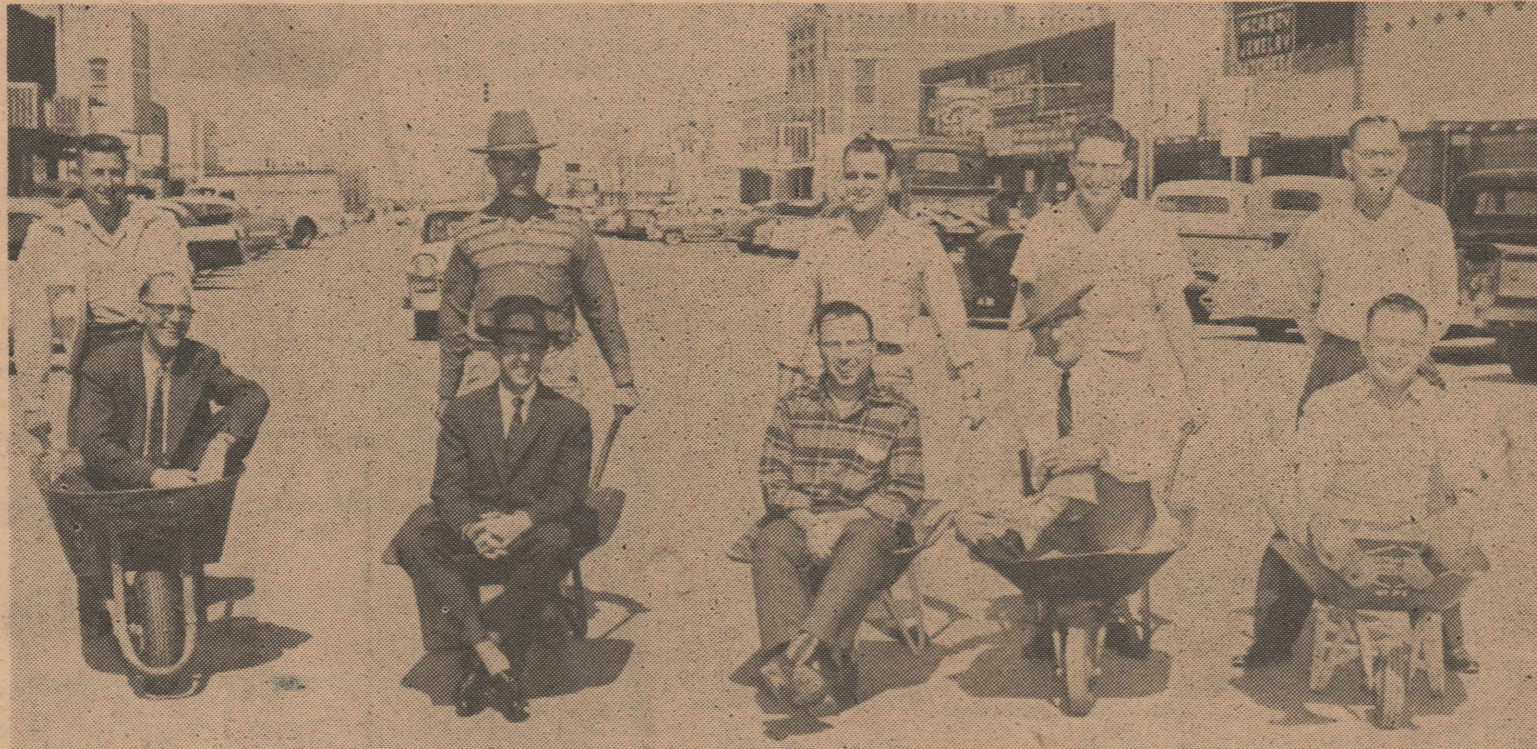
In the bi-district game the Mustangs lost to Knox City by a narrow margin.

4-H Club Bake Show Slated Here March 30

When the 4-H girls hold their County Bake Show March 30 a ribbon will be awarded in each of four divisions, according to Miss S. C. Kinsey, county Home Demonstration agent.

The divisions were determined by the girls who represent their individual clubs on the County 4-H Council and are as follows: Drop cookies, easy cake, quick loaf bread, and cheese sandwiches.

The show and a bake sale will be in the American Legion building in Knox City, with registration starting at 9 a. m. and judging at 10:00.

That afternoon, contests will be conducted in certain types of demonstrations to select individuals and teams of girls to represent the county in district competition at Wichita Falls April 13. Contests scheduled in the county are Dairy Foods demonstrations at 1:30; Vegetable Production demonstrations at 2:30; and Electric Team demonstrations at 3:00 p. m.

Any Knox County 4-H girl is eligible to enter the show or contest, Miss Kinsey said.

A number of adult leaders have assisted the girls in planning these activities and have volunteered to help on March 30.

Schedule Set for Free Polio Shots

Dr. D. C. Eiland, county health officer, today announced the time schedule for the free Salk polio shots to be given Knox Countians from six months to 20 years of age at the Knox County Hospital next week.

As announced last week, people from Munday will be vaccinated on March 25; from Knox City March 26; from Goree, Benjamin, Rhineland, Vera and Gilliland March 27.

School children will be vaccinated from 10 a. m. to 3 p. m. School superintendents will be notified as to what time to bring each group. Pre-school children should be brought at 3 p. m., after the schools have finished, and Dr. Eiland pointed out that all under 20 must be accompanied by a parent or have written permission to receive the shots.

Vaccine will not be given to anyone over 20, except pregnant women. These women, and those under 20 but not in school, should also come at 3 p. m.

Those who have had their first or first and second Salk shots may receive the remainder of their shots, the health officer said.

The grain certificates will be issued by J. T. Gilpin of the ASC office, and mailed direct to the applicant. The roughage certificates will be issued by the Farmers Home Administration office in Seymour and mailed direct to the applicant. Roughage certificates will cover feed purchased from March 13, and must be presented to the bank not later than April 15.
