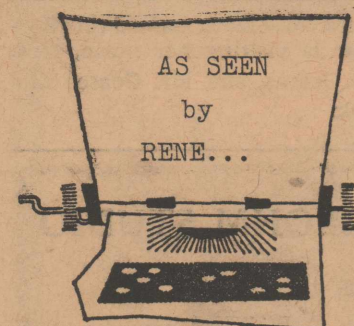

Television Tower To Be Up Soon

A 400-foot television antenna tower is now under construction and should be erected here by Oct. 20, C. E. Williams announced this week.

Williams and his father, L. M. Williams, are owners of TV Antenna Service Co., which will erect the tower under a franchise granted by the city. Crews will soon begin stringing coaxial cable through alleys, and the company hopes to be furnishing service to subscribers within about 30 days.

Installation of the tower and closed-circuit system should greatly improve television reception in Knox City, Williams said. The high tower will receive primary signals from stations in Wichita Falls, Abilene and Sweetwater, and should also receive a strong signal from Ft. Worth. Plans call for installation of a five-channel system including channels 3 and 6 of Wichita Falls, channel 9 of Abilene, channel 12, Sweetwater, and channel 5, Ft. Worth.

The tower will be located on the Gore property at the edge of town, away from ignition and electrical interference. The signal will be carried through shielded coaxial cables. These two towers, plus the height of the tower, should virtually eliminate interference, Williams added.

Amplifiers will be installed at 1000 foot intervals along the cable, insuring equal reception at any point in the system.

The company has contracts ready for those who wish to subscribe to the service. Charges to those who sign up while the construction crews are here will be \$15.00 for the first month and \$7.50 monthly thereafter. After the construction crews leave it will be necessary to charge a tie-in fee, Williams said.

Social Security Law Misunderstood By Knox Residents

Some Knox County Social Security beneficiaries have been caused unnecessary embarrassment and hardship in recent months, according to Erton F. Tate, district manager. The difficulty could have been avoided, he added, had these people understood what earnings count toward determining how many social security insurance checks they could receive for a year.

He mentioned the case of a young mother who was receiving survivors benefits for herself and her children based on her deceased husband's wage records. She works for a non-profit organization and her job is not covered by social security. Because of this she assumed that she could receive all of her benefit checks regardless of the amount she earned. She did not know that all earnings from employment or self-employment must be considered whether the work is under social security or not, Tate said. By the time she found out differently, she had been overpaid for several months and was required to make a full refund of the amount.

Another recent case related by Tate was that of a Knox City man who applied for his social security several months ago, drew one check, and then had them stopped because he expected to earn over the \$1200 limit. Several months later he found that he had needlessly deprived himself of his benefits. His expected earnings were actually stock dividends and a pension that his former employer paid him. Earnings such as these do not count in figuring income for the retirement test, so this man's monthly old-age payments were

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resumed and his back payments sent to him.

Some other non-earned income which does not affect social security benefits are income from savings, investments, insurance, and rents. Tate advises all social security beneficiaries who

are not certain about their rights under the retirement test to contact the social security office for further information.
