



The total land under irrigation in Texas now stands at 6,962,234 acres. This compares with a total of 6,208,022 in 1955 (figures are from a similar survey). In June when the figures were taken, 39,706 farms were listed as being irrigated. Only 10 counties in the state reported no irrigation. The number of irrigation wells rose from 42,674



in 1955 to 54,994 in 1957. The number of sprinkler systems in use almost doubled during this same period with a 200,000 acre increase in the land thus irri-
