to paint the new garbage cans. He explained he had to attend all Committee meetings on account of him having to open 'em with prayer.

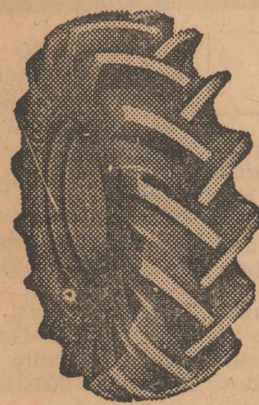
