This is well and good if that person is the most qualified person.

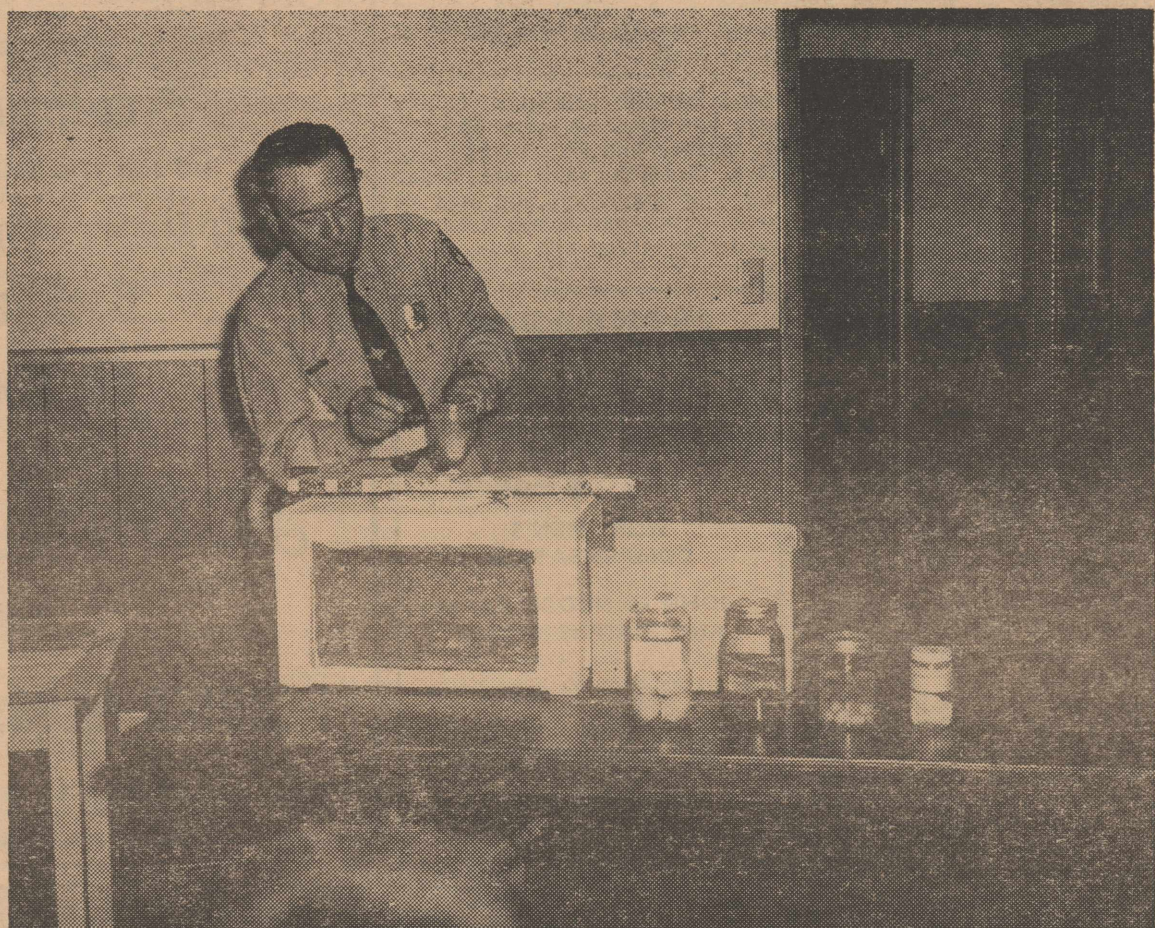

Knox County's Commissioners held their regular monthly meeting Monday, April 9 with all of the commissioners being present as follows: J. V. Carver, commissioner of Precinct 1; W. W. Trainham, commissioner of Precinct 2; J. B. Eubank, commissioner of Precinct 3; and George Nix, commissioner of Precinct 4; and County Judge L. A. Parker, presided at the meeting.

