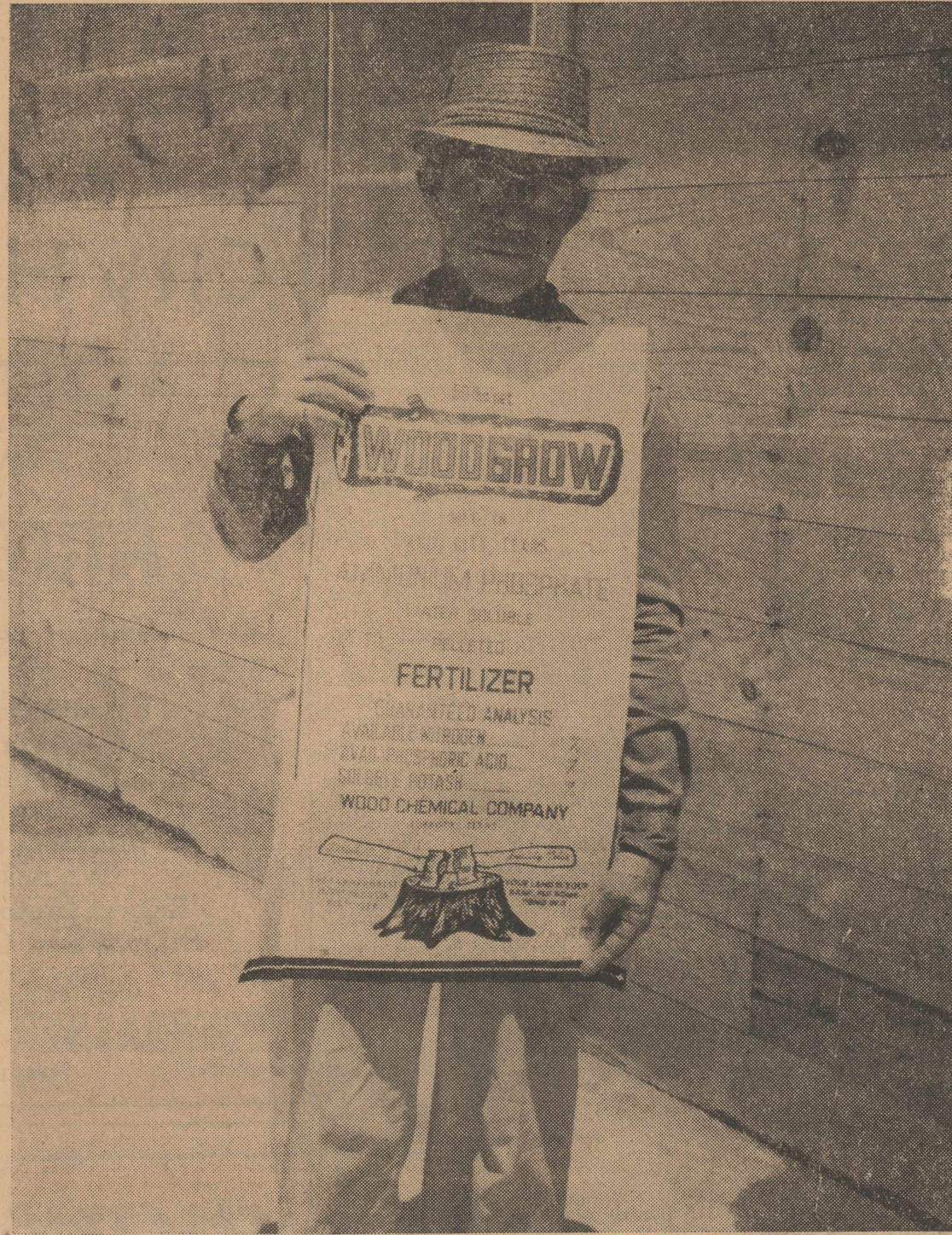

WOOD CHEMICAL CO., INC. PLAN OPEN HOUSE AND FISH FRY FOR EVERYONE SATURDAY, MAY 12th

Wood Chemical Co., Inc., with headquarters in Lubbock, Texas, under the presidency of W. R. Wood, has completed two new buildings here in Knox City to begin manufacturing fertilizer.

