Last week on the way to Wichita Falls we noticed the big, four-lane highway and only two cars could meet on it. WHY?

If our roads are for two-way traffic why go to the expense of building four-way roads?

We feel certain that Cousin Herbert Petry Jr., will have a logical explanation, but can't understand its meaning, offhand.

From our observation, we have found that the wide highways carry no more traffic than the farm-to-market roads around our county.

A good example of how we waste our highway space try this out for yourself, right here at home—From downtown KC to Garrison's Cafe is a six-lane road—try to pass someone sometime without getting in the opposing lanes traffic. See what we mean!

Other than looking pretty and wide, it has no other function. On a recent jaunt to Oklahoma we were run off the road after leaving Wichita Falls by drivers driving 80 MPH and up, which was a fair speed for the 60 MPH zone, but in Oklahoma we noticed a road that was 70 (legally) but were unable to get one family chariot past 50 mph of the time.

If Oklahoma had our highways the speed limit in proportion to the one they have now would make an Indianapolis race car burn up!

Texas and Texans ARE big, but a Falcon here isn't any bigger than it is in Oklahoma, New Mexico, or Arizona—or is it?

Mr. C. R. Hendricks of Fort Worth brought the legal notice in Monday on our proposed bond election Sept. 8. He verified what we had rumored earlier—that all work on both buildings would not increase our taxation one cent!

We feel this is significant as everyone is conscious of more taxation from every source and it is our belief that we will get hit for a few more pounds in both city and county before too long.

Somepuns gotta give—and it will more than likely be the taxpayer.

If you are for the renovation and addition of the hospital and for renovating the courthouse—do so with a clear conscience, for it won't raise your taxes. The county's general fund may need a boost shortly, but if they raise taxes or collections in any way it will only put more money in the sinking and building fund, which can only be used for that purpose, and we have enough right now for all we want!

Proposition No. 1 calls for a \$125,000 bond election for the hospital and Proposition No. 2 is for \$80,000 for renovation of the County Courthouse.

Think it over and decide what you think will be the best for you.

Dr. Travis White, president of Midwestern University said, "We need more individualism today and less crowds" and also that non-conformists today were a disgrace—that is to the majority of people.

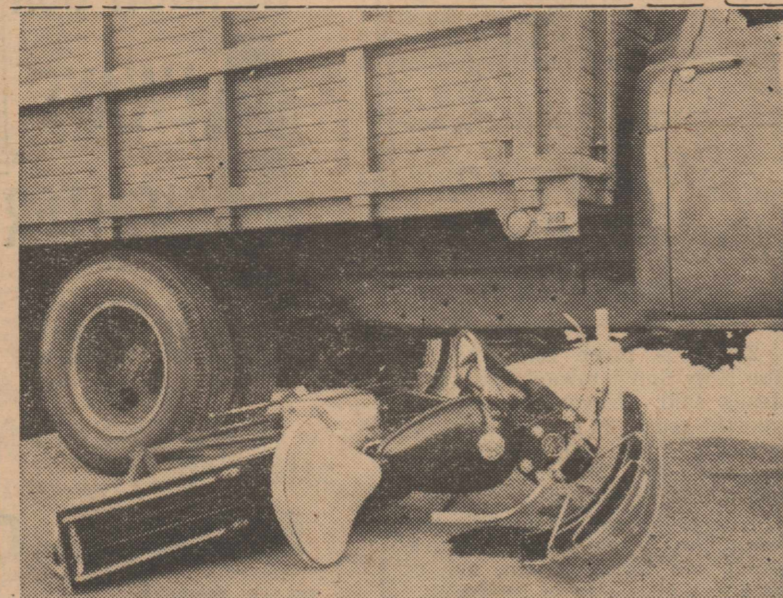

## Commissioners Have Two Special Meetings; Buy Equipment; Set Budget

BE IT REMEMBERED that the Honorable Commissioners' Court of Knox County, Texas, convened in Special Session on July 16, 1962, with all of the commissioners being present and with County Judge L. A. Parker, presiding.

