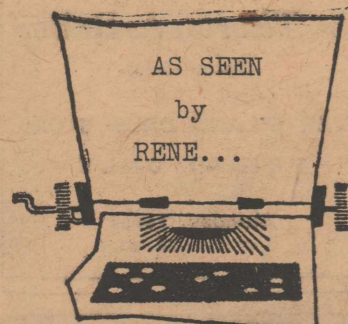

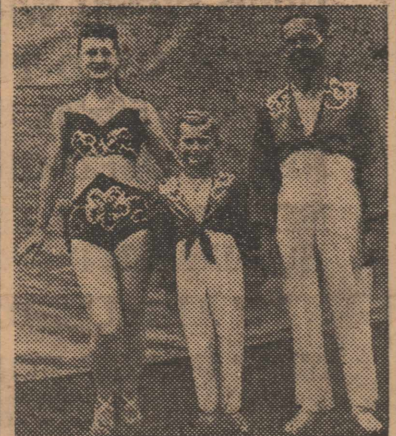

### Mapping of Proposed Lake Site Completed

Topographic mapping of the watershed area of the proposed Miller Creek Reservoir has been completed, and core drilling of the tentative dam and lake site was scheduled to begin Sept. 30 and should be completed in three weeks.

Tom Craddock of Seymour, chairman of the Citizens Water Committee of the North Central Texas Municipal Water District, was advised by Freese & Nichols, engineers on the project, that when core drilling is finished the engineers can prepare estimates of cost on the project to furnish water to Knox City and six other area towns.

Munday schools were also closed Tuesday, with 16 percent of the 653 students absent.

The O'Brien school was to be dismissed today and Friday, Supt. Elvin T. Mathis announced after a called meeting of the school board Wednesday.

Wednesday morning 42 students were out of school, from a total enrollment of 217, the superintendent said. The number included 34 in the elementary grades and eight in high school.

Mrs. Doug Benham, O'Brien Homemaking teacher, was the only teacher who missed classes. She was ill Tuesday and Wednesday but expected to be back in school today, Mathis said.

The O'Brien Bulldogs' district football game with Weinert, where school was also closed because of flu, was cancelled and reset for Nov. 14.

Classes at all the schools are scheduled to be resumed at the regular time Monday.

### County Agent Says Fungus Causing Damage to Cotton

Verticillium wilt, a fungus disease similar in many ways to fusarium wilt, is causing heavy damage to some cotton fields southwest of Munday. County Agent Roy England said this week.

The disease has followed irrigated cotton northward and westward across Texas, England said, and is much more insidious in its action than is cotton root rot, mainly because control of verticillium wilt requires conditions and practices that tend to promote the spread of cotton root rot.

The verticillium wilt fungus favors cool weather for development, whereas cotton root rot favors hot weather. Frequent light irrigations to prevent excessive cooling of the ground aid in controlling verticillium wilt, but promote the growth of cotton root rot. "Any cultural practice that aids in raising the soil temperature helps control this disease, such as summer fallowing or planting on top of the bed," England said. "Rotations that include a small grain following summer fallow also are beneficial."

Characteristics of verticillium wilt are a shedding of the leaves and small bolls, beginning at the bottom and gradually moving up the plant. On cutting the stem in two, a cross section will reveal a brown flecked appearance of the normally white woody stem.

Losses from this disease will range upward to 50 percent on heavily infested soils, England said.

## Cotton Crops in County Heavily Damaged by Hail

Many Knox County farmers, who had already had too much rain, not enough rain, too many insects and the other normal hazards of cotton farming, received another low blow Monday night after seeing their crops mature with prospects for a near-bumper yield.

Hail and damaging rain fell over much of the county, with some sizable spots suffering hail

damage ranging from 50 to 100 percent.

County Agent Roy England, who toured the county Tuesday afternoon, said there was some hail damage in spots over most of the county, with the hardest hit area running from Gilliland through Vera, Rhineland, north and east of Munday, north and west of Goree. Receiving very heavy damage was a strip about one mile by four miles at Gilli-

land and a strip about one mile by seven miles between Goree and Munday, containing about 2,000 acres. Some dry land crops in the area, he added were totally destroyed.

In the Gilliland area, rain measured from five to seven inches, and the average over most of the county was three inches, England said. Knox City received 2.24 inches, according to Weatherman Horace Finley's official measurement, with no hail damage reported in the immediate vicinity. Truscott received 2.4 inches of rain, and large hailstones caused some damage to crops.