J. B. Eubank made a motion, seconded by George Nix that all Justice of the Peace Fee reports, and also all county bills which were approved be paid.

All voted in favor of the motion.

The returns of the school trustee elections held in various towns in the county were canvassed.

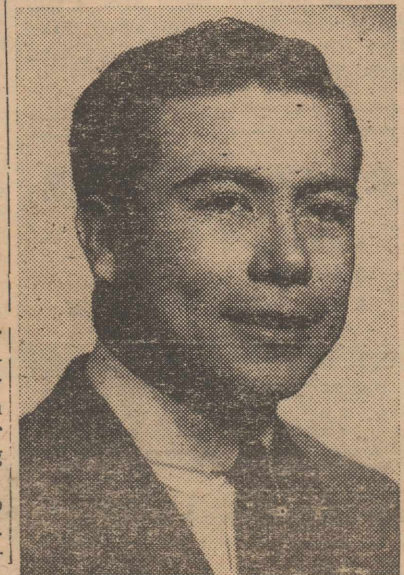

## Air Force Captain Explains Missiles To Lions Club

Knox City Lions heard a talk by Captain Richard Oveson of Shepard Air Force Base in Wichita Falls Wednesday noon. Capt. Oveson was a fighter pilot during the war and is now an instructor in the Atlas Missile School for officers at the base.

He was accompanied here by A3c Tom OBenreder.

David County, program chairman, introduced the visitors and Capt. Oveson said he would explain the missile program at the base and would be open for "any questions you might have concerning the program. If I don't know the answer I will say it's classified," he quipped.

He began by saying that we have spent a lot of money, and that we would have to continue to spend money to keep abreast of the fast pace the world is setting in the missile program.

"It is the first time in history we have had to maintain a large army in peace time," the captain said.

This was due because we had to be prepared. "In a sense we are like Marshall Dillon," he said, "we have to draw fast and shoot straight—we have to be prepared for anything at a moment's notice."

Weapons have changed a lot

he said since our last war, and they are changing every day. What is good today may not be good tomorrow he said.

In comparing an Atlas missile with a war head compared with the strongest bombers of WW II he said one Atlas missile can deliver as much power in one blast as a fleet of 1,000 B-17's hitting the same target every day for five and one-half years.

Capt. Oveson said in case of an attack we could launch our missiles and fighter planes and bombers in 15 minutes notice.

In staying prepared he gave the illustration that Russia and the US were like two men pointing a pistol at each others head.

If we stay prepared to retaliate, they will think twice before starting anything, he said.

In comparing the cost of our program now and in WW II, Captain Oveson said a B-17 cost \$100,000 then, a B-52 bomber now costs \$8 million. An Atlas missile with all the items necessary to launch it costs \$50 million.

He said the Altus base has 12 missiles and that the cost for this installation was \$600 million. "Do you know how much \$600 million is?" he asked. "If it was in silver dollars stacked one on top of the other, it would be 1,300 miles high," he said.

"What am I trying to say?" the Captain asked—"It is that we must have a missile program that can strike back at a moment's notice." He said that the expense of shooting one off every now and then was also a necessity, "just so we can see if it works," he told the audience.

Capt. Oveson showed a number of color slides of the Base in Wichita Falls and said there were 500 officers, 8,700 airmen and sergeants, and counting all personnel there were approximately 18,000 men on the base there. Payroll last year was over \$55 million and that \$66 million was spent in Wichita Falls.

In conclusion Capt. Oveson said the missile program has been a fast pace and that he and the other instructors had to work hard to keep ahead of their students. We have gone all out to keep abreast in the missile race, he said and we are doing everything we can to train and keep qualified personnel. Time has changed when a man in the army is given a gun and told to sight in the enemy. It takes more than a grease monkey to fill the bill on the missile program.

