## **Oral Polio Vaccines** Will Be Available

### **On September 16**

Knox County's Local Medical Society is the sponsor a mass immunization drive for administering Oral Polio Vaccine.

The immunization date has been set for Saturday, Sept. 16 in the school gyms at Munday and Knox City.

The new vaccine can be administered orally—a drop or two on a piece of sugar. Age limit is from six weeks

of age up. The doctors said everyone should be innoculated with the new serum, regardless of prior shots, and they are hoping everyone in the county will turn out for their polio

vaccines Sept 16. Although the serum is free of charge to all who want it, a 25 cent contribution is solicited. "Regardless of whether you have 25 cents or not we want everyone in Knox County to be innoculated,"

they said. More information will be made available prior to the date specified for the mass immunization drive.
