Residents of the Knox City area who have not previously had their blood typed and who are willing to donate blood through the local "walking blood bank" may have their blood typed tomorrow (Friday) night at the Knox City Clinic from 8 to 9 o'clock.

Technicians from the Knox City Clinic and volunteers for record-keeping will be on hand to begin a blood typing program being sponsored in Knox County by home demonstration clubs and locally by the 1946 Study Club.

The study club conducted a survey several weeks ago to enlist new donors. Approximately 65 names of Knox City residents were added to the walking blood bank list. Anyone who was missed in the survey may report to the clinic, Dr. D. C. Eiland, county health officer, said today. Anyone 16 years old or older may be typed.

Area Wheat Harvest Getting Under Way

The wheat harvest in the Knox City area is expected to get into full swing within the next week if the dry weather and sunshine continues, local grain men say.

Market Poultry & Egg Co. at O'Brien received its first load Tuesday from the Milton Rowan farm 1½ mi. west of O'Brien. The dry land wheat, of the Early Triumph variety, cut 22½ bushels per acre, according to Alton Hester, Market Poultry & Egg manager. Last Friday night's driving rain and high wind did com-

paratively little damage to the wheat, according to reports, and a bumper yield is expected.

County Agent Roy England said the excessive rains caused some damage where the water stood in terrace channels, low spots and natural lakes, but that very little of the grain was down.

The harvest of early wheat in the Truscott and Gilliland area is under way, and the county agent reported that some dry land wheat had cut as high as 40 bushels per acre. He expects the average yield on dry land to "crowd 20 bushels," and the average on irrigated land to range between 35 and 50 bushels per acre.

England said there has been extensive damage to grain crops—mostly to oats—between Hefner and Vera by Army worm infestations. Some fields of oats were completely ruined by the pests, he added. In the Vera community, some farmers are wind-rowing green oats to speed up their maturity.

The county agent also reported that potato digging in the county will probably begin by Munday, and that some cabbage crops will be ready for their second cutting. The potato crop will be fair, he said, but probably not as good as last year.

Several farmers in the Knox City area are growing potatoes and cabbages for the first time.
