No Candidates Yet For School Trustee

March 23 is the deadline for filing as a candidate for trustee of the Knox City Independent School District, Supt. Chas. E. Silk reminded citizens this week. Candidates may file with the secretary of the board, Horace Finley, or at the office of the superintendent, before 6 p. m. March 23.

Trustees whose terms expire are M. H. Mansfield and J. O. Warren. Hold-over members of the board are Finley, Lloyd Waldrip, Bobby Burnett, Clyde Voss and John Crownover.

The trustee election will be held Saturday, April 6 at the American Legion Hall. Judge will be C. C. Hoge, and Claude Reed, Claude Richardson and J. T. Cypert will be clerks.

Deadline for filing as a candidate for the county board, an election to be held at the same time, is ten days prior to the election, according to Merick McGaughey, county superintendent. Candidates must file with the county judge.

K-C, Benjamin Schools Burgled

Burglars entered the Knox City and Benjamin schools one night last week, but their only loot was some stamps and a jacket taken from the Benjamin school.

The culprits tried to enter a door of the new Knox City high school building but failed, and gained entry through a window that had been left unlocked. They broke in the door to Principal E. A. Youngblood's office and went through his desk and filing cabinet, but Youngblood failed to find anything missing.

Sheriff Homer T. Melton said the burglaries appeared to be the work of adults. The sheriff also reported that there has been a rash of petty thievery in the county, including hub-caps, auto accessories and gasoline. Thieves climbed the fence of Dan Steakley's used car lot and made off with several accessories, and other thefts have been widely scattered.

Soil Conservationist Speaks at Meeting Of Local Lions Club

W. C. Howard of Quanah, banker and farmer and president of the Texas Association of Soil Conservation Districts, was guest speaker at the Wednesday noon meeting of the Knox City Lions Club.

Howard was introduced by Jack Idol of Benjamin, a member of the board of supervisors of the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District.

Mr. Howard commended Knox County farmers for the land leveling and other conservation measures being practiced. He remarked that soil and water conservation is vital to our future, even though there are 75,000,000 of surplus farm land in the country today. The estimated population increase, he said, will wipe out this surplus in 15 years.

The speaker said soil conservation has been hindered by the prolonged drought, but that it will be "pushed" by the association more this year. One means of promoting more conservation is publication of a magazine to get the story of conservation to the farmers. He called on business men for donations to help distribute the magazine to the rural population.

Joe Clonts New Science Teacher

Joe Murray Clonts was selected by the Board of Education of Knox City Schools to teach science and math in high school for the remainder of the school year. He began Monday morning, replacing J. R. Hitchcock.

Clonts is a graduate of Texas A and M, and is associated with his father in the hardware and furniture business here.

The board will meet next Tuesday night to study and make decisions on an insurance program on school buildings, Supt. Chas. E. Silk said. Another item on the agenda will be the approval of recommendations of the textbook committee for the selection of certain books to be used in the schools.

Members of the committee are Mmes. A. V. Kemletz, W. J. Morris, R. G. Vaughan, Hazel Long, Otis Cash, Fuller Shannon, E. R. Carpenter, M. A. Lowrey, E. F. Branton, and Mr. Morris and E. A. Youngblood.

The board will also inspect the high school shop building to pass on its adequacy and decide on possible additions to the building and equipment. Equipment is being installed now.

The superintendent said formal opening of the shop will be held in the near future.

Dates Set for Free Salk Polio Vaccination

Forms for free polio vaccination of Knox Countians are ready for the signatures of parents, Dr. D. C. Eiland, county health officer, said Wednesday.

Knox County physicians, along with the staff of the Knox County Hospital, hope to vaccinate every person in the county from six months to 20 years of age, and all pregnant women.

The vaccine will be given free at the Knox County Hospital. People from Munday will be vaccinated from 10 a. m. to 3 p. m. Monday, March 25, and Knox Citians will get their first shots the following day from 10 a. m. to 3 p. m. Those from Goree, Rhineland, Benjamin, Vera and Gilliland will receive their shots Wednesday, March 27.

Dr. Eiland said children will be transported by bus, and automobiles will be available at the schools for people who need transportation.

Parents were asked to give the information called for on the request forms and sign the forms, in order for their children to receive the vaccine.

