**"THIS YEAR IS THE LAST ONE" SAMMIE CARPENTER SAYS**

At a recent school board meeting Mrs. E. R. (Sammie) Carpenter met with the board and presented them with her resignation to be effective at the end of this year's school term.

Superintendent Erwin Youngblood said after considerable discussion with Mrs. Carpenter the board granted her wish "reluctantly."

"It was quite a blow to us and the school system," the school board said.

Mrs. Carpenter has taught in Knox City for the past 31 years, and has taught school for 41 years. She began her teaching profession in Monday at the age of 19.

The decision to retire was a hard one to make she said, but felt that she had taught long enough.

"Today I can walk down the street and meet some of my students and always they speak and wave to me," she explained, "this is the way I want it to be. I don't want to stay in the teaching profession until I am old and broken down," she jokingly said.

Mrs. Carpenter has taught area children from the fourth grade through high school. Her subjects have been English, Speech and History. She taught in high school for a number of years, but "I have always loved to teach the fifth grade students," she said.

One reason was that they were starting to grow up and that they seemed just the right age to start learning, she said.

Mrs. Carpenter, or Sammie, as she is affectionately known, has been an outstanding authority on area people, and is usually the final decision to any argument arises concerning the name of any former resident.

Mrs. Carpenter recalled many happy years with her students and said she had thought about retiring for some time, but that every year had seemed her best year, and that she had postponed the decision until this year.

Mr. Carpenter retired as manager of the Paymaster Gin here in February, after serving 21 years in that post. His retirement was another factor in her deciding to join him.

Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter had one son, Sam Ed, who was a Ma-

son during World War II. He was killed at Iwo Jima on March 15, 1945. "It was some time later that we received word from Washington," she recalled. "I was in the kitchen fixing some Easter eggs and Mr. Carpenter brought the telegram with the sad news," she said.

It was a terrific blow to the Carpenter family.

After that teaching the youngsters was her salvation, Mrs. Carpenter said, for she didn't have time to worry about her own troubles and misfortunes.

The love and affection the children have for her is "part of me," she said.

As for the future the Carpenters have no immediate plans but just to "take it easy."

**George Young's Trial Gets Under Way Here**

Trial began in Knox County Monday with the selection of a jury for District Judge Lewis M. Williams 50th Judicial Court. State and defense lawyers examined veniremen from 10 a.m. until 8:30 p.m. Monday night to select four men and eight women.

They will decide the fate of George L. Young, 22, a Seymour Negro accused of assaulting a four year old white child in Seymour on the morning of January 28, 1962.

The case was transferred here from Baylor County after officials failed to get a jury there.

District Attorney A. W. Davis and Baylor County Attorney Clyde Whiteside are the prosecutors.

Judge Williams court appointed three well-known Seymour attorneys to represent the defendant, Judson Balch, D. J. Brookerson, and Earl Garrison, all of Seymour.

Jurors for the case are Mrs. Mary M. Campbell, Miss Edna Eubank, Ruben Bates, Pate Meiner, T. B. Hertel, Travis Lee, Mrs. Lottie Whittaker, Mrs. Doris Collins, Oscar W. Cypert, F. H. Wiles, Rhoades Allen and Don Coffman.

Young allegedly entered the child's home and took her a short distance away and assaulted her. He then returned her to her home and later in the day the child's mother detected blood on her clothing and then took her to the Baylor County Hospital where doctors confirmed the assault. Baylor County Sheriff Wesley Styles was then notified and the investigation was under way.

Trail began at 9 a.m. Wednesday and at noon recess the state had called four witnesses, the mother of the prosecutrix, Dr. E. H. Balch, medical doctor of Seymour, Wesley Styles, Baylor County sheriff, and at recess time, Clyde Whiteside was on the stand.

Exhibits introduced by the state consist of:

1. Order changing venue to Knox County,
2. Dress of little girl (blood stained),
3. Plot showing home of little girl,
- 4 through 11—Pictures showing shoe tracks around the house
12. Shoe of Negro defendant,
13. Shorts (undergarments) of Negro with blood on them.
14. Confession of Negro defendant telling what he did.