The plant will handle defoliant, insecticides, as well as the mixing of fertilizers. A. A. Cox of O'Brien is plant manager, and Bill Brown, Knox City, and formerly of Artesia, N. M., will be plant superintendent.

The plant will sell its products wholesale, and dealers all over this area will be selected to market their products.

A large number have been agents for Wood, but now they will buy the products here instead of the Lubbock office. Right now the plant is operating with six men, but when full production is reached, it will require 15. The new building is equipped with the latest and most modern equipment and as Mr. Cox said, "Everything here will be push-button."

Cox stated that everything in the plant that could be purchased here was—"we used local help, contractors, building materials, everything, that we could possibly get," he stated.

Worley Welding Service was contractor for the plant and C. A. Richardson and Son, general contractors, were sub-contractors.

Main building is 96 by 50 feet and has 7 bins, each holding 150 tons of fertilizer each. The plant is located south of Knox City and borders the railroad

tracks. A shipment was delivered May 7 and operation was under way.

To celebrate their grand opening, Mr. Wood and all Wood Chemical personnel are sponsoring a fish fry Saturday, May 12, at 7 p.m. Everyone in the entire area is invited to attend. Conducted tours of the new plant will be held throughout the day. Festivities will begin at 5 and end at 9 p.m. Saturday.

Cox said the Rochester High School Band will entertain during the dinner hours. Knox City Band was invited to attend but other plans intervened.

All fertilizer will be packaged in 50 pound bags and one of the main features of the new product will be that the fertilizer will be mixed according to the land it is meant to be used on.

Menu for the evening will consist of fresh water catfish, which will be flown in from Louisiana, brown beans, salad, potato salad, pie and beverages.

Cox said, "it is all free if you come out and \$10 if you don't."

Record Vote Tabulated For County Saturday

Knox County along with the state of Texas had one of the largest ballots in history and Knox County voters turned out in record numbers to pick the candidates of their choice Saturday, May 5.

There were 2,074 votes cast in the sheriff's race, of which Sheriff H. C. Stone received 1,343; D. E. Whitworth 419 and Olen Coffman 309.

Stone was second to vote getting ability only to Sen. George Moffett who received 1,463 votes to his one opponent, George Corse, 416 votes.

County Judge L. A. Parker held the lead by 50 votes to his closest opponent, Joe Reeder Jr. Parker received 767 votes to Reeder's 727, and the other candidate, C. A. Bullion, received 456 votes.

Another county office with three candidates was the office of County Treasurer. Incumbent Ed Thompson lead the field with 1,005 votes, and Mrs. Sue Bumpas received 865; John M. Stock-

ton received 160 votes.

State Representative of the 83rd District Carl Wheatley, lead his two opponents Roy Arledge and Foy Easley by a narrow margin. Wheatley received 703 votes, Easley 644, and Arledge 598.

Although Arledge placed third in this county, Wheatley and Arledge will be in the runoff.

For Governor, Knox County voted in this fashion: Connally, 634, Formby 513, Daniel 299, Wilson 227, Yarbrough 170 and

Walker 72 votes.

There were 1,945 votes cast in the governor's race.

Commissioner for Precinct 2 results were W. W. Trainham, the incumbent, 147 votes, Patterson 139, and Lee Snailum 80.

Commissioner of Precinct 4 George Nix received 455 votes to opponent Lonzo Cartwright 415 votes.

Knox County voted against horse racing and against abolishing the poll tax receipts.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, one of the best-known and well-regulated qualities of the State of Texas is its soundly built and carefully maintained highway system; and

WHEREAS, a consistent program of highway construction and modernization has in recent years brought about a reduction of more than 25 per cent in the fatality rate on all Federal and State highways in Texas; but

WHEREAS, heavy increases in traffic endanger these advances in highway safety, since the state's population has increased by one-fourth since 1950, the state now has more than five million registered motor vehicles, and the miles traveled by these vehicles now totals 43 billion miles a year; and

WHEREAS, due to this flood of traffic some 22,000 miles of the state's 25,000-mile system of U. S. and State-numbered highways are already obsolete for the loads of traffic they carry;

THEREFORE, BE IT REMEMBERED, as the Nation at large observes National Highway Week during the period May 20-26, 1962, that the Texas Highway Department be commended for its achievements in building today's fine highway system in the face of mounting traffic problems; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the citizens of Texas be urged to view with concern the adverse economic effects and the cost in human lives that will result if highway traffic overwhelms the capacity of our roads, and to support a sustained program of highway improvement and modernization to keep Texas growing.

