On December 15, 1961, former Nazi SS Lt. Col. Adolph Eichmann was sentenced to be hanged in Israel for the murder of 6,000,000 Jews in World War II. Eichmann was the master of genocide or the extermination of all the Jews in Europe. Jews

were considered by Hitler to be ated to make way for the Ger. hanging of these leaders of the man "master race." The tales which came out of the concentration camps such as Auschwitz, Buchenwold, Bergen-Belsen and others are horrible to put it mildly. The tales of the atrocities are actually beyond belief, but they are true, and Adolph Eichmann was in charge of the final solution to the "Jewish problem."
