**Farm and Ranch Notes**

By Roy England, County Agent  
Brown wheat mites are building up to damaging numbers in many fields of wheat in Knox County. These infestations are especially heavy on land that has been in wheat for two consecutive years. Crop rotation is still the most effective means

of preventing heavy build-up of this insect. Control should be initiated whenever a stand of wheat is threatened and adequate moisture is present. For control of the Brown Wheat Mite, as well as the Winter Grain Mite and Greenbugs, one pint of parathion should be applied by spray when temperatures are above 50 degrees.

\*\*\*  
Aphids are doing some damage to the cabbage recently planted in the Munday and Knox City areas. This insect may be controlled by use of parathion, malathion, lindane or TEPP. Special precautions are absolutely necessary when using either parathion or TEPP.

**H-D Notes . . .**

Barbecued pot roast has proved to be a popular dish with a number of Knox County Home Demonstration Club members, since some of the leaders used this method for their meat preparation demonstration in February. Mrs. Claudell Bratcher and Mrs. Gaylon Scott of Vera report that this is especially true in the Vera Club.

The following is the recipe which they used:

- Barbecued Pot Roast**  
3 lb. beef pot roast (blade or arm cut)  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
3 tablespoons fat  
1 8-oz. can tomato sauce  
1/2 cup water  
3 medium onions  
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard  
2 cloves garlic  
1/2 cup lemon juice  
1/2 cup catsup  
2 tablespoons brown sugar  
1/2 cup vinegar  
1/2 teaspoon paprika  
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Rub meat with salt and pepper; brown in hot fat. Add water, tomato sauce, minced or thinly sliced onions and minced garlic. Cover and cook over low heat 1 1/2 hours. Combine remaining ingredients and pour over meat; cover and continue cooking about 1 hour, or until tender. Remove meat to hot platter. Skim most of fat from gravy, dilute with water to suit taste, then thicken with 2 tablespoons flour mixed to smooth paste with a little water. Serves 4 or 5.

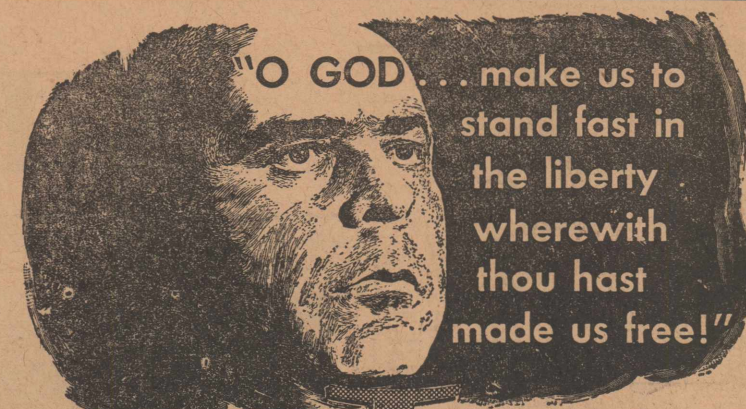

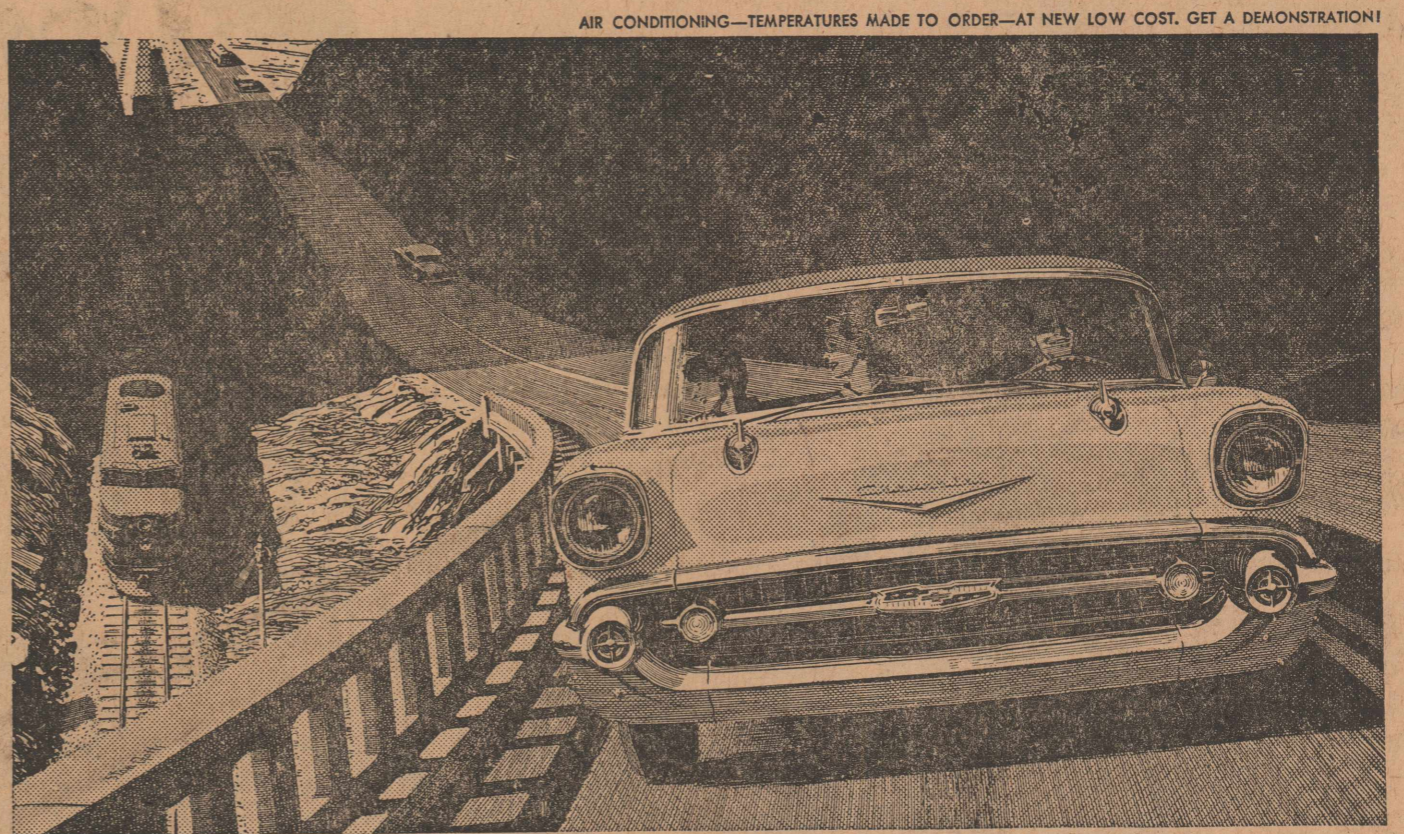