The doctor testified that the abuse was evident.

Twice during the morning session the jury was retired and vehement arguments between counsel in relation to allowing the exhibits into record were discussed; and the defense counsel raised the issue that the statement and clothing of the defendant were taken after his arrest. The defense sought to preclude that the arrest was illegal in that the Negro was arrested without a warrant. Sheriff Styles testified that the defendant admitted the offense, thus the arrest.

Afternoon testimony for the state was:

Clyde Whiteside, who read the confession of Young on the day

of the assault, January 28, 1962. Young claimed he made the confession without any interference or abuse by the officers. "I made it because it was the truth," he alleged in his confession Whiteside read to the court.

Whiteside named a number of other persons who were on hand when the confession was made and later when Young read the confession and again verified its accuracy. After that he signed the confession.

Grady Nelson, deputy sheriff of Baylor County was called to the stand and told the jury how he had seen the accused within a few yards of the house on the morning of Jan. 28, and that he had stopped and talked to him.

Later he had left by himself.

J. S. Curley was the next witness. He is also a Negro from Seymour and he said that on the morning of Jan. 28 at approximately 7 or 7:30 Young had awakened him and wanted a clean shirt. After handing Young the shirt Curley said he had noticed some stains on his trousers.

Dist. Attorney Davis asked him to stand up and show the jury where the stains were located and he did. Defense attorney Balch cross examined the man and asked him if the stains were blood or if they could have been dirt, grease, ect. The witness said it was possible.

Curley said the defendant had been drinking, but was not drunk.

Balch then asked Curley if it was not a fact that Seymour colored people referred to Young as "that crazy Nigger", and he replied that it was true.

Benjamin Bell was next on the stand and is a lab technician at Baylor County Hospital. He extracted blood from the defendant and the little girl and gave them to Ranger Homer T. Melton for him to take to Lubbock to be analyzed.

Ranger Melton testified that he received the blood from Bell and he then took them to the laboratory of the Department of Public Safety for analyzing.

H. Wayne Anderson was the person to whom Melton gave the blood and he testified that he made an analysis and found:

1. Analyzed the blood.
2. Made a comparison of the blood on the defendants shorts and classified it.
3. Sample of blood from the girls dress.
4. And also blood from a piece of mattress that the girl slept on.

Blood on the defendants shorts matched the girls blood type O and the defendants blood type is B.

Charles Dickson was next and he explained he had made the photographs, ect.

The defense consisted of eight colored people who testified in Young's behalf.

Jessie Williams was the first to testify and he said Young "hung out" at his cafe. He said he believed Young mentally unbalanced.

Henry Young, the man's father said he believed him to be a good boy. His mother, Mrs. Henry Young testified that he (her son) had spells and was off balance.

Herbert Sims testified to the defendant's unbalanced state of condition, also.

J. P. Pierson said Young had worked for him and was a good worker but had seemed peculiar.

Henry Curtis and Willy Daniels testified in similar vein.

Willis Strange said that Young sometimes seemed "off" and sometimes "on," and that the night he committed his crime, he had appeared "on," to him.

Court will convene at 9 a.m. this morning and the first witness will be a psychiatrist.

**Dan Talbott Rites Held In O'Brien**

Funeral services for Dan Watkins Talbott, 58, of O'Brien who died at 10:30 a.m. Friday of a heart attack were held at the First Baptist Church in O'Brien at 10 a.m. Saturday. The Rev. Larry Young, minister, officiated.

The body was taken to Corsicana for Sunday services, and burial in the Mayes Cemetery there. Pinkard and Smith Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Talbott was born in Freestone County, February 14, 1904, and married Mrs. Maggie Robertson in 1925. They moved to Haskell County in 1956. He was a farmer, and a member of the O'Brien Baptist Church.

Survivors are his wife; one son, Dan Jr., of O'Brien; one sister, Johnnie Robertson of Houston; and one grandmother.

