Farm and Ranch Notes

Perennial Sweet Sudan, a result of 15 years of breeding and selection, has been developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. This new plant, a cross between sweet sudan and Johnson grass, is very palatable and sweet, like its sweet sudan parent, and perennial like its Johnson grass parent, though it is less likely to become a pest due to its shorter rhizomes that do not penetrate deeply into the soil. Certified seed will be available in the summer of 1958.

Right now would be a good time to look into a defoliation program if you plan to harvest your cotton with strippers or pickers this fall. Copies of the 1957 Cotton Defoliation Guide are now available at the county extension office.

Providing adequate shade, fresh water and ventilation for those poultry flocks and hogs during the hot days ahead will help to maintain production and mean more profit at market time.

Dr. Finley Graham from the Near East Baptist Missions, Beirut, Lebanon, will be missionary speaker for the WMU camp at 8 p. m. August 8. Rev. Byron Bryant will speak at 11 a. m. Friday and Mrs. Evan Reiff of Abilene will conduct the morning watch. A leadership course for directors and counselors of YWA, GA and Sunbeam work will be taught and awards given. Mrs. George Graham of Abilene is district WMU president.

Cowan, Johnson To Attend Texas Coaching School

Knox City coaches Les Cowan and Bob Johnson will be among an estimated 2,150 coaches attending the twenty-fifth annual Texas Coaching School, which opens in Dallas next week.

L. W. McConachie, executive vice-president of the Texas High School Coaches Assn., predicted an all-time record attendance at the school, Aug. 4-9.

Coaches from at least 11 other states and Mexico will be on hand for the huge clinic. It will require three Dallas hotels to handle the convention and the athletic facilities of Southern Methodist University are being used for training of football and basketball squads that clash in all-star games. The basketball game will be in the 8,000-seat SMU coliseum Thursday night, with the football game in the Cotton Bowl Friday night.

The faculty of the coaching school will be impressive. Bud Wilkinson of Oklahoma and Bowen Wyatt of Tennessee will lecture on football. Their teams were No. 1 and No. 2 in the nation last fall. Wilkinson uses the split T and Wyatt the single wing.

In basketball it will be Milton Jowers of Southwest Texas State and Hank Iba of Oklahoma A & M, while Oliver Jackson of Abilene Christian College will talk about track.

Among the top personalities to be interviewed at the clinic will be Wilkinson, Wyatt, and George Mikan, the most famous basketball player of all time.

Also during the clinic representative high school coaches will be interviewed on what the Texas schoolboy campaign promises this fall.

Miss Bailey was in the Air Force two years, spending more than a year in Iceland and Newfoundland.

Employed as vocational agriculture teacher was George E. Piller of Abilene. Piller is a 1950 graduate of Texas Tech and was VA instructor at ACC in Abilene. He spent two years in the Navy.

Piller is part-owner of Buddy's Feed Store in Abilene, and was superintendent of the swine division of the Abilene Fat Stock Show and the West Texas State Fair.

Still needed by the school are a Homemaking teacher and a commercial teacher who can also teach in the upper grades.

Mathis said the O'Brien School will begin Sept. 2 and end May 27. Holidays will be Thanksgiving, Nov. 28-29; Christmas, Dec. 21-29; and Easter, April 4 and 7. Students will also have a holiday March 7 when teachers attend an associational meeting.

Tickets to the 20th annual football classic between Texas and Oklahoma schoolboy stars are on sale at the Kemp Hotel in Wichita Falls.

Amerson won all-state honors last fall and was a triple threat sparkplug of the strong Moguls all season. Weighing 181, and ranging upward 6 feet, 1 inch, Amerson attracted much attention from colleges. He is headed for Texas Tech in September.

Amerson played offense and defense and guided the Moguls to a fine season from his quarterback slot. He is the first quarterback picked for the Texas Oil Bowl squad.

The two boys named Tuesday join a fine Texas backfield that boasts Abilene's Lynn Gregory, fullbacks Max Morris of Littlefield and Richard Christopher of Vernon, and halfback Fer-man McBeth of Hale Center.

Linemen chosen so far are all-stars Stuart Peake of Abilene and Gerald Emerson of Henrietta, both guards.

