O'Brien Gin Pays Cash Dividend Totaling \$50,302.61

A cash dividend of \$50,302.61 was declared at the annual stockholders meeting of the O'Brien Cooperative Gin Co. Saturday.

The dividend amounted to \$4 per bale for the cotton ginned during the 1956 season.

Payment of the dividend will leave enough cash on hand to do all repair work on the gin plants, equipment and housing, according to S. N. Reed, manager. The gin will begin operating this fall on a cash basis with no indebtedness.

The sale will be sometime in June, with the date to be announced later.

Otis Harbert, president, announced that Mrs. J. M. Bradberry had resigned as club sweetheart and pianist, and asked members to find someone to replace her.

Public Meeting Will Be Called to Discuss Lake Plan

Mayor Otis Harbert said this week that a public meeting will be called in the near future to hear a discussion of the proposed Miller Creek Lake project.

A bill authorizing organization of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority was signed by the governor last week, and it is expected that an election will be called sometime this summer to determine if Knox Citizens want to participate in the lake project, which would furnish municipal water for seven area towns.

"The city council wants the public to thoroughly understand the proposal," Harbert said, "and the meeting will be scheduled when representatives of the bonding company or the engineering company, or both, can be present and give a complete picture of the need and the cost of the project."

4 Inches of Rain Received in Week

Despite the necessity of replanting many hundreds of acres, Knox Citizens were counting their blessings this week as reports came in of hail, excessive rains and flooding streams over many sections of the state.

While the rains here have added up to a whopping 4.07 inches for the past week, they have been evenly distributed and there have been no reports of badly washed fields or other damage. Rain has fallen every day except one in the past week, and the heaviest in any single day was 1.59 inches.

Heavier rains were reported west of town, and all stock tanks were filled to overflowing.

Official total in Knox City so far this year is 10.45 inches, while the total for the same period last year was only 2.62 inches.

And it's still raining.

City Council Boosts Water Meter Deposit

At a meeting of the city council last Thursday night, the council voted to raise water meter deposits from \$5 to \$10, in line with the charges made by other towns in the area. At the same time the tapping charge was raised from \$10 to \$15. This is also in line with other towns, according to Mayor Otis Harbert, who said \$10 did not cover the actual cost of tapping a line.

The higher meter deposit on future installations will help reduce the loss to the city due to unpaid water bills. The council instructed the city secretary to take steps to collect delinquent bills, and in the future, to discontinue service when bills are not paid by the 10th. This is in accordance with an ordinance passed by the city council in June, 1955, Harbert said. Delinquent water and sewer bills at present total more than \$500.00.

Plans were also discussed for taking steps to collect delinquent taxes, in order to put the city on a more sound financial footing. Delinquent taxes on the books amount to more than \$12,000.00.

Joe Reeder, Jr., was retained as city attorney by the council.

A swimming pool was discussed at length, but the council agreed there was no feasible plan for construction of a municipal pool at present. They deferred further discussion until a later date, and expressed their willingness to cooperate as fully as possible with any individual, club or other organization with plans for constructing a pool.

Mayor Harbert resigned from the Local Housing Authority, which is in charge of the Federal low-cost housing project, and the council appointed Henry Jones to replace him. Other members of the Authority are Joe Reeder, Jr., Paul Hoge, J. M. Averitt and Judge L. M. Williams.

The child died Tuesday afternoon in Union Hospital, Terre Haute, Indiana, of burns she received in an automobile accident last Friday night. She and her parents and sister, Patsy Sue, 10, were enroute to Ft. Worth from Illinois where West had been on a temporary job. He works for Consolidated Aircraft in Ft. Worth.

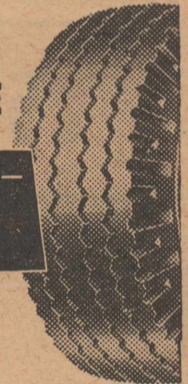

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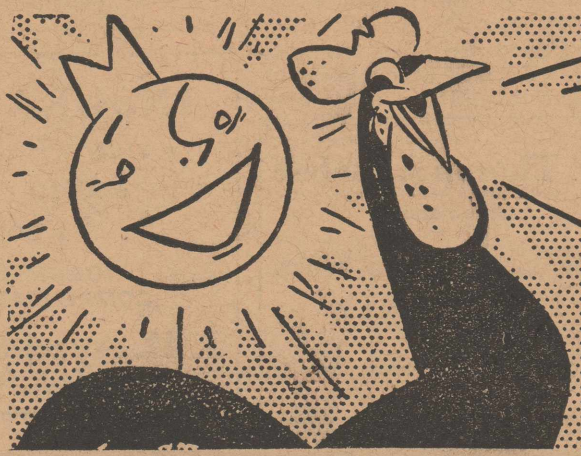