THEREFORE, we, Guy Glenn, Mayor of Knox City, and J. D. Redwine, Mayor of Benjamin, do hereby designate the period May 20-26, 1962, as HIGHWAY WEEK—and urge that special attention be directed to the needs of our highway system.

Health and Safety Tips From A.M.S.

The home gardening season is in full swing across the nation again this week. After long months of winter, followed by spring rains, millions of American householders are back at the annual battle with crab grass and insects in the perennial effort to add a touch of natural color and beauty to the American scene.

Gardening is splendid therapy and good exercise, highly recommended by the medical profession for almost everyone. It also entails some hazards to health, most of which can be avoided.

If you have done nothing more strenuous than sit by the fire for most of the winter, by all means take it easy for the first few weekends of gardening.

Give your muscles and wind a chance to regain strength gradually, rather than trying to do too much on the first day in the yard.

Gardening often brings cuts and scratches from twigs, thorns, sharp tools. First aid is simple: Wash the wound with soap and water and apply an adhesive bandage. Let it bleed a little to wash away impurities. Of course deeper cuts will require medical attention.

Tetanus germs are harbored in the soil, particularly if there are farm animals around or if barnyard fertilizer is used in the garden. The home gardener who fails to get a shot of tetanus toxoid at the beginning of the season is courting serious trouble with lockjaw.

Power tools, particularly lawn mowers, are standard equipment for the modern home gardener. They save many an aching back, but they are potentially dangerous. Your power lawn mower should come with instructions on its safe use. Study them carefully. They mean what they say. If you're in doubt, check with a mechanic as to potential hazards of power tools.

Inspect sprays and powders, plus poisons that kill weeds, are useful adjuncts to gardening. These, also, have inherent hazards if used improperly or carelessly. Once again, read the directions, especially the warning. Keep the unused portion of the spray or powder tightly capped and safely out of the reach of children.

The bees and wasps and spiders are out for the spring season too, and now and then one of them may sting you. For most of us, the sting is painful and causes swelling, but it isn't serious. If you are one of those individuals with an allergy to insect bites, extra caution is required. If you are allergic to bites, ask your doctor about the desensitizing injections.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

How Binding is That Contract?

You cannot get out of a contract just because you made a bad deal or because you changed your mind. Tough luck will not get you off the hook, unless you cover it in the contract.

A builder agreed to build a home for a certain price. Then his costs skyrocketed due to unexpected increases in labor and material costs. Could he get out of his contract? No. Unless the contract says what is to be done or there are unexpected costs, the contract is binding and the law will hold the builder to it.

From the builder's standpoint, a good contract would provide that, in case of increased costs, the buyer would pay them.

Suppose you agree to sell 100 steers which you own for a certain price, and hoof and mouth disease kills off most of them. Scarcity may boost the cattle price. Since you can buy steers, even at sky-high prices, you will either have to do so and perform the contract, or pay the buyer damages for your failure to perform.

Things which the law says the parties should have thought about, such as increased costs or strikes, are no excuse for not going ahead with the contract unless the contract says that it is an excuse. An exception to this rule is where performance is prevented by an irresistible, superhuman cause—as where the citrus crop was sold failed because of a severe freeze.

The law itself — without anything being said about it in the contract—excuses you from carrying out your contract if the law forbids the thing called for in the contract—for example, a building in violation of a zoning law.

Where the very thing contracted for is destroyed, as when the house to be sold burns down, the law excuses performance.

Contrary to popular opinion, death will not excuse performance, unless the contract calls for the personal services of the decedent, such as those of an author, actor, or lawyer.

And so the law will enforce most agreements against the estate of the decedent. This is true even if the contract calls for the payment of money over a long period of time, as in the case of a lease. The result may well be to impoverish the decedent's family. A good lease provision, from the lessee's standpoint, would be one giving his estate the right to cancel in the event of his death.