Hot Weather Taxes City's Water System

The city's water system has been taxed to the limit the past 30 days, according to City Secretary Wesley Garrison, and pumps on the five city wells have been running 24 hours a day.

No water rationing is anticipated by city officials. However, the school was asked to stop irrigating the football field until the wells refill, and everyone was urged to equip air conditioners with re-circulating pumps.

The water tower is filled every night, Garrison said, but empties during the day despite the fact that the pumps are kept going.

Allen Barnett, water superintendent, estimates he has been pumping 600,000 gallons per day. But the town has been without water only one half hour recently, when a pump was down on a well near the hospital, and the well at the tower and the well near the railroad were temporarily pumped dry.

The two new wells near the hospital were tested last week. While they were running, one well had 6 feet, 6 inches of water and the other 12 feet, 3 inches. Both wells are 30-inch holes with 16-inch casing.

Garrison, who has just finished mailing out water bills, said the average family will pay from \$10.50 to \$25 for water used last month. The six-unit housing project in the east part of town was a big user, with the meter showing 935,000 gallons used last month. The bill, paid by the housing authority, was \$244.75.

As soon as water use slacks off, the city secretary said, the fire department plans to burn the weeds off several vacant lots in town.

W. M. Rowan Dies Tuesday; Funeral Today

Funeral services for W. M. Rowan were to be held at 3 o'clock this afternoon (Thursday) at the First Baptist Church with the Rev. Billy Frazier, pastor, officiating.

Mr. Rowan died at 3:30 p. m. Tuesday, July 30 in the Knox County Hospital, where he had been critically ill the past two weeks. He had been in ill health since 1952 when he suffered his first heart attack.

He was born in Garland County, Ark., October 26, 1887, and came to Texas in 1926. At that time he settled near Rochester. He later bought land three miles northwest of Knox City and lived there until his retirement 12 years ago, when he moved to town.

Mr. Rowan was active in all affairs of the First Baptist Church until ill health prevented his participation. He was former Sunday School superintendent and teacher, and former music director and choir leader. He was a 32nd degree Mason, a member of Knights Templar, Maskat Temple Shrine of Wichita Falls, and of the Commandery in Haskell.

Masonic graveside rites were to be held at the Knox City Cemetery, with burial under the direction of Pinkard-Smith Funeral Home of Knox City.

Survivors are his wife; one son, Milton of O'Brien; two daughters, Mrs. Jack Tankersley and Mrs. Elwood Hackney, both of Knox City; one brother, J. H. Rowan of Amity, Ark.; one sister, Mrs. Maggie Triplett of Pine Bluff, Ark.; and eight grandchildren.

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Bailey Reports on Lions Convention in San Francisco

Rev. Floyd V. Bailey, who attended the Lions International Convention in San Francisco recently as a delegate of the local club, gave a report on the convention when the club met Wednesday.

Bailey said the strength of Lionism, which is only 39 years old, was clearly demonstrated at the convention, with representatives present from 82 countries under 58 flags.

Speakers from India and other nations, he said, credited Lionism with maintaining peace in the world.

Lions International now has more than 600,000 members, he reported. Last year 1,008 new clubs were established in eight countries. More than 170,000 community service projects were completed by the various clubs.

During the recent Hungarian crisis, he added, Lions International handled more than \$80,000 in Hungarian relief funds.

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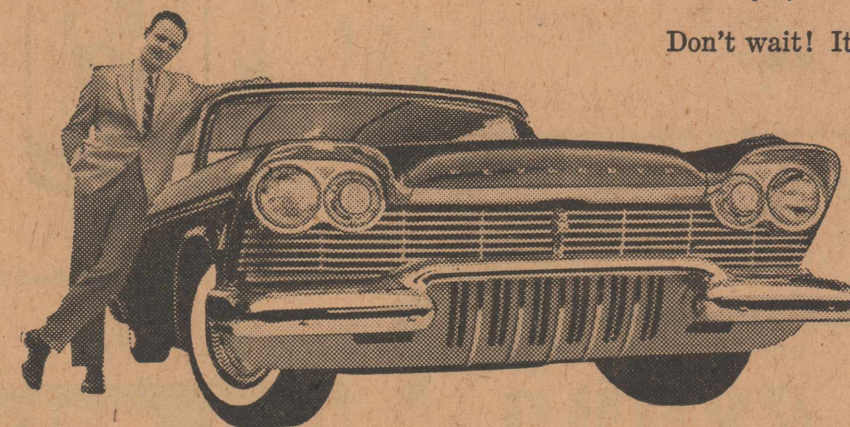

AGRICULTURAL RESEARCH NOTES

Topdressing winter wheat with nitrogen fertilizer paid good dividends in extra yields in tests at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station near Amarillo.

