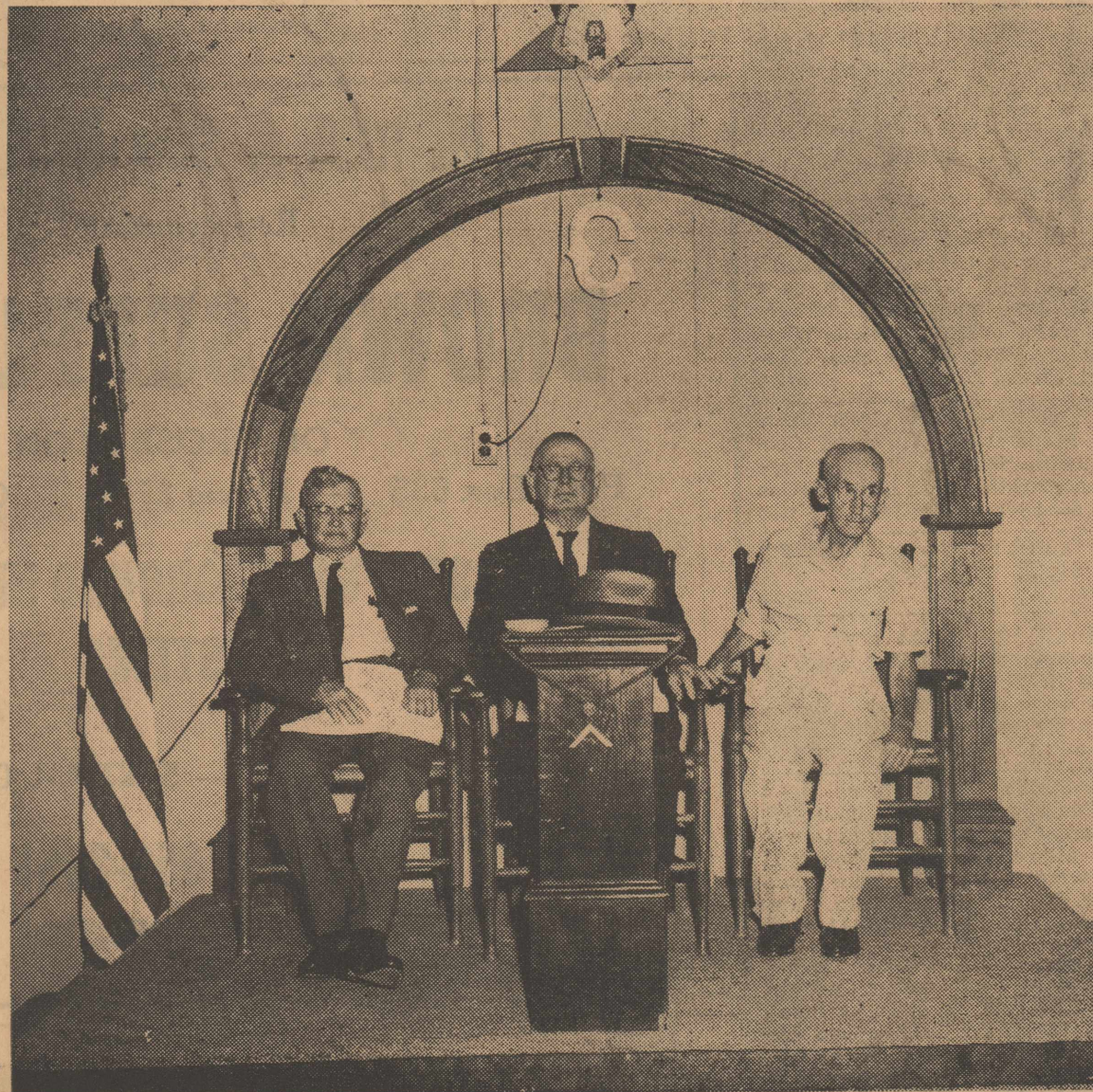
DESTROYED — J. Tom Graham notified his parents that his trailer house and all his clothes were destroyed by fire Wednesday afternoon.

Major And Captain Of Highway Patrol Visit Knox To Discuss Patrol Station

Major Harry Hutchison, Region Commander of all phases of the Texas Highway Patrol of 60 northwest Texas Counties from Lubbock and Capt. E. L. Posey, of the Highway Patrol Dist., also of Lubbock were in Knox City Tuesday in answer to a letter endorsed by the Lions Club and another written by Editor Jim Hill of the Herald, as to the feasibility of securing a Highway Patrol unit stationed in Knox County.

The Herald has told its readers through news stories and editorials the condition of the county in regard to law enforcement and that it was in "good or better shape than any county in this area."

Capt. Posey verified this with facts and figures compiled from 1958 through January of this year, plus a list showing only 14 accidents and no deaths up to the present time.

The Highway Patrol is up to only half its normal force at the present time and Maj Hutchison said they were having a hard time in securing adequate personnel for areas in much greater need.

This writer pointed out that we were aware that the county was "clean", and that it was the desire of the citizens to keep it that way.

It was also mentioned that we should not be penalized for having a clean county.

Both men said they were extremely proud of the views of all the people who wanted to see the law enforced and would do their best to see we secured a unit as soon as possible.

