Graves-Monuments Disturbed At Cemetery

Thursday Knox's City Chief of Police J. J. Hester drove by the old Cliff Cemetery, located approximately three miles south east of Knox City to check on the condition of the old graves and noticed that someone had dug up one of the graves.

The excavation was dug in three steps—the first approximately three feet below the surface, the second about five and at the head of the grave it was down almost seven feet.

Pieces of bone, some felt casket lining and a casket handle were laid to one side of the opening.

Hester said it was his opinion that someone had buried something there and from the looks of the excavation something had been removed from the head of the grave.

To make matters more puzzling the tombstone had been moved approximately 20 feet from the excavation and it, in turn had been buried.

When Hester arrived and began his investigation, he noticed the ground looked fresh dug and upon inspection saw the tip of a tombstone, underground.

He dug around the stone and set it upright. On it was the

name Thomas Elmer Fowler, Sept. 28, 1884 and Oct. 2, 1910.

Approximately four months ago the county's police agencies had received complaints that a number of cars were meeting at the old cemetery and that someone was molesting the graves and tombstones.

Hester said he had spent a number of night at the cemetery, and that the sheriff's department had also kept it under surveillance, but that there had been

no visitors while they were on duty.

Hester said several old timers here who were familiar with the Cliff Cemetery, said a large number of tombstones were missing, and several have been broken by vandals.

Many here were wondering last week why the grave was dug into, why the tombstone was moved and then buried, and WHO could be doing the deeds, and for what purpose.

Regardless Of Prior Polio Shots, Every Person Is Urged To Be Innoculated

In cooperation with the Knox County Medical Association and Druggists, the Herald is publishing a fact sheet on the Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine. The immunization drive will get under way in Knox County on Sunday, September 16, at 12 Noon to 5 p.m. at the elementary schools in Munday and Knox City.

O'Brien will have their drive on the same date at the High School Auditorium in O'Brien.

Below are pertinent questions concerning the vaccine:

Is Polio Always Caused by the Same Virus?

There are three different known types of polio virus which cause poliomyelitis. In order to be protected against polio, an individual must be protected against all three types. There are separate oral vaccines against all three types of poliovirus.

What Is The Oral Vaccine?

It is a live virus vaccine which helps the body develop immunity. Unlike many other vaccines, however, it can be taken by mouth.

What is the difference between Sabin Oral Vaccine and the Salk Vaccine?

The Salk vaccine is a killed virus vaccine. Although the three types are combined into one vaccine, four shots are given over a period of 9 to 15 months. With Sabin oral vaccine, each type is given separately by mouth, four to eight weeks apart. The vaccine works fast, usually within a week.

How Extensively Has the Sabin Oral Vaccine Been Used?

The Sabin vaccine has been given to more than 100 million people throughout the world with satisfactory results reported. Millions of doses have been given in the United States.

How Effective Is The Sabin Oral Vaccine?

The oral vaccine acts to produce an intestinal barrier against poliovirus as well as antibodies

in the bloodstream. Thus, it is expected that the vaccine will help vaccinated persons from carrying the disease as well as help protect them against poliovirus.

Should You Have Oral Vaccine If You Have Already Had Salk Vaccine?

YES, it is wise to take the oral vaccine. It will increase your protection and help you protect other persons in the community.

How Is It Given?

A dose of vaccine can be mixed with distilled water and taken by cup or spoon; it can be given to infants by dropper or put on a sugar cube for older children and adults.

Who May Take The Oral Vaccine?

The vaccine may be given to person six weeks of age or older. In this immunization program, vaccine will be given to 6 weeks of age and up.

Where Will It Be Given?

Two locations in Knox County—the elementary school buildings in Knox City and Munday.

When Will It Be Given?

On Sunday, Sept. 16, from 12 Noon to 5 p.m.

How Much Will It Cost?

A contribution of 25 cents is solicited for each inoculation, however, it is free if you wish.

Who Is Supplying The Vaccine?

Pfizer Laboratories, and sponsored by the Knox County Medical Association.

A Greyhound bus with accommodation for 39 people at a cost of \$5. for each person.

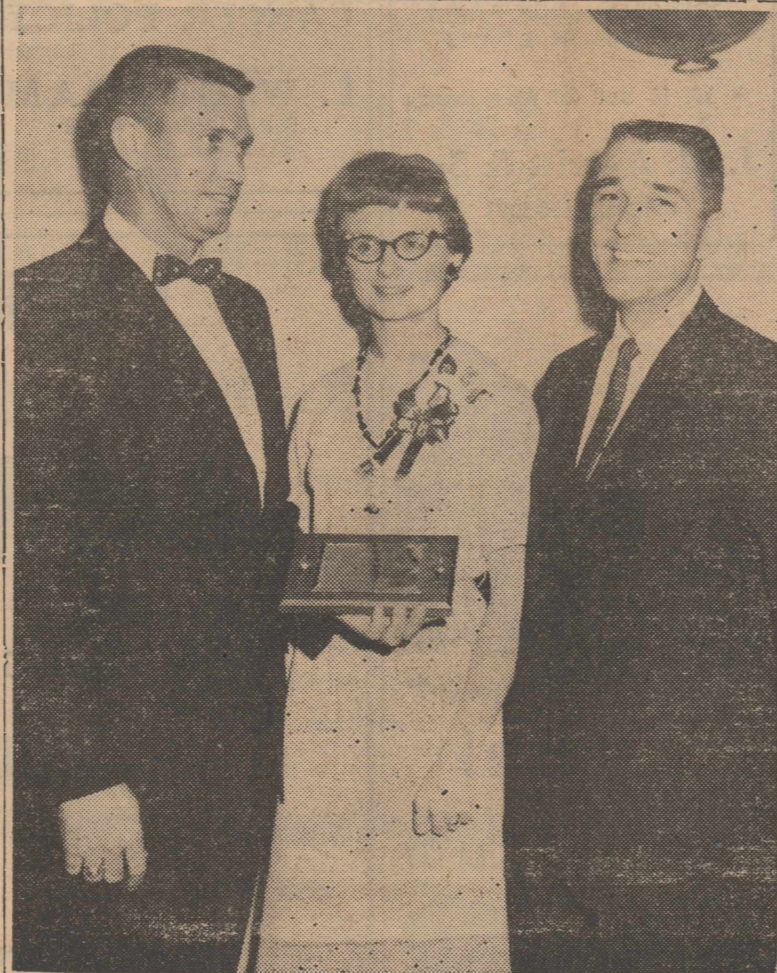
The one price will be made for all out of town games with the exception of Rochester, which would be too close for bus transportation.
