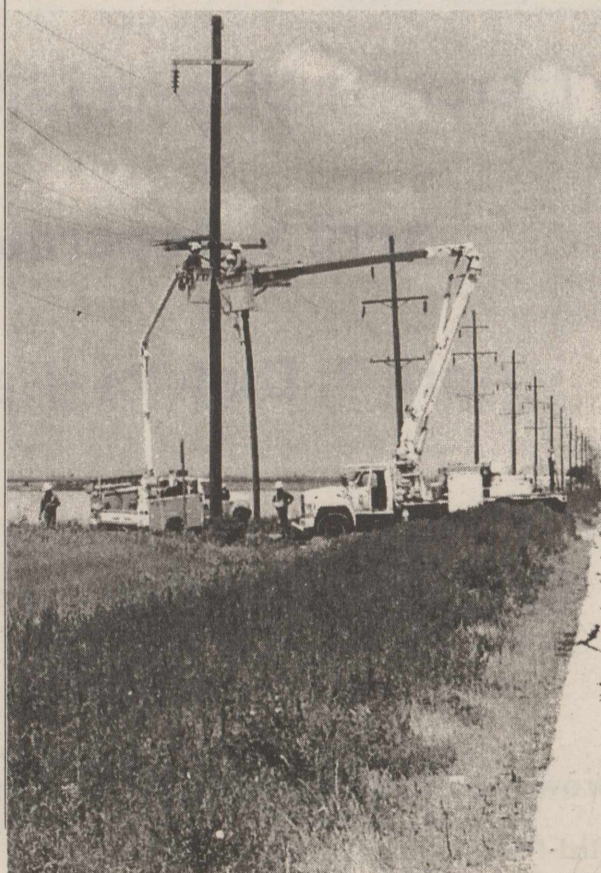

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Cotton Market weekly

A Service Provided by Plains Cotton Cooperative Association

After closing higher six out of seven days, cotton futures at the New York Board of Trade settled sharply lower Thursday, March 17, as the market corrected from higher levels amid lagging export sales.

Export sales in the week ended March 10 were at the lowest levels since the last week of October 2004. USDA reported net export sales of U. S. cotton totaled 121,900 bales, 33% lower than the previous week and the prior four-week average. Major buyers were China, Pakistan and Thailand. Sales of 40,800 bales for delivery in 2005-06 were mainly for Ireland, South Korea and Colombia.

Export shipments of 297,400 bales slipped 13% from the previous week's marketing year high and 1% from the four-week average. Primary destinations were Turkey, Mexico, China and Indonesia.

In the spot cotton market, online sales by producers in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas remained active with 31,032 bales traded in the week ended March 17. The volume

was down from the previous week when 56,363 bales were sold. However, average prices received by producers in the most recent week ranged from 38.45 to 43.31 cents per pound compared to 37.48 to 41.00 cents per pound the previous week.

In other news, winter weather returned to West Texas as rain and snow fell in key cotton growing areas early in the week. While more seasonable readings returned to the High and Rolling Plains and fieldwork resumed in some southern counties by Thursday, cooler-than-normal temperatures for this time of year prevailed in South Texas.

Isolated showers fell from the Texas Upper Coastal Bend to the Lower Rio Grande Valley (LRGV), halting planting activities. Planting is nearing completion in the LRGV, and farmers there welcomed a slow-soaking rain to help with seed germination.

With the 2005 cotton season now underway, market sources will be turning their attention to USDA's cotton planting intentions

report due to be released on March 31. Several sources expect to see a small increase in acres from last season and close to the National Cotton Council's acreage survey of 13.73 million acres, up 0.6% from last year.

Rising prices for corn and soybeans could discourage some U. S. producers from planting cotton. On the other hand, the threat of Asian rust disease on soybeans could encourage more cotton acres in the Southeast.

"Most producers in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas will make important planting decisions in the next

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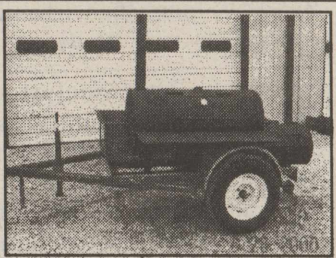

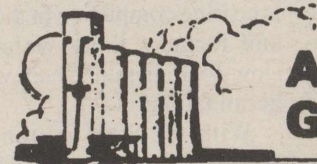
