Knox Boys' Hogs Tops in County Show

The Brazos Valley Gin yard was literally covered Saturday with sheep, swine, 4-H and FFA boys and spectators.

The occasion was the annual Knox County Sheep and Swine Show, and Saturday's show was the best ever held in the county, according to Roy England, county agent, and L. E. Groves, Knox City vocational agriculture teacher.

Roy McClung, Baylor County farm agent, judged the swine. He chose a Hampshire gilt exhibited by Jerry Johnston of the Knox City FFA as the champion female, and a Hampshire boar exhibited by J. Tom Graham of the Knox City FFA as champion male.

Placing second and third in the breeding gilts division were animals exhibited by Tommy Howry, Goree 4-H, and George Offutt, Munday FFA. Second and third place boars were exhibited by David Albus and Dwayne Herring, both of the Rhineland 4-H Club.

Champion breeding sow was shown by Frank Pierce, Benjamin 4-H, with second and third place honors going to Clarence Herring Jr., Rhineland 4-H, and Offutt.

Herring also showed the top sow and litter, with Marion Kuehler, Rhineland 4-H, and Glen Phillips, Munday FFA, winning second and third.

Pictures of winners in the swine contest will be published next week.

Sheep Division
In the sheep division the champion breeding ewe was exhibited by Martin Welch of the Gilliland 4-H Club.

David Albus of the Rhineland 4-H showed the champion fat lamb, and Skeet McGaughey of the Benjamin 4-H exhibited the reserve champion.

The sheep show was judged by Allen Turner, lamb buyer for Shirley Livestock Commission Co. of Ft. Worth. Donny Ryder, Benjamin 4-H and FFA boy, won the lamb showmanship award.

Lambs Marketed
Following the show the lambs were shipped to the Ft. Worth market and a group of 4-H boys, accompanied by the county agent and adult leaders, went to Ft. Worth to observe marketing procedures and packing plant operations.

The lambs cashed in at \$21.50 and \$22. England said the boys bought their lambs at \$16.50 last November, so the price Monday gave them a good spread and some of them nice profits, despite adverse drought conditions. One boy had a 60 pound gain in his lambs.

England reported the lamb project proved especially profitable where the boys had irrigated wheat pasture, and some of the grown-ups have been so impressed they plan to launch similar operations.

Jack Barker Elected Mayor of Benjamin

Jack Barker was elected mayor of Benjamin in the city election Tuesday, and Collins Moorhouse and Aubrey Barnett were named councilmen. The candidates were unopposed.

Barker's election ended 26 years of service in the city government by Leroy Melton, Benjamin druggist. Melton, who had been mayor 20 years, did not seek re-election.

The new mayor is manager of the Knox County Abstract Co.

Otis Harbert Is Mayor Elect

Knox Citizens elected a new mayor and one new alderman in the city election Tuesday, when 295 votes were cast.

Otis Harbert was elected mayor or with 177 votes. Incumbent Barney Arnold, completing his first term, received 118, according to the unofficial count.

The new mayor is owner of Harbert Hotel, and is active in civic affairs. He is currently serving as president of the Knox City Lions Club.

Vaughan Gruben was high man in the aldermanic race with 181 votes. Otis Cash and Russell Boyd, both candidates for re-election, were tied with 138 each in the unofficial count, and W. P. White received 103.

The votes will be officially canvassed at the next meeting of the city council, probably next week, city officials said this morning. It was not announced how the tie will be settled, if there is still a tie after the official count.

Knox County Voters Favor Yarbrough

Knox County helped elect Ralph W. Yarbrough to the United States Senate Tuesday, giving him more than 50 per cent of the vote cast for the top four candidates.

Yarbrough received 565 votes, while his nearest opponent, Martin Dies, received 271. Thad Hutcheson, the Republican candidate, received only 97, and John C. White received 105.

Knox City, long a Yarbrough stronghold, gave him 199 votes. Dies received 78, Hutcheson 36 and White 29.

The vote in Knox City's south box was Elmer Adams 1, Searcy Bracewell 4, Dies 59, Ralph W. Hammons 1, James P. Hart 5, Charles W. (Jack) Hill 1, Hutcheson 21, White 20 and Yarbrough 128.

In the north box the vote was Dies 19, Hammons 1, Hill 1, Hutcheson 15, White 9 and Yarbrough 71.
