





The following is the which they used:

**Barbecued Pot Roast** 3 lb. beef pot roast (blade or arm cut)

teaspoon pepper teaspoons salt tablespoons fat

8-oz. can tomato sauce cup water

medium onions teaspoon dry mustard cloves garlic

cup lemon juice cup catsup

tablespoons brown sugar cup vinegar teaspoon paprika

tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Rub meat with salt and pepper; brown in hot fat. Add water, tomato sauce, minced or thinly sliced onions and minced garlic. Cover and cook over low heat 1½ hours. Combine remaining ingredients and pour over meat; cover and continue cooking about 1 hour, or until tender. Remove meat to hot platter. skim most of fat from gravy, dilute with water to suit taste, then thicken with 2 tablespoons flour mixed to smooth paste with a little water. Serves 4 or



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
