

July 2 Deadline For New Wheat Farm Application For '63

Farmers who wish to be considered for a "new wheat farm" llotment for 1963 on a farm allotment should get in touch with the ASCS County Office right away, Olie Ilseng, chairman Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee said June 6. Such farmers have until July 2 to file applications for such an allotment.

Under the wheat allotmentmarketing quota program, a "new farm" is a farm on which there is no wheat acreage his tory, including acreage considered as wheat under the Conserva tion Reserve or the Great Plains program, for any of the years 1960, 1961, or 1962.

The chairman emphasized that formal application for a "new farm" application must be made in writing on a form provided for that purpose, and the appli cation must be filed at the ASCS' office by the July 2 deadline.