George Nix made a motion, seconded by J. B. Eubank, that Precinct No. 1 accept the low bid by Plains Machinery Co., on one new I. H. C. Tractor Model TD-92, equipped with new Drott 4 in 1 Loader-Dozer combination, with TD-14-4 in 1 loader-Dozer combination to be traded in on said purchase. Net difference F.O.B. Knox City is \$14,000, to be paid as follows: \$4,000, to be paid immediately, and the balance of \$10,000, to be issued in 3 warrants, with the first warrant in the amount of \$3500, to be due on Dec. 1, 1962. The second warrant in the amount of \$3500, to be due on May 1, 1963, and the third warrant in the amount of \$3000, to be due on December 1, 1963. Said warrants to be issued to Plains Machinery Co., at the rate of 4 1/2% interest, and Plains Machinery Co., will then endorse said warrants over to Citizens State Bank at Knox City, Texas.

All voted in favor of the motion.

W. W. Trainham made a motion, seconded by J. V. Carver, that the bid from Plains Machinery Co., (being the low bid) in the amount of \$2,950,000, be accepted, said bid being for one new Tilt-type Wisconsin trailer, equipped as per specifications. Said purchase to be paid for in cash, by Precinct No. 1, after delivery.

All voted in favor of the motion.

J. B. Eubank made a motion, seconded by W. W. Trainham, that the bill in the amount of \$40.70 be paid to Frank H. Davis Lumber Co., by Precinct No. 4, said invoice dated July 1, 1962.

All voted in favor of the motion.

J. B. Eubank made a motion, seconded by George Nix, that the meeting be adjourned.

All voted in favor of the motion.

BE IT REMEMBERED, that the Honorable Commissioners' Court of Knox County, Texas, convened in Special Session on July 26, 1962, with all of the Commissioners being present with the exception of W. W. Trainham. County Judge L. A. Parker presided at said meeting.

Purpose of said meeting was to meet as Board of Equalization.

J. V. Carver made a motion, seconded by J. B. Eubank, that the bid from Plains Machinery Company in the amount of \$17,500.00 be accepted by Precinct No. 4 for one Gallon Model T-500 Motor Grader complete W-GMC 471 engine, Cab, heater, exhaust stack extension, 14" Roll-away with one used Adams Model 450 motor grader to be traded in on said purchase. Said equipment is to be paid for as follows: \$7,500.00 cash upon delivery, and the balance in the amount to be due on December 15, 1962 in the amount of \$2,000.00. The second warrant to be due May 15, 1963, in the amount of \$2,000. The third warrant to be due on December 15, 1963, in the amount of \$2,000. The

fourth warrant to be due on December 15, 1964, in the amount of \$2,000. Said warrants to be issued to Plains Machinery Co., at the rate of four and one-half percent interest, and Plains Machinery Co., will then endorse said warrants over to Citizens State Bank at Knox City, Texas.

All voted in favor of the motion.

George Nix made a motion, seconded by J. V. Carver, that the Sheriff of Knox County be allowed to hire a deputy at a salary of \$300, per month, effective as of the 1st of August, 1962. All voted in favor of the motion.

J. B. Eubank made a motion, seconded by J. V. Carver, that the Commissioner of Precinct No. 4 furnish his own automobile while on official business in the county, and he is to receive the sum of \$75.00 per month he shall pay all expenses in the operation of said vehicle and keep same in repair, free of any other charge to the county. (As allowed under Article No. 2350, R. C. S. Texas).

All voted in favor of the motion.

The petitions which included the required number of signatures, asking for an election to decide whether or not to make improvements on the Knox County Courthouse and Knox County Hospital and Knox County Courthouse were presented to the Commissioners' Court, and the date of the election was set for September 8, 1962.

August 16, 1962, was set for the date of the Budget hearing.

J. B. Eubank made a motion, seconded by J. V. Carver, that the meeting be adjourned. All voted in favor of the motion.

## Chief Says Law To Be Strictly Enforced Come Saturday!

Chief of Police J. J. Hester said that youngsters without drivers license have until Saturday to secure them or quit riding their scooters and other motor powered vehicles.

Hester said the parents or guardian will be held responsible for the violation if their youngsters are involved.

Hester said the law governing a drivers license for scooters, motor bikes, etc., is that a youngster cannot legally operate a motor vehicle without a drivers license until age 14, regardless of horsepower rating. If the vehicle has a motor rated more than five horse power, he cannot receive a drivers license until age 16.

Hester said the above was the law in effect at present and was supplied him by the Highway Patrol. The Highway Patrol has offered their help in enforcing the law, he told the Herald.