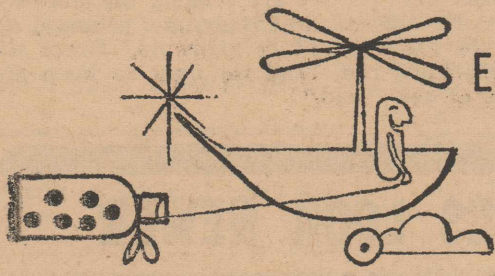
The Shepard Base can do everything in the missile program but launch one he said.

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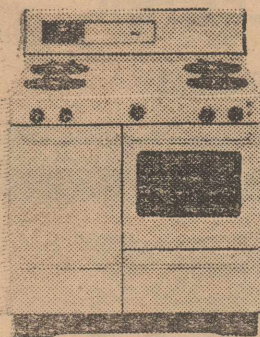

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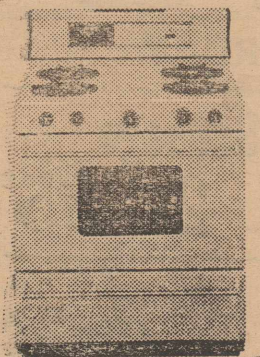

His family, along with a million other Arabs were displaced to make room for the Jews at that time.

In explaining part of the political problems of his country, he explained that the basis of their troubles stemmed from religious differences. The country is divided by numerous religions and although the Jewish people number two and a half million they are not a religious people and only three per cent of them are Orthodox Jews, practicing the Jewish religion.

There are also many Muslims and the Christians are in a minority, he continued. Of them there are many Catholics. The schools in Israel are either state or private. The state schools are free through the eighth grade but after that tuition is charged. All private schools have tuition for the entire time. In Nazareth there is a Baptist school and an Anglican or Presbyterian school as well as several Catholic schools.

He said that Americans just didn't realize the freedom they have and that he felt that was the biggest contrast in our way of living to his.

He went on to say that a middle class American would be a millionaire in his native land. No one but millionaires there have cars and that most of the things we take for granted are considered real luxuries in Israel.

Following Mr. Ateek's talk he was presented a gift from the club by Mrs. George Houston. Special guests at the meeting were Mmes. George Gerber, Jack Heffington, and David Slaughter.

Punch and cake was served to the guests as they arrived. The cakes were centered with nests of tiny Easter eggs. The table was centered with an arrangement of purple and white Dutch iris surrounding a bubbling fountain.

An arrangement of Easter lilies banked with white candles was used in decorating. Hostesses were Mmes. Houston, Don Railsback, and Jimmy Lynn.

At the business meeting following the program the club discussed the 1946 Study Club Scholarship to be given a senior graduating this year from Knox City High School. The committee of Mmes. Joe Clonts, George Wall and Paul Hoge had met with Supt. Erwin Youngblood to outline the requirements.

**AUSTIN** — The hundreds of candidates who are running for places in the Texas House of Representatives and the Texas Senate have plenty of problems. But when the victors get to Austin they'll have a new one. Big question will be "where to park their cars?"

Lack of parking facilities on the Capitol grounds causes a maddening game of musical chairs — or musical cars — at each legislative session. Speaker of the House James A. Turman says the problem is "growing more acute each day."

So, Turman appointed a committee which may have the longest title in the history of the statehouse: The Interim Committee to Study State Owned Lands Around the Capitol Concerning the Possibility of Converting Such Land Into Parking Lots.

Rep. Obie Jones of Austin was named chairman. Two other Austin members, Reps. Wilson Foreman and Charles Sandahl, will serve on the interim study committee.

**CUT THE PROPERTY TAX?** — For three years now a legislative-citizen study committee—the Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy—has been mulling the possibility of state abandonment of the property tax. Texas Research League has helped with the study.