The plots which received nitrogen fertilizer also produced more wheat per inch of irrigation water than the unfertilized wheat.

Alex Pope, assistant agronomist at the station said application of 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre in the form of ammonium nitrate (33 percent nitrate) gave the greatest return per fertilizer dollar. At one of the test locations where no nitrogen fertilizer was applied the yield was 25 bushels per acre compared with 53 bushels on wheat which received 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre.

He said also that ammonium nitrate appeared to be a better source of nitrogen than ammonium sulfate for topdressing winter wheat in late February.

A previously undescribed disease of cotton occurring in the Lower Rio Grande Valley has been found to be caused by a virus. Studies already are under way by researchers of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station to identify the virus and to seek methods for its control.

Dr. David W. Rosberg, of Texas A and M College's Department of Plant Physiology and Pathology and the experiment station, said the virus is not carried over in the seed from one year to the next.

Affected plants are somewhat stunted and bolls are one-half to two-thirds normal size. The seed are small and poorly filled. Leaves of the infected plants are mottled and red-spotted and

the veins are cleared and banded by dark green areas. Older leaves become buff-colored, are conspicuously red-spotted and fall readily.

Fertilization of irrigated grain sorghum with nitrogen at the rate of 60 pounds an acre produced the most economic yield increase of all fertilizer tests conducted the past three years at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station near Amarillo.

The fertilizer applications resulted also in more efficient use of irrigation water, and were conducted on land which had been in irrigated grain sorghum for five years.

There was no response of the sorghum to phosphorus alone or in combination with nitrogen, although there was a tendency of response to phosphorus when applied with 160 pounds of nitrogen per acre.

An application of 160 pounds of nitrogen an acre increased the protein content of the grain compared with sorghum which received 80 pounds and another test which had no nitrogen.

Yield increase associated with the application of nitrogen were due to increased head size and, in part, to increased bushel weight.

ABOUT YOUR HEALTH . . .

AUSTIN. — Summer is well on its way in Texas, and school days are practically around the corner. And it is time that mothers should start thinking about getting the young ones ready for school again.

Special consideration should be given to the thousands of Texas youngsters who will be starting school for the first time.

Most school districts have certain requirements which must be met before a child may be entered in school. Foremost in nearly every school is proof of birth.

If you do not have a copy of your child's birth certificate, a certified copy may be obtained from the Texas State Department of Health for a one dollar fee.

Write to the Bureau of Vital Statistics, Texas State Department of Health, Austin, Texas. Be certain to include the child's name, birth date and birth place, and the name of his parents. Also, enclose \$1.00 cash (at your own risk) or money order.

Every child should have a pre-school health examination. His height, weight, posture, vision and hearing should be checked. Often school beginners' problems can be traced to faulty vision and hearing.

Have your dentist go over your child's teeth again. With the excitement and challenge of school, new physical—and emotional—demands are made on him and to get the most out of school, he needs to be physically ready for it.

With school come more chances for exposure to communicable diseases. This isn't the school's fault—it's because your child is becoming a part of a bigger world.

To help prevent illness, check up on immunizations, especially your school district's requirements. See that your child is still protected against diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, smallpox, and by all means have his polio series started if you have not already done so.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 51a of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:
Section 51a. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of the State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of judicial districts of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State, under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund."
"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 51a, Article XVI of the State Constitution relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 51a, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and this Amendment shall be published and the election held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children; and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:
Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:
(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person; and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until and unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.
(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.
(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.
"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer

not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year.
"The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make provision of the amounts of aid hereunder available for inspection."
"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning December 1, 1957, and ending August 31, 1959: Four Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000) for Old Age Assistance, One Hundred, Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000) for Aid to the Blind, and Five Hundred, Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$525,000) for Aid to Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and other wise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fifth day of November, 1957, at which election there shall be printed on each ballot the following clauses:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year; and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year; and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."
Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