**Knox City Man Dies At Home**

Dan Edgar Wells, 84, died at 1 a.m. Sunday at his home following a heart attack. He was born April 13, 1878, in Missouri and came to Knox County in 1935.

He married Minnie Anna Murphy Nov. 20, 1910. She died in 1959. Mr. Wells was a retired farmer.

Services were held at the First Baptist Church at 3 p.m. Monday with the Rev. Murrell Johns, pastor officiating.

Burial was in the Knox City Cemetery under direction of Pinkard and Smith Funeral Home.

Mr. Wells is survived by one son, Willie, of Littlefield; seven daughters, Mrs. W. W. Stanley of Spur; Mrs. C. C. Perry of Afton; Mrs. Lula Myers of Houston; Mrs. G. C. Lemon of Colorado City; Mrs. Preston Scott of Afton; Mrs. Pat Chambers of Knox City, and Miss Katie Wells of Knox City.

During the 24-week course he was trained to install, maintain and repair radio transmitters and associated equipment used in long range military communications systems.

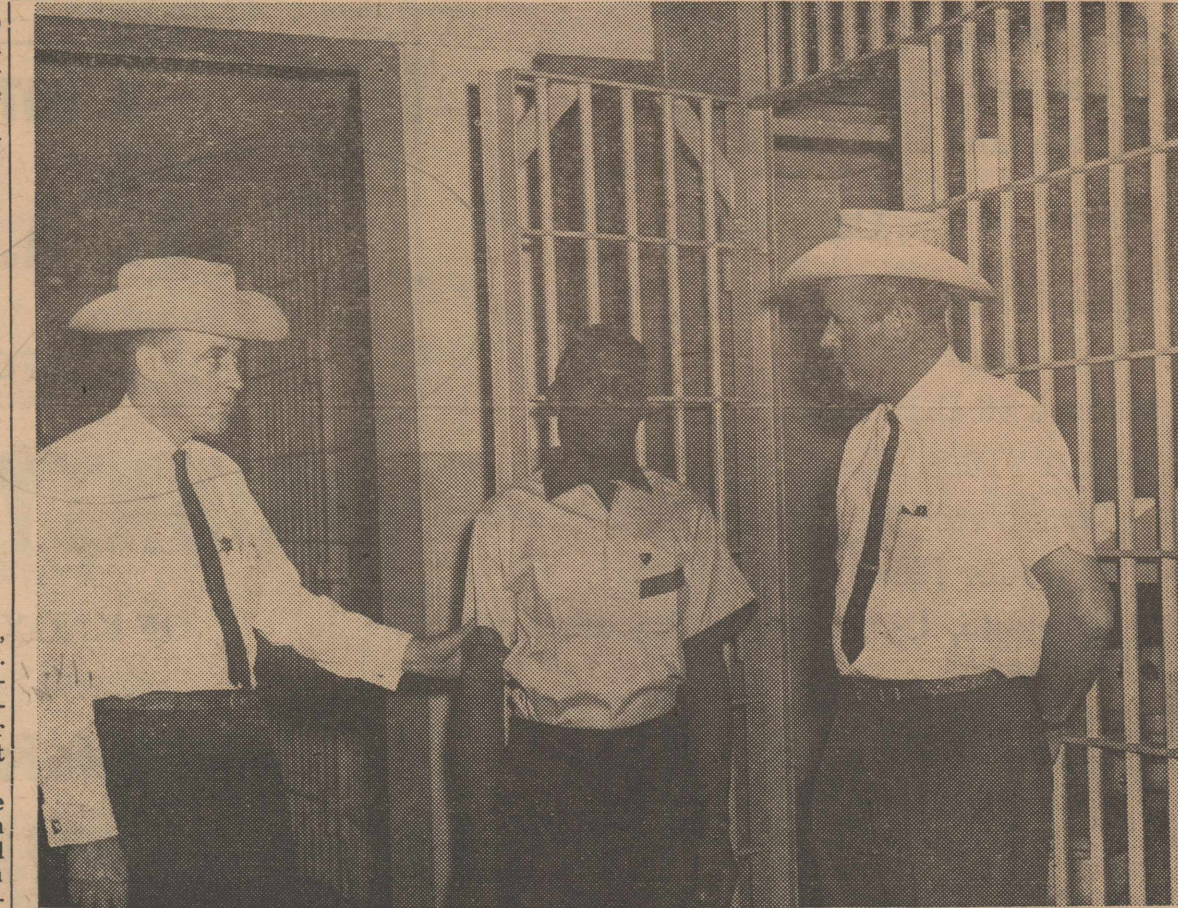
Burt entered the army in July 1961 and received basic combat training at Fort Jackson, S. C.

