## 'Gift Shop' for Disabled Veterans Set for Saturday

Members of the Teague-Carpenter unit, American Legion Auxiliary, are busily engaged in preparing gifts for the "Christmas Gift Shop" for patients at McKinney Veterans Hospital.

The Gift Shops, now nationwide Christmas projects of the Auxiliary, were started in the 1930's at Kerrville.

From the gift shops, hospitalized veterans select gifts to send to members of their families.

Local Auxiliary officers invited everyone in this area to contribute to the gift shop and to attend a special program at the Legion Hall at 3 p. m. Saturday. The program will be presented by Mrs. Chas. E. Silk and a group of Homemaking girls, and Mrs. J. R. Hitchcock and a number of kindergarten pupils.

Guests will register and three door prizes will be given.

Everyone was asked to bring a gift for the gift shop. Suggestions are for all members of the family—socks, scarfs, pins, dolls, ties, stationery, etc. Gifts should not be wrapped, as they will be wrapped after the veterans select the items to send their families.

The veterans themselves will also receive gifts on Christmas morning, purchased through assessments on Auxiliary units. The local unit contributes \$20.

"The sacrifices of the hospitalized veterans are often forgotten in these hasty times," Mrs. Guy Robinson of the Auxiliary said. "Let's all help to make their Christmas merrier, cheerier and happier by furnishing gifts for them to give their loved ones."

## Bonds Sales in Texas Increase in September

Sale of Series E and H Savings Bonds in Texas for September were \$14,626,577. This represents an increase over August sales of more than one million dollars. Nathan Adams, chairman, and Ed Gossett, co-chairman of the State Savings Bonds Committee announced today.

Sales in Knox County amounted to \$170,419 for the nine-month period, which was 55.4 per cent of the 1957 goal, according to W. E. Braly of Munday, Knox County chairman.

September sales in Knox County were \$12,425.

"I am sure that if every citizen of Knox County will buy an extra Savings Bond during 1957 our county will reach its goal. There is no safer investment than U. S. Savings Bonds, since both the principal and interest are fully guaranteed by our Government," Mr. Braly said.

## O'Brien Native Appointed Judge Of California Court

Roland C. Rutledge, a native of O'Brien and a great-nephew of J. S. (Uncle Joe) Smith, has been appointed judge of a newly created Municipal Court in Ontario, Calif.

Rutledge, an Ontario attorney, was officially named judge by the governor of California, Goodwin J. Knight. He is the son of the late J. A. Rutledge and Mrs. Almeda Rutledge. Mr. and Mrs. Rutledge lived in Knox City for many years. She now lives at 575 N. Hamilton, Pomona, Calif.

The new court, which will absorb the Justice Court, will handle all cases involving sums up to \$3,000, including foreclosures and damage suits. It also will have jurisdiction in misdemeanor complaints based on offenses committed inside the Ontario Judicial District, except those which fall under the jurisdiction of the juvenile court.

Judge Rutledge was born in O'Brien. He moved to Ontario in 1920 when his father, a farmer, retired. He served in the army from 1942 until 1945, with 11 months overseas duty. He was awarded the Bronze Star for saving a comrade's life under fire at Cologne, Germany.

## Former Knox Citian Takes Part in NATO Maneuvers

U. S. ATLANTIC FLEET. — Daniel R. Brinegar, electronics technician second class, USN, aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Saratoga, took part in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization exercises in European waters during the latter part of September.

Brinegar is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Brinegar of Benjamin, and attended Knox City High School before entering service.

More than 200 vessels, with attached air support, from NATO countries took part in the operations, marking the first time since 1953 that forces under NATO have been engaged in large-scale combined fleet maneuvers.

Air and submarine opposition, anti-submarine warfare, aircraft carrier operations, simulated use of guided missiles and atomic weapons in offensive action, plus an amphibious assault landing were included in the exercises.

## Munday Co-op Makes Vegetable Crop Plans

Estimated acres of vegetables expected to be produced in 1958 include: 800 acres potatoes, 500 acres cucumbers, 600 acres cantaloupes, 500 acres watermelons, 100 acres bell peppers, 100 acres cabbage, 75 acres onions and 200 acres sweet potatoes.

H. H. Partridge, co-op president, asked that anyone planning to produce vegetables for marketing through the co-op please notify him of the acreage to be grown so that adequate seed supplies can be ordered and marketing plans completed.

## C. L. Dowding Dies Wednesday Of Heart Attack

Funeral services for Charley L. Dowding, King County rancher and county commissioner, were to be held at 3:00 p. m. today (Thursday) at the First Baptist Church in Knox City. The pastor, Rev. Billy Frazier, was to officiate, assisted by Rev. Walter Driver, pastor of the Knox City Methodist Church.

Although he had been in ill health a number of years, Dowding died unexpectedly about 10:15 a. m. Wednesday at his home, shortly after suffering a heart attack.

He was born Dec. 17, 1893 on the Dowding ranch west of town and had lived there his entire life. The ranch was homesteaded by his father, the late "Uncle Billy" Dowding, who came to this country from England.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church and of Orient Lodge No. 905. He had served as commissioner in King County continuously since 1932.

Survivors include his wife; three sisters, Mrs. J. J. Justiss of Claude, Mrs. Mabel Dearing of Knox City and Mrs. Land Hight of Guthrie; and several nieces and nephews.

Following the funeral, Masonic burial rites were to be held at the Knox City Cemetery. Pinkard-Smith Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Expanding industry and rising standards of living require more and more water per person to satisfy the American way of life. One-fourth of the population today is troubled with water shortage, poor water, or both, reports the Soil Conservation Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The potential supply of water remains constant while needs for human use pyramid with growing population, according to the SCS. From 1900 to 1950, while U. S. population doubled, total water use, other than for power, increased four-fold. By 1955 it was up another 21 percent from 1950. Water needs are expected to double again by 1975.