The committee should have recommendations ready for legislative action in the January session. Outcome may rest on voter pressure between now and the November general election.

Under the current system, schools get 42 per cent of the property tax dollars; cities take 29 per cent; counties, 18 per cent; and the state government and special districts only get five per cent each.

Texas Municipal League has urged the state to abandon the ad valorem tax and let the cities increase their property taxes.

Hale-Aikin committee asked the state to abandon the tax and let the schools levy it.

Tax experts often have declared that county assessors might place higher values on property, if they felt more of the ad valorem tax dollar would stay in the county.

**COLLEGE FUNDS SHORT** — Presidents and business managers of Texas' 19 state-supported colleges and universities were stunned this week when Texas Commission on Higher Education reported they will get only 54 per cent of the funds they requested to meet increased enrollment in 1963.

Administrators had set their future needs at \$2,770,951. But the Legislature only appropriated

\$1,500,000 to supplement the teaching salaries for enrollment increases. So the commission's staff prorated the fund among the 19 schools.

Dr. F. L. McDonald, president of Lamar State College of Technology in Beaumont, didn't take the news quietly. "This is one of the reasons why we are never able to raise salaries," he replied. He said the colleges are never allotted enough money, and "have to dig it up."

While the 19 president are trying to balance their budgets, Commission on Higher Education will be studying requests from three more colleges which want to join the state system: Odessa, San Antonio and Laredo junior colleges.

Recommendations will be made when the 58th Legislature convenes.

**NEW SHELL GAME** — Land Commission Jerry Sadler predicts that Texas never will yield control over any part of Padre Island to the federal government. He charged that some Texans have been "deceived" by talk of an 88-mile-long national park there.

He said the U. S. Senate did not approve a park, but a "Na-

tional Seashore Area." "This status," says Sadler, "would keep Padre Island and Laguna Madre in an undeveloped state."

Sadler urged Attorney General Will Wilson to push recovery of Laguna Madre acreage from private owners before they convey their rights to the U. S. Department of the Interior.

Meanwhile, U. S. Congressman Joe Kilgore of McAllen said the House National Parks Subcommittee will make an on-the-ground survey of the island from May 11 through May 13. They will return to Washington, D. C., to consider legislation on May 14.

**READING PUBLIC GROWS** — Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, State Librarian, announced an increase of 13 public libraries in Texas and more than a quarter of a million books on library shelves throughout the state.

He said library service has improved to the point where there are now 106 branch libraries in comparison to 97 in 1960. More than \$4,400,000 was spent for library construction last year, "possibly the biggest library-building year in more than three decades."

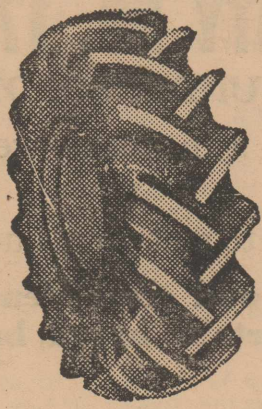
Dr. Winfrey gave much of the credit for library development to the Rural Library Service Division of the Texas State Library. It operates bookmobile services throughout the state; furnishes books for libraries in cities and communities of less than 10,000 population; and provides consultants without charge.

But many of the achievements can be claimed by communities — like Taylor, Rockdale, Navasota and Alvin — where citizens get out and raise money for library building funds.

**HIGHEST HIGHWAY LETTING SET** — State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said the highway department's April bid letting will be the biggest this year. Low bids are expected to total some \$28,600,000.

The April 24-25 letting will involve 952 miles of Texas highways and cover contracts for 422 miles of U. S. and State highways; 148 miles of farm-to-market roads and 382 miles of seal-

coat work. "We are leading the nation in miles of interstate, primary, and secondary highways," Greer stated, "and we want to keep that lead."



