We made the pilgrimage to the capitol Monday to attend the trial of Trainham vs. Patterson for their day in court, but things never materialized and now the trial will be postponed until Thursday, July 12. Dennis Ratliff attorney for the contestee, Patterson, wouldn't agree to just count the votes. Judson Bacon, attorney for the contestant, W. W. Trainham, will file an amendment to his original petition.

All discussions were conducted in the Judge's chambers and both parties agreed to the postponement two weeks from today.

In our interpretation of the law it would seem that the contest would have to prove at least 21 votes were illegal in order to contest the election. (There were 20 votes difference). If the contestant can name that many persons or irregularities that could have changed the outcome of the election to his advantage, then a contest is justified.

It is possible the defendant is asking that names be supplied and proof given.

All in all it is a pretty tough proposition and the next trial could be over in a day and it could last a week or more, depending entirely on how many votes and voters are contestee. It is not improbable that a large number will be asked to testify as to who they voted for. This is within the realm of the law, if need be, and especially if a ballot appears to be mutilated, etc.

Judge Lewis Williams told the parties that he would set trial at any time agreeable to both sides and that he was interested in getting a fair trial for each—both agreed on the date of Thursday, July 12.

Our former home, Post, is again in the news as they will hold a special election July 2 to determine if the voters want to integrate the schools there. Over 20 percent of the eligible voters, 327 signatures, were given to the school board to call for the election. The petition was raised in answer to the financial condition of the schools. Post's colored students are carried by bus to Slaton, and it was stated that \$41,000 more was spent than their present tax rate and revenue could withstand.

The board stated that the tax rate can be held only if the schools are integrated.

Pastors of Post's eight churches underwrote the issue in favor of integration as a "matter of conscience." Their answer in part, states:

"... we further believe, from the standpoint of Christian principles, that this act of integration is right in the eyes of God. Moreover, we believe that the integrating of the public schools in Post is a matter of Christian conscience."

Lions Club members voted to observe the holiday at their meeting last week.