Where fraud exists, the innocent party who entered into the contract can, on learning of the fraud, cancel the contract and be excused from performing his part of the agreement.

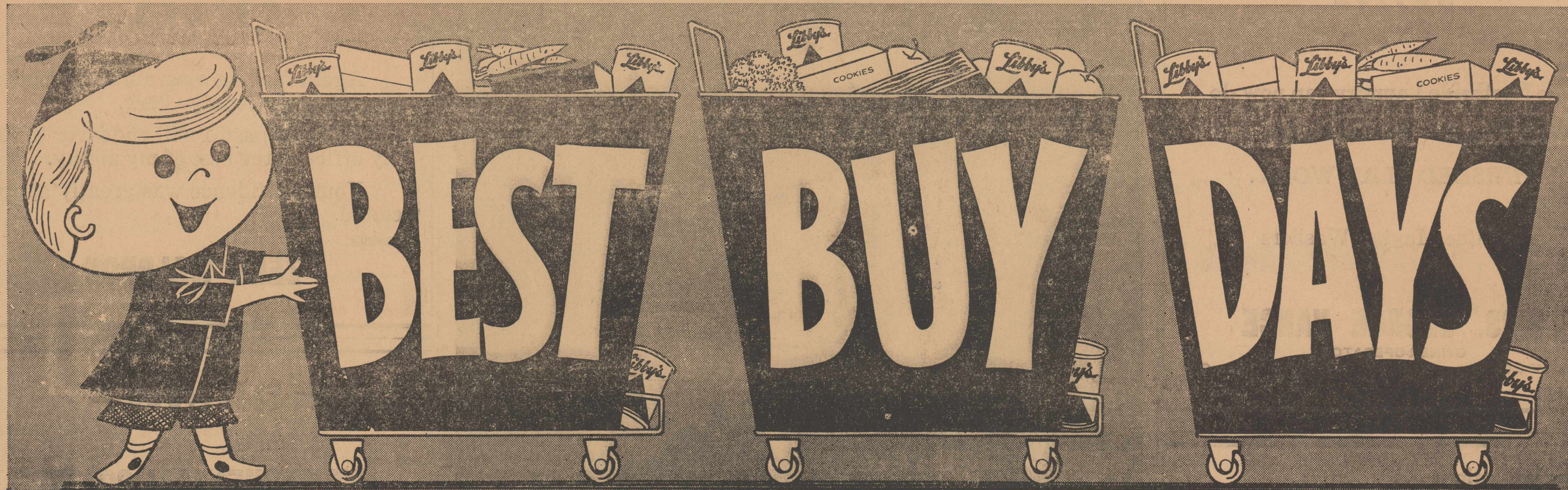

Desert Places*

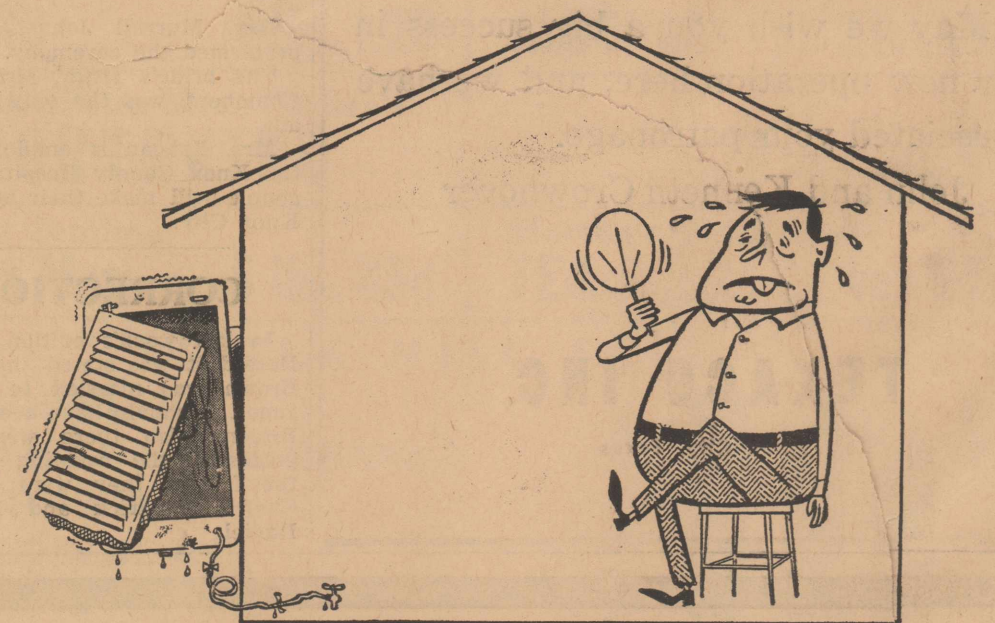