## KNOX CITY PLACES CLOSE TO TOP IN TRACK MEET HELD HERE

Iowa Park's Class A track teams won both the Freshman and Grade School Divisions of the Knox City Junior Relays Friday at the local track field.

In the Freshman Division Knox City ran the Iowa Park team a close second. Iowa Park scored 113 points and Knox City 110½ points. Douglas Logsdon, Knox City freshman, was high point man with 30 points. Logsdon won four first places. He was a member of both the 440-yard and mile relay teams and also won the 330 yard dash and the high jump.

Other teams in the relays were Haskell, third with 42 1-16 points, Rule and Chillicothe tied for fourth place with 30 points, Henrietta fifth, with 27, Aspermont 26 points, O'Brien 12 points, and Valley View 8 1-3 points.

In the Grade School Division Walls of Iowa Park was high point man with 29 points. He was a member of both relay teams than won first, tied for first in the broad jump, and won the 100 yard dash.

Iowa Park ran up 73 points. Valley View was second with 53 points, and Knox City third with 45½ points. Chillicothe had 34 points, Rochester 32½, Henrietta 32, and Munday and Aspermont tied for 7th place with 20 points each.

In the special relay events of the afternoon Rule beat Chillicothe in the 440 yard relay. In the mile relay an outside team composed of Douglas Logsdon, Eddie Williams, Jimmy Phillips and Jimmy Johnston of O'Brien won the event with Chillicothe second and Rule last.

## Notify Your SS Man When You Get Married

When an employed woman marries she should announce the event to the social security office as well as to her personal friends, Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls social security district office said last week. "If she continues to work without notifying the social security administration and has earnings reported in her name, she may have difficulty getting credit for those earnings," Tate said.

"This is true because if our central accounting office records show that a certain number is assigned to 'Ruth Doe,' wages reported under that number to 'Ruth ones' cannot be credited. They are held in a suspense file until such time as the discrepancy can be cleared."

"Of course, the social security office is not interested in an engraved announcement; just get a form 7003, 'Request for Name Change' from your social security office or local post office. Mail this completed form and your social security card, if you still have it, to the social security office."

"You will receive a new card showing your new name and the old number. In this way, you can be sure your wages are posted promptly without our accounting office contacting your employer or you later."

Post card forms to be used in obtaining a statement of the earnings credited to your social security account are also available at any social security office. Write to your social security office, 411 Federal Bldg., Wichita Falls.

## Negro Students Can Enroll At TCU

Negro students who qualify may be enrolled in two specialized colleges of Texas Christian University starting next fall and those with deficiencies in their degree programs may attend regular undergraduate classes.

The new policy was approved by the executive committee of the TCU board of Trustees to "meet obvious and reasonable needs."

The two divisions are the Harris College of Nursing and Brite College of the Bible, the graduate seminary which has admitted Negro ministerial students for more than a decade.

Under the new policy, students will be admitted to Harris College for the last two years of training in nursing without regard to race.

Such students, who would enter as juniors or seniors and might have deficiencies in their programs for the Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree, will be allowed to make them up in regular classes.

All students enrolled in Brite College, where a bachelor's degree is required for entrance, may make up any deficiencies in requirements for advanced religious degrees in any campus class.

Policy in regard to the other six schools and colleges on campus, and in matters of housing, will remain unchanged, according to Lorin A. Boswell, TCU Board Chairman.
