We made the pilgrimage to the capitol Monday to attend the trial of Trainham vs. Patterson for their day in court, but things never materialized and now the trial will be postponed until Thursday, July 12. Dennis Ratliff attorney for the contestee, Patterson, wouldn't agree to just count the votes. Judson Baicn, attorney for the contestant, W. W. Trainham, will file an amendment to hi soriginal petition.

All in all it is a pretty tough proposition and the next trial could be over in a day and it could last a week or tmore. depending entirely on how many votes and voters are contesteu.

It is not improbable that a large number will be asked to testify as to who they voted for. This is within the realm of the law, if need be, and especially if a ballot appears to be mutilated.

Judge Lewis Williams told the parties that he would set trial at any time agreeable to both sides and that he was interested in getting a fair trail for each -both agreed on the date of Thursday, July 12.