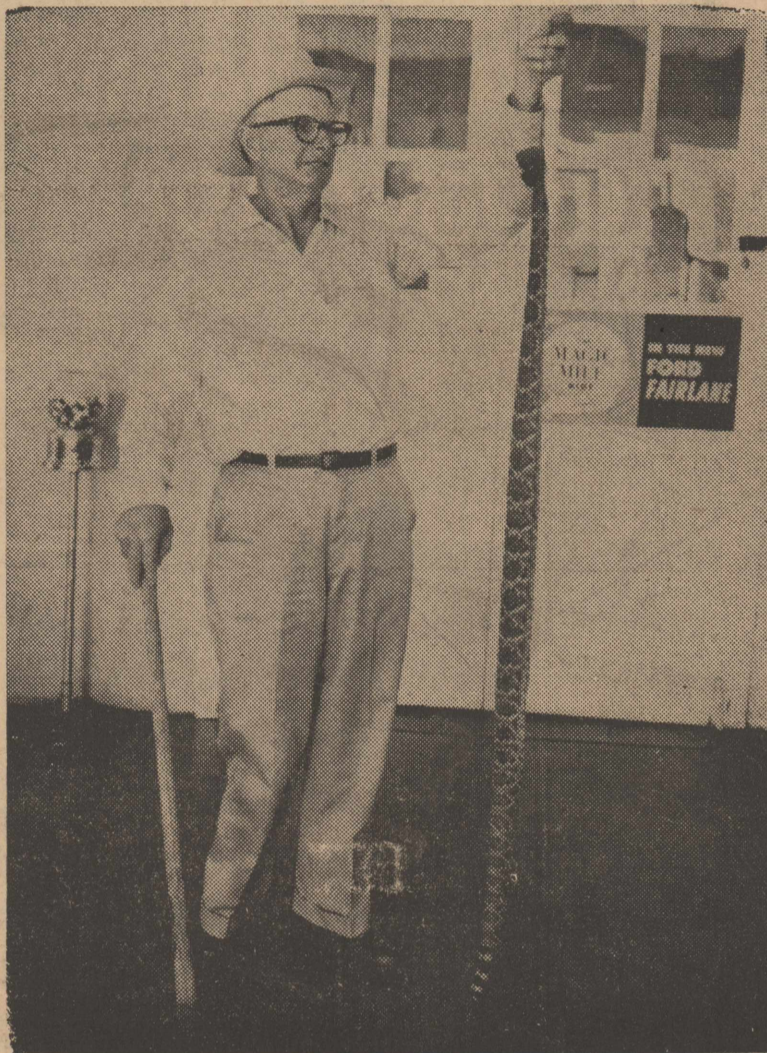

A meeting of the Knox County Country Club members was called Tuesday night at 8 p.m. in the American Legion Hall.

The board of directors consisting of President Joe Averitt, secretary-treasurer Fuller Shannon, Jesse James, Sammy White, Abe Watson, C. J. Reese, Chad Wilson, and Monty Penman met to discuss recommendation to bring before the club for a vote, prior to the meeting.

The directors appointed Jeff Graham, Ted Darland, and Chad Wilson as the Grounds Rules Committee, and discussed the issue as to when and how much the dues would be for members.

The directors recommended a fee of \$6.50 per month for playing members.

Shannon read a financial account of the club and the directors met with the members to make final plans for the coming year.

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## Knox City Woman Drowns In Lake

The body of Mrs. Mary Ann Loper, 20, was recovered from Mansfield Lake at 12:45 p.m. Wednesday after she fell from a trolley crossing the lake.

M. H. Mansfield, was notified of the accident and he in turn called C. H. Keek in Knox City, to notify Sheriff H. C. Stone.

Sheriff Stone was notified at the Lions Club at 12:30 p.m. and after contacting Justice of the Peace Eddie Carr, proceeded to the lake.

Approximately a dozen Lions Club members and other citizens were at the lake looking for the body.

Sammy Joe Wilson discovered the body and was assisted by Sheriff Stone and John Ed Smith Jr., in bringing her to the shore.

Hob Smith and Rev. Jarrell Sharp administered artificial respiration but were unable to revive Mrs. Loper.

In a statement to this writer and County Attorney Tom Bullington, Mrs. Loper's husband, Darrell gave this account of the accident:

He and his wife and three small children arrived at Mansfield at approximately 10 a.m. in order for the children to swing and play. His wife wanted to ride the trolley across the water, and he said she cautioned her to see that there were no tangles in the line. He said they had both used

the trolley at other times.

His wife started across and the rope tangled, leaving her in the middle of the pool. She had hollered for help and he attempted to bring her back with the rope attached to the bar, but could not do so.

He said she kept saying that she couldn't hold on much longer, and finally turned loose.

He placed the time of the accident at 12:15 p.m.

## Texas Traffic Better Than Ever Statistics Show

Texas has something to brag about: The best traffic safety record in Texas history!

The National Safety Council "grades" all states on traffic safety. Of a possible 100 points, Texas got 84 for its efforts to solve traffic deaths and injury during 1961. A big share came from the second lowest traffic death toll since 1949—"only" 2,314 killed on the highways in 1961.

California had the best score with 86. Michigan was second with 85. Texas tied with Illinois and Ohio for third place among the "big traffic" states.

Gov. Price Daniel said that holding down the death rate despite steadily-increasing traffic made a real record—fewer deaths per 100,000 miles traveled than ever before.

New industry in state noted. Every Texas city is looking for new industry. But they aren't alone. Every state has some sort of industry-attracting program.

In May, Texas tied with Illinois for fourth place in the number of new industries opened for business. Each had 30. New York 49, California's 35 and Pennsylvania's 32 led Texas.

Some states allow public-supported bond issues to finance plant buildings. The Texas Industrial Commission thinks this should be done by private finance, but it asked the Texas Research League to make a study to see which approach is best.
