Farm-Ranch News

FEED LOTS—

The League Ranch has just completed the first portion of their feed lot for cattle. The first part of the lot has the capacity

for 500 heavy feeder cattle. The feed pens are located on the Benjamin side of the Dapis Lake near the farm headquarters.

The Knox County Feed Lot has also just completed their second portion to their feeding facilities and will be able to handle 1500 head of feeder cattle. These feed lots were both under construction this summer and are now in full operation. These feed lots are using silage feed rations at the present time and are set

up primarily for silage feeding. These feed lots, as the other feed lots in the county, were primarily set up to finish out cattle that are pastured on the small grain pastures in this area in the winter.

SOIL TESTING—

Soil testing is the only way to properly determine the correct amounts and the correct fertilizer to use on crop land. From some of the soil sample reports that are being taken in Knox County, some of the farmers are finding out that fields that they thought to be the same as far as nutritive requirements are concerned are requiring different fertilizer treatment.

Fertilizing is becoming more popular due to not only an increase in production but also increased net profit to the farmer. Soil sample bags and information sheets have been placed in several locations in the county for the farmers so that they can pick up the necessary information easier.

Bags and information sheets are available at the First National Bank in Munday, The Citizens State Bank in Knox City, at the Gilliland Co-Op Gin in Gilliland, and at the county agent's office in Benjamin.

IRRIGATION CLINIC

All farmers in the area will want to mark Thursday, March 29, 1962, on their calendar. This is the day the "Irrigation Clinic" sponsored by the Stamford and B-K Electric Cooperatives, Inc., will be held in the High School Gym at O'Brien. The Clinic starts at 9:00 a.m. and ends at 4:00 p.m. with free lunch and door prizes through courtesy of the sponsors.

An excellent group of speakers are scheduled to talk on all phases of irrigation; including pump design, frequency of irrigation, crop management, use of fertilizer and pumping costs.

The talks will be designed to give the farmers information they can take home and put to god use in increasing their yields, reducing irrigation costs and making maximum use of a limited amount of irrigation water.

"AMONG OTHER THINGS . . ."

On December 15, 1961, former Nazi SS Lt. Col. Adolph Eichmann was sentenced to be hanged in Israel for the murder of 6,000,000 Jews in World War II. Eichmann was the master of genocide or the extermination of all the Jews in Europe. Jews

were considered by Hitler to be sub-humans and should be liquidated to make way for the German "master race." The tales which came out of the concentration camps such as Auschwitz, Buchenwald, Bergen-Belsen and others are horrible to put it mildly. The tales of the atrocities are actually beyond belief, but they are true, and Adolph Eichmann was in charge of the final solution to the "Jewish problem."

Undoubtedly Eichmann is guilty and should be punished but it should be noted that there are legal reasons for his being acquitted. The first is the contention by the defense that Eichmann was kidnapped and not properly extradited from Argentina. (After World War II Eichmann fled to Argentina and had been living under an assumed name.)

Another contention is that Eichmann did not receive a fair and impartial trial, that the three judges who tried him were incompetent and completely biased.

A third contention is that Eichmann was tried under a law which did not exist when his war crimes were committed. In 1950, the Israeli Parliament passed a law covering war crimes committed against the Jewish people. Eichmann was tried under this law, and a person usually cannot

be tried for a crime committed before a law is passed.

Many of the Israeli people are divided as whether Eichmann should be hanged or not. Some are inclined to agree with the late Senator Robert A. Taft, who said at the Nuremberg war trials in 1946: "I question whether the hanging of these leaders of the German people, however despicable, will ever discourage the making of aggressive war, for no one makes aggressive war unless he expects to win. About this whole thing there is a spirit of vengeance, and vengeance is seldom justice."

I have no doubts that Eichmann will be hanged. Whether or not he should be is a question I believe no one can satisfactorily answer. But, one thing must be noted; even with the kidnapping question and the business of being tried under a law which did not exist at the time the crime was committed, one thing cannot be denied. Eichmann was given a thousand times as much justice than he gave the innocent Jews in the gas chambers of Europe.
