

Chief of Police J. J. Hester said that youngsters without drivers license have until Saturday to secure them or quit riding their scooters and other motor powered vehicles.

Hester said the parents or guardian will be held responsible for the violation if their youngsters are involved. Hester said the law gov-

erning a drivers license for scooters, motor bikes, etc., is that a youngster cannot legally operate a motor vehicle without a drivers license until age 14, regardless of horsepower rating. If the vehicle has a motor rated more than five horse power. he cannot receive a drivers license until age 16.

Hester said the above was the law in effect at present and was supplied him by the Highway Patrol. The Highway Patrol has offered their help in enforcing the law, he told the Herald.