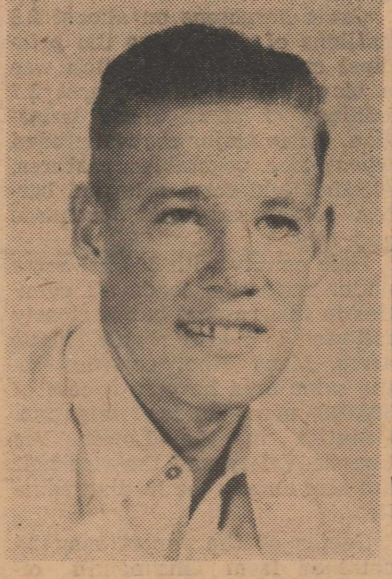
While the dry land cotton—the best in years—was hardest hit, farmers say the grade of irrigated cotton will be lowered by the rain, which will have a considerable effect on the price.

Sheriff H. T. Melton said the rain caused considerable erosion of highway shoulders between Truscott and the South Wichita River, as well as near Rhineland and other parts of the county.

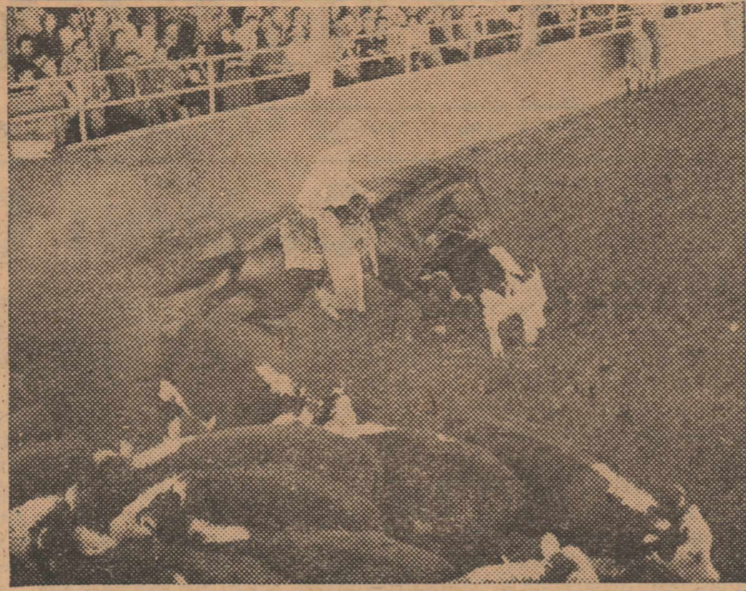

### SURVEY SHOWS CONTINUED EXPANSION OF IRRIGATION

COLLEGE STATION. — A contributing factor and a mighty important one to the overall agricultural production of Texas farms and ranches is irrigation. R. V. Thurmond, extension agricultural irrigation-engineer has just released a statewide summary which points up the great economic importance that supplemental water plays in the state's economy. Figures were collected from each county in the state relative to the total number of acres irrigated; number of irrigated farms; acres irrigated by gravity; number of sprinkler systems; number of irrigation wells; acres irrigated from ground water and the acreages of the principal crops irrigated in each of the counties. County agricultural agents supplied the information and Thurmond made the final compilation.

The total land under irrigation in Texas now stands at 6,962,234 acres. This compares with a total of 6,208,022 in 1955 (figures are from a similar survey). In June when the figures were taken, 39,706 farms were listed as being irrigated. Only 10 counties in the state reported no irrigation. The number of irrigation wells rose from 42,674 in 1955 to 54,994 in 1957. The number of sprinkler systems in use almost doubled during this same period with a 200,000 acre increase in the land thus irri-

gated. Grain sorghums on almost 2.3 millions of acres were the principal crop irrigated. Cotton was a close second with almost 2.2 millions of acres under irrigation. Other major crops included wheat, rice, vegetables, pastures, alfalfa, field corn, oats and barley, forage sorghums, orchards and others.

Hale county with 500,000 acres under irrigation leads all counties in this respect but is closely followed by Swisher with 480,000 acres. Many other counties in the same area have in excess of 300,000 acres under irrigation. Counties in the Lower Rio Grande Valley and the rice belt are also among the leading counties.
