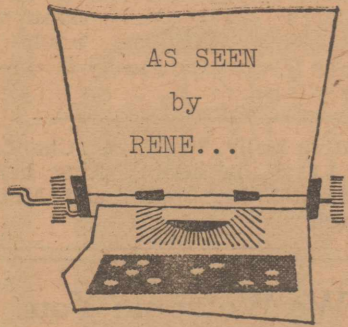

School Students To Register Next Thursday

All students of Knox City Schools, both elementary and high school, will register at 10 a. m. Thursday, Aug. 29, Supt. Chas. E. Silk said Wednesday.

The buses will run Thursday morning in time to get the rural children to the school by 10 o'clock.

The students will be at the school about an hour, the superintendent said, and the buses will return them home at 11:30. A general faculty meeting will be held in the high school building at 2 p. m. Thursday, followed by separate meetings of the elementary faculty and the high school faculty.

Friday, Aug. 30, will be the first day of classes. Classes will begin at 9 a. m., lunch will be served in the lunchroom, and school will dismiss at 4 p. m. with the exception of the first three grades, which will dismiss at 3 p. m.

Prices for lunches in the school lunchroom will be 30 cents for school children and 40 cents for adults. Supt. Silk reminded parents of beginning students that small-pox and diphtheria vaccinations are required. Another requirement for first graders is a birth certificate, which will be returned to the parents as soon as the school records are completed.

The Board of Education will meet in a special session Tuesday night, Aug. 27, for preliminary study of the school budget for the 1957-58 term.

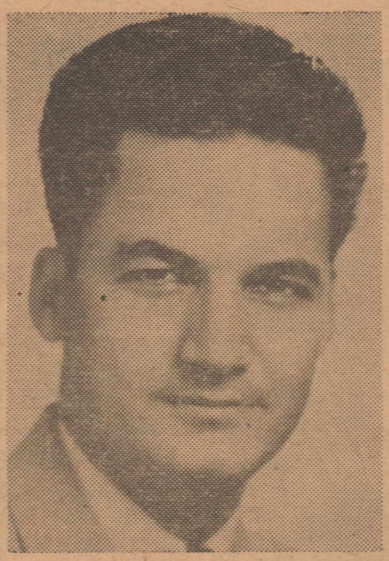

Rates of payment for individual farms will vary up and down from a county average rate per acre according to the relative productivity of the farms and other factors.

Farmers who are eligible to sign 1958 Acreage Reserve agreements for winter wheat are those who have "old farm" wheat acreage allotments for 1958 and who normally grow winter wheat.

Chairman Partridge explained that, under the 1958 program, each producer will be responsible for furnishing the County ASC Committee with the production history and other information needed to establish a "Soil Bank base" for his farm, and this must be done before the agreement may be signed. The required information should be supplied at least 15 days before the end of the sign-up period on October 4.

The "base" will be determined primarily on the basis of the average acreage of land devoted to Soil Bank base crops during 1956 and 1957; the base crops, in general, are all crops produced for harvest on a farm, except hay crops. If a farm already has a base established under the Soil Bank's Conservation Reserve Program, that base will apply.

Farmers who earn payments under the 1958 wheat Acreage Reserve Program must reduce their wheat acreage below the farm's wheat allotment, must comply with any other allotments set for crops on their farm, and must not harvest more total acreage than the "permitted acreage"—which is in general the Soil Bank base less the number of acres put in the Soil Bank.

Farm and Ranch Notes

Due to a shortage of good varieties of oat seed for the coming year, it is likely that seed of many unadapted varieties will be shipped into Texas from other states this fall. Farmers should use caution in the purchase of seed oats, and try to obtain one of the recommended varieties for this area.

Varieties recommended for fall or spring sowing are Mustang, New Nortex, Bronco and Fultex. Alamo is recommended for spring sowing only because of its lower cold tolerance.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has listed 31 varieties of wheat as undesirable because of their inferior milling or baking qualities. These varieties will be discounted 20 cents a bushel in price support rates on the 1958 crop. The varieties concerned with in this area are Blue Jacket, Early Blackhull, Chiefkan, Kanking, Redchief and Red Jacket.

The price-support regulations for 1958 will provide for producer certification regarding the undesirable varieties. Recommended wheat varieties for this area include Crockett, Westar, Concho, Comanche, Ponca, Quannah and Early Triumph.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State. **BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of judicial districts of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 45-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State, under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AMENDING SUBSECTION (A) OF SECTION 62, ARTICLE XVI OF THE STATE CONSTITUTION, RELATING TO ESTABLISHMENT OF A RETIREMENT, DISABILITY AND DEATH COMPENSATION FUND FOR OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE STATE."

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AMENDING SUBSECTION (A) OF SECTION 62, ARTICLE XVI OF THE STATE CONSTITUTION, RELATING TO ESTABLISHMENT OF A RETIREMENT, DISABILITY AND DEATH COMPENSATION FUND FOR OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE STATE."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and this Amendment shall be published and the election held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
