AFTER NARROW SQUEAK

Basketball Boys to Leave Friday for Regional Tournament at Canyon

The Knox City basketball boys won the bi-district title by defeating Mattson in a 57-51 thriller at Haskell.

The Greyhounds will leave tomorrow (Friday) morning for the regional Class B tournament at Canyon. The trip will be made in the school station wagon and two private cars, and the team will be accompanied by Coaches Les Cowan and Bob Johnson.

Their first game in the regional contests will be with Wheeler at 8:30 Friday night. If they win they will play again at 11:15 a. m. Saturday, probably against the winner of the McAdoo-Meadow game.

All games will be in the gym at West Texas State College.

The game Tuesday night was tied 51-51 at the end of the regular game, and went into a three-minute overtime period.

The Mustangs, coached by former Knox Citian Bill Baker, had won the 14-B championship Saturday night by defeating Paint Creek, 50-44, in the third game of a three-game play-off.

It was the Mustangs' first district championship in 21 years.

Baker's fast, hard-working team almost upset the favored Greyhounds. Knox City held a 19-15 lead at the end of the first period, but Mattson forged ahead and stayed in the lead until just before the first half ended with the score Knox City 33, Mattson 30.

Knox City held a slim lead through the third quarter and into the fourth, and began using stalling tactics with a three-point lead and four minutes remaining

Program and Open House Sunday To Launch 'Public Schools Week'

Official Memorandum

GREETINGS:

Our system of public education requires the active interest of all our people, and it is the privilege and likewise the duty of every citizen in the State to cooperate with our respective School Boards, Superintendents, Principals and Teachers in an effort to make Texas public schools the finest in the Nation.

Every Texan has the opportunity and the right to attend our public schools and to acquire the necessary learning for making an honorable living, as well as an appreciation and understanding of the correspondent duties, obligations and rights of American Citizenship.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of March 4-9, 1957, as

PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK

in Texas, and urge each and every citizen to visit a public school during this period so that all may become personally acquainted with the accomplishments and the improvements of our educational system.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of Texas to be affixed this 15th day of January, 1957.

Bills Introduced for Forming Municipal Water Authority

State Senator George Moffett of Chillicothe and Representative Ed Cloud of Rule introduced a bill in the House and Senate last week that would permit the towns of Knox City, Haskell, Seymour, Munday, Rule, Goree and Rochester to form a water district called the "North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority" and cooperate in construction of a dam and reservoir on Miller Creek about 12 miles east of Munday.

Senator Moffett said the bill was introduced exactly as it was written by the attorneys for the proposed district, and he expects it to be passed without change in a reasonable length of time.

Moffett pointed out that the bill authorizes a tax on property within the limits of the towns mentioned in the bill, and there is no ceiling as to the rate.

"While I am old timey enough to hesitate to approve such a provision in connection with a property tax," he said, "it seems to be customary. I understand that most of the bills that authorize a water district are written in this manner."

"In recent years many areas in West Texas have asked for this type of bill, and some of the districts—as far as I know all of them—have made progress. Certainly I earnestly wish for the success of this district."

He added that each town will vote to come into the district or stay out, as preferred, and if a town votes to stay out, that ends the matter as far as that town is concerned.

Elections will be held after the enabling legislation is passed, and if enough towns want the project, a permit for the dam will be sought from the Board of Water Engineers.

Engineers and bonding com-

panies believe most of the cost of the project could be paid from sale of water. They estimate that if all seven towns participate, an ad valorem tax of 24 cents would be necessary the first two years. The third year the tax would be 10 cents and after that the project should be self-sustaining.

Engineers believe most towns in the area will eventually have to depend on surface water, and they describe the Miller Creek location as "probably the last good reservoir site in this section."

Three Incumbents File for Re-Election To City Offices

Mayor Barney Arnold and Aldermen Otis Cash and Russell Boyd have all filed as candidates for re-election, and up to this morning had no announced opposition.

Deadline for filing, as announced by Mayor Arnold last week, is Saturday.

The three incumbent candidates filed last Thursday. They have each been in office two years.

The city election will be held Tuesday, April 2. A special election to elect a United States Senator will be held at the same time.

MUSICAL PROGRAM PRESENTED AT LIONS CLUB

Members of the Beginners Band of the Knox City School presented a musical program at the regular luncheon meeting of the Knox City Lions Club Wednesday.

The band, which is composed mostly of fifth-graders, was directed by W. J. Morris.

Club President Otis Harbert announced that the program next week will be presented by the school in observance of Public Schools Week. He urged all Lions to attend.

A program and "open house" at the school Sunday, March 3, will launch activities in the local observance of Texas Public Schools Week, March 3-9.

The program will be at 2 p. m. in the school auditorium, and the public is urged to attend.

All groups of the school band will participate in the program. Director will be W. J. Morris. Following entertainment by the band, parents will be invited to visit the rooms where their children attend classes, meet the teachers, and talk with them about their child's progress or any problem they may have, Supt. Chas. E. Silk said.

The superintendent said that many people failed to visit the new high school when open house was held, due to the bad weather that day. The building will be open Sunday and everyone is invited to tour the new high school facilities.

"During next week the faculty and I would like for parents, at their convenience, to visit classes when actual classwork is in progress. You are welcome at the school at any time, but we hope parents will make a special effort to visit sometime during Public Schools Week," the superintendent said.

Wednesday a group of school students will present a program at the weekly meeting of the Lions Club in order to focus further attention on the school.

The week's activities will also include a banquet for the faculty and members of the board of education, Monday night at Roddy's Cafe.

School will dismiss all day Friday so the faculty can attend a teachers meeting in Vernon. All local teachers are expected to attend.

Trustees Accepting Funds for Perpetual Cemetery Care

The Board of Trustees of the Knox City Cemetery Endowment Trust is now accepting funds for endowment of lots in the cemetery.

Members of the Knox City Study Club, which sponsored organization of the plan for perpetual cemetery care, are mailing explanations of the plan to former residents who own lots in the cemetery. Mrs. C. J. Reese, president of the club, and Mrs. Claude E. Reed, secretary, said addresses of some lot owners have not been obtained. Anyone knowing the address of a former resident who has loved ones buried in the cemetery was asked to contact one of the two ladies.

Anyone wishing to endow his lot or lots may contact Mrs. Reese, Mrs. Reed, or any member of the board of trustees, which is composed of E. R. Carpenter, president, J. M. Averitt, secretary-treasurer, and U. H. Lea, L. W. Graham, Roy Smith, C. J. Reese, Charles Reese, Claude E. Reed and C. A. Wilson.

Briefly, the Endowment Trust plan provides that a person who owns one or more lots in the cemetery may purchase perpetual care for them, and anyone who purchases lots in the future, either in the present cemetery or in the new addition which will be opened later, may purchase perpetual care at the same time.

Certificates of ownership for perpetual care are issued by the Endowment Trust and each is recorded in the office of the county clerk.

The funds placed in the endowment fund for each tract will be invested in Government Bonds, and the interest will be used in caring for the tract endowed. Any excess, however, may be used for caring for the cemetery as a whole, including streets.

No further dues or contributions will be necessary to care for any endowed lot, and the interest from the invested funds cannot be used for any other purpose. The Knox City Study Club has paid from its own funds the cost of printing application forms, endowment certificates and other material.

The cost of endowing tracts is as follows:

One grave space, \$50.00; two grave spaces \$100.00; Four grave spaces \$150.00; eight grave spaces \$200.00, and twelve grave spaces \$250.00.

All local residents with cemetery plots were urged to endow their lots as soon as possible, so the funds can be invested and begin drawing interest.