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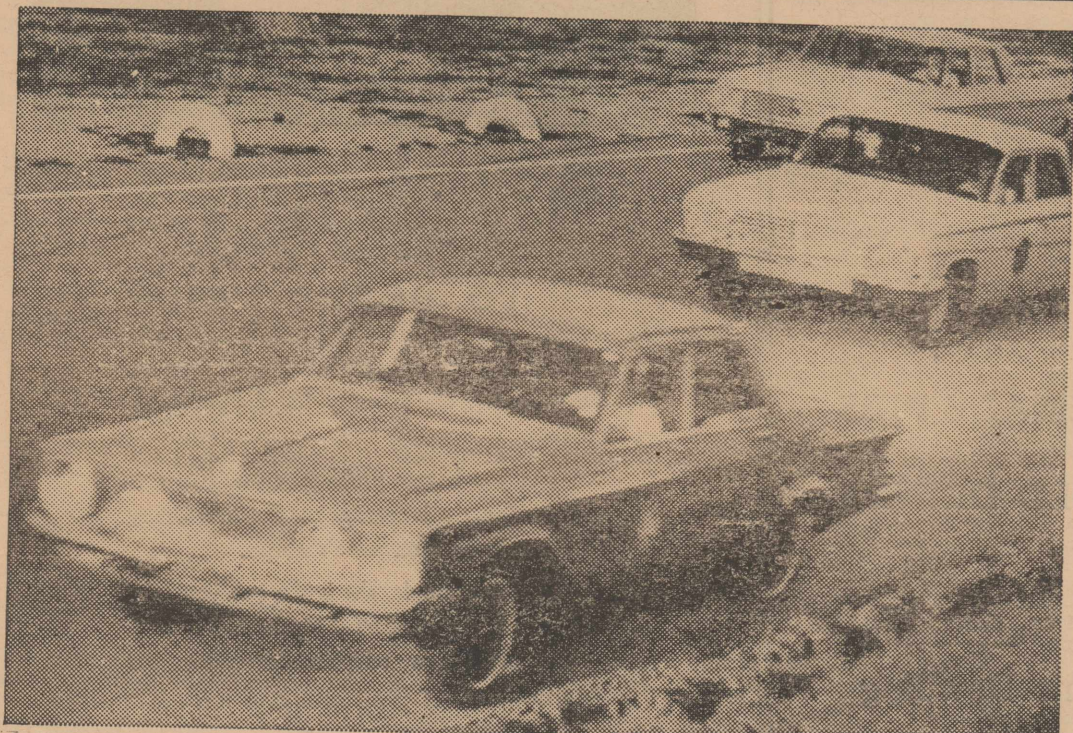

## WANTED BY THE FBI



Eugene Francis Newman

Newman is the alleged machine gun-carrying leader of a gang that attempted the robbery of an armored car carrying \$492,500 in American and Canadian currency in Buffalo, New York, on August 3, 1955. He and his associates, wearing silk stocking masks, engaged in a running gun battle with the truck's guards and Buffalo Police, and a machine gun bullet, allegedly fired by Newman, seriously wounded a guard. Two bandits were quickly apprehended but Newman remains at large.

A complaint, filed before a U.S. Commissioner at Buffalo, New York, on August 5, 1955, charges Newman with fleeing the State of New York to avoid prosecution for robbery.

Heavily armed, with a violent temper, Newman has previously been convicted for theft of Government property, interstate transportation of a stolen motor vehicle, petty larceny, and burglary.

He is a white American, reportedly born on October 3, 1928, at Brooklyn, New York, who is 5'8" tall, weighs 170 to 180 pounds, has blond hair, blue eyes, a medium build, and medium complexion.

He has scars near his right eye, on the back of his right hand and on the center of his left cheek. A birthmark appears on his upper left arm and a mole on his left index finger. Tattoos include the name "Danny" and a heart on the outside of his right forearm, and the number "13" within a dotted circle on the back of his left hand. He has worked as a bricklayer, clerk, construction worker, counterman, and laborer.
