> The two new wells near the nospital were tested last week. While they were running, one well had 6 feet, 6 inches of water and the other 12 feet, 3 inches. Both wells are 30-inch holes with 16-inch casing.

Garrison, who has just finished mailing out water bills, said the average family will pay from \$10.50 to \$25 for water used last month. The six-unit housing project in the east part of town was a big user, with the meter showing 935,000 gallons used last month. The bill, paid by the housing authority, was \$244.75.




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