The forms will be distributed by school children, and are available at postoffices and drug stores in the county for those without children in school. In Knox City, forms may be picked up at Jones Drug, Hoge's Pharmacy, or the postoffice. Dr. Eiland asked that after the forms are filled out, they be returned to the school.

He asked parents to sign and return the forms as soon as possible if they want their children to receive the vaccination. If a child has had one or two shots he may complete the series, or he may take the full series of three.

\$120.58 Collected for Heart Fund Here

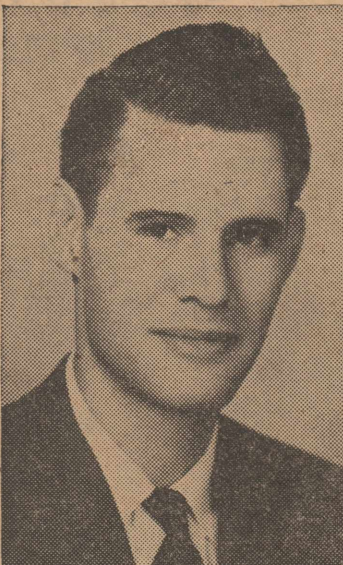
Knox Citians donated a total of \$120.58 to the 1957 Texas Heart Fund, Allen Hester, community chairman for the drive, said this week.

Hester expressed his appreciation for the cooperation he received from those solicited for funds.

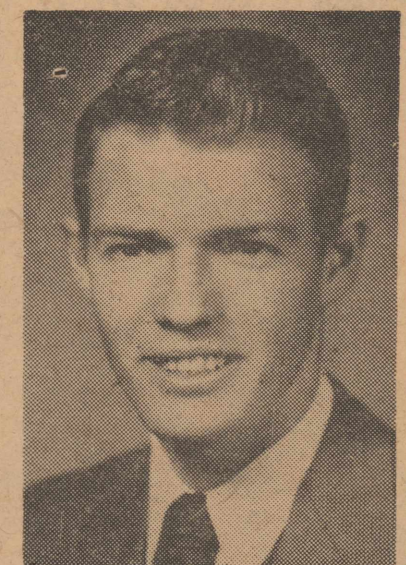
JOE ROY SMITH TO HANDLE BUTANE AND PROPANE