Major Hutchison pointed out that at least half of their applicants were turned down at the beginning; one-third could not pass the written test, another

Precinct 2 Commissioner Runoff Race Is Contested

A suit was filed by W. W. Trainham of Benjamin against Rex A. Patterson, Thursday, June 14, and Patterson filed suit against Trainham, Saturday, the 16th of June.

The suits were filed after the Democratic Primary election in which Patterson defeated the incumbent Trainham, by 20 votes.

In the Trainham vs. Patterson suit it is stated in part:

With voting boxes in Benjamin, Vera and Brock, Precinct No. 2 Knox County, Texas, 384 votes were cast in Prec. 2 including 34 absentee votes. Trainham received 182 and Patterson 202 votes making a total of 20 votes difference in Patterson's favor.

The petition alleges that there were illegal votes cast and if deducted from the total it would make Trainham the winner. Also that there were some who did not have valid poll tax receipts; those who needed assistance were not assisted according to law; and

B. Secret ballot not maintained as required by law and that by 11 a.m. on the morning of the election, before polls closed it was reported in Benjamin one of the voting places, the number of votes that would be cast for each candidate. After counting ballots only one vote was tabulated in the difference as before mentioned. That the secret ballot was not maintained and the same offsets the outcome of the election.

C. Other irregularities that vitally affected outcome of election.

That the court should hear and determine all matters and things necessary or proper for a true determination as to the result of the election and any irregularities in the conduct of said election, any erroneous calculations and that the court should exercise all of its powers to ascertain the true and correct result of said election.

D. In the alternative this plaintiff and contestant herein, alleges that the irregularities, illegal votes cast and breach of the secrecy of the ballot box all of such a nature as to make it impossible to accurately or easily ascertain the results of the election or the will of the people and that therefore said election

as an alternative, should be declared void and another new runoff election be held between these parties.

District Judge L. M. Williams of the 50th Judicial District, set date for the defense to file his answer on June 25, 1962 and trial date for hearing shall be June 25, 1962 at 10 a.m.

R. J. Balch, attorney at Seymour is representing Trainham.

Ratliff and Ratliff, attorneys from Seymour, are representing Patterson, the defendant.

In their answer, the suit said in part:

1. Defendat excepts to plaintiff's original petition for the reason that the same fails to state a cause of action against this defendant of which any relief can be grounded—Of which exception defendant prays judgment of the court.

2. Defendant specially excepts to paragraphs 2A of plaintiffs original petition because the same is insufficient in law in that it fails to allege with certainty and with particularity so as to put this defendant upon notice of the number of illegal votes alleged to have been cast and which were counted and tabulated by the election officials, and of names of the "certain parties" who voted in said election and who did not have valid poll taxes as required by law, and did not reside in the Precinct, of number of the additional illegal votes cast and the number and names of the voters who needed assistance in the

marking and casting of their ballots and who were not assisted as provided by the laws of the state of Texas.

Of which defendant prays judgment of the court.

3. The defendant also excepts to paragraph 2B in that it is insufficient in law in that it fails to allege with certainty and particularity so as to put this defendant upon notice as to how and in what manner a secret ballot was not maintained as required by law and how and in what manner the same affected the outcome of the election.

4. and 5. Also listed in the petition was that the petition failed to allege with certainty and particularity of any other irregularities as to such election that vitally affected its outcome.

That in paragraph 2D it is insufficient in law that there is no authority of law for ordering a new election in primary elections, in a contest of such elections; the law applying only to contests of general elections.

6. That defendant denies all and singular the matters and things alleged in the plaintiff's original petition and demands strict proof thereof.

7. That defendants votes were all voted votes and that he received a majority of all votes cast and that he is entitled to be certified as the nominee of the Democratic Party as candidate for the office of the County Commissioner of Precinct No. 2 of Knox County, Texas.

Patterson also contended that there were illegal votes cast for Trainham and that when such illegal votes so cast for the plaintiff are taken into consideration the contest filed herein by the plaintiff will not affect the results of said election.

This will be the first contested election filed in Knox County during Judge William's 22 years in office. He has had similar suits, however, in some of his other counties.

July 2 Deadline For New Wheat Farm Application For '63

Farmers who wish to be considered for a "new wheat farm" allotment for 1963 on a farm which does not now have a wheat allotment should get in touch with the ASCS County Office right away, Ollie Ilesing, chairman Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said June 6. Such farmers have until July 2 to file applications for such an allotment.

Under the wheat allotment-marketing quota program, a "new farm" is a farm on which there is no wheat acreage history, including acreage considered as wheat under the Conservation Reserve or the Great Plains program, for any of the years 1960, 1961, or 1962.

The chairman emphasized that formal application for a "new farm" application must be made in writing on a form provided for that purpose, and the application must be filed at the ASCS office by the July 2 deadline.

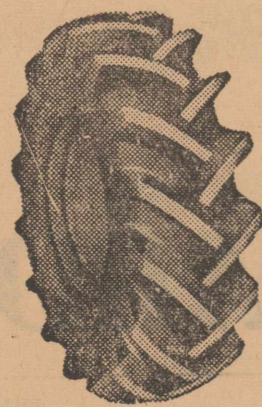
