

### Lions Entertained By Abilene Men

Knox City Lions Club held their weekly meeting in the Methodist Educational Building Wednesday and Lion President Gerald Averitt told the club the board of directors had met Wednesday morning and recommended the club donate \$25 to the Red Cross.

The club voted to follow the board's recommendation.

Dr. Charles Markward reminded the club that Friday the Red Cross Bloodmobile would be in town and asked that people donate their blood.

Zeb Smith also made the announcement that Friday night the Lions Club would compete in the Juniors volleyball tournament and asked that all members be on hand to lend moral support.

The Lions game will be at 7:30 p.m. he said, "And after that there will be some good games coming up," the tail twister prophesied.

Program Wednesday was supplied by the program chairman, David Counts and featured on the program were Head Basketball Coach Hershell Kimbrell of McMurry College, P. E. Shotwell, athletic director at McMurry, Woodlief Brown, Abilene architect, and three Abilene high school boys, Paul Thompson, Bill Reese, and Keith Cox, a trio of musicians.

Shotwell is seeking the office of District Governor 2 E-1 of the Lions Club and the men were here to make a political speech in his behalf.

Basketball Coach Kimbrell was the first to speak and he told the members that he was in Knox City in search of some more Bobby Drivers, and Dennis Andersons. He proceeded to list a number of Abilene's accomplishments in the field of sports this year and to predict that next year would be even better.

He praised Shotwell for his contributions to all of Abilene's athletic programs as well as to his ability in all things he undertook.

The trio of Thompson, Reese, and Cox were next on the agenda and sang three numbers to the accompaniment of a banjo and bull fiddle.

Woodlief Brown was the next speaker and after thanking the members for their hospitality, said they had driven in rain all the way from Abilene and had brought the rain with them. "You can blame Mr. Shotwell for that," he quipped.

Mr. Brown praised Mr. Shotwell highly for his contribution to the crippled children's camp at Kerrville and said he was a director on the board and that although he didn't receive too much publicity, he was one of the hardest workers for the crippled children. "He's one man who has done a lot for the Lions Crippled Children's Camp and for young people in general," Brown said.

"He has spent over 40 years teaching in Texas high schools and colleges," Brown said.

Brown concluded his speech by saying he was sure Shotwell would serve as district governor with as much enthusiasm as he had his other jobs in the Lions Club.

Mr. Shotwell conducted a question and answer session from the floor and reported to the Lions how things were being conducted at the Kerrville camp.

He reported that there were 40 per cent returnees to the camp this year and said it was too high—that 20 per cent was ideal—and that more children should be picked up who haven't had the opportunity to stay there.

The camp can accommodate 144 children for two weeks and a new group is enrolled five times during the summer.

So far, 6,000 Texas youngsters have been to the camp.

Woodlief Brown said a few words in praise of Shotwell and asked the club to be sure and send delegates to the convention and to support his candidacy.

## KNOX CITY WINS TOP HONORS IN TRACK MEET HERE TUESDAY

Due to inclement weather last Friday the track meet at Knox City was postponed until Tuesday. Winning 10 of the 14 events, the Knox City Greyhounds raced to the District 13-B track and field championship here after scoring 261 points to 94 for runner-up Goree.

Rhineland tallied 53 and Benjamin 31.

The meet's high pointer was Goree's Donnie Estes, who swept the pole vault, broad jump and high jump for 30 points.

Knox City's Brack Shaver tallied 29, Gary Land of Goree 28, Jimmy Lea of Knox City 26 and Walter Hooker also of Knox City received 24.

Freddie Smith of Knox City swept the two weights, setting a new record of 45-4½ in the shot put; and Lea, who won both hurdles established a new mark of 21.9 in the lows.

Bobby Burnett also of Knox City, set a new record in the 880 yard run with a time of 2:17.8.

Knox City qualified both relay teams and 16 individuals for the Region 1-B meet at Lubbock April 13-14. Goree qualified its 440-yard relay and five individuals and Rhineland qualified its mile relay and one individual, Benjamin failed to send anyone to regional.

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## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — At a joint meeting of the Governor's Highway Safety conference and the Texas Safety Association, Gov. Price Daniel said that good traffic legislation still is lacking because citizens "have never taken enough time and trouble to tell their legislators exactly what they want."

He said that five bills which have failed to pass will be introduced in the January session, "regardless of the identity of your next governor." These concern:

1. State financing to pay the salaries of driver-education teachers in public school.
2. Complete revision of the

driver-licensing law.

3. A chemical test law for use in cases of driving while intoxicated—designed to free the innocent and provide medical evidence against the guilty.

4. Adequate city and county traffic courts of record to handle traffic cases with efficiency and justice.

5. Authorization for additional highway patrolmen and additional pay for Department of Public Safety personnel.

Although the Legislature lately approved 51 additional highway patrolmen, a \$300 increase in pay and set a floor of \$4,947 annual salary, the governor reported the patrol still is 150 men short of its authorized strength of 804. He feels the pay hike was insufficient.

**VOTERS LIST** — Comptroller Bob Calvert added up the poll taxes and exemptions sent in by the counties and found 2,355,159 Texans qualified to vote.

This is an increase of 300,000 from 1958, the last non-presidential election year. But it is virtually the same as the number of qualified voters in 1952.

Still holding the record is 1960 with 2,599,924 Texans qualified to vote.

**TEACHERS QUIZZED** — Texas school teachers are pretty

good at answering their examinations. They expected a 30 per cent return but 92,000 answered.

Questions were part of a Texas Legislature Council study of teacher training.

Results will be fed through computers to give lawmakers an idea of what school people think about the way public schools are run and how teachers are trained.

**WATER LOANS HIT** — The state will borrow another \$15,000,000 on April 19 to help local water districts, river authorities and cities on their water projects.

Texas Water Development Board has the authority to borrow up to \$100 million for this purpose.

Its first bond issue of \$10 million is nearly used up in four loans. So another \$15 million worth of bonds will be sold.

Major project helped so far by this state program is the Toledo Bend reservoir on the Sabine River near Newton. It will get a \$15 million loan over the next four years.

**PADRE STUDY** — Herb Petry, chairman of a special committee to study the various proposals for making Padre Island a recreation area, said the committee will have a meeting in April to

**GI FARMS** — Veterans Land Board has sold 20 repossessed GI farms for \$19,000 more than it had in them.

But it turned down bids on a Grayson County tract which drew 33 bidders.

Board tried, but failed, to put a block deal back together by advertising for bids on an 860 acre farm in Zavala County.

Only qualified veterans who have not made GI land loans were eligible to bid on the tracts.

**PROFESSORS PAY** — Two University of Texas department heads told their troubles as they moved into a new \$4,000,000 business and economics building.

Dr. Carey C. Thompson, chairman of the economics department, said he recently lost a good faculty member to the University of Rochester which bid up his salary from \$7,800 to \$13,000 a year.

Dr. John Arch White of the College of Business Administration said his college had not had a full staff since the end of WW II. Last year he needed to hire 12 young instructors but could only find eight and then lost four of them. Other employers outbid his salary limits.

The two departments have a fine new building but are hard-pressed for professors for their growing number of students.

**SUNDAY SALES** — Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has held that the new law which prohibits car-house sales on Sunday or Saturday does not prohibit the sale of mobile homes (house trailers).

New law requires retailers in many lines to close either on Saturday or Sunday.