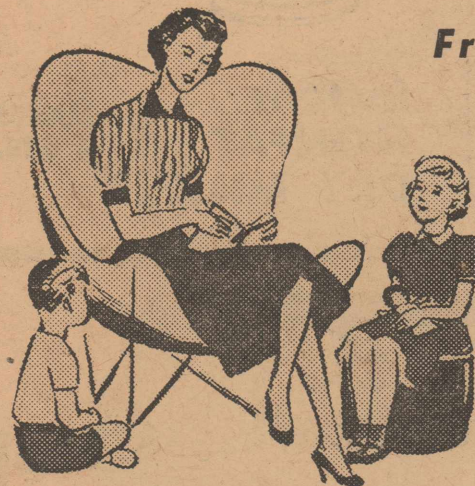

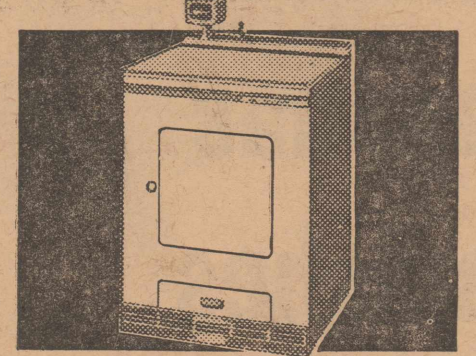

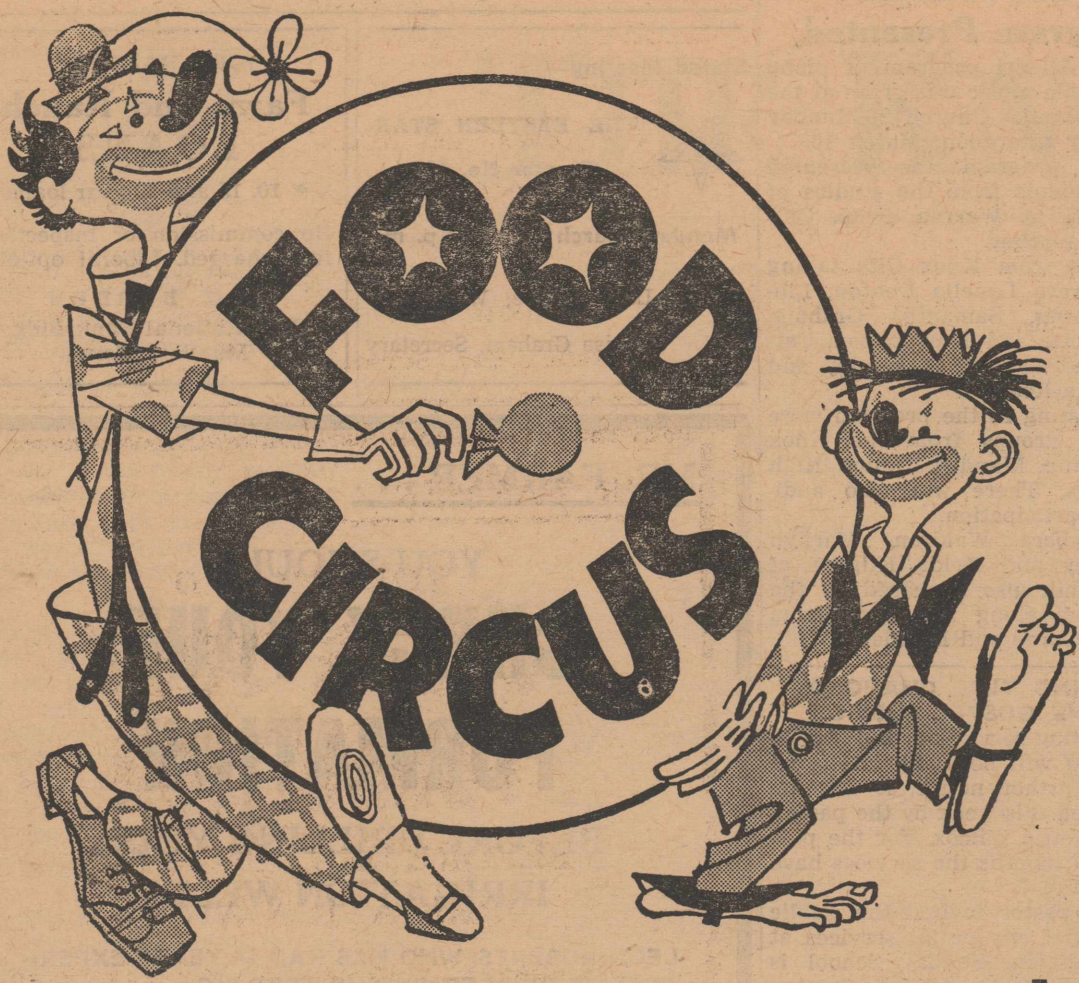

H-D Notes . . .

Has the gardening fever hit you yet? If so, you will have lots of company in Texas because there are some half-million gardens planted in our state each year.

Why do so many people garden? Here are the main reasons: Quality—This is the big selling point. You simply can't beat garden-fresh vegetables picked at the peak of quality.

Saving—A good home garden can mean a sizeable saving on the family food budget. The estimated average saving is \$100.

Then, of course, you will just naturally use more good vegetables in your meals. And this could help bring about better health for the whole family with an additional saving.

Fun—Garden provides an enjoyable hobby, a chance to relax and a release from tension.

If you plan to raise your tomato plants here are some varieties the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Iowa Park recommend for the Knox County area: Red Cloud, Bounty, Firesteel, Danmark and Valiant. All of these are large fruited types. Then there is the Improved Porter which is a smaller tomato.

The Knox County 4-H girls have been studying about dairy products in their food program this year. But whatever your age milk is the best food you can get.

It is outstandingly important

for three nutrients—calcium, vitamin B2 (riboflavin) and protein. Without a sufficient amount of milk or dairy foods, it is hard to get enough calcium or vitamin B2 in the daily diet. Throughout life, the body needs protein to build and repair tissues and muscles, glandular organs, skin, hair and nails. Calcium is needed for proper development, maintenance and growth of bones and teeth. Riboflavin or vitamin B2 helps in promoting good eyesight and a feeling of general well-being.

The easiest way to get your milk each day is to drink it plain, in a cold, frosty glass or "dressed up" with fruits, syrups or ice cream.