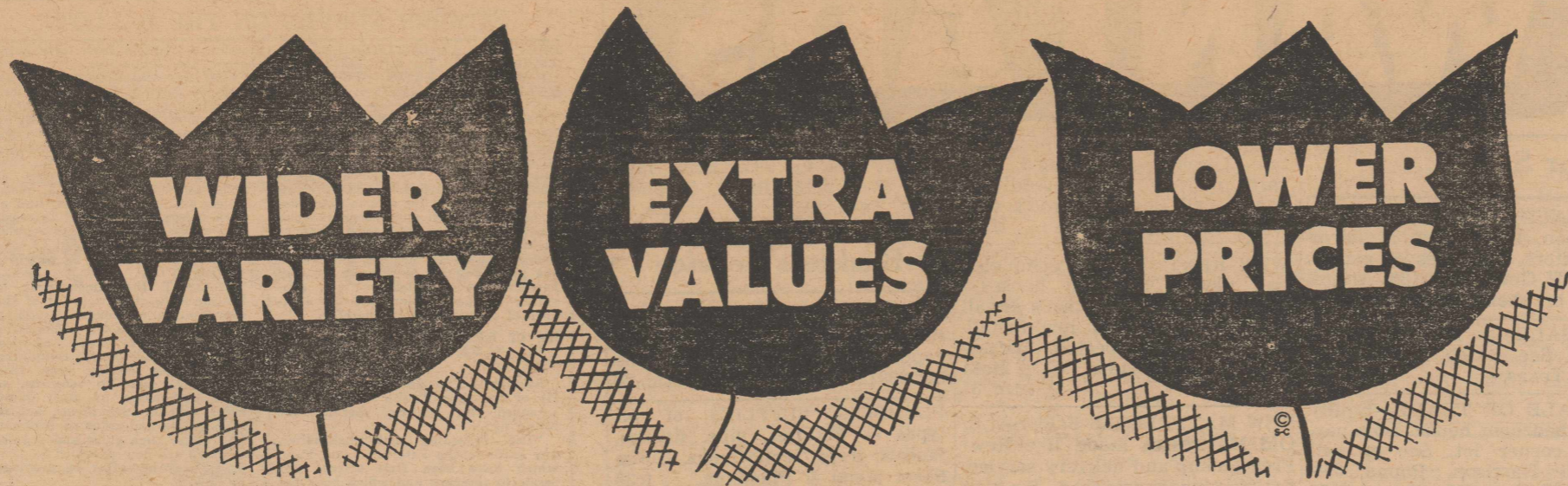

### Robinson Reunion Will Be Held Here Sunday, Aug. 19

Between 75 and 100 persons are expected to attend a reunion in Knox City on August 19, for descendants of the late W. M. (Choctaw Bill) Robinson, who was a native of Alabama but came west seeking adventure as well as preaching the gospel. Rev. Robinson was a member of the Baptist Church and felt the call to preach at an early age. It was he who organized the first church in Erath County.

Coming to Texas in 1848 he settled in Rusk County and there he helped to organize a church. Always seeking new fields he came farther west riding a mule and following Indian trails.

He found some settlers in Erath County and organized a church on the Paluxy in May of 1857. It was in September of the same year that the church at Stephenville was organized with three members. Rev. Robinson was a progressive man and was never content to sit back and let some one else do the work.

He was a farmer, stockman, merchant, and later in life built a sawmill in Comanche County. He helped to find beef for the soldiers stationed at Fort Benknop and also preached to the soldiers at Camp Coleman.

Although he had many activities, his first thought was to preach the gospel. This he did at every opportunity, often riding horseback across the country in cold and rain.

Rev. Robinson could see the good in all men and his strong physique and clear voice literally drew people to hear him preach.

He lived to be 89 years of age and is buried in the Baggett Cemetery in Comanche County. One of his sons was J. F. Robinson who with his wife moved to Fisher County in 1901. He and his wife were the parents of seven

A COPY of this order, signed by the County Judge of said County, and certified by the County Clerk of said County, shall serve as proper and sufficient notice of such election.

NOTICE of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this order, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS." Said notice shall be posted in each of the election precincts of the County of Knox, and at the County Courthouse door, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation, published in the County of Knox, the first of said publications to be not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election.

The above and foregoing order having been read, it was moved by Commissioner J. B. Eubank and seconded by Commissioner George Nix that the

same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Court voted "AYE": Commissioners Carver, Trainham, Eubank and Nix; and none voted "NO."