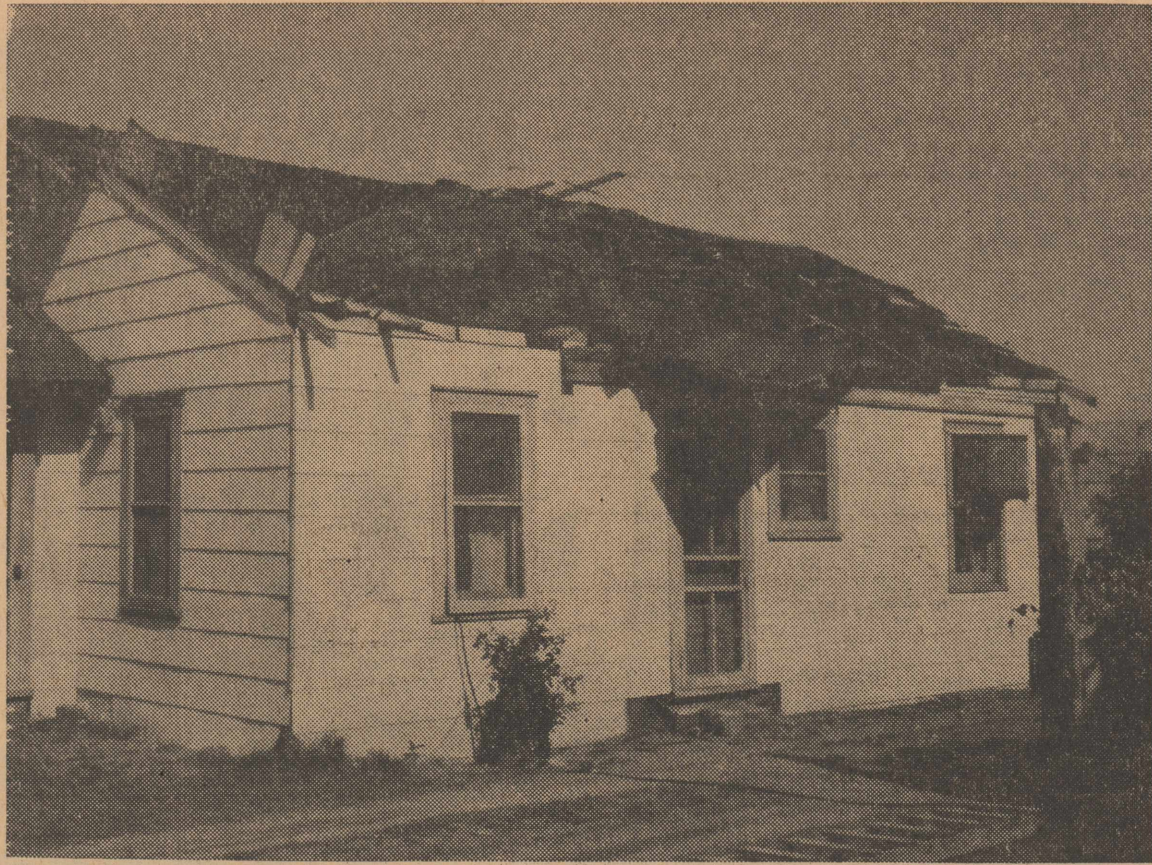

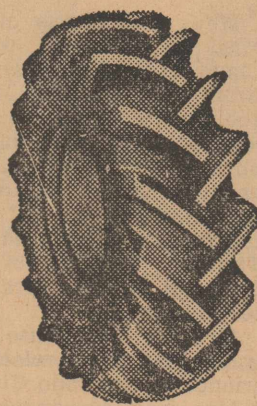

AUSTIN, Tex. — Annual payments of corporation franchise taxes helped knock down the enormous deficit in the state's General Revenue Fund in just 12 days.

On April 24, State Treasurer Jesse James reported a deficit of \$60,341,045. Twelve days later, the overdraft was down to \$23,053,885.

James noted that the deficit was markedly lower than the \$98,000,000 peak reached a little more than a month ago. But he did not state when the next big payment will be made out of the revenue fund which might make the deficiency soar again.

However, State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert said the state will send more than \$34,000,000 to public schools early in the summer.

STATE WINS ESCHEAT SUIT — Texas' General Revenue Fund will reap \$3,665 as a result of the state winning its first judgment under the new escheat law.

Although the judgment by the 53rd District Court at Travis County was for \$103,665, the State General Revenue Fund benefits by only \$3,665. Reason is that the first \$50,000 escheat must be kept in the treasury in case owners are located. Another \$50,000 annually must be allocated to pay for the cost of administering the program.

Funds were placed in the treasury under an old law which had no provision for disposition. But the escheat law passed in 1961 paved the way for use of the money.

Attorney General Will Wilson immediately started seeking more escheat money. He asked the U. S. Supreme Court to determine whether Texas, Pennsylvania or New Jersey has the right to escheat \$37,853 that Sun Oil Company owes to more than 1,800 people whose whereabouts are unknown.

Texas claims the money because the transactions were made here. New Jersey filed suit because Sun Oil was chartered there. Pennsylvania wants to attach it because the company headquarters in that state.

IMPORTED STEEL TO BE

BANNED — District Judge Herman Jones of Austin has given notice to both sides of the case of the Texas Association of Steel Importers, Inc., versus the State Highway Department that he will uphold the Highway Commission's authority to order a ban against imported steel in constructing state highways.

Steel importers challenged this authority when they brought suit in January. A five-day trial in March ended in a hung jury. Highway Commissioner Herb Petry, Jr., testified that some imported steel was found to be "inferior," and stated that it wasn't "worth the risk."

Judge Jones concluded that the importers had failed to show the invalidity of the highway department's order. He is expected to enter judgment for the state next week.

COMMISSION ADOPTS teacher service — Texas Employment Commission has undertaken a new statewide program to answer the problem of placing teachers for the state's 2,500,000 school children.

TEC Administrator R. L. Coffman announced that the commission will run a placement service as a clearing house for applications from teachers. Also they will list vacancies.

New plan is expected to afford teachers a wider selection of teaching opportunities and provide school administrators with a choice of instructors from all over the state.

Local offices of the employment commission are stocking application forms, which also may be secured from the Austin office.

UT LEASES UP FOR SALE — Some 35,000 acres of oil and gas leases owned by the University of Texas will be offered for sale at a public auction in the Commodore Perry Hotel in Austin on June 26.

All of the 101 leases on West Texas land parcels, ranging from 82 to 343 acres, will be sold for a term of five years, or as long as the oil or gas on the lands is produced in paying quantities.

Big difference in this 45th auction is that the royalty from gross production has been raised from the one-eighth charged previously to one-sixth. Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler insisted on the change since state public school lands long have been sold on a one-sixth basis.

SHORT SNORTS — The New York Stock Exchange made a survey of security transactions in Texas and reported that the number of stockholders in the state zoomed from 160,000 in 1956 to 375,000 in 1959, with one Texan in every 26 a shareholder.

State Highway Department is arranging with Civil Defense officials to make departmental buildings available as public fallout shelters in the event of enemy attack.

Twenty-one inspection stations were closed by the Department of public safety as it began a crackdown on stations suspected of improper inspection of motor vehicles.

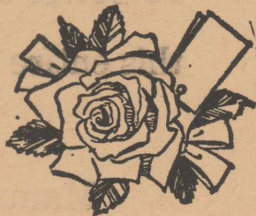