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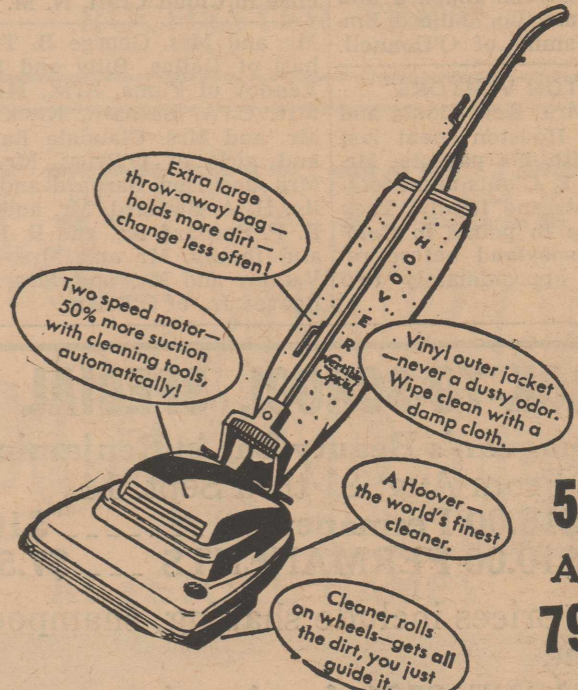

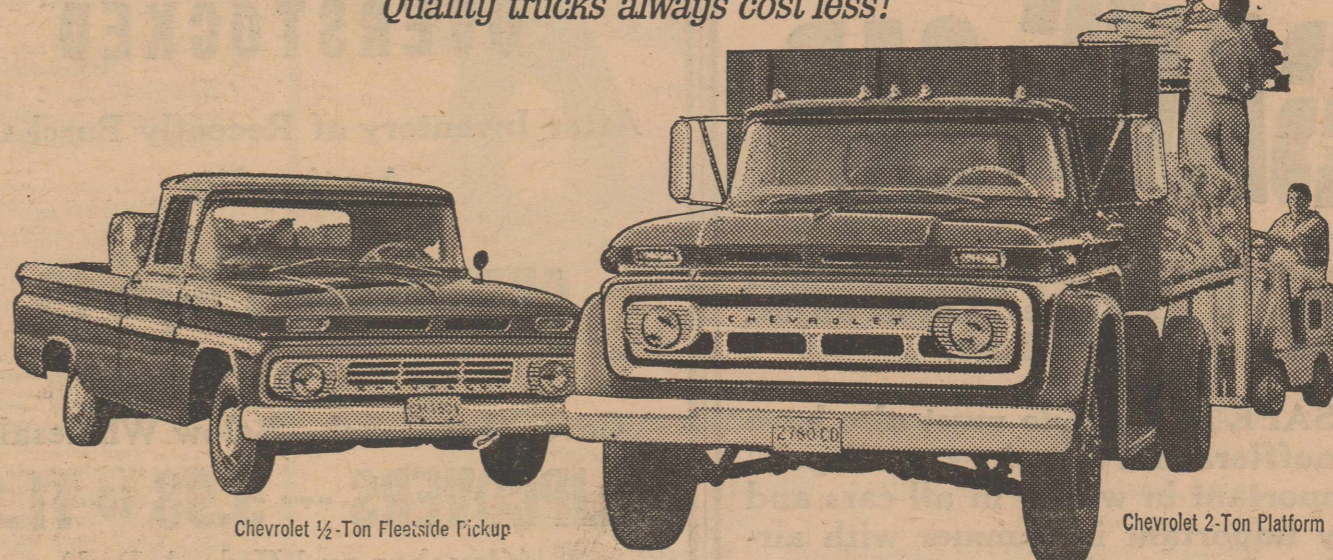

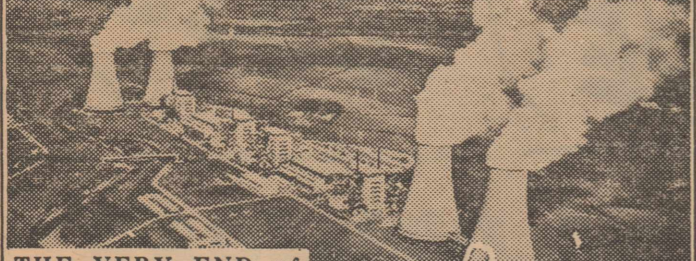
